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## Thank You from The Red Cross

Dear Carol Stream Donors,

Thank you for your gift of \$3,247.24 on June 3, 2005, in support of American Red Cross emergency relief efforts to the victims of the recent earthquake and tsunami devastation. The contribution you made as part of your February and March water bill payment will assist those throughout ravaged areas to gain stability by providing immediate relief assistance and long-range development assistance for the hundreds of thousands of people affected by this tragic event.

On Sunday, December 26, 2004, the largest earthquake to strike the globe since 1964 rocked the ocean floor off the coast of Indonesia. The 9.0-magnitude quake triggered giant tsunami waves that brought massive flooding and destruction, took more than 170,000 lives, and left hundreds of thousands injured, missing and homeless. The fear and risk of disease from contaminated water and food lingers.

The Red Cross responded immediately, supporting this international operation with relief supplies, financial backing and personnel. On January 7, the American Red Cross announced a multi-year plan of action to assist the victims of this disaster. Since the onset of this crisis, the Worldwide Red Cross Movement has assisted more than 840,000 survivors; the American Red Cross, specifically, has supplied more than 300,000 families with essential resources such as tents, sleeping mats, cooking sets, and hygiene kits. We have also launched various projects to tackle a broad array of issues, including a water sanitation program in Sri Lanka that will provide safe, clean water for up to one million residents. In close partnership with the United Nations, we are also delivering and distributing food rations for up to two million people for six months, and committing \$35 million to support vaccinations for nearly 22 million children through the Measles Initiative.

We will continue to assist this relief effort in every way possible to restore balance to the lives of those affected. You can remain informed of our ongoing, tsunami response effort through updates posted on [www.redcross.org](http://www.redcross.org). The process of regeneration will be a toilsome one for the tsunami victims, but you have helped to provide the immediate aid that will make their long-term recovery possible.

## The Buzz on West Nile Virus (WNV) - Infection Protection



### Mosquito Bites - protecting yourself and family:

- **Sparingly apply insect repellent to exposed skin.** The more DEET a repellent contains the longer it will protect you from mosquito bites. Choose a repellent that provides protection for the amount of time that you will be outdoors.
  - Avoid applying repellent to the hands of children;
  - Be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use, as printed on the product;
- **Spray clothing with repellents** containing permethrin or DEET since mosquitoes may bite through thin clothing. Do not apply repellents containing permethrin directly to exposed skin.
- Whenever possible, **wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants outdoors.**
- **Place mosquito netting over infant carriers** when outdoors.
- **Stay indoors during peak biting times** - dawn, early evening & dusk.
- Install or repair window and door screens.

### Breeding Sites - reduce their number around your house:

- **Twice a week, empty water from** flower pots, pet food and water dishes, birdbaths, swimming pool covers, buckets, barrels, and cans;
- **Check gutters for clogged down spouts;**
- **Remove discarded tires and other items that collect water.**
- **Check under your bushes, shed or deck for empty cans or bottles** that can collect water.
- Keep the length of your grass short.

### Avoiding Exposure to Pesticide Spraying - those with upper respiratory or allergic conditions should follow take the following precautions to minimize possible exposure to pesticides:

- **Phone Clarke Mosquito Control Hotline at (800) 942-2555 for announcements about scheduled area spraying.** and remain indoors during applications in the immediate area.
- **Those with chemical sensitivities** or who feel spraying may aggravate a preexisting health condition, should consult their physician or local health department to inquire about special measures to avoid exposure.
- **When spraying is taking place in the immediate area,** stay indoors, close windows and turn off window-unit air conditioners.

**Reporting Dead Birds to the DuPage County Health Department** - Dead birds may be a sign that West Nile virus is circulating between birds and the mosquitoes in the area. Remember that birds die from many other causes besides West Nile virus. **Dead crows and blue jays are important sentinels for detecting the West Nile Virus** and these dead birds will again be collected by the Health Department. ## Don't Mow - Grow! How to Create a Nature Friendly Yard

Nature friendly yards are safer for children, pets, wildlife and the environment. They reduce your lawn size, eliminate the need for lawn chemicals and reduce air and water pollution caused by gas-powered mowers and over-applied fertilizer. The following suggestions will get you on your way to creating a nature friendly yard:

**Plant native flower gardens in unused space in your yard. Native plants originally found in the Illinois woodlands, savannahs and prairies and do not require fertilizers.**

**Let your lawn grow to 3" before mowing;**

**Consider pulling weeds by hand or spot treating them instead of treating your whole lawn with synthetic fertilizers w/ weed killer;**

**Consider switching from synthetic to natural fertilizers to treat your lawn;**

**When using natural or synthetic fertilizers, strictly follow the application directives on the product label;**

**Over applied fertilizers wash off into storm drains which connect to local ponds and streams thereby causing damage to wildlife and the environment.**

## Barbecue Safety Tips

The Carol Stream Fire Investigation Unit wishes residents a enjoyable summer and reminds them to observe the following barbecue safety tips when grilling outdoors.

