



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## Fond Farewells and a Warm Welcome

On May 5<sup>th</sup>, the Village Board and staff recognized outgoing Village Trustee Linda Pugh for her 18 years of public service to the community. First elected in April of 1985, Trustee Pugh served two consecutive terms of office through April 1993. In December of 1996, Mayor Ferraro appointed Trustee Pugh to fill a Board vacancy after which she was elected to a third term in office in April 1999. During her 18 years as a Village Board member, Trustee Pugh championed efficiencies and economies that supported the Village's mission of fiscal. Trustee Pugh is thanked for her years of hard work and attention to detail that has helped support the high quality of life the community enjoys.

On June 2<sup>nd</sup>, Trustee John Fioti was recognized for his 4 years of public service to the community. Beginning in January 1999, John served on the Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals through August of 2000 after which he was appointed to the Board of Fire and Police Commissioners. On May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2001, John was elected to serve as a Village Trustee. Trustee Fioti resigned from the Village Board on June 2<sup>nd</sup> as he is moving to a new residence in a neighboring community.

On May 5<sup>th</sup>, Rick Gieser was sworn into office as the newest member of the Village Board of Trustees. Rick was born and raised in Carol Stream and attended District #93 schools and Glenbard North H.S. before attending and graduating from Indiana University. Rick has been active in the community as member of the Carol Stream Historical Society, was a 2002 Community Pride Award Judge, a 2002 Citizen of the Year nominee, a Secretary on the Village's Board of Fire and Police Commissioners and a member of the Park District's Citizen Advisory Committee. Rick and wife Kim have a 4-year old son Ricky. A warm welcome to Trustee Gieser as he begins the first year of a 4-year term as a Village Trustee.

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## Community Activity Fund Grant Deadline is Friday, October 31<sup>st</sup>

The Village administers a Community Activity Fund grant program whose purpose it is to support the efforts of local civic organizations and social service agencies in addressing the needs of "at risk" Carol Stream residents. Eligible organizations that have a primary mission to provide services that address unmet human and social needs, are a registered nonprofit organization are **encouraged to submit a formal grant application for funding consideration by Friday, October 31<sup>st</sup>**. The maximum grant request is \$1,000 and funded organizations must then submit a detailed financial expenditure report to the Village Manager specifically detailing the expenditure of funds.

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## 2003-04 Village Budget & 3-Year Financial Plan

The Village Board has reviewed the adopted 2003-04 Annual Budget and 2004-2006 Financial Plan. The Financial Plan details the resources necessary to fund Village services and public improvements for the next three years.

The Village's Financial Plan is different from a traditional municipal budget that focuses on short-term revenues and expenditures (one year only). A Financial Plan broadens the scope to include three years of revenue and expense projections and a detailed financial forecasting model to substantiate these medium-range plans. A Financial Plan also differs from a traditional budget in that a multi-year financial plan serves as a planning, organizing, decision-making and communication tool for elected officials to anticipate how current policy decisions will impact tomorrow's finances.



The Village's Financial Plan consists of three distinct elements namely the Operating, the Capital and Special funds. The budget includes \$23.1 million is for the Operating Element and \$3.4 million for the Special Funds Element. The Capital element includes \$8.1 million in improvement projects.

The General Corporate Fund accounts for the majority of traditional government services. The General Corporate Fund Operating budget for this coming fiscal year totals \$16.6 million. Of that total, \$9.3 million is earmarked for Public Safety (Police), \$3.3 million for Public Works programs, \$1.4 million for Financial and Support Services, \$1.7 million for Community Development and Engineering Services, \$.9 million for Legislative Board, Commissions, Legal Services and Village Administration. Approximately 56.5% or \$10 million of the General Corporate revenues are from state-shared sources such as sales, income and telecommunications tax receipts. **The Village does not levy a local property tax.**

### Details of the 2003-04 Budget include:

1. A .5% home-rule sales tax was levied to help restore significant revenue loss from Pella Windows' transfer of sales tax to Rockford.
2. The utility tax on natural gas was rescinded and replaced with a 2.5¢/therm natural gas use tax.
3. Due to budget constraints, the following cutbacks were made:
  - 6<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> vacant positions were frozen and not included in the budget;
  - the Road Maintenance program was reduced by 50%.
4. The Water Reclamation Center expansion will be completed in FY04.

