



## Pay Your Water/Sewer Bill from the Convenience of Your Home or Business

The Village proudly offers its water and sewer customer a no cost way to pay their utility bill from the convenience of their home or business, 24/7. Its called **e“STREAM”**, the new user-friendly online utility bill payment service that accepts MasterCard, Visa, American Express as well as “STREAM” – line Pay (Direct Debit). Additional **e“STREAM”** features include the ability to receive your water bill via e-mail, review your billing history and e-mail questions to a billing clerk.

To use **e“STREAM”**, simply go to the Village’s Web site at [www.carolstream.org](http://www.carolstream.org) and click on the **e“STREAM”** button, then select “login” and you will be prompted through the simple enrollment process. You can “log in” to the **e“STREAM”** web site to simply browse without having to enroll. To exit, select the “End Session” button at any time. After enrolling for the **e“STREAM”** bill payment service, you will then have the ability to pay your water bill with as few as three “clicks” of your mouse from your computer’s e-mail system. **e“STREAM”** saves water and sewer customers the inconvenience of having to buy stamps, wait in line to pay in person or drive to the Municipal Center water bill drop box to just make the payment deadline to stave off late fee.

All credit card transactions on the **e“STREAM”** web site are highly secure. **e“STREAM”** payer’s credit card numbers will be encrypted by converting the information to an unreadable format before transfer over the internet to the issuing credit card company. When the credit card company’s authorization clerk receives the encrypted data, a decryption key is used to decode the number to its original, readable format. **e“STREAM”** stores the credit number in the encrypted format and therefore not able to be read by the Village. Only you and the Village will only be able to read the last four digits for reference.


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## Village Snow Removal Policy

Each year, residents are asked to follow Village snow removal policies to support the safe and efficient removal of snow and ice from local roads:

1. The Village **ONLY** salts main arterial and local collector streets as needed. The Village does not salt dead ends or cul-de-sacs except those locations that pose special hazards to motorists such as dangerous curves, school crossing zones and roadway inclines.
2. Snow removal operations will begin according to established snowplow routes. These routes have been carefully determined to allow for the optimum use of equipment, manpower and supplies. Snow removal is conducted on village main and through streets **BEFORE** clearing operations begin on side streets, dead ends and cul-de-sacs.
3. The Village **prohibits parking on all streets after a 1" snowfall**. The parking ban allows snow removal crews to make a clean pass of the street by eliminating the potential collision between a parked car and a plow or salt truck. The snow-parking ban remains in effect until the streets have been cleared of snow accumulation.
4. Village snowplows discharge snow from the streets toward the adjacent parkway. **It is IMPOSSIBLE to prevent the deposit of snow at driveway entrances!** Windrows of snow at entrances to driveways are an unavoidable by-product of our effort to clear streets of snow accumulation in the safest and most efficient manner. We ask residents to delay shoveling your drive until the Village's plow trucks have sufficiently cleared the adjacent street.
5. Residents are prohibited from shoveling snow from their driveway apron or sidewalk into the street. Snow can become compact and harden into ice mounds thereby causing a dangerous safety hazard for motorists and emergency vehicles.
6. The Village does not provide snow removal from sidewalks or driveway entrances!
7. The Village will not reimburse homeowners for plow or snow damage to improperly installed curbside mailboxes. Before the snow falls, residents who have concerns about the installation of their mailbox should measure its setback distance in inches from the curb line. Mailboxes located at least one foot (12 inches) behind the curb and 42 inches above grade level are properly installed. (Refer to the diagram included for details on the proper placement of mailboxes)
8. The Village asks residents to keep the sidewalk adjacent to their home clear of snow and ice. Sidewalks have been installed for the convenience of pedestrians who live in the immediate area. Although the Village's Snow removal crews and contractors try to minimize the mounding of snow around fire hydrants, plows are designed to discharge snow to the curb which makes this very difficult. Any assistance that homeowner's can provide to keep fire hydrants in front of their home visible is greatly appreciated.




