



Mayor's Letter

Reflections by Mayor Ferraro

I want to thank all of those residents, friends, neighbors, business owners, community and religious leaders for their support over my 20 years serving as Mayor of the finest community in DuPage County. Also, to all those residents who answered my call to serve on either the Village Board or a civic commission, task force, advisory council or the 4th of July Committee, I am indebted to you for your community service. I was lucky to be able to work with a fine staff of professionals and employees under the direction of 2 of the finest City Managers in the business - **Greg Bielawski** and **Joe Breinig**. Last but not least, I want to thank my wife **JoMarie** and my family for all the sacrifices they made in their lives that allowed me to carry out my public duties.

On May 7, I will be retiring from elected office to spend more time with my wife, family, grandchildren and good friends I have met over the years. It will be difficult to leave a role I love very much, but there are many wonderful leaders that will help govern the Village with honor, integrity and vision throughout the coming years.

As I near the completion of my last term as Mayor, I can't help but look back with pride and a deep sense of accomplishment at all the efforts of elected and appointed officials, a fine staff of professionals, wonderful community volunteers and other civic leaders who together have guided our community during its development from a small scale suburban community to a mature community of over 41,000 residents and over 900 businesses. Some of the more notable accomplishments over my 20 years include:

July 4, 1987 - The Village 4th of July Citizen Parade Committee hosted the 1st ever Independence Day parade;

August 1987 - Severe flooding which prompted then Illinois Governor James Thompson to declare northern Illinois a disaster area opening the way for federal funding for recovery;

Fall 1987 - the Village was awarded the Governors Hometown Award for partnering with Wheaton Youth Outreach Ministries to better serve the growing social service needs of many of our residents;

1989 - The Village entered into an agreement with the federal government to build a regional postal facility that created hundreds of job opportunities and public facilities that included a softball field and an emergency helipad for medical airlift;

1990 - Established its 1st Tax Increment Financing District for the Carol Point Business Park whose bonds were paid off _____ early;

1991 - Successfully recertified as an Illinois Certified City securing a hard-earned reputation as a progressive, full-service subur-

ban community;



1992 - DuPage Water Commission communities received Lake Michigan water securing sufficient and clean drinking water for the future. The Village entered into an agreement with DuPage County to open a regional recycling sorting facility which has generated \$1.3 million in resident rebates over its life;

1993 - Began a multi-million dollar expansion of the Water Reclamation Facility so adequate sewage treatment capacity would be available for future planned development;

1994 - The Police Department established a Community & Problem Oriented Policing Unit whose aim was to better target resources at identified public safety projects in the community. The Citizen Community Image Enhancement Task Force was formed for the purpose of planning gateway improvements along the Village's major highway corridors.



1995 - Commercial and industrial development activity occurred whose land value totaled approximately \$37.4 million. The Village Board approved the acquisition of a 22-acre parcel of land at the southwest corner of Gary Avenue and Lies Road for a Town Center;

1996 - 26 businesses located into the industrial park creating thousands of new jobs. In the fall, the Police Department and Glenbard Township High School District 87 established the High School Liaison Officer position at Glenbard North H. S.;

1997 - Experienced commercial and industrial development activity whose improvements valued at over \$100 million - it's highest ever;



1998 - Then Village Manager, Greg Bielawski and I worked with local state representatives to secure over \$100,000 in funding assistance for the rehabilitation of the Historic Farmhouse. On June 20,

1998 the Village formally dedicated the Carol Stream Town Center and hosted its first ever community festival and weekly summer concert series.

2002 - The Gregory J. Bielawski Municipal Center adding new

offices, conference rooms and an improved HVAC system as well as a much-needed Emergency Operations Center. The Village also began the final expansion of the Water Reclamation Center to increase sewage treatment capacity to a final built out population of approximately 42,000 residents.



2003 - On Dec. 1st, the College of DuPage broke ground on the reconstruction of the former Fire District Headquarters for a local Regional Technology Center. Thanks to the intergovernmental cooperation of the Fire Protection District,

the Village and COD, vacant land for a new fire station was transferred to the district with the understanding that the former fire station would in turn be transferred to COD for a Regional Technology Center to address the growing digital divide.



2004 - The Village successfully negotiated development agreements with the regions most prominent home improvement franchises - Home Depot and Lowe's, which

generated approximately 250 new jobs and helped stimulate economic activity in the Village's retail sector.

