Mayor's Letter

Spring is finally here and the staff is putting the final touches on upcoming Town Center events. Due to the overwhelming success of the 2005 Rockin' Rainbow Kid's festival, Rainbow Academy will host the 2nd annual kid's event on Saturday, July 22nd from 11 am until 2 pm featuring music, giveaways, food and amusement rides. I can't say enough about our 2006 event sponsors whose generosity allows us to host quality events for the community at the Town Center. If you happen to be in one of the sponsoring businesses, provided they are located in the community, please make it a point to extend a personal thank you for their support of Town Center events.



On February 6th, I had the privilege of meeting **Julia Topinoja**, a Rotary Youth Exchange student from Hameelinna, Finland who is attending school at Glenbard North H.S. and living with host families in our community. Accompanying Julia were two other fellow Glenbard North H.S. students **Tim Pedrick** and **Jeff Knutson** who are Carol Stream residents and Rotary Youth Exchange students as well. Tim is getting ready to live and study in Germany this fall while Jeff will be doing the same in Sweden.

Residents planning home improvement projects are reminded to work closely with our Community Development Department to get the required permit(s) before beginning work. Permitted projects are subject to a valuable code inspection service that may detect poor workmanship and possible code violations that could, if not addressed, reduce the value of the improvement.

Spring brings windy weather and many reports of blowing trash. Please be reminded to do your part in securing your refuse in a can with a lid on your collection day so litter doesn't end up in the street, in parks, ponds, streams or on your neighbor's property. **Help keep Carol Stream clean and beautiful all year long.** Also, I want to thank residents for working with the Village and Flood Bros. on the transition to recycling toter service. In just two months, the community has increased recycling by 72 tons. I acknowledge the toter is larger than the former 20-gallon bin that posed a space challenge for several residents in fitting it in their available garage space. The toter manufacturer offered a 35, 65 and 95 gallon and the Board and I selected the 65-gallon knowing that it could accommodate average weekly household recycling volumes and have enough additional space for those 5-6 weeks each year when volumes typically spike. With recycling process-

ing now single-stream, the toter will be able to secure all materials and significantly reduce blowing litter.

Spring rain can produce standing water and a likely mosquito-breeding site. I would ask each of you to inspect your property for potential breeding sites and if any are identified, eliminate the location as a likely breeding site. Vector control specialists have found mosquito population prevention activities much more effective than adult spraying in reducing this nuisance. Please refer to the article on page 5 for more tips on reducing backyard breeding of mosquitoes.

Counties and Villages are hard at work updating homeland security plans and conducting exercises to increase the readiness of first responder agencies like Police, Fire and Emergency Medical Services. One key component in disaster readiness is involving the citizenry as partners in the many support tasks and activities needed by a community in responding to an emergency. DuPage County in partnership with its municipal governments has established the DuPage Citizen Corps in an effort to recruit, train and deploy volunteers for targeted support in an emergency. Please visit their web site at www.citizencorpsdupage.org to see what kinds of skills, talents and expertise are needed to better prepare our community.

Inserted in this newsletter is our 2006 Town Center calendar that details our event season that begins May 13th with the Mother's Day breakfast and run through September 30th, the date of this year's Oktoberfest. Please keep this on your refrigerator or kitchen bulletin board so you can stay abreast of what's happening around town. Also inserted is a flyer promoting the Citizen Observer program, an on-line public safety notification service that allows local law enforcement to rapidly share detailed crime prevention information with its citizens and businesses. The key to this free public safety subscription information service is ensuring that citizens and businesses register. In closing, have a wonderful spring and I look forward to seeing all of you at the upcoming 4-day "Summer in the Center" festival that begins Thursday evening, June 8th and at the 4th of July Parade and evening music concert and fireworks extravaganza at the Town Center, scheduled for Tuesday, July 4th.

Capital Improvement Projects

❑ Street Resurfacing

Street resurfacing projects involve spot repairs to curbs and sidewalks, edge grinding 1 ½" of the existing pavement and the placement of a new asphalt surface.

❑ Pavement Reconstruction

Pavement reconstruction involves the removal of the entire asphalt pavement structure. Concrete curb, sidewalk and pavement base repairs are also performed. A 2" layer of asphalt binder is then placed, followed by a 1 ½" layer of asphalt surface.

❑ Structural Overlay

Structural overlay involves the removal of 2" to 6" inches of asphalt surface followed by a leveling layer of asphalt, road fabric, and two inches of surface. Project streets will be temporarily disrupted during the summer months, but should always remain passable.