- Keep your barbecue grill on a level surface;
- Grill away from buildings, trees and shrubs;
- Never grill inside tents, gazebos, garages, even if ventilated;
- Never walk away from a grill when children or pets are present;
- Strictly follow the instructions on any barbecue lighting product;
- Check propane hoses on gas grills for leaks by dabbing them with soapy water and looking for bubbles;
- Never move a lit barbecue, you risk it tipping over and causing severe burns
- Know where you could access water in case the barbecue fire gets out of control;
- Never store a filled spare propane tank under or near a grill, or indoors;
- Never store or use gasoline or flammable liquids near a grill;
- Always use charcoal starter fluid designed for barbecue grills;
- Never use petrol, paraffin or other flammable liquids to light or revive your barbecue;
- Keep doors and windows closed to prevent burning particles from being blown into the house.



\* **Dearborn Cir.**


\* **Idaho Tr. (north of Lies Rd.)**

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# Carol Stream Water Quality Report - 2004

The Safe Drinking Water Act Amendments of 1996 require that all community water systems provide information to their customers concerning the quality of their water. This report complies with this Act by providing information on the source of your drinking water, the results of water sampling, our compliance with drinking water regulations, as well as some brief educational material.

The Village of Carol Stream is committed to providing you with this information. If upon reading this report you should have any questions or wish additional information, you are encouraged to contact either Al Turner, the Director of Public Works, or Bob Hoffrage, the Water Division Supervisor and Chief Water System Operator at 871-6260. Copies of this Water Quality Report are available on the Village's web page at <http://www.carolstream.org>. Additionally, you are always welcome at the regularly scheduled Village Board Meetings that hold an informal Listening Post at approximately 7:30 p.m., prior to the 8:00 p.m. Board Meeting scheduled for every first and third Monday of the month.

The Village of Carol Stream receives Lake Michigan Water that is processed by the City of Chicago at the Jardine Water Filtration Facility, which is the largest purification plant in the world. The Jardine Water Treatment Facility is just north of Navy Pier on the Chicago lakefront. Lake Michigan is the source of water used to provide drinking water for Chicago and many suburban communities, including Carol Stream. For more information, contact their web page at <http://www.ci.chi.il.us/Water>. The Village of Carol Stream is a customer of the DuPage Water Commission who purchases the water from the City of Chicago and transports it to the member communities. Water is metered and then pumped into our distribution system and into the elevated and ground storage facilities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791).

Lake Michigan as one of the Great Lakes is an excellent source of drinking water. However, all sources, including lakes, rivers and wells have a possibility of contamination, including contamination such as:

- ♦ **Microbial contaminants**, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife;
- ♦ **Inorganic contaminants**, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming;
- ♦ **Pesticides and herbicides**, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses;
- ♦ **Organic chemical contaminant**, including synthetic and volatile

organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems;

- ♦ **Radioactive contaminants**, which may be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

## Source Water Assessment

The Illinois EPA considers all surface water sources of community water supply to be susceptible to potential pollution problems. The very nature of surface water allows contaminants to migrate into the intake with no protection only dilution. This is the reason for mandatory treatment for all surface water supplies in Illinois. Chicago's offshore intakes are located at a distance that shoreline impacts are not usually considered a factor on water quality. At certain times of the year, however, the potential for contamination exists due to wet-weather flows and river reversals. In addition, the placement of the crib structures may serve to attract waterfowl gulls and terns that frequent the Great Lakes area, thereby concentrating fecal deposits at the intake and thus compromising the source water quality. Conversely, the shore intakes are highly susceptible to storm water runoff, marinas and shoreline point sources due to the influx of groundwater to the lake. Throughout history, there have been extraordinary steps taken to assure a safe source of drinking water in the Chicagoland area. From the building of the offshore cribs and the introduction of interceptor sewers to the lock-and-dam system of Chicago's waterways and the city's Lakefront Zoning Ordinance. The city now looks to the recently created Department of Water Management, Department of Environment and the MWRDGC to assure the safety of the city's water supply. Also, water supply officials from Chicago are active members of the Weest Shore Water Producers Association. Coordination of water quality situations (i.e., spills, tanker leaks, exotic species, etc) and general lake conditions are frequently discussed during the association's quarterly meetings. Also, Lake Michigan has a variety of organizations and associations that are currently working to either maintain or improve water quality. Finally, one of the best ways to ensure a safe source of drinking water is to develop a program designed to protect the source water against potential contamination on the local level. Since the predominant land use within Illinois' boundary of Lake Michigan watershed is urban, a majority of the watershed protection activities in this document are aimed at this purpose. Citizens should be aware that everyday activities in an urban setting might have a negative impact on their source water. Efforts should be made to improve awareness of storm water drains and their direct link to the lake within the identified local source water area. A proven best management practice (BMP) for this purpose has been the identification and stenciling of storm water drains within a watershed. Stencilling along with an educational component is necessary to keep the lake a safe and reliable source of drinking water.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about

drinking water from their health care providers. USEPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the USEPA's **Safe Drinking Water Hotline (1-800-426-4791)**.