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
## Water & Sewer Rate Increase Took Effect May 1<sup>st</sup>

On April 7<sup>th</sup>, 2003, the Village Board approved Ordinance 2003-04-15 that increased the sewer rate by 20¢/1,000 gallons from \$1.80 to \$2.00. This sewer rate increase took effect on May 1, 2003 and will apply to water consumption through April 30, 2004. This is the first of three annual 20¢/1,000 gallon rate increases needed to repay the loan taken out to fund the \$8 million Water Reclamation Center expansion. The other two rate increases will take effect on May 1<sup>st</sup> of 2004 and 2005.



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## Tired of Telemarketing Calls? Register your Phone Number(s) on the National “Do Not Call” Registry



The Restricted Call Registry Act was signed into law August 9<sup>th</sup>, 2002 to reduce unsolicited telemarketing calls. The Act requires the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) to establish and maintain a registry of telephone numbers submitted by residential subscribers who do not want to be called by telemarketers. This past spring the Federal Trade Commission announced plans to establish a national “do not call” Registry. The Illinois Restricted Call Registry Act allows the Illinois Commerce Commission to adopt the FTC registry as its own and coordinate a state-wide time table to coincide with FTC implementation efforts.

In July, the Federal Trade Commission will make available nationwide online registration for the “Do Not Call” Registry. When registration opens in July, consumers can register for free in two ways: online or by telephone. Telephone registration for the National “Do Not Call” Registry will be available to consumers coast-to-coast during July 2003. Online registration will be available nationwide on or around July 1<sup>st</sup>. Telephone registration will open for consumers in states west of the Mississippi River – including Minnesota and Louisiana – on the same date. Telephone registration will be available one week later to the entire country. Telemarketers and other sellers will have access to the registry in September. In October, States and the FTC will begin enforcement.

The FTC will not allow private companies or other such third parties to “pre-register” consumers for the national Do Not Call registry. [Web sites or phone solicitations that claim they can or will register a consumer’s name or phone number on a national list – especially those that charge a fee – are a scam.](#) Consumers will be able to register directly with the FTC, or through some state governments, but never private companies. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) has amended the Telemarketing Sales Rule (TSR) to give consumers a choice about whether they want to receive most telemarketing calls. Consumers soon will be able to put their phone numbers on a national “do not call” registry. It will be illegal for most telemarketers to call a number listed on the registry. So check back often for all you need to know about the national “do not call” registry and the amended Telemarketing Sale Rules.

### WATER QUALITY REPORT – 2002

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The Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996 require that all community water systems provide information to their customers concerning the quality of their water. This report complies with this Act by providing information on the source of your drinking water, the results of water sampling, our compliance with drinking water regulations, as well as some brief educational material.

The Village of Carol Stream is committed to providing you with this information. If upon reading this report you should have any questions or wish additional information, you are encouraged to contact either Al Turner, the Director of Public Works, or Bob Hoffrage, the Water Division Supervisor and Chief Water System Operator at 871-6260. Copies of this Water Quality Report are available on the Village's web page at <http://www.carolstream.org>. Additionally, you are always welcome at the regularly scheduled Village Board Meetings that hold an informal Listening Post at approximately 7:30 PM, prior to the 8:00 PM Board Meeting scheduled for every first and third Monday of the month.

The Village of Carol Stream receives Lake Michigan Water that is processed by the City of Chicago at the Jardine Water Filtration Facility, which is the largest purification plant in the world. The Jardine Water Treatment Facility is just north of Navy Pier on the Chicago lakefront. Lake Michigan is the sole source of water used to provide drinking water for Chicago and 123 suburban communities, including Carol Stream. For more information, contact their web page at <http://www.ci.chi.il.us/Water>. The Village of Carol Stream is one of the 23 customers of the DuPage Water Commission who purchases the water from the City of Chicago and transports it to the member communities. The Village of Carol Stream receives its water from the DuPage Water Commission. Water is metered and then pumped into our distribution system and into the elevated and ground storage facilities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's *Safe Drinking Water Hotline* (1-800-426-4791).

