


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## Carol Stream Outreach to Hurricane Katrina Victims



### Carol Stream Fire Protection District

On September 5<sup>th</sup>, Firefighter T.J. Weinrich, Battalion Chief Bob Tardio, and Fire Chief Mark Bodane traveled to New Orleans with a contingent of some 600 Illinois Firefighters. Upon their arrival, they were assigned to Illinois Task Force 4, a firefighting unit with members assigned to the naval air station to coordinate helicopter water airdrops, and others assigned to what is called a FAST truck company (a safety team at fires). When not firefighting, the unit's most rewarding assignment was helping in "Operation Chainsaw" that involved clearing out damaged fire houses and helping in the neighborhoods. Only 6 of the 35 firehouses in New Orleans were operational when we arrived. TJ, Bob and Mark slept in a tent city and during their assignment worked in a war-like zone protected from the air by military helicopters and on land by 300 Army Reservist troops. Bob, TJ and Mark returned on September 19<sup>th</sup>.

### Suzanne Hlotke, Carol Stream Resident



On September 14<sup>th</sup>, Suzanne Hlotke, a 26-year residents trav-

eled for 2 days by car to the City of Houston to assist hurricane Katrina and Rita evacuees. Suzanne put herself up in the Greenway Plaza Motel in Houston proper during her month-long service as an unpaid independent volunteer. Suzanne duties included the following:

- \* **Providing childcare to 125 children of staff members at Ben Taub Hospital**
- \* **Conducted medical inventory for the City of Houston at the George R. Brown Convention Center and also provided support to the Red Cross and disaster evacuees.**
- \* **Organized a library for students K-12 from New Orleans West College Preparatory**
- \* **Staffed a disaster hotline and provided in person information assistance to evacuees at the Red Cross office in Houston.**
- \* **Performed data entry duties for the Harris County Medical Reserve Corps.**

Suzanne returned to Carol Stream on October 17<sup>th</sup>.

### Carol Stream Police Department

Officer Kyle Scifert of the Police Department was dispatched along with 150 other law enforcement personnel from the region as part of the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System to assist victims of the Katrina disaster. In early September, shortly after the Katrina ravaged the Louisiana and Mississippi gulf coast, Officer Scifert and the other Officers shipped out for a 16-day detail. Officer Scifert was assigned to a search and rescue group and tasked with traveling in a ¼ ton Army Supply Truck through the flooded streets calling for anyone trapped in their homes. In areas where the floodwaters exceeded 12 feet, the rescue group used aluminum fishing boats working anywhere from 12-20 hour days. Many of those rescued by the search and rescue team had been trapped in the upper floors of their homes, many times in their attic or on their roof without food and water for several days. During his 16-day detail, Officer Scifert and the other 150 Illinois law enforcement Officers rescued 147 residents of New Orleans.

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## Advocate Good Samaritan partners with Life Line Screening

Advocate Good Samaritan Hospital has partnered with Life Line Screening to provide a health screening at St Andrew United Methodist Church on Tuesday, February 21<sup>st</sup>. The location is 240 N Gary in Carol Stream . The screenings are open to the public.

Life Line Screening offers ultrasound screenings for the prevention of vascular disease and stroke. An ultrasound of the carotid arteries in the neck to determines if you are at risk for stroke. Up to 75% of all strokes are linked to carotid artery blockage. Screenings of the arteries of the legs are offered to check for peripheral artery disease, which is linked to heart disease. A third test is performed for aneurysms in the aortic vessel of the abdomen. Life Line also offers a bone density screening to test for early detection of osteoporosis.

These non-invasive, completely painless, ultrasound screenings take about 10 minutes each. Each of the 3 vascular tests are offered for \$ 45.00 each, Osteoporosis for \$ 35.00. Complete vascular screening (3 tests) for \$ 109 or all 4 tests for \$129. PRE-REGISTRATION IS REQUIRED. The timely sharing of information is critical to law enforcement in carrying out their crime prevention and community policing duties. To this end, the Police Department has partnered with an online information sharing web site to efficiently and effectively share information with residents and the business community. The web site, [www.CitizenObserver.com](http://www.CitizenObserver.com) allows our Police Department to electronically share crime prevention information and crime alerts with the citizenry and the business community. This web-based public safety information and notification site was established in St. Paul in 1999 to assist the community in locating the whereabouts of a fugitive. The CitizenObserver includes notification tools that allows our department to post information about area crimes, missing persons, wanted fugitives, unsolved cases and other information.

