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### Affordable Health Screenings

**Corpus Christi Catholic Church, located at 1415 W. Lies Rd.** will host a Life Line Screening for the Carol Stream community on Friday, October 29<sup>th</sup>. Life Line screens the carotid arteries in the neck to determine if you are at risk for stroke. Life Line will also offers a bone density screening to test for early detection of osteoporosis. These non-invasive, completely painless, ultrasound screenings take about 10 minutes each. Each of the 3 vascular tests is offered for \$ 45 while the bone-density screening costs \$ 35. Complete vascular screening (3 tests) for \$ 99, or all 4 tests for \$125. **To schedule your appointment, phone Life Line at 1-800-407-4557 as pre-registration is required!!**



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### Prescription Drug Card Scam Alert

On June 1<sup>st</sup>, the US Department of Health & Human Services approved 27 prescription drug discount cards to our nation's Medicare/Medicaid beneficiaries. Soon thereafter, a number of drug card scams occurred in various parts of our nation. All issued prescription drug discount cards approved by the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) bear the Medicare Rx seal. (see insignia below)

Approved card sponsors do not conduct cold calls and therefore no individual should ever receive a sales call from a card sponsor, unless they have personally requested information from an ad or direct mail piece. Beneficiaries are warned to never share bank account, a health insurance card or your social security number with any individual who calls or comes to your door claiming to sell any Medicare related product. **If you suspect you are unlawfully solicited by a fraudulent drug card company,** contact Medicare at **1-800-MEDICARE**, or the Office of the Inspector General's Fraud Hotline at **(1-800) 447-8477** or phone emergency **9-1-1**.

## Holiday Fire Safety Tips:

**Keep Matches & Lighters Out of Your Child's Reach** - store matches and lighters up high in a cabinet or in a locked drawer and teach your children to stay away from candles, fireplaces and space heaters.

**Choose Toys Wisely** - Take a pass on toys that are highly flammable and make sure electric powered toys have an Underwriters Laboratory (UL) safety certification label on the cord.

**Give Space Heaters Space** - Keep space heater units at least 3 feet from any combustible surface. Never use gasoline or diesel fuel to power a kerosene heater. Only kerosene fuel goes in a kerosene heater.

**Party Safely** - Make sure your holiday decorations are flame retardant or non-combustible. Provide large deep ashtrays for smokers and make sure the butts are cool before dumping ashtrays.

**Check Out Lights** - Use outdoor lights outdoors and indoor lights indoors and make sure they have the Underwriters Laboratory safety certification on the cord. Replace all light strands that have loose connections or frayed cords. Never put lights on a metal tree and always unplug holiday lights before going to bed.

**Fire Safe Your Fireplace** - Have your home's chimney inspected each year by a certified chimney inspection and cleaning company. Always use a fire screen and burn only those materials designed for fireplaces. Never burn paper in a chimney and install a spark arrestor on your chimney cap if you don't already have one.

**Exercise Care with Candles** - Put candles in candle sticks before you light them and never use candles in a decorative holiday display or place them in windows or near exits.

**Choose a Fresh Holiday Tree** - Look for a holiday tree that is not shedding its needles. Trim the tree's trunk at an angle before securing it in a non-tip stand. Check the tree's water supply regularly and place the tree away from heat sources especially furnace heat registers.



## Preventing Chimney Fires



Homeowners can prevent chimney fires by having their chimney(s) inspected annually by a trained and licensed chimney inspection service. A reputable trade school or the National Chimney Sweep Guild typically licenses professional chimney inspectors. Consumers of this service should be diligent in checking licensing, training credentials, and client references. A professional chimney service will not just brush a chimney's flue but also inspect the lining for cracks, brick displacement and improper installation of prefabricated chimneys.

Creosote is produced when damp and improperly dried firewood vaporizes into a liquid attaching itself to the lining only to later solidify into a carbon film. Over time, the dangerous carbon film gets thicker, blocking the uptakes of smoke and embers causing a dangerous down draft and eventual house fire. Creosote build-up can be prevented by burning seasoned (aged & dried for at least 1 year) hard woods such as oak, hickory, ash or maple. Also, fires that are stoked hot support a more complete combustion of the fuel from firewood. The hotter the fire is, the less chance there is for creosote build-up in the flue lining. Residents are advised not to burn wrapping paper, treated wood, construction scraps or holiday evergreen boughs. These are all known to produce creosote build-up in chimneys. The Carol Stream Fire Protection District encourages everyone to take the necessary precautions to prevent chimney fires.

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## Halloween Safety Tips

Parents and guardians are asked to be sure to review the following trick or treat safety tips with children under their care to make Halloween a real treat.

**Make sure the costume fits your child is brightly colored or has reflective marking and is labeled “flame resistant”.**

Costumes accessories like **light swords and sabers should be made of soft flexible material.**

Carry a **flashlight and makes sure your child’s shoes fit even if they don’t go with the costume.**

**Obey traffic signals, cross streets between crosswalks or at intersections.**

**Walk, don’t run, don’t cut across yards or driveways and stay on sidewalks. If no sidewalk, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic.**

**Stay away from and don’t pet dogs you don’t know.**

Children should **trick or treat with a parent, adult family friend or guardian.**

**Trick or treat in familiar neighborhoods** or at the homes of friends and neighbors and avoid unfamiliar and unlit homes.