Lake Michigan as one of the Great Lakes is an excellent source of drinking water. However, all sources, including lakes, rivers and wells have a possibility of contamination, including contamination such as:

- **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife;
- **Inorganic contaminants**, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses;
- **Organic chemical contaminant**, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems;
- **Radioactive contaminants**, which may be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's *Safe Drinking Water Hotline* (1-800-426-4791).

In order to ensure that our water is safe to drink, the USEPA prescribes regulations that limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Attached are several tables indicating the constituents that are regulated for which the Chicago/Carol Stream drinking water has been tested. The data is separated into data as tested by the City of Chicago as the parent supply of our drinking water and the Village of Carol Stream as the satellite supplier. We are happy to report that we meet and exceed all regulations. **Neither the City of Chicago nor the Village of Carol Stream had any water quality violations.**

**TURBIDITY (NTU)**

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

**UNREGULATED CONTAMINANTS:**

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

**FLUORIDE**

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommend an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

**SODIUM**

There is not a state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.

The parkway planting area must meet the tree spacing requirements listed in the parkway tree ordinance. After the individual planting areas are approved, **the staff will invoice the resident for their purchase and payment will be required at that time.** You **do not** have to send payment with your initial order. Requests for tree plantings will be accepted through September 30<sup>th</sup>. 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## Garage Sale Signs Regulations

Garage sale direction signs not exceeding six square feet in surface area per face and not exceeding four feet in overall height may be placed within the public right-of-way under the following conditions:

- a. Signs may be in place on Thursdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays only between the hours of 9:00 AM and 6:00 PM
- b. Signs must be free standing, not attached to any utility pole, or structure nor any traffic control sign.
- c. No attention attracting devices such as pennants, streamers, balloons, inflatable shapes, banners flashing lights or other illumination shall be attached to a garage sale sign or placed in the public right-of-way.
- d. Each sign must have attached an adhesive label or other means to identify the name and daytime telephone number of the person responsible for the placement and removal of each sign.
- e. A maximum of four signs for each garage sale may be placed in the public right-of-way.
- f. No sign greater than 30 inches in height shall be placed within any portion of the 25-foot sight triangle as extended to the street pavement on the triangles third (non right-of-way) side. The triangle is made up of the area 25 feet from the point of intersection of two street right-of-way lines forming a corner.
- g. No more than one sign directing the public in any one direction shall be placed at any intersection.
- h. No garage sale signs may posted at the intersection of Lies Road and Gary Avenue.

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## Sculpture Unveiled at September 30<sup>th</sup> Community Arts Festival



The unveiling and dedication of several massive sculpture panels co-created by nearly 900 young people will be the focal point of a community-wide arts festival at Jay Stream Middle School, 283 El Paso Lane, Tuesday, September 30<sup>th</sup>, from 6:30-8:30 PM Arts festival sponsors extend an open invitation to everyone in the community to join in the multi-faceted celebration of the arts in Carol Stream.

With planning under way, event steering committee members representing the Village, School District 93, Library, Park District, Chamber of Commerce, Woman's Club, Rotary, Historical Society and Jay Stream School, are combining resources and ideas to develop a program with broad appeal to art lovers throughout the community.

"The Jay Stream School sculptures reflect the combined talents of nearly 900 young people from throughout our community, who participated in an innovative arts residency in the closing weeks of the 2002-03 school year," said Jan Hanselman, Community Coordinator. "We will celebrate the artistic accomplishment of these young people and help expand on that enthusiasm for the arts by featuring artistic contributions from throughout the community."

Every student at Jay Stream School had a hands-on role in co-creating the sculptures either sculpting, modeling, painting, creating masks of faces, arms, legs, clothing, objects and more during the week-long arts residency in May. Portrait artist Kevin Olis of Algonquin and Jay Stream School art teacher Donna Krusenoski directed the students in their effort to depict "The Jay Stream Middle School Experience."