Local businesses and residents can view information posted by the various law enforcement agencies who share information on this web site, and, in addition, can register with the web site, free of charge. In return, those registering will receive the local departments' postings electronically via fax, e-mail, digital cell phone or pager. Local businesses and residents can subsequently respond with any information they may have about incidents in their area.

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## Preventing the Flu

Influenza, a contagious respiratory illness caused by a virus strain infects on average 5-20% of the U.S. population each year. The Avian Influenza is an infection caused by a bird flu virus strain. Bird flu viruses do not usually infect humans, but several cases of human infection have occurred since 1997 in Asia. The current risk to Americans from the bird flu outbreak in Asia is low. The DuPage County Health Department is working closely with local and state agencies to enhance early detection and response efforts, including coordination of antiviral and/or vaccine distribution if the avian flu virus is found in the U.S. population. In addition to providing protection against the predominant circulating influenza strain, vaccination with the most recent seasonal human influenza vaccine is intended to reduce the likelihood of an exposed individual being co-infected with human and avian strains, where genetic rearrangement could take place, leading to the emergence of potential pandemic strain.

- Schools, businesses, employers and employees can help prevent the spread of colds and flu in schools, the workplace and home by following these simple actions:
- Get vaccinated each fall;
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick;
- If you come down with the flu symptoms, stay home from school, work or public functions and get plenty of rest;
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing as the flu spreads from being exposed to respiratory droplets of a person infected with the virus;
- Washing your hands often will help protect you from germs. When soap and water are not available, alcohol-based disposable hand wipes or gel sanitizers may be used;
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs are often spread when a person touches something that is contaminated with germs and then touches his or her eyes, nose, or mouth.
- Consider altering workplace practices when several employees are out sick to prevent the spread of the flu, such as suspend telecommuting, cross-training and job-sharing, regularly sanitize workplace surfaces (such as telephone, computer keyboard and mouse) and reduce the use of public transportation;
- Practice other good health habits such as getting plenty of sleep, maintain your exercise regimen, manage your stress, drink plenty of fluids, and eat nutritious food.

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## Tax Relief for Working Families - the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)

If you worked at a job any time during 2005, you could owe less income tax and get cash back from the IRS through the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). You may be able to apply for a tax credit if:

- ☞ You have more than one qualifying child and your earned income was less than \$35,263 (\$37,263 if married filing jointly),
- ☞ You have one qualifying child and your earned income was less than \$31,030 (\$33,030 if married filing jointly), or
- ☞ You do not have a qualifying child and your earned income was less than \$11,750 (\$13,750 if married filing jointly).



If you have children and are eligible for the earned income tax credit, file form 1040 or 1040A and be sure to attach Schedule EIC. If you don't have children, file any federal tax return. In most cases, the EITC does not affect benefits like TANF, Foods Stamps, SSI, Medicaid or public housing. The maximum amount of investment income you can have and still get the credit has increased to \$2,700. If you qualified but failed to apply for a tax credit for the last 3 tax years, you may file retroactively. ## Winter Heating Requirements in Effect thru May 15<sup>th</sup>

**65° degrees between 6:30 a.m. and 10:30 p.m.**

**60° degrees between 10:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m.**

In addition to heating requirements for apartments and other rental units, Village Code requires businesses and other non-residential structures to maintain a minimum temperature of 65° during their business hours. To report a violation, phone the Community Development Department at (630) 871-6230.

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## Preventing Frozen Water Pipes

A period of sustained uninterrupted sub-zero temperatures will increase the length of the frost line to 6 ft., the approximate depth of a water service. When this situation occurs, home and business owners can take the following steps to prevent their water pipes from freezing.

### In Early Winter


- ❄ Insulate pipes that are most susceptible to freezing such as those in outer walls, attics and crawl spaces.
- ❄ Wrap pipes with UL approved heat tape.
- ❄ Seal any leaks that allow cold outside air into a pipe gallery.
- ❄ Disconnect garden hoses and shut off and drain water from pipes leading to outside faucets.