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## Garage Sale Signs Regulations

Garage sale direction signs not exceeding six square feet in surface area per face and not exceeding four feet in overall height may be placed within the public right-of-way under the following conditions:

- a. Signs may be in place on Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only between the hours of 9:00 AM and 6:00 PM
- b. Signs must be free standing, not attached to any utility pole, or structure nor any traffic control sign.
- c. No attention attracting devices such as pennants, streamers, balloons, inflatable shapes, banners flashing lights or other illumination shall be attached to a garage sale sign or placed in the public right-of-way.
- d. Each sign must have attached an adhesive label or other means to identify the name and daytime telephone number of the person responsible for the placement and removal of each sign.
- e. A maximum of four signs for each garage sale may be placed in the public right-of-way.
- f. No sign greater than 30 inches in height shall be placed within any portion of the 25-foot sight triangle as extended to the street pavement on the triangles third (non right-of-way) side. The triangle is made up of the area 25 feet from the point of intersection of two street right-of-way lines forming a corner.
- g. No more than one sign directing the public in any one direction shall be placed at any intersection.
- h. No garage sale signs may posted at the intersection of Lies Road and Gary Avenue.





## Don't Know What to Do With Your Old Cellular Phone?

The Carol Stream Police Department is asking the public to donate their old cellular phones to a new senior citizen emergency phone program. The Senior Cell Phone Program will provide donated cell phones to senior citizens who would not otherwise have access to such a phone during an emergency. All inactive cellular phones are still capable of sending 9-1-1 emergency calls. These phones do not provide any other cellular access. All 9-1-1 calls generated by a cellular phone in DuPage County are received by the DuPage County Sheriff's Office who in turn forwards the calls to the appropriate jurisdiction. There is no service fee associated with 9-1-1 cellular calls.

Cellular phones will be accepted at the front desk of the Carol Stream Police Department any time of the day or night. Donated phones must be in overall good condition and have a working battery and charging unit. Applications for the Senior Cell Phone Program are available to Carol Stream residents who are:

- \* At least 62 years old or younger than 62 with a physical or mental disability,
- \* Not a cellular phone owner now.

The Senior Cellular Phone program provides residents with an opportunity to recycle their old cellular phone while at the same time providing seniors, who may not be able to afford cellular service, immediate 9-1-1 access in an emergency. 
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## Halloween Safety Tips

Parents and guardians are asked to be sure to review the following trick or treat safety tips with children under their care to make Halloween a real treat.

- 👻 **Make sure the costume fits your child is brightly colored or has reflective marking and is labeled “flame resistant”.**
- 👻 **Costumes accessories like light swords and sabers should be made of soft flexible material.**
- 👻 **Carry a flashlight and makes sure your child’s shoes fit even if they don’t go with the costume.**
- 👻 **Obey traffic signals, cross streets between crosswalks or at intersections.**
- 👻 **Walk, don’t run, don’t cut across yards or driveways and stay on sidewalks. If no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.**
- 👻 **Stay away from and don’t pet dogs you don’t know.**
- 👻 **Children should trick or treat with a parent, adult family friend or guardian.**
- 👻 **Trick or treat in familiar neighborhoods or at the homes of friends and neighbors and avoid unfamiliar and unlit homes.**
- 👻 **Never enter a home, but remain on the stoop or porch for a treat.**
- 👻 **Instruct children not to eat any candy until their parents have inspected it at home.** Wrapped candy should be checked for openings, pin sized holes, or any evidence of tampering. Homemade or unwrapped candy should not be eaten unless it comes from your home, a relative or a family friend.
- 👻 **Check your local paper and TV for locations in your area that provide [candy-checking services](#). If Ever In Doubt, Throw It Out!!!!!!**

## Ever Wonder Why the Traffic Light Changes When an Emergency Vehicle Approaches?

When a fire, police or medical emergency strikes, minutes can mean the difference between rescue and tragedy. Yet all too often, emergency vehicles on their way to an emergency scene are trapped in gridlock or vulnerable to accidents as they speed through intersections against the prevailing traffic signal. Special instruments called Emergency Vehicle Pre-emption devices (EVP), give Police, Fire and EMS vehicles priority status when traveling to emergencies. At signalized intersections along these select routes, optical detectors "read" signals emitted from approaching emergency vehicles. Traffic-signal operation is preempted following detection of these vehicles. EVP's are controlled by a white strobe light on each emergency vehicle, which emits a signal to a receiver on the traffic light when the vehicle approaches. The traffic light will then change to green in the direction the emergency vehicle is traveling and turn red in the opposite direction.