2006 - The Village dedicated the Lies Road pedestrian pathway running from Fair Oaks Road into the Town Center. The Village also worked diligently to provide water to residents living along Judith and Riviera Lane whose private wells were confirmed contaminated and a public health hazard.

2007 - As a member of the DuPage Water Commission, I worked with fellow commissioners to significantly lower the agencies reserves which provided over \$1 million in one-time revenues and lowered the cost of Lake Michigan water by 20¢/1,000 gallons.

These accomplishments tell only a part of the story of the development of the Carol Stream community and don't speak of the hard work of Carol Stream residents to development their neighborhoods, business owners to build and strengthen the business sector and civic institutions and their leaders in securing a high quality of life for the community at large. For all those who helped shape this great community of ours, I offer my undying gratitude for your selfless efforts to make Carol Stream what it is and always will be - **a great place to live, work and raise a family.**

In closing, may God Bless each of you and God Bless America!

Street Resurfacing

Street resurfacing projects involve spot repairs to curbs and sidewalks, edge grinding 1 ½” of the existing pavement and the placement of a new asphalt surface.

Pavement Reconstruction

Pavement reconstruction involves the removal of the entire asphalt pavement structure. Concrete curb, sidewalk and pavement base repairs are also performed. A 2” layer of asphalt binder is then placed, followed by a 1 ½” layer of asphalt surface.

Structural Overlay

Structural overlay involves the removal of 2” to 6” inches of asphalt surface followed by a leveling layer of asphalt, road fabric, and two inches of surface. Project streets will be temporarily disrupted during the summer months, but should always remain passable.

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Lies Road LAPP (from Gary Avenue to Schmale Road)

LAPP is the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT) acronym for “Local Agency Pavement Preservation”. The Village applied for Federal Funding to do a Structural Overlay on Lies Road in the industrial area. IDOT will administer the contract and the Village will fund 25% of the construction costs.

Fair Oaks Road Reconstruction (from Army Trail Road to Plum Grove Court)

This deteriorated section of Fair Oaks Road was removed and replaced to current standards. Curb and gutter was used rather than stone shoulders, and a combination of storm sewer and roadside swales will improve drainage. The Village is also working with the DuPage County Division of Transportation to construct a traffic signal at Army Trail and Fair Oaks Road, that will be finished in the spring along with the final road surface.

Projects Requiring a Building Permit

Work done prior to securing a permit is subject to increased fees and fines. Decide early on whether you or your contractor will apply for the necessary building permit(s). **Once a building permit has been issued, you are required to clearly post the permit either in the front window or on the door of the building.** Common projects that require a building permit include:

Give Highway Workers a Brake in Work Zones!



Expect the Unexpected - Normal lanes may be changed, speed limits reduced and repair crews working on the roadway.

Slow Down - Posted speed limits through work zones are not a suggestion. They are the law.

Pay Attention - Traffic patterns in highway work zones can change several times a day.

Follow the Signs - Signs, arrow boards and flaggers are not there to make your life more difficult. They're there to help guide you safely and efficiently through the work zone.

DO NOT TAILGATE - One of the most common crashes in a work zone is a rear-end collision. Be sure to allow at least two seconds of time between your vehicle and the one in front of you, and never change lanes in a work zone.

Don't follow too closely - Keep a safe distance between your vehicle and the road crews and their equipment.

Obey Road Crew Flaggers - The flagger knows best how to move traffic safely through a work zone. A flagger has the same authority as a regulatory sign and failure to follow can result in a traffic citation.

Stay Alert & Minimize Distractions - Dedicate your full attention to the roadway and avoid changing radio stations or using your cell phone in a designated work zone.

Be Patient! Drivers are asked to slow down well below the speed limit and be prepared to stop if traffic is heavy or if construction equipment is being moved in the work zone. Impatience and anger won't get you through the work area any faster.

Turn on Your Headlights - Workers and other motorists driving through the work zone need to see your vehicle. Truckers--use your emergency flashers to warn trailing motorists that you are slowing.

www.CitizenObserver.com - An Online Public Safety Info Source

The timely sharing of information is critical to law enforcement in carrying out their crime prevention and community policing duties. To this end, the Police Department has partnered with an online information sharing web site to efficiently and effectively share information with residents and the business community. The web site, www.CitizenObserver.com allows our Police Department to electronically share crime prevention information and crime alerts with the citizenry and the business community. This web-based public safety information and notification site was established in St. Paul in 1999 to assist the community in locating the whereabouts of a fugitive. CitizenObserver includes notification tools that allows our department to post information about area crimes, missing persons, wanted fugitives, unsolved cases, and other information.

