

Mayor's Letter



Our event season is well underway and we hope you take advantage of the free summer concerts most every Thursday evening through Aug. 20th and help us celebrate during our golden anniversary year. I am very grateful to **Christopher Burke Engineering LTD, Home Depot, Charter One Bank, Berlin Ind., Hometown RV, the Daily Herald, the Carol Stream Rotary Club, the American Legion Post 76, TranSystems,** for the financial support of this year's festival summer. I also want to thank Trustee Matt McCarthy and the members of the **Carol Stream Youth Council** for a very successful 4th Annual Teen Music festival.

This past April 25th, the Village partnered once again with Com2 Computer as well as the DuPage County Dept. of Environmental Concerns to host an Earth Day Recycling event that allowed residents and the general public to have their personal financial documents shredded in person and also drop off of their unwanted electronics for proper recycling. I am happy to report that 10,500 lbs of paper was shredded on-site and 25,733 lbs. of electronics were collected. The Village hopes to host a similar type of event each April in our efforts to foster recycling community-wide.



On Tuesday, February 17th, I had the privilege of swearing in Deputy Chief Kevin Orr as the Village's 10th Chief of Police. **Chief Orr** has spent his entire 22-year law enforcement career with the Village and has worked closely

with previous administrations to make the Village Police Department one of the more innovative public safety agencies in the area. Chief Orr takes the reins of a 93 person department that includes 65-sworn officers and 28-person support staff and a 10- square mile service area. Please support Chief Orr and his department staff in continuing to make Carol Stream a safe community.

The Village has its 26th general election this past April 7th during which 3 Village Board



positions were up for election. On May 4th, I was extremely proud to swear in incumbents **Trustee Pam Fenner** for her 5th consecutive term on the Village Board, **Trustee Matt McCarthy** for his 2nd consecutive term and former Village Treasurer and Plan



Commissioner, **Trustee Anthony Manzullo** to his 1st term on the Village Board. Pam, Matt and Anthony are excellent public servants and look forward to continuing our work together as a govern-



ing board to continue to make Carol Stream a great place to live, work and raise a family.

On April 20th, the Village said farewell to two friends and fine public servants. **Trustee Mike Drager** completed his service on the Village Board on May 4th after completing my vacated term. Prior to his two-years of service on the Village Board, Mike honorably served on the Bd. of Fire and Police Commission. During that same meeting, the Village recognized **Lloyd Smith** for his 27 years of service working in the Public Works department. Both Mike and Lloyd are wished much health, happiness and success in their future endeavors and their service to the community is greatly appreciated.



The Village is working with the US Census Bureau to prepare the community to be counted in the upcoming 2010 decennial census. To this end, I have enlisted the support of the following community leaders to work with the staff and the Census Bureau to fully prepare the community for this major undertak-

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ing. A complete count of our community in 2010 is essential to ensuring that resources needed for infrastructure improvements, public health & safety, homeland security, child care, education and health care are provided back to our community from those federal agencies who apportion these funds. I want to thank **Trustee Greg Schwarze**, **Milli Jones** from the COD Education Center, **Bob Douglas** from the Public Library, **Kelly Carbon** from the Park District, **Vanessa Roth** from the Outreach Community Center, **Luanne Triolo** from the Chamber and **Dr. William Shields** of Community Consolidated School District 93 for agreeing to prepare a Census outreach plan the gets ever Carol Stream resident counted.

The Village has recently expanded video traffic enforcement to North Ave. at the Gary Ave. intersection which includes the monitoring of 6 traffic movements from both sides of North Ave in an effort to reduce red light accidents. Red light running is become a nationwide problem and is the leading cause of automobile crashes in metropolitan regions. In many jurisdictions including Carol Stream, a yellow light has come to symbolize for many motorists 'hurry up' and not 'slow down' as it is intended. The Village is working with its contractor to ensure the program's implementation is seamless and that startup issues are handled quickly and effectively. In closing, I want to strongly encourage all Carol Stream residents and businesses to shop Carol Stream as often as possible. In this difficult economy, shopping locally keeps money in our own community, as dollars spent in locally-owned business have up to three times the impact on the community as those spent at corporate chains. In fact, for every \$100 spent in independently owned stores, \$68 is returned to the community through taxes, payroll and other expenditures. If you spend that same \$100 in a national chain, only \$43 is returned to the community. On-line expenditures have a negative impact on the local economy.

I look forward to seeing all of you at the 4th of July parade beginning at 10 am and summer concert and fireworks extravaganza at the Ferraro Town Center that same evening.

Automatic Traffic Light Enforcement Program Update

Red light cameras have been installed at the Gary/North Ave. intersection and will monitor red light running at the Gary/North Ave. intersection. The cameras will monitor 12 traffic movements (6 in each direction) that include the following:

Eastbound North Ave. @ Gary Ave.

- 2 Left turn lanes (turning onto Northbound Gary Ave.)
- 3 center lanes
- 1 Right turn lane (turning onto Southbound Gary Ave.)

Westbound North Ave. @ Gary Ave.

- 2 Left turn lanes (turning onto Southbound Gary Ave.)
- 3 center lanes
- 1 Right turn lane (turning onto Northbound Gary Ave.)

Red light running and speeding is a national traffic safety problem that jeopardizes the safety and lives of Americans on a daily basis. Statistics show that motorists are more likely to be severely injured in accidents involving failure to obey traffic controls. Traditional traffic enforcement in dense urban areas poses special difficulties for both motorists and traffic patrol officers who in most cases follow a violating vehicle through a red light endangering motorists, pedestrians as well as the officer. Photo enforcement is a proven method of reducing the incidence of red light running and program statistics have shown undeniable proof of its effectiveness in saving lives.