### When It's Bitter Cold

- ❄ Let hot and cold water trickle from faucets located adjacent to an outer wall.
- ❄ Open cabinet doors to allow heat to warm uninsulated pipes under a sink or an appliance near an outer wall.
- ❄ Make sure the furnace thermostat is left on and never set below 55 degrees.
- ❄ If you plan to be away, ask someone to check your home daily to make sure the furnace is sufficiently warming the home.

### If Pipes Freeze

- ❄ Make sure you and your family members know how to shut off your home's water service.
- ❄ Call a plumber and your insurance agent to inspect whatever damage has occurred.
- ❄ Never try to thaw a pipe with an open flame or torch.
- ❄ Always be careful of the potential for electric shock when working in or around standing water.



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## Need Help Paying Your Winter Home Heating Bills?

The Low-Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP) program assists low-income households by offsetting the rising cost of home energy through direct financial assistance, energy counseling, outreach and education. An overdue bill or disconnect notice is not required to receive LIHEAP assistance once per year. Emergency assistance is available to eligible households whose utility service has been disconnected and for homeowners whose furnace is non-operational or determined unsafe to operate. ## New Toter Program to Increase Community's Recycling Rate

Many communities in northern Cook County and Lake County Illinois have successfully instituted recycling toter service into their residential solid waste collection program as a way to reduce blowing litter and increase the community's overall recycling rate as well as improve the efficiency of recycling collection. Over the 13 years since the inception of the residential curbside recycling program, the amount of recycling materials now bought and sold on the commodities markets has increased exponentially requiring a need for a container with sufficient volume capacity for the amount of materials generated by an average single-family home. Recycling toter service makes it easier to recycle, as materials no longer need to be separated. Paper, newsprint, magazines, cardboard, glass, bottles, plastics, tin and aluminum can now be commingled. With the new 65-gallon recycling toter, the Village hopes to increase its overall recycling rate 20% from 6,895 tons per year in 2005 to 8,275 tons in 2006.

## Village Receives Award for Excellence in Budgeting

The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) has awarded the Village its 18<sup>th</sup> consecutive Distinguished Budget Presentation Award for its annual Budget and 3-Year Financial Plan. The Village's 2005 budget met national standards for excellence as a policy document, a detailed spending plan and operations guide as well as a public information device. A certificate of recognition was awarded to Stan Helgerson, the Village's Director of Finance, who was responsible for coordinating the preparation of the 2005 budget. The success of the GFOA's "Distinguished Budget Presentation" program is that it encourages government finance officers and their staffs to adopt the highest standards in governmental budgeting and financial management.



## Citizens Appointed to the Stormwater Advisory Committee

In 1972, Congress passed the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (aka Clean Water Act) to establish standards for water quality and an enforcement protocol to deter pollution and its sources in an attempt to preserve the health of people, wildlife and the planet's overall eco-system. Much progress to date has been made in compliance with this important national life safety and health legislation, but more needs to be done. One particular phase of the requirement that needs to be addressed is improving the overall quality of storm water discharge. Rainfall and snowmelt can be very easily contaminated with pollutants during its journey from property before entering the collection system or lakes, natural creeks and streams.

The Village has secured the services of a consultant to help the community begin to discuss how best to comply with this important federal mandate within the constraints of the collection resources we have at our disposal as well as the financial resources we have to meet these important requirements. The Village Board has tasked the staff, the consultant, community leaders and the citizenry to meet, discuss and recommend the components of a program that will assure the community's compliance with this phase of the clean water act as it pertains to storm water discharge. To facilitate this process, the Mayor has appointed the following community leaders to the Carol Stream Storm water Advisory Committee to help fashion a mandated compliance program. ## Village & Rossano Italy Become Sister Cities



The Sister City Program is a living legacy left by the late President Dwight D. Eisenhower. He conceived the program and initiated it in 1956, as a new approach to securing peace around the world through the establishment of personal, people-to-people friendships between Americans and the peoples of other nations.

President Eisenhower, who often proclaimed that he would rather be known to history for his contributions toward world peace than for his accomplishments as a President or general, deplored the fact that throughout history, international diplomacy failed to keep the peace or to prevent war. He foresaw that the people-to-people idea, fostered by a Sister City program involving hundred of thousands of people in cities throughout the world could be a massive form of citizen diplomacy that might succeed in doing what the nations of the world had been unable to accomplish through diplomatic efforts.



