


## 15<sup>th</sup> Annual 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade

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
## Vehicle License Enforcement to Begin Soon

Monday, July 1<sup>st</sup> was the final day of the regular vehicle registration period. **Beginning Tuesday, July 2<sup>nd</sup>, all residents must display a 2002 vehicle license sticker on their motorized vehicle(s) on the lower right corner of the front windshield.** A \$10 late fee will be charged for those registering their vehicle(s) after June 30th while a monthly \$5 base fee increase becomes effective Thursday, August 1st until your vehicle(s) is registered with the Village. The Village's Police Department will soon begin issuing tickets for all motorized vehicles that don't have a current vehicle sticker displayed.

The adjusted vehicle license sticker fees below include a \$10 late charge:

- \$25 - Passenger Auto
- \$19 - Motorcycle
- \$13 - Senior Citizen
- +\$10 - All Truck Classifications

Residents and businesses who increase their vehicle fleets within the year are given 30 days to purchase a transfer vehicle sticker for a nominal fee from the Village. **The Village will honor a new resident's current vehicle sticker from their previous community until it officially expires.** Those with questions about the Village's vehicle registration program can phone the Village Receptionist at (630) 665-7050.



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## School District #93 News

### \* NEW IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENT

Illinois has recently implemented new immunization regulations for school children. Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, all Illinois preschool and kindergarten school children will be required to receive chickenpox vaccinations before school opens. This vaccine is required in addition to the diphtheria, hepatitis B, measles, mumps, whooping cough, polio, rubella and tetanus vaccinations previously mandated. Due to the demand for chickenpox vaccine, it may not be available for all children needing it prior to the opening of school. A doctor's note indicating that chickenpox vaccine is not available will enable your child to enter school in August. However, the vaccination must be obtained once it becomes available.

### \* NEW & RETURNING STUDENT REGISTRATION

Registration packets for current CCSD 93 students were mailed out in mid-June. Completed packets should be returned no later than Wednesday, July 10th. New student registration will take place at both Jay Stream and Stratford Middle Schools. Families with students who will attend Carol Stream, Western Trails, Heritage Lakes, or Jay Stream Middle Schools will register at Jay Stream. Families with students who will attend Roy DeShane, Elsie Johnson, Cloverdale, or Stratford Middle Schools will register at Stratford. Registration at both sites will take place on Thursday, August 8, from 7:30 a.m. - 2:00 pm and from 4:00 pm - 7:00 pm



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## Heroes Day Celebration at Roy DeShane School

### WATER QUALITY REPORT — 2001

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The Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996 require that all community water systems provide information to their customers concerning the quality of their water. This report complies with this Act by providing information on the source of your drinking water, the results of water sampling, our compliance with drinking water regulations, as well as some brief educational material.

The Village of Carol Stream is committed to providing you with this information. If upon reading this report you should have any questions or wish additional information, you are encouraged to contact either Al Turner, the Director of Public Works, or Bob Hoffrage, the Water Division Supervisor and Chief Water System Operator at 871-6260. Copies of this Water Quality Report are available on the Village's web page at <http://www.carolstream.org>. Additionally, you are always welcome at the regularly scheduled Village Board Meetings that hold an informal Listening Post at approximately 7:30 pm, prior to the 8:00 pm Board Meeting scheduled for every first and third Monday of the month.

The Village of Carol Stream receives Lake Michigan Water that is processed by the City of Chicago at the Jardine Water Filtration Facility, which is the largest purification plant in the world. The Jardine Water Treatment Facility is just north of Navy Pier on the Chicago lakefront. Lake Michigan is the sole source of water used to provide drinking water for Chicago and 123 suburban communities, including Carol Stream. For more information, contact their web page at <http://www.ci.chi.il.us/Water>. The Village of Carol Stream is one of the 23 customers of the DuPage Water Commission who purchases the water from the City of Chicago and transports it to the member communities. The Village of Carol Stream receives its water from the DuPage Water Commission. Water is metered and then pumped into our distribution system and into the elevated and ground storage facilities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small

amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Lake Michigan as one of the Great Lakes is an excellent source of drinking water. However, all sources, including lakes, rivers and wells have a possibility of contamination, including contamination such as:

- **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife;
- **Inorganic contaminants**, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses;
- **Organic chemical contaminant**, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems;
- **Radioactive contaminants**, which may be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care

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providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's *Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791)*.