In order to ensure that our water is safe to drink, the USEPA prescribes regulations that limits the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.

Attached are several tables indicating the constituents that are regulated for which the Chicago/Carol Stream drinking water has been tested. The data is separated into data as tested by the City of Chicago as the parent supply of our drinking water and the Village of Carol Stream as the satellite supplier.

Neither the City of Chicago nor the Village of Carol Stream had any water quality violations during 2004.

### **TURBIDITY**

Turbidity is a measure of the cloudiness of the water. We monitor it because it is a good indicator of water quality and the effectiveness of our filtration system and disinfectants.

### **UNREGULATED CONTAMINANTS**

A maximum contaminant level (MCL) for this contaminant has not been established by either state or federal regulations, nor has mandatory health effects language. The purpose for monitoring this contaminant is to assist USEPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water, and whether future regulation is warranted.

### **FLUORIDE**

Fluoride is added to the water supply to help promote strong teeth. The Illinois Department of Public Health recommends an optimal fluoride range of 0.9 mg/l to 1.2 mg/l.

### **SODIUM**

There is not a state or federal MCL for sodium. Monitoring is required to provide information to consumers and health officials that are concerned about sodium intake due to dietary precautions. If you are on a sodium-restricted diet, you should consult a physician about this level of sodium in the water.

## 2005-06 Village Budget & 3-Year Financial Plan

In April 2005, the Village Board reviewed and adopted the 2005-06 Annual Budget and 2006-2008 Financial Plan. The Financial Plan details the resources necessary to fund Village services and public improvements for the next three years.

The Village's Financial Plan consists of three distinct elements namely the Operating, Capital and Special funds. The budget includes \$26.5 million is for the Operating Element and \$1.6 million for the Special Funds Element. The Capital element includes \$6.1 million in improvement projects.

The General Corporate Fund accounts for the majority of traditional government services. The General Corporate Fund Operating budget for this coming fiscal year totals \$19.1 million. Of that total, \$10.5 million is earmarked for Public Safety (Police), \$4.0 million for Public Works programs, \$1.6 million for Financial and Support Services, \$2.0 million for Community Development and Engineering Services, \$1.0 million for Legislative Board, Commissions, Legal Services and Village Administration. Approximately 55.5% or \$10.8 million of the General Corporate revenues are from state-shared sources such as sales, income and telecommunications tax receipts. **The Village does not levy a local property tax.**

### Details of the 2005-06 Budget include:

- 1) **An operating deficit is projected for fiscal years 2007 and 2008, although the projected \$44,068 deficit for FY07 is very manageable. The projected deficit in FY08 is significant therefore the Village Board and staff have begun working on solutions to address this funding shortfall.**
- 2) **As part of the Village's ongoing efforts to reduce and contain our operating costs, 7 positions were eliminated in this financial plan.**
- 3) **The Village's equalized assessed valuation (EAV) surpassed \$1 billion, a 200% increase from the 1990 EAV.**
- 4) **The Village developed its first stand-alone Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) document. The plan takes a comprehensive look at the Village's infrastructure and facility needs at 5, 10 and 20 year intervals. A CIP is a multi-year plan that forecasts spending for all anticipated capital projects. The CIP enables the Village to identify needed capital projects and then coordinate the timing of their financing. An effective CIP consists of both an administrative process to identify the location, scale and timing of needed capital projects and a fiscal plan to provide for the funding of those projects.**

- ✕ **COMMON HACKBERRY (*Celtis Occidentalis*)** - Tolerant to harsh climatic conditions as well as to urban stress, this deep-rooted tree rarely lifts sidewalks. The rough, corky bark adds interest and resists damage. Broad ascending canopy, arching over time. Light green foliage turns yellow in the fall.
- ✕ **CHANTICLEER CALLERY PEAR (*Pyrus Calleryana*)** - Narrow conical crown with white flowers in the spring and glossy leaves turning from gold to red then plum in the fall. Matures to a height of 35-40 feet.
- ✕ **SUMMIT GREEN ASH (*Fraxinus Pennsylvannica*)** - Vigorous tree with a straight trunk and an oval crown. Leaves turn golden yellow in the fall. Matures to a height of 50-60 feet.
- ✕ **GINKO (*Ginkgo Bilboa*)** - Pyramidal, irregular form that grows rapidly and is very adaptable. Green leaves in summer turning yellow in the fall. 40-70 ft.
- ✕ **RED SUNSET MAPLE (*Acer Rubrum*)** - Outstanding variety with a dense upright branching habit. Bright green leaves in the summer turning to a brilliant red-orange in the fall. Excellent for street and lawn use. Matures to a height of 50 feet.
- ✕ **WHITE OAK (*Quercus Alba*)** - Broad, massive and spreading form with green foliage turning red in the fall. Matures to a height of 60-100 feet.
- ✕ **AUTUMN PURPLE ASH (*Fraxinus Americana*)** - Upright, oval crown, opening with age. Medium green leaves turn reddish-purple in the fall. Matures to 40-50 feet.