❑ Lies Road LAPP (from Gary Avenue to Schmale Road)

LAPP is the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) acronym for "Local Agency Pavement Preservation". The Village applied for Federal Funding to do a Structural Overlay on Lies Road in the industrial area. IDOT will administer the contract and the Village will fund 25% of the construction costs.

❑ Lies Road Bikeway (from Fair Oaks Road to Fountain View)

A 10' wide bike path will be constructed on the north side of Lies Road using Federal Funding. This improvement project will allow pedestrians direct connection from the Town Center to the West Branch Forest Preserve and all points in between. Again, this project is administered by IDOT and the Village will only pay 25% of the construction costs.

❑ Fair Oaks Road Reconstruction (from Army Trail Road to Plum Grove Court)

This deteriorated section of Fair Oaks Road will be removed and replaced to current standards. Curb and gutter will be used rather than stone shoulders, and a combination of storm sewer and roadside swales will improve drainage. The Village is also working with the DuPage County Division of Transportation to construct a traffic signal at Army Trail and Fair Oaks Road.

Projects Requiring a Building Permit

Work done prior to securing a permit is subject to increased fees and fines. Decide early on whether you or your contractor will apply to obtain the necessary building permit(s). **Once a building permit has been issued, you are required to clearly post the permit either in the front window or door of the building.** Common projects that require a building permit include:

Watering Restrictions

Automatic sprinkler systems and continuous watering devices **are the only uses subject to water use restrictions**. Watering with a hand held device that has an automatic shut off nozzle is not regulated.

Odd-Even Day Restrictions: Homes with even numbered addresses (i.e. 172 Thunderbird Tr.) can water on an even numbered dates (May 2nd), while homes with odd numbered addresses (i.e. 283 Idaho Tr.) can water on odd numbered dates (June 17th). **Odd-even day restrictions are in effect all year round!**

Residents may water new lawns and landscaping from sun up through midnight for 14 consecutive days from the date of planting. To avoid ticketing, residents must register their property address by phoning (630) 871-6220 by 4:30 p.m. (Mon.-Thu.) for weekday projects and by 12:30 p.m. on Friday for weekend projects.

Hydrant Flushing April 3rd - 14th

The springtime flushing of fire hydrants is a standard water utility practice that removes mineral oxide build up that settle at the bottoms of water mains. To minimize inconvenience to residents, crews will flush from 7 pm until midnight when water demand is typically the lowest. Crews will post signs in the service area where they are working to notify residents that flushing will occur that evening. Water customers:

- **may experience a temporary drop in water pressure** & discolored water;
- **are asked to run their tap in the morning** to clear up any discoloration;
- **are advised not to do laundry during evening hours** to prevent possible rust staining.

Give Your Recycling Toter Space

The new recycling collection service is now automated which means a mechanical arm operated by the driver from the cab of the truck grabs, lifts and empties the toter's contents. The toter was selected because recycling collection is now single stream that means everything can now go into one can. The arm of the recycling truck is designed to collect a specifically designed toter.

The new recycling collection truck **CANNOT collect around your mailbox or any other refuse can if improperly placed at the curb**. There needs be to a 3ft. clearance on all sides of your recycling toter. Recycling toters put too close to a refuse can, a yard waste bag or your home's mailbox post cannot be picked up mechanically which needlessly delays collection service. Also, **the new toter should be adjacent to the curb line and not behind any other refuse container. The handle of your recycling toter must directly face the home**. The visual representations below detail the correct and incorrect placement of the new toter in relation to another refuse container. Your full cooperation is critical in our effort to stabilize solid waste collection costs and increase the community's overall recycling rate.

Recycling Toters & Refuse Containers Must be Stored Out of Sight

Chapter 9, Article 1, Section 7 of the Village's Health Code regarding the placement of solid waste containers states that **"containers must be removed on or before midnight on the day of collection and thereafter stored so as to be hidden from the view of the street and placed so as not to constitute a nuisance to adjacent property owners or the occupants thereof."** Please comply with this code requirement to keep the streetscape of Village neighborhoods attractive to those living in the neighborhood, visitors and prospective home buyers.