Local businesses and residents can view information posted by the various law enforcement agencies who share information on this web site. In addition, online registration is free of charge and in return, those registering will receive the local departments' postings electronically via fax, e-mail, digital cell phone or pager. Local businesses and residents can subsequently respond with any information they may have about incidents in their area.



Family Watchdog - A Predator Alert Web Resource www.familywatchdog.us

Family Watchdog's mission is to build awareness of nearby threats by providing accessible and accurate sexual offender location information. To this end, Family Watchdog has built a bilingual safety portal on both the online and mobile platforms. This service is extremely easy to use, contains information from all states and is updated on a daily basis to ensure that our information is as current as the states from which we receive our sex offender data. Parents and guardians can register on-line for e-mail or cell phone alerts of predators.

The following safety tips for both parents and children as a means to discourage or ward off predators.

Parents:

- Always know where your children are.
- Put your children's emergency identification (name, address, phone number) on their clothes.
- Teach your children your home phone number and how to call 911 in an emergency.
- Agree on a specific time when children must return home.
- Call emergency 9-1-1 immediately if you observe any suspicious or unlawful activity.

Children:

- Always tell your parents where you are going.
- Never enter any home without getting your parent's permission first.
- Never get into any vehicle, unless your parents know and have said it's OK.
- Always wear reflective clothing at night.
- Never approach any house that is not well lit.
- Remember anything weird that an adult says or does to you and tell your parents immediately.
- Run away from people who offer you candy or other treats or want you to help look for their puppy or kitten.
- Scream, run and fight if anyone tries to grab you or make you to go with them.
- Don't play in areas that you are unfamiliar with.
- Stay on well-lit streets and always use the sidewalk. If there is no sidewalk, always walk facing traffic.

Yard Waste Sticker Locations

Watering Restrictions

Automatic sprinkler systems and continuous watering devices **are the only uses subject to water use restrictions**. Watering with a hand held device that has an automatic shut off nozzle is not regulated.

Odd-Even Day Restrictions: Homes with even numbered addresses (i.e. 172 Thunderbird Tr.) can water on even numbered dates (May 2nd), while homes with odd numbered addresses (i.e. 283 Idaho Tr.) can water on odd numbered dates (June 17th). **Odd-even day restrictions are in effect all year round!**

Residents may water new lawns and landscaping from sun up through midnight for 14 consecutive days from the date of planting. To avoid ticketing, residents must register their property address by phoning (630) 871-6220 by 4:30 p.m. (Mon.-Thu.) for weekday projects and by 12:30 p.m. on Friday for weekend projects.

Hydrant Flushing April 2nd - 13th

The springtime flushing of fire hydrants is a standard water utility practice that removes mineral oxide build up that settle at the bottoms of water mains. To minimize inconvenience to residents, crews will flush from 7 pm until midnight when water demand is typically the lowest. Crews will post signs in the service area where they are working to notify residents that flushing will occur that evening. Water customers:

- **may experience a temporary drop in water pressure** & discolored water;
- **are asked to run their tap in the morning** to clear up any discoloration;
- **are advised not to do laundry during evening hours** to prevent possible rust staining

Coyote Advisory

Once they reach the age of 2, coyotes will reproduce once a year in January-February. The percentage of females that breed is dependent on food availability and coyote density. Pups are born nine weeks after breeding occurs. The litter size depends on the age of the mother and the amount of available prey in the area. A scarcity of prey results in fewer females breeding which results in smaller litters. Under average conditions, female coyotes birth 4 - 7 pups. Coyote pups will join parents hunting for food when they reach 8 - 10 weeks of age. Most young coyotes begin to disperse from their den in the late fall and usually relocate within 5- 10 miles, while some may remain with the pack for up to 2 years.