Cross-street traffic is then required to stop, allowing any standing vehicle queues to clear before emergency vehicles arrive at the intersection. Overriding a traffic signal helps emergency vehicles move quickly through an intersection with additional green time instead. The proximity of the approaching vehicle and the status of the traffic light guide the decision to allow a light to remain green beyond its normal cycle. A **flashing white confirmation light means** the emergency vehicle is approaching from the roadway you are currently on. A **solid white confirmation light means** an emergency vehicle is approaching from the opposite direction. If you see emergency lights or hear emergency sirens, slow down and pull to the right to allow the emergency vehicle to pass in either direction. Once the vehicle has passed carefully resume your normal speed. So remember, **"Pull Right for Sirens and Lights."**

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## Have a Fire Safe Holiday



**Keep Matches & Lighters Out of Your Child's Reach** - store matches and lighters up high in a cabinet or in a locked drawer and teach your children to stay away from candles, fireplaces and space heaters.

**Choose Toys Wisely** - Take a pass on toys that are highly flammable and make sure electric powered toys have an Underwriters Laboratory (UL) safety certification label on the cord.

**Give Space Heaters Space** - Keep space heater units at least 3 feet from any combustible surface. Never use gasoline or diesel fuel to power a kerosene heater. Only kerosene fuel goes in a kerosene heater.

**Party Safely** - Make sure your holiday decorations are flame retardant or non-combustible. Provide large deep ashtrays for smokers and make sure the butts are cool before dumping ashtrays.

**Check Out Lights** - Use outdoor lights outdoors and indoor lights indoors and make sure they have the Underwriters Laboratory safety certification on the cord. **Replace all light strands that have loose connections or frayed cords.** Never put lights on a metal tree and always unplug holiday lights before going to bed.

**A Fire Safe Fireplace - Have your home's chimney inspected each year** by a certified chimney inspection and cleaning company. Always use a fire screen and burn only those materials designed for fireplaces. Never burn paper in a chimney and install a spark arrestor on your chimney cap if you don't already have one.

**Care with Candles** - Put candles in candle sticks before you light them and never use candles in a decorative holiday display or place them in windows or near exits.

**Choose a Fresh Tree** - Look for a holiday tree that is not shedding its needles. Trim the tree's trunk at an angle before securing it in a non-tip stand. Check the tree's water supply regularly and place the tree away from heat sources especially furnace heat registers.

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## Final 2002 Village Tree Branch Collections



- ✓ Monday, October 7<sup>th</sup>

Please note that the Village's program is different than Flood Brother's program in that it accepts high volumes tree branch piles no larger than 4 feet high, running 10 feet along the curb and individual limbs that are between 4 to 10 feet long and no more than 10 inches in diameter. Larger piles will *not* be picked up. Residents are only allowed one branch pile per month which requires a yellow \$5 Village tree branch waste sticker. However, Flood Brothers will continue to pick-up yard waste including tree branches through the final yard waste collection week of December 2<sup>nd</sup> - 6<sup>th</sup>. **Tree branch piles placed at the curb for collection after the Village's November collection** will require a \$1.25 Flood Brothers green yard waste sticker and cannot be larger than 4 ft. long and 2 ft. in diameter per sticker.

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## Upcoming Refuse Collection Holidays



There will be no refuse collection on:

Thanksgiving Day	Thursday, November 28 <sup>th</sup>
Christmas Day	Wednesday, December 25 <sup>th</sup>
New Year's Day	Wednesday January 1 <sup>st</sup>

Refuse collection is scheduled one day later than usual to accommodate these national holidays. **Please note** that the December 2<sup>nd</sup> collection week is the last week for yard waste collection. Flood Brothers yard waste collection service will resume during the March 17<sup>th</sup> 2003 collection week.

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## Holiday Tree, Wreath & Bough Collection

Because compost facilities are closed during the winter months, disposal of Christmas trees as general refuse is the only disposal alternative available. Holiday greenery will be collected with regular refuse from **January 2<sup>nd</sup> - 14<sup>th</sup>**! **Please note** that a yard waste sticker is not required for collection during this 10-day period. Residents who place their holiday greenery out at the curbside for pickup after Tuesday, January 14<sup>th</sup> may be charged a bulk item collection fee.