Mosquito Control & West Nile Virus Infection Protection

To prevent your property from being a drought mosquito-breeding site, follow the precautions below:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, bottles** and all other water holding containers.
- Drain or fill-in any low places** (ruts and puddles) in your yard.
- Keep drains, ditches and culverts clear of trash and weeds** so water drains properly.
- Keep lids on your trash containers** to keep out rainwater.
- Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.**
- Empty wading pools each week** and store them indoors when not in use.
- Make sure your swimming pool** is working properly and cared for while on vacation.
- Fill in hollowed out tree stumps** with sand or concrete.
- Change the water in** birdbaths, plant pots, and drip trays at least once a week.
- Cut your grass short** and trim your shrubbery to eliminate hiding places for mosquitoes.
- Store boats** covered or upside down and remove rainwater weekly.
- Repair window screens.**
- Make sure **ornamental ponds** are stocked with fish who will eat mosquito larvae.

The key in helping to control for the WNV is reducing breeding sites and larviciding (egg destruction) and not adult spraying as is commonly thought. Spraying (fogging) only kills those mosquitoes that come in contact with insecticide droplets and adult mosquitoes commonly return to a breeding area shortly after the spray agent has dissipated. Residents living in Bloomingdale and Wayne township portions are asked to report areas of excessive mosquito infestation and areas of standing water to Clarke's "**Mosquito Hotline**" at **1-800-942-2555**. **Find out how you can help reduce the development of WNV by visiting :**

Outdoor Severe Weather Sirens

When outdoors during forecasted severe weather, it is important to keep your ear and eye to the sky. The Village has 6 outdoor warning sirens at strategic locations to alert those outdoors to immediately seek shelter indoors. **Severe weather sirens are not designed to be heard by those indoors,** as TV and radio are their source for emergency information. A severe weather siren will be activated when:

1. a tornado has been sighted within 5 miles of the Village limits by a trained weather spotter; or
2. a trained weather spotter observes firsthand severe winds causing structural damage to a home or building; or
3. a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service (NWS) that the community is in the direct path of an oncoming tornado.

Once activated, sirens are not resounded for the same storm cell or tornado sighting. A warning siren is resounded for a new confirmed sighting or a different storm cell that meets activation criteria. **Outdoor warning sirens are never sounded to signal an 'all clear' advisory. Residents should monitor radio and TV for the issuance by the NWS of an 'all clear' advisory.** A siren sounded after a local activation should never be interpreted as an 'all clear' as it may be a siren activation from a neighboring community.

All Kids - Affordable Healthcare for Illinois' Uninsured Children

Children of working or middle class parents are caught in the coverage gap between public programs they're not eligible for and private health insurance their parents can't afford. Families who earn between \$40,000- \$80,000 annually make too much for their children to qualify for state programs like KidCare but not enough to afford health insurance.

Uninsured children are at higher risk for hospitalization and for missed diagnoses of serious and potentially life-threatening illness. Uninsured children are 9 times more likely to be hospitalized for a preventable health problem. Studies have shown that uninsured children are 25% more likely to miss school and that once enrolled their academic performance increased 68% and reading scores doubled.

All Kids Healthcare Program provides comprehensive coverage to all children at a level the family can afford, so if you make more, you pay more. Costs for doctor visits, vision and dental benefits, hospital visits and prescription drugs are covered under the Illinois All Kids Healthcare program. Enrolled families would pay monthly premiums plus affordable co-payments for doctor appointment and prescription medications. Monthly premiums for a family of 4 would start at \$15/child and increase depending on family income. Estimated plan coverage cost schedule would be as follows:

Affordable Health Screenings

Colony Park Senior Complex, located at 550 E. Thornhill Dr. will host a Life Line Screening for the Carol Stream community on **Friday, June 9th**. Life Line screens the carotid arteries in the neck to determine if you are at risk for stroke. Life Line will also offers a bone density screening to test for early detection of osteoporosis. These non-invasive, completely painless, ultrasound screenings take about 10 minutes each. Each of the 3 vascular tests is offered for \$ 45 while the bone-density screening costs \$ 35. Complete vascular screening (3 tests) for \$ 109, or all 4 tests for \$129. Help Stop Sewer Overflows

Dinner is over, and you are getting ready to clean the dishes. Did you know that the steps you follow could help your sewer system and reduce the number of sewer blockages and backups in the main lines and your sewer service? Grease is the leading cause of sewer overflows in Carol Stream and around the country. Over time, kitchen grease and other fats, oils, and grease that are poured down the sink or garbage disposal will enter the sewer system and clog pipes as the grease hardens. These pipe blockages can lead to raw sewage coming out manholes or out drains in your home.