The keys to coexistence with coyotes is eliminating food sources in and around your home and making them uncomfortable when crossing paths with one. To this end, heed the following coexistence tips:

- * Regularly clean in and around elevated bird feeders and don't overfill your bird feeder;
- * Clean and cover your barbecue grill after use;
- * Discontinue putting dog or cat food and water bowls outside;
- * If you store pet food in your garage, do not leave it open;
- * Keep lids secured on your refuse cans, regardless of whether they are stored outside or in your garage;
- * If you have fruit tree, regularly pick up fallen fruit from the ground;
- * Never, ever, purposely feed a wild animal, especially a coyote as they can lose their natural fear of people;
- * If seen, take the time to alert residents in the neighborhood of their presence;
- * If I observe an injured (limping or missing fur from mange) coyote, contact 9-1-1 to report its general location;
- * Should you cross paths with a coyote, stand tall, make eye contact and stare it down, clap your hands, wave your arms but never run;
- * If a coyote stands its ground, spray it with a garden hose or make loud noises by blowing a whistle or banging pots & pans.

Animal Regulations Also Pertain to Cats

Chapter 9, Article 3 of the Village Health Code regulates animal and pet owners and limits the number of dogs (excluding puppies under 4 months old) that can be kept on a property (building and/or lot) to 3 nor more than 4 cats or other domestic animals except in veterinary hospitals, pet shops, kennels or dog pounds. The payment of a dog license(s) shall not be interpreted to allow the keeping of more than the number of dogs allowed.



Dog and cat owners whose animal defecates upon another's property (public or private) must promptly remove the excrement to a proper receptacle located upon their own property.

Person(s) violating these regulations will can be ticketed and subject to fines of not less than \$20 for the 1st offense, \$30 for the 2nd offense, \$60 for the 3rd offense and \$120 for the 4th offense and for each offense thereafter. Person(s) ticketed for failing to remove their pet's excrement can be issued a separate violation for each day they fail to remove the waste and will be then subject to progressive fines.

Emerald Ash Borer Alert

The Village asks home and commercial building owners that have ash trees on their properties to be alert for a potential infestation of the emerald ash borer (EAB). Adult beetles are metallic green and about ½-inch long and nibble on ash foliage but cause little damage. The larvae (the immature stage) feed on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the tree's ability to transport water and nutrients. If you have ash trees on your property or nearby parkways, watch for signs that could mean they are in trouble.

Home and property owners with ash an tree(s) on their property are asked to periodically inspect them for the following signs of possible EAB infestation:

- **Flagging, wilting or dying of the leafy canopy of the tree;**
- **New green sprouts growing at the base or from the trunk;**
- **Small D-shaped exit holes about one-eighth inch across;**
- **Splits or cracks in the bark;**
- **Serpentine channels under bark that easily pull off.**

Mosquito Control & West Nile Virus Infection Protection

To prevent your property from being a drought mosquito-breeding site, follow the precautions below:

Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, bottles and all other water holding containers.

Drain or fill-in any low places (ruts and puddles) in your yard.

Keep drains, ditches and culverts clear of trash and weeds so water drains properly.

Keep lids on your trash containers to keep out rainwater.

Repair leaky pipes and outside faucets.

Empty wading pools each week and store them indoors when not in use.

Make sure your swimming pool is working properly and cared for while on vacation.

Fill in hollowed out tree stumps with sand or concrete.

Change the water in birdbaths, plant pots, and drip trays at least once a week.

Cut your grass short and trim your shrubbery to eliminate hiding places for mosquitoes.

Store boats covered or upside down and remove rainwater weekly.

Repair window screens.

Make sure **ornamental ponds** are stocked with fish who will eat mosquito larvae.

The key to controlling the WNV is by reducing breeding sites and larviciding (egg destruction) and not adult spraying as is commonly thought. Spraying (fogging) only kills those mosquitoes that come in contact with insecticide droplets and adult mosquitoes commonly return to a breeding area shortly after the spray agent has dissipated. Residents living in Bloomingdale and Wayne township portions are asked to report areas of excessive mosquito infestation and areas of standing water to Clarke's "**Mosquito Hotline**" at **1-800-942-2555**.