**Never enter a home**, but remain on the stoop or porch for a treat.

Instruct children **not to eat any candy until their parents have inspected it at home.** Wrapped candy should be checked for openings, pin sized holes, or any evidence of tampering. Homemade or unwrapped candy should not be eaten unless it comes from your home, a relative or a family friend.

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## Disposing of Fall Leaves

### 70¢ Leaf Stickers Use Period

70¢ leaf stickers can be used **October 11<sup>th</sup> through November 19<sup>th</sup>** to dispose of resident's fall leaves. Leaves must be placed in a commercial yard waste bag or a 33-gallon refuse can. Leaves placed in plastic bags or mixed with other yard waste will not be collected. Residents **save 80¢ a bag or can** by using a leaf sticker rather than the regular \$1.50 yard waste sticker. Leaf stickers are sold at:

### Free Leaf Collection from Nov. 22<sup>nd</sup> – 27<sup>th</sup>

During the **November 22<sup>nd</sup> collection week**, Flood Brothers offers a free one-week fall leaf pickup. During this week, residents may place **an unlimited amount of leaves** in a commercial yard waste bag or a 33-gallon container for collection. Leaves placed at curbside may not be mixed with other types of yard waste such as grass, sod, or twigs and branches or the material will be left at the curb.

### Village Ordinance Prohibits Raking Leaves into the Street/Curb-

Village Code states that “It shall be unlawful to throw or deposit garbage, refuse and yard waste on any public or private property within the Village, including retention/detention basins, creeks, whether occupied or unoccupied, except that the owner or person in control of the property may maintain private receptacles for garbage, refuse and yard waste which are waste products resulting from the occupancy of the property itself.” (**Sec. 8: Throwing/ Depositing Refuse Prohibited**)

“Any person, firm, or corporation violating any provision of this chapter shall be fined not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for each offense with a separate offense determined on each consecutive day that the violation continues.” (**Sec. 10: Accumulation of Refuse**)

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## Holiday Tree, Wreath & Bough Collection

Holiday greenery will be collected with regular refuse from **January 3<sup>rd</sup> - 18<sup>th</sup>**! Please note that a yard waste sticker is not required for collection during this 12-day period. Residents who place their holiday greenery out at the curbside for pickup after Tuesday, January 18<sup>th</sup> may be charged a collection fee. For questions, phone (630) 261-0578.

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## Village Snow Removal Policy

**The Village ONLY salts main arterial and local collector streets as needed.** The Village does not salt dead ends or cul-de-sacs except those locations that pose special hazards to motorists such as dangerous curves, school crossing zones and roadway inclines.

Snow removal operations begin according to established routes. These routes have been carefully determined to allow for the optimum use of equipment, manpower and supplies. **Snow removal is conducted on main and through streets BEFORE clearing operations begin on side streets, dead ends and cul-de-sacs.**



The Village **prohibits parking on all streets after a 1" snowfall.** The parking ban allows snow removal crews to make a clean pass of the street by eliminating the potential collision between a parked car and a plow or salt truck. **The snow-parking ban remains in effect until the streets have been cleared of snow accumulation.**

Village snowplows discharge snow from the streets toward the adjacent parkway. **It is IMPOSSIBLE to prevent the deposit of snow at driveway entrances!** Windrows of snow at entrances to driveways are an unavoidable by-product of our effort to clear streets of snow accumulation in the safest and most efficient manner. We ask residents to delay shoveling your drive until the Village's plow trucks have sufficiently cleared the adjacent street.

**Residents are prohibited from shoveling snow from their driveway apron or sidewalk into the street.** Ice patching will develop and create a traffic safety hazard for motorists and emergency vehicles.

**The Village does not remove snow from sidewalks or driveway entrances!**

**The Village will not reimburse homeowners for plow or snow damage to improperly installed curbside mailboxes.** Before the snow falls, residents who have concerns about the installation of their mailbox should measure its setback distance in inches from the curb line. Mailboxes located at least one foot (12 inches) behind the curb and 42 inches above grade level are properly installed.

**The Village asks residents to keep the sidewalk adjacent to their home clear of snow and ice.** Sidewalks have been installed for the convenience of pedestrians who live in the immediate area. Any assistance that homeowner's can provide to keep fire hydrants in front of their home visible is greatly appreciated.

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## Rain Gardens Catching On

Rain gardens are fast becoming one of the more popular forms of gardening. Due to their beauty, low maintenance and ability to improve water quality. Rain gardens utilize native plants and wildflowers with very long and dense roots systems (wet feet) that thrive in wet and soggy soil conditions. Yards with low, moist areas unable to support turf grass are easily converted into a rain garden. Homeowners whose property doesn't have a depression area can create their own wet condition by channeling water from downspouts or a sump pump into an area dug out in your yard.



The benefits of rain gardens are numerous and include helping to; replenish groundwater supplies, clean up the water and keep potential dirty runoff out of our local streams and ponds. Rain gardens do not require hand water-

ing or fertilizer or chemical treatments. You'll enjoy watching these beautiful and colorful plants grow and the wildlife they attract. Rain gardens also create small nature areas for songbirds,

butterflies and other beneficial wildlife to live and find food such as dragonflies who feed on mosquitoes that breed in other areas.