On September 15<sup>th</sup>, Mayor Ferraro and a contingent of local Italian Americans traveled to the Calabria Region of Italy ("Toe of the Boot") to discuss the possibility of entering into a Sister City Alliance with the citizens of Rossano, Italy. On September 22<sup>nd</sup>, Mayor Ferraro and Mayor Orazio Longo of Rossano entered into an agreement to collaborate on local government best practices, exchange culture, promote global trade between the DuPage and Cosenza regions, and to promote citizen diplomacy networks among its citizens, businesses, schools and civic institutions.

Rossano is located on the southeastern coast in the Calabria region at is 975 feet above sea level in the hills overlooking the Ionian Sea. The current population of Rossano is 39,000 residents with a housing stock of 20,000 dwelling units inhabited by approximately 12,000 families. The primary industry is tourism though the area is known for its manufacturing of marble. The city dates back to the Byzantine Period (5<sup>th</sup> Century) when the Christian monastic period flourished in Europe. The city has 3 distinct geographies including a seaport coastal area termed the Lido section, Sant' Angelo, the inland section of the city and Rossano Scalo (Old Town) the historic section that is scattered with Byzantine architecture.

The Village staff is working with the officials and citizens of Rossano to plan a cultural exchange this summer during the event season. Stay tuned for developments in the upcoming spring newsletter.

## Identify a Drunk Driver to be Eligible for a \$100 Award

Join forces with the Police Department in a joint effort to identify drunk drivers and remove them from the road. A call from your cell phone to 9-1-1 or \*99 with the license plate number, vehicle description, location and the direction of travel could net you a \$100 reward if the driver is stopped, charged and convicted of drunk driving. The public is asked to familiarize themselves with the following list of visual cues that may likely identify a drunk driver:

- 1) Making exaggerated (wide) turns;
- 2) Straddling center or lane marker;
- 3) Nearly striking an object or a vehicle;
- 4) Driving in opposite lane of traffic;
- 5) Driving below the posted speed limit;
- 6) Weaving, Swerving & Drifting;
- 7) Stopping without cause in a traffic lane;
- 8) Slow response to traffic signals;
- 9) Accelerating or decelerating rapidly;
- 10) Driving with the headlights off



## Water Main Breaks



If you notice a ground swell or an unusual large flow of water, coming from underground, it might be a water main break. The freeze thaw cycle that occurs in a typical winter puts pressure on the underground water system.

A typical water main repair will take on average 4-6 hours depending on weather conditions and conflicts and delays in locating other surrounding utilities in the repair area. Repair crews shut off the water to those served by the broken main and try to give notice to homes and businesses unless it is late at night. After the main repair is completed and water service restored, the affected homes and businesses might experience some discolored water resulting from the mineral sediment stirred up during the repair. Run the water for 5-10 minutes until the water color returns to normal.

### 2006 Dog Licensing Underway



2005 dog tags expired, Saturday, December 31<sup>st</sup>. Village residents must have their dogs licensed by the Village and DuPage County once they reach 6 months of age. Written proof of inoculation must be presented as proof before applying for a dog license. A \$5 license fee is charged for female dogs and a \$3 license fee is charged for male and spayed female dogs.

### It's Time to ICE Your Cell Phone

In a crisis or emergency, a cell phone provides an invaluable lifeline. In responding to a medical emergency, a paramedic or a Police Officer can access an injured residents cell phone address book to notify next of kin or their medical status. First responders however waste valuable time scrolling thru a cell phone address book trying to determine who best to notify. Many married adults identify their spouse by first name only in their cell phone address book making them indistinguishable from other entries.

Cell users are being encouraged to use the acronym I.C.E. (In Case of Emergency) before the names of the person(s) they want designated as next of kin. (e.g. ICE- Laurie) An ICE contact can not only verify the identity of the person but also provide valuable information like allergies, prior medical conditions and blood type that can speed up medical treatment. An added benefit of ICEing your cell phone is the ability to identify the owner of a lost cell phone.

Before ICEing your cell phone, it is critical that you notify your next of kin that they are your cell phone ICE contact as well as provide them with your name, address and date of birth at minimum.