The concept for the project took shape in April when students throughout the school met with Olis, a former teacher for 18 years and artist for 20, in a series of mass "brainstorming sessions." In separate assemblies, the school's sixth, seventh, and eighth grade students shared ideas and modeled poses for activities that define their days at Jay Stream. Artist Olis sketched the student models in motion, assembling a library of illustrations that provide the foundation for this week's creation.

The project was funded in part by a \$1,000 grant from the Illinois Arts Council, an agency of the State. The Jay Stream School Student Council elected to provide \$1,500 in funding, with Jay Stream School's PTA committing \$2,000 to the project. Additional contributors include the Carol Stream Rotary and Republicans of Bloomingdale Township.

### • Immunization Requirement

All Illinois preschool and kindergarten school children are required to receive chickenpox vaccinations before school opens. This vaccine is required in addition to the diphtheria, hepatitis B, measles, mumps, whooping cough, polio, rubella and tetanus vaccinations previously mandated. Due to the demand for chickenpox vaccine, it may not be available for all children needing it prior to the opening of school. A doctor's note indicating that chickenpox vaccine is not available will enable your child to enter school in August. However, the vaccination must be obtained once it becomes available.

### • New Student Registration

Registration packets for current CCSD 93 students were mailed out in mid-June. **Completed packets should be returned no later than Wednesday, July 9<sup>th</sup>.** New student registration will take place at both Jay Stream and Stratford Middle Schools. Families with students who will attend Carol Stream, Western Trails, Heritage Lakes, or Jay Stream will register at Jay Stream Middle School. Families with students who will attend Roy DeShane, Elsie Johnson, Cloverdale, or Stratford will register at Stratford Middle School. Registration at both sites will take place on Thursday, August 7<sup>th</sup>, from 7:30 AM - 2:00 PM and from 4:00 PM - 7:00 PM

### • Back-to-School Activity

On Friday, August 22<sup>nd</sup>, all District 93 schools will host "Meet the Teacher" activities to welcome returning and new students to the new school year. Activities are scheduled at both middle schools from 9-10:30 AM and at all six elementary schools from 11 AM -12:30 PM



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## Cell Phones & Gas Stations Don't Mix



Shell Oil Co. recently issued a warning after three incidents in which cellular phones ignited fumes during refueling. The first incident occurred when a customer put a cellular phone on their car's trunk during refueling that rang igniting gas vapors that destroyed the car and the gas pump. The second incident occurred when a customer answered a cell call during refueling which subsequently ignited gas vapors causing severe burns to their face. The third incident occurred when a customer whose cell was in their pocket, rang, igniting gas fumes that caused severe burns to their thighs and groin.

Cellular phones release enough energy when turned on and when they ring to create a charge sufficient to ignite a flash fire or explosion. Never use cell phones when refueling your car, truck, boat and lawn mower, etc. Cell phones should also be turned off around other materials that generate flammable or explosive fumes or dust, such as solvents, chemicals, grain dust, etc.

Another gas station safety warning involves the danger static electricity can cause during refueling. The Petroleum Equipment Institute (PEI) started a campaign to make people aware of the fire hazard caused by static electricity during refueling. The Institute researched 150 cases of gas station fires caused by static electricity and cites the following trends:

- 1) Most of the 150 cases involved women;
- 2) The majority of the cases involved a person who returned to their car during refueling. At the completion of refueling, the person exited their car to pull the nozzle out and a static charge on their clothing ignited a fire;
- 3) Most of the victims were wearing rubber-soled shoes;
- 4) Don't ever use cell phones when pumping gas;
- 5) It is the vapors that come out of the gas that cause the fire when connected with static charges;
- 6) The make and model of the vehicle's which caught fire varied;
- 7) 17 of the fires caused by a static electricity charge occurred before, during or immediately after the gas cap was removed and before fueling began.