In order to ensure that our water is safe to drink, the USEPA prescribes regulations that limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Attached are several tables indicating the constituents that are regulated for which the Chicago/ Carol Stream drinking water has been tested. The data is separated into data as tested by the City of Chicago as the parent supply of our drinking water and the Village of Carol Stream as the satellite supplier. We are happy to report that we meet and exceed all regulations. *Neither the City of Chicago nor the Village of Carol Stream had any water quality violations.*

## 2001 SOURCE WATER ASSESSMENT SUMMARY

Based upon Section 141.153(b)2 of the CCR rule, community water supplies are required to report a summary of their source water susceptibility determination, which are compiled by the Illinois EPA.

Our community water supply purchases water from another water supply. The following information relates to that supply's source water.

As of the date of this report, this summary has not been completed. The Illinois EPA must complete all source water assessments by May 2003. As this assessment becomes available, our supply will summarize the results and incorporate the information into this report, as required.

Trees are 2 inches in trunk (caliper) diameter with prices ranging from \$198.00 to \$234.00, delivered balled and burlapped, planted and guaranteed for one entire growing season.

The parkway planting area must meet the tree spacing requirements listed in the parkway tree ordinance. After the individual planting areas are approved, **the staff will invoice the resident for their purchase and payment will be required at that time.** You **do not** have to send payment with your initial order. Requests for tree plantings will be accepted through October 1st. The Village Code (Chapter 12-3-4) states: *"It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, create or maintain any obstruction upon any street, alley, sidewalk or anywhere within a public right-of-way, ..... (3) Objects which tend to impede the flow of traffic or interfere in a dangerous manner with the visibility of pedestrians, bicyclists or the drivers of motor vehicles."* **Parking a vehicle(s) over a public sidewalk is one such obstruction and a violation of Village code. Dangers are created when pedestrians on foot or bike have to skirt the sidewalk to go around a parked car. Don't park your car(s) on the sidewalk.**

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### New Propane Tank Law

As of April 1<sup>st</sup>, it's against Illinois law to have a propane tank on your grill that does not have an OPD (overfill protection device) valve, and illegal for a dealer to refill the old tank. While the tanks themselves won't look different, the top of the valve on each tank must be labeled OPD. The new OPD valve will now be standard in many states adopting this new fire protection law. The new OPD valve prevents propane tanks from being filled to more than 80 % capacity. Propane gas expands if a tank is overfilled beyond the 80% limit and can explode causing burns and fires. The new OPD valve has a "float mechanism" in it, that at 80% capacity, will prevent more propane from getting into the cylinder. The new OPD valve law applies to propane tanks from 4 to 40 pounds. New tanks cost around \$20 and many tanks manufactured after 1998 already have the required OPD valve. Old propane tanks should not be thrown out, but taken to any propane company who will recycle them free of charge. Calls are answered by pharmacists, nurses, physicians, poison information specialists and poison information providers trained in toxicology. Trained specialists have access to computerized cross-referenced **information on over 1 million substances.**

### When do you need to call the IPC?

The IPC provides assistance for persons who have been **exposed to a poison**, are concerned about the **amount of medicine** they may have taken, are involved in a **chemical exposure at work or home**, or **need information about whether a substance is a poison.**

### When Making the Call

1. **Stay Calm** so you can support the person and follow the directions provided by the IPC specialist. Poison specialists are very dedicated personnel and deal with these types of situations every day.
2. **Be Ready to Answer the Following Questions**
  - 1) **Exact Name** of poison/drug/product, or active ingredient
  - 2) Patient's **weight** and **age**
  - 3) **Time of poisoning**
  - 4) **Any symptoms?**
  - 5) **Amount ingested**, if known
  - 6) **Medical history** (such as health problems, current medications, allergies)
3. **Write Down Your Poison Specialist's Name**

The responding poison specialist will tell you their name which you should write down should you need to make a follow-up call for the same case.