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### → 65¢ Leaf Stickers Sold during 6 weeks in the Fall

Flood Brothers offers a leaf sticker for only 65¢ to be used for fall leaf disposal during a designated 6-week collection period. There is no limit placed on the amount of leaf bags or cans a resident can place at the curb for disposal. Residents must dispose of their leaves in a kraft paper bag or a 32-gallon rigid container. Leaves placed in plastic bags or mixed with other yard waste will not be collected. Residents will **save 60¢ a bag or can by using a leaf sticker** rather than the regular \$1.25 yard waste sticker. **Fall leaf stickers are available at: the Village Hall, Ace Hardware** (County Farm Shopping Plaza), **Carol Stream Foods** (Elk Trail Shopping Center), **Family Foods** (Army Trail & County Farm Rd.) **Dominick's Finer Foods (2 Locations: Geneva & Schmale Rd. & in Bloomingdale @ Gary Ave./Schick Rd.)**, **Convenient Food Mart** (590 Kuhn Road) and **Jewel** (Heritage Plaza Shopping Ctr.). ### → Free Leaf Collection Scheduled for the November 25<sup>th</sup> Collection Week

During the **November 25<sup>th</sup> collection week**, Flood Brothers offers a free one-week fall leaf pickup. During this week, residents may place **an unlimited amount of leaves** in a kraft paper bag or a 32-gallon container for collection **at no charge**. Leaves placed at curbside may not be mixed with other types of yard waste such as grass, sod, or twigs and branch material or the load will be rejected for pick-up.

### → Ordinance Prohibits Raking Leaves into the Street/Curb

Chapter 9, Article 1, Section 8 & 10 of the Village Code states that “It shall be unlawful to throw or deposit garbage, refuse and yard waste on any public or private property within the Village, including retention/detention basins, creeks, whether occupied or unoccupied, except that the owner or person in control of the property may maintain private receptacles for garbage, refuse and yard waste which are waste products resulting from the occupancy of the property itself.” **(Sec. 8)**

“Any person, firm, or corporation violating any provision of this chapter shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for each offense with a separate offense determined on each consecutive day that the violation continues.” **(Sec. 10)**

In Illinois, like many states, health care providers are prohibited by state solid waste regulations from disposing of medical waste such as needles and lancets in the trash. However, medical waste generated in the home is not prohibited from being thrown out in the trash despite health risks to solid waste collection agents. Advances in healthcare and the desire of patients to administer their own care within their home will significantly increase the use of self-injection drugs over the next decade. The risk of accidentally being stuck by a needle thrown in the trash and the resulting potential for Hepatitis B, C or HIV from such an injury has created a need for mail back programs for medical sharps.

Waste Management and Sharps have teamed up to address this solid waste disposal problem by offering a program that provides the self-treating patient a worry-free needle disposal service. WMI and Sharps offer a variety of mailback sharps containers to provide the home user and the professional a total system for the safe disposal of sharps waste. There are several container sizes available for the home user that meet all local, state and federal requirements and provide a worry-free, responsible and safe needle disposal system. 

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## Paint Recycling & Reuse Options

### ⇒ Latex Paint

DuPage County has established a recycling facility for the collection and reuse of residential latex paint. Only residential latex paint that is less than 10 years old and never been frozen or mixed with other products will be accepted. DuPage county residents can drop off their unwanted containers of latex paint at the DuPage Woodridge Greene Valley Wastewater Treatment Facility on the 1<sup>st</sup> Saturday of each month between 8 AM and noon through Saturday, October 6th. Residents can also pick up consolidated latex paint “as is” on the first Saturday of the month (April - October) from 8 AM until noon and Tuesdays and Thursdays year round between 8 AM and 3 PM Remixed latex paint may be picked up outside scheduled hours by phoning (630) 985-7400. Commercial or business-generated latex paint will not be accepted. DuPage County’s Greene Valley Wastewater facility is located at 7900 S. Rt. 53 in Woodridge.

### ⇒ Oil Based Paint

Oils based paints and paints containing lead, cadmium or mercury are considered hazardous and can be brought to the City of Naperville Fire House #3 located at 1971 Brookdale Rd. on Saturday and/or Sunday between 9 AM and 3 PM

### ⇒ Partners for Paint Waste Solutions

As part of their Partners for Paint Waste Solutions program, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) has agreements with local hardware and paint stores to collect and recycle old paint for a small fee. Three area locations that accept paint waste are:

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## 2002 American Cancer Society Relay for Life Postscript