The Institute cautions to **NEVER** return to your vehicle during refueling. If returning to your vehicle is **ABSOLUTELY UNAVOIDABLE**, make sure that after exiting your vehicle, you close the vehicle's door touching the door's metal panel to discharge any static from your body before removing the nozzle from the gas tank. 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## Senior News – Prescription Drug Discounts

**Pharmaceutical Assistance Circuit Breaker program** is a tax relief program through the Illinois Department of Revenue that provides discount prescription medication for those diagnosed with arthritis, diabetes, heart conditions, high-blood pressure, glaucoma, cancer, Alzheimer's, osteoporosis, Parkinson's or a smoking-related illness. Applicants must be at least 65 years old or totally disabled with an annual income of less than \$21,218, and be an Illinois resident when the claim is filed. Single applicants whose income is less than \$8,590 will pay an annual fee of \$5 and have no co-payment charges for their prescription medication. Other eligible applicants will pay an annual fee of \$25 and a \$3 co-payment for each prescription. The program pays for medication expenses until the prescription payout totals \$2,000. Thereafter, the applicant must then pay 20% of the cost of each prescription. Payments are based upon the State of Illinois's fiscal year that begins July 1<sup>st</sup>.

**Senior Care program** is a new program intended to help low-income residents pay for prescription medication. Persons whose income is no more than \$17,720 or married couples with annual incomes of \$22,880 or less are eligible for program assistance. The no-fee SeniorCare program covers most prescription drugs and many over-the-counter drugs prescribed by a physician. Individuals earning less than \$8,859 a year or married couples with income less than \$11,939 a year, SeniorCare will pay for the first \$1,750 in prescription costs and 20% thereafter. For individuals earning between \$8,860 and \$17,720 a year or married couples whose income is between \$11,940 and \$23,880 a year, SeniorCare will pay for the first \$1,750 in prescription costs while the senior pays \$1 for generics or \$4 for brand name medication. After that, seniors pay the \$1 or \$4 co-payment plus 20% of the prescription's cost.



## Senior & Disabled Taxi Program Changes

On April 21<sup>st</sup>, the Village Board voted to join the Senior and Disabled Pilot II Paratransit Taxi program. This coordinated paratransit program provides registered clients a choice of taxi companies, limits pickup windows to 15 minutes, expands trips boundaries anywhere in DuPage county, requires customer service training for taxi drivers and will soon have computerized dispatch technology to assist in efficiently scheduling ride reservations. The service provided by taxi companies is continuously monitored by members of a Consumer Advisory Committee comprised of seniors and disabled residents who are also Pilot II customers.

Under the new Village program, registered clients are limited to using 20 coupons a month. Please be aware that clients who fail to cancel a reserved ride may be charged a \$10 “no show” fee.

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## Do Not Park Over Sidewalks

The Village Code (Chapter 12-3-4) states: *“It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, create or maintain any obstruction upon any street, alley, sidewalk or anywhere within a public right-of-way, ..... (3) Objects which tend to impede the flow of traffic or interfere in a dangerous manner with the visibility of pedestrians, bicyclists or the drivers of motor vehicles.”* Parking a vehicle(s) over a public sidewalk is one such obstruction and a violation of Village code. Dangers are created when pedestrians on foot or bike have to skirt the sidewalk to go around a parked car. Don't park your car(s) on the sidewalk.



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## Vehicle License Enforcement to Begin

Monday, June 30<sup>th</sup> was the final day of the regular vehicle registration period. **Beginning Tuesday, July 1<sup>st</sup>, all residents must display a 2003 vehicle license sticker on their motorized vehicle(s) on the lower right corner of the front windshield.** A \$10 late fee will be charged for those registering their vehicle(s) after June 30<sup>th</sup> while a monthly \$5 base fee increase becomes effective Friday, August 1<sup>st</sup> until your vehicle(s) is registered with the Village. The Village's Police Department will soon begin issuing tickets for all motorized vehicles that don't have a current vehicle sticker displayed. The adjusted vehicle license sticker fees below include a \$10 late charge:

- \$25 - Passenger Auto
- \$19 - Motorcycle
- \$13 - Senior Citizen
- +\$10 - All Truck Classifications



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## A Primer on Outdoor Warning Sirens



The Village maintains and operates a network of 7 outdoor warning sirens, designed to warn the public of impending weather and other disaster conditions. These sirens are mounted on poles throughout the Village and are designed to warn persons who are outdoors during a threatening event to seek shelter. **Outdoor warning sirens are engineered and designed to be heard outside and not to be heard inside every building in the coverage area, as they are not effective for warning in air-conditioned or tightly insulated buildings or homes.**

### Alert Warning (Peacetime Emergency)

**Length/Sound of Alert:** 3-5 Minute Steady Siren

- Criteria for Alert:**
- (1) Confirmed sighting by a trained severe weather spotter of a tornado or funnel cloud aloft within 5 miles of the community;
  - (2) A confirmed sighting by a trained severe weather spotter of winds causing structural damage within 5 miles of the community;
  - (3) Receipt of a tornado warning from National Weather Service indicating the community is in the direct path of an oncoming tornado.