The DuPage County Health Department (DCHD) will collect ONLY dead crows and blue jays as part of its West Nile Virus surveillance effort until such a time it can confirm the virus's presence in the county. Once WNV is confirmed, these birds will no longer be collected. **To report a dead crow or blue jay, phone DCHD at (630) 682-7979 ext 7046.** If a sick or injured bird other than a crow or blue jay is found, contact the Willowbrook Wildlife Center at (630) 942-6200. Resident Canadian Goose Nest Egg Registration

The population of Canadian Geese has skyrocketed across the entire Mississippi flyway in the past few years whose current population is estimated to be 1.5 million and growing at a rate of 6 % a year. Droppings from these waterfowl have rendered some people's yards and patios unfit for human use. Not only do the droppings often contain viruses and bacteria that can infect humans, some have been found to contain human pathogens such as E-coli, salmonella, listeria and campylobacter.



Canadian Geese can become aggressive during the nesting season; sometimes they attack people who walk nearby a nest site. Destroying eggs and nests can be vital in controlling the Canadian Geese population and is widely supported by both conservation agencies and animal welfare groups, including the Humane Society of the United States. Egg and nest destruction is also inexpensive when compared to other population control methods. Geese start nesting as early as late February, so landowners should watch for nests now. Canada geese usually nest within 150 feet of water, often on islands or peninsulas.



Sump Pumps Can Cause Sewer Backups in Your Home

Do April showers only bring May flowers? The answer is "No". However, they can cause sewage backups in your basements.

The Public Works Department is looking for your assistance to reduce the amount of 'Clear Water' (rainwater) that is improperly discharged into the sanitary system. Having your sump pump directly discharging into the sanitary sewer increases the likelihood of a sanitary sewer backup in your home and also increase the cost of treating wastewater at our Water Reclamation Center.



"Do illegal sump pump connections really have a major impact on the sewer?" The answer is "YES". A typical 8-inch sanitary sewer can handle wastewater from about 350 homes, but if only 12 of those homes have sump pumps running at full capacity, the sewer will become overloaded and backups and flooding will occur.

Removing improper sump pump connections will significantly reduce the flow of clear water to the sanitary sewer system thereby reducing both the possibility of basement flooding as well as the amount of and cost for wastewater that has to be treated.

Gypsy Moth Alert

The gypsy moth is a leaf-eating insect that feasts on trees and shrubs. In large populations, it's capable of stripping plants bare, leaving them vulnerable to a secondary insect and disease attacks. Because of the weight of their eggs, female moths cannot fly. So, they typically lay their eggs on objects near the trees where they're feeding on.



If the moth is white and flies, it's NOT a gypsy moth! Male gypsy moths are brown with black markings and have a wingspan of about an inch-and-a-half. The females have wingspans of up to two inches and are white or cream-colored. But, remember, they're too heavy to fly.

Gypsy moth caterpillars grow from 1/16 inch long at hatching to about 2 inches long, multiplying their weight almost 1,000 times. One 2-inch caterpillar can eat leaves covering more than one square yard. One gypsy moth eggmass may produce up to 1,000 caterpillars and for every egg mass we can see, there may be dozens or hundreds, hidden.



Gypsy moths will devour almost anything leafy and green, but especially like oak, hickory, and willow trees. They'll also reluctantly eat ash trees and evergreens. Illinois has had isolated infestations primarily in the northeast, all of which have been eradicated. The Illinois Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Environmental Programs participates in the Slow the Spread program, a joint local, state and federal effort to reduce and control the spread of the gypsy moth.

Although the caterpillars prefer oak leaves, they will eat from more than 500 kinds of shrubs and trees.

Outdoor Severe Weather Sirens



When outdoors during forecasted severe weather, it is important to keep your ear and eye to the sky. The Village has 6 outdoor warning sirens at strategic locations to alert those outdoors to immediately seek shelter indoors. **Severe weather sirens are not designed to be heard by those indoors**, as TV and radio are their source for emergency information. A severe weather siren will be activated when:

1. a tornado has been sighted within 5 miles of the Village limits by a trained weather spotter; or
2. a trained weather spotter observes firsthand severe winds causing structural damage to a home or building; or
3. a warning has been issued by the National Weather Service (NWS) that the community is in the direct path of an oncoming tornado.

Once activated, sirens are not resounded for the same storm cell or tornado sighting. A warning siren is resounded for a new confirmed sighting or a different storm cell that meets activation criteria. **Outdoor warning sirens are never sounded to signal an 'all clear' advisory. Residents should monitor radio and TV for the issuance by the NWS of an 'all clear' advisory.** A siren sounded after a local activation should never be interpreted as an 'all clear' as it may be a siren activation from a neighboring community.