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## Sharing the Roads with School Buses

School will be back in session in late August which means motorists will once again have to share the roadways with the many yellow school buses that transport children to school. Motorists should refresh themselves on the many Illinois traffic laws involving school buses, that when observed ensure our children arrive to and from school safely:

- ❑ **Observe the Posted 20 Mph School Zone Speed Limit** when traveling through a school zone.
- ❑ **Stop** when a school bus stops with its red lights flashing and its stop sign arm extended.
- ❑ **On 2 Lane Roads, Both Lanes of Traffic Must Stop** when a school bus stops with its red lights flashing and its stop sign arm extended.
- ❑ **On 1-Way Streets**, all vehicles must stop when a school bus stops with its flashing red lights and stop sign arm extended.
- ❑ **On 4-Lane Roads** where traffic moves in both directions, vehicles traveling in the same direction as a school bus must stop when the bus stops with its red flashing lights and its stop sign arm extended.
- ❑ **Be Aware** that school buses come to a complete stop at all railroad grade crossings before proceeding. Motorists are prohibited from passing a school bus within 1000 feet of a railroad grade crossing.

Illinois motorists convicted of passing a school bus with its stop sign arm extended will lose their driving privileges for 3 months and be fined \$150. Motorists who receive two or more such convictions within a 5-year period will lose their driving privileges for an entire year and be fined \$500 for each violation. 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## Water Conservation Tips

- ◆ Use a rain barrel as the main water source for hand watering plants, flowers and shrubs.
- ◆ Use a toilet brick to reduce the volume of flushed water.
- ◆ Take shorter showers.
- ◆ Don't flush waste paper (paper towels, tissue paper) down the toilet.
- ◆ Don't keep the water running when brushing your teeth.
- ◆ Don't fill the tub when you take a bath.
- ◆ Keep a jar of cold water in the refrigerator.
- ◆ Don't wash and peel vegetables under running water.
- ◆ Run the dishwasher and washing machine only when full.
- ◆ Use a bucket of water when washing the car. Use the hose for rinsing only.
- ◆ Mow your lawn on the highest mower setting possible. (Prevents evaporation of ground water)
- ◆ Water lawn, plants, shrubs and flowers during the coolest part of the day.
- ◆ Use mulch as a top dressing and a soil amendment around trees, shrubs and flowers.
- ◆ Equip your hose(s) with a hand held automatic shut-off sprayer.
- ◆ Forego continuous lawn watering during extremely hot and dry or windy weather conditions.



## Do Not Dump Kitchen Grease Down the Drain

The Village needs your help to keep its sewer system functioning properly. Residents can help avoid repeated repairs and unnecessary disruptions to residences and businesses by not disposing of kitchen and cooking grease down the sink or toilet bowl. While cooking grease and oil are liquids when heated, they harden to a solid in a sewer system where the temperatures are cooler. Overtime grease and oil buildup will clog sewer lines and possibly cause sewer back-ups and flooding. Cooking oil and grease are wastes that place excessive demand on the sewage treatment environment by requiring a longer time and greater resources to breakdown. **You can help by placing cooled cooking oil, poultry and meat fats in a sealed non-recyclable container for disposal with your regular garbage.**



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## 2002 Street Maintenance

The local road system is the largest public infrastructure investment the Village has valued at over \$100,000,000. The cost of reconstructing them is about \$1 million for every mile. For this reason, the Village has been diligent in protecting this investment through an aggressive street maintenance program. The following local streets are scheduled for preventative maintenance this year:

**Crackfilling** – An asphalt liquid reinforced with polyethylene fibers is injected into a street’s stress cracks. Though somewhat unsightly when first applied, crackfill material seals the crack to prevent water from entering the pavement structure and creating larger cracking and eventually potholes.