**Action to be Taken:** Immediately seek shelter and once indoors rely on indoor warning systems of radio, tone-activated weather receivers and/or TV for additional information and instructions.

### Attack Warning Signal

**Length/Sound of Alert:** 3-5 Minute Wavering Siren

**Criteria for Alert:** Actual attack or a detected missile launch against the United States has been detected and protective action should be taken immediately

**Action to be Taken:** Immediately seek shelter and once indoors rely on indoor warning systems of radio, tone-activated weather receivers and/or TV for additional information and instructions.

Once activated, outdoor warning sirens for severe weather will not be resounded for the same storm cell or sighting. The warning siren will however be resounded for a new confirmed sighting or second storm cell that meets the activation criteria.

Outdoor warnings systems will not be sounded to signal the termination of a weather watch or any kind of 'all clear' advisory. Only the National Weather Service (NWS) can issue an 'all clear' statement to signal the expiration of a tornado/severe weather watch or warning. Severe weather warnings are typically issued for 30 minutes to an hour and usually allowed to expire on their own. Residents should monitor commercial radio and TV for the issuance of an 'all clear' advisory from the NWS. A siren sounded after a local activation should never be interpreted as an 'all clear' as it may likely be a siren activation from a neighboring community.

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## DuPage County Paint Recycling Drop-off & Pick-up Hours

As a member of the IEPA's Partners for Waste Paint Solutions Program, DuPage County established a Paint Recycling Facility for the purpose of accepting residential latex waste paint and providing recycled latex paint to the public for reuse. The consolidated latex paint is provided "as is" with no warranty of any kind, expressed or implied. The DuPage County Paint Recycling Facility is located at the Woodridge Wastewater Treatment Facility at 7900 S. Route 53 in Woodridge. **There is no charge for residents to drop-off waste paint or pick up recycled paint.** For more information on the Paint Management Program, call (630) 985-7400.

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## Mosquito Health Advisory

In addition to observing the above breeding control measures detailed in the spring newsletter issue, Village officials advise the general public to take the following personal precautions to reduce your risk of becoming infected with the WNV:

- *Avoid places and times when mosquitoes bite.* Generally, peak biting periods occur just before and after sunset and again just before dawn. Each species, however, has its own peak period of biting. Tree-hole and Asian tiger mosquitoes, feed during daylight hours in or near shaded or wooded areas.
- *Be sure door and window screens are tight fitting* and in good repair.
- *Wear appropriate clothing.* Long-sleeved tops and long pants made of tightly woven materials keep mosquitoes away from the skin. Be sure that your clothing is light colored. Keep trouser legs tucked into boots or socks.
- *Use mosquito netting when sleeping outdoors* or in an unscreened structure and to protect small babies any time.
- *When it is necessary to be outdoors, apply insect repellent as indicated on the product label.* The more DEET a product contains, the longer the repellent can protect against mosquito bites. However, concentrations higher than 50 percent do not increase the length of protection. For most situations, 10 - 25 % DEET concentration is adequate. Apply repellents to clothes whenever possible; apply sparingly to exposed skin if label permits. Consult a physician before using repellents on young children.

The Illinois Department of Public Health has established a West Nile virus (WNV) hotline in the Division of Environmental Health that is staffed Monday through Friday between 8:30 AM - 5:00 PM. Graduate students trained in handling public inquiries regarding West Nile Virus will record surveillance data into a database and respond to e-mail inquiries from callers. Voicemail will be activated in the evenings and on weekends and calls will be returned as soon as possible. Hotline hours of operation may change if human cases of WNV are reported and the volume of calls increase.