So what can we do? Follow the steps below to prevent sewer backups:

- Use an old coffee can or jar as a grease container.
- Pour grease or oil food waste into the container, **NOT DOWN THE DRAIN OR GARBAGE DISPOSAL**
- Mix liquid vegetable fats with an absorbent material such as cat litter or coffee grounds in a sealable container before throwing it in the trash.
- Place food scraps in the garbage instead of down the drain.

By doing these little things around the house, we can help control the amount of grease in our sewer system. This will allow our treatment plant to run more efficiently and for us to reduce the amount of Sanitary Sewer Overflows in the Village.

WAYS offers Systematic Training for Effective Parenting (STEP) as an effective tool to help parents meet the challenge of raising children, improving relationships with them and helping children make good choices. STEP is a proven method for helping parents understand the motives behind their child's behavior, improving communication with them and for appropriately establishing healthy and supportive structure for your child. STEP class are offered on Monday evening from 7-8 p.m. for 8-consecutive weeks and cost \$25/session. Parenting sessions are ongoing so new members may join a class at any time. Important Changes in International Travel Requirements

All travelers, including U.S. citizens to and from the Americas (North, Central & South), the Caribbean and Bermuda will soon be required to have a passport or other accepted document that establishes the bearer's identity and nationality in order to enter or reenter the United States. The initiative will be implemented in phases according to the following timeline.

Dec. 31, 2006 – the new travel requirement is applied to all air and sea travel from Canada, Mexico, Central & South America, Bermuda and the Caribbean.

Dec. 31, 2007 – the new travel requirement is extended to all land border crossings as well as air and sea travel.

Slow Down- Posted speed limits through work zones are not a suggestion. They are the law.

Follow the Signs- Signs, arrow boards and flaggers are not there to make your life more difficult. They're there to help guide you safely and efficiently through the work zone.

Don't follow too closely- One of the most common crashes in a work zone is a rear-end collision. Be sure to allow at least two seconds of time between your vehicle and the one in front of you, and **never** change lanes in a work zone.

Be Patient! Drivers are asked to slow down well below the speed limit and be prepared to stop if traffic is heavy or if construction equipment is being moved in the work zone. Impatience and anger won't get you through the work area any faster.

Turn on Your Headlights- Workers and other motorists driving through the work zone need to see your vehicle. Truckers—use your emergency flashers to warn trailing motorists that you are slowing.

Scanning & Sorting Critical Personal Records is Critical to Disaster Readiness

One of the lessons learned from Hurricane Katrina disaster was the destruction of personal property and critical personal records. In the event of a long-term evacuation from your home or business, access to critical personal records is important in reestablishing your life and the lives of your family's members and/or business associates. Part of disaster readiness for families and businesses is cataloguing critical personal and business records and then safely digitizing (scanning) and storing that information on a CD-Rom. Some of the key records that disaster authorities encourage residents and business owners to digitally catalogue include the following:

- Bank records
- Birth, marriage and death certificates
- Divorce, child support and alimony documents
- Driver's license, ID cards and vehicle registration
- For federal government employees, a copy of your most recent SF-50, verifying your employment
- Immigration and naturalization documents
- Wills, trusts, medical records or list of primary physicians and dentists
- Children's immunization and school records
- Baptismal and christening records
- Medicare card and other health insurance cards
- Military records
- Passport
- Savings Bonds and investment documents
- Social Security Card
- Last 7 years of federal and state income or business tax returns
- Genealogy records
- Home loan documents
- Insurance policies (life, health, car, home) etc, including agent's name, phone number and e-mail address
- Create a list of all your creditors names
- College transcript or copy of diploma
- Most recent professional work resume
- Only the most critical photos (most of us have too many to think about scanning all of them)
- List of most valuable items such as jewelry, home furnishings, equipment
- A spreadsheet of all your music, books, DVDs, etc
- Your most recent credit report
- List of emergency contacts, including family and friends
- Anything else that would help you reconstruct your life in the event of an emergency



Create a file on your hard drive called **"Critical Documents"**. After scanning everything and saving them on your computer's hard drive, burn at least two CDs which should be put in a CD case then inserted in a water-air tight zip lock storage bag. Store the CD's in your bank's safety deposit box for safekeeping. The reason for maintaining a folder on your hard drive, is if you need to occasionally update a record(s) it's easy to burn a new CD by copying the revised version of the entire file. No matter what kind of emergency you might face that entails a short or long-term evacuation, you can begin to reconstruct your life (and prove who you are) once you have access to a computer.