Red light running is the leading cause of urban crashes in the United States, representing 22% of the total number of crashes. On average, red light running costs U.S. citizens \$7 billion annually. Currently a violation of law occurs when a motorist enters an intersection after the traffic signal has turned red. When the signal changes to red, motorists already in the intersection waiting to turn are not considered red light violators.

Protect Your Vehicle's GPS

The Police Department has had several reports of burglaries of GPS devices from resident's vehicles. GPS devices have become the number one stolen item and because of their small size and high resale value, they are a tempting item for opportunistic thieves. Many vehicle owners place their GPS device under their car seat but leave the suction cup mounts on the windshield tipping off would-be burglars. The following tips are offered to help vehicle owners better protect their GPS units:



- Always lock your vehicle, even when parked on your own property.
- Remove your GPS unit before leaving your car and place it in a purse, backpack, brief case or belt-mounted case.
- Consider dashboard mounting the GPS using friction strips to better conceal the device.
- Write down the unit's serial number so it can more easily be returned in the event it is recovered.
- Also, enable your GPS locking capability using the secure password protection feature.

Vehicle Sticker Enforcement to Begin July 1st

All motorized vehicles housed in the Village overnight are required to display a current valid vehicle sticker on the lower right corner of the front windshield by Tuesday, July 1st. Vehicle owners who fail to display a valid 2009 vehicle sticker on or before July 1st will be issued a \$100 ticket. Ticket charges are in addition to any fees associated with the purchase of an annual Village vehicle sticker. The cost of the sticker doubles if not purchased before the July 1, 2009 deadline and is increased an additional \$5 each month until a valid 2009 sticker is purchased.

Open Enrollment Underway for Fall Adult Citizen Police Academy

An 11-week Adult Citizen Police Academy beginning **Thursday, Sept. 24th through Dec. 10th** will include law enforcement sessions on Investigations/Interrogations, Crime Scene Evidence Processing, DUI Enforcement, Use of Force, Social Services, Dispatching, Firearm Safety, Racial Profiling, Gang & Drug Awareness, Traffic Stops and a Ride along with Patrol. Recycle Unwanted Pharmaceuticals @ the Police Station 24/7



Pharmaceuticals that are flushed down the toilet make their way into our water supply causing harm to fish and wildlife and may harm people who tap the Great Lakes for their drinking water. Conventional sewage treatment methods were not designed to remove this type of contamination.

In addition to environmental protection, unintentional poisoning is the 2nd leading cause of accidental injury in our country which includes accidental drug overdose.

The Village's Police Department provides residents with a pharmaceutical drop off site at the Police Department walk up lobby located at 500 N. Gary Ave. Acceptable pharmaceuticals include both prescription drugs as well as over the counter (OTC) medication. Make sure when dropping off your medications, they are emptied into a sealed leak-proof bag (zip lock) to prevent spillage. Liquid medication bottles should also be placed in a sealed leak-proof bag. Please note that controlled substances are discouraged from being dropped off, however, they will be accepted without questions or condition. Below are steps you can take to properly dispose of your unused, expired, or unwanted medications:

- Do not flush pharmaceuticals down the toilet or sink rather bring them to the local Police Dept. walk up lobby for proper disposal;
- Do not drop off used/expired prescription medication in their original vials, as it has the patient's personal information which can compromise your personal identity;
- All medications in pill form should be poured into a zip lock bag while liquid medication bottles should be sealed into a double zip lock bag to prevent any spillage at drop off;
- Only purchase the quantity of OTC and prescription medication you absolutely need to reduce the chances of stockpiling expired pharmaceuticals in your home;
- Place all your pharmaceuticals in one secure location so you can monitor their inventory for possible misuse/abuse.
- Do not take drug samples unless you are going to use them.



Regulations on Outdoor Fire Pits

Residents are asked to abide by the following regulations governing the operation of residential fire pits and outdoor fireplaces:

- Outdoor fire pits & fireplaces are allowed at a single-family home and only for recreational purposes only!! They are not allowed at multi-family residences.
- Recreational fires shall not be used to dispose of landscape material such as grass, leaves or shrubbery.
- Recreational fires shall not be used for the disposal of building materials, refuse or other trash.
- Recreational fires shall be attended continuously until the fire is extinguished.
- Outdoor fireplaces and fire pits shall be placed at least 15 feet from any building structure which includes homes, decks, sheds, fences and swimming pools and shall be located on a non-combustible surface where vegetation extending 3 ft. around the perimeter of the pit/fireplace has been cleared away.
- Fire pits shall be no larger than 4 ft. square with circular pits no greater than 4 ft. in circumference.

Police Officers and firefighters are **Hometown Heroes** who know how important it is to have all types of blood ready for transfusion. Each year, nearly 6 million people in our nation need a lifesaving blood transfusion and 38,000 pints of blood are needed daily. To this end, Carol Stream Police Officers will go head to head in a Battle of the Badges donor challenge competition with the Carol Stream Fire Protection District firefighters and paramedics to raise awareness about the ongoing need for blood donations. Illegal Fireworks May Result in a \$250 Ticket

The State of Illinois considers the possession, sale and use of fireworks a punishable offense under state statute with an associated minimum fine of \$500 and a maximum up to \$1,000. The Police Department enforces this law under local ordinance with a \$250 hang on ticket which must be paid within 10 days to avoid having the offense prosecuted in the Circuit Court of DuPage County. Repeated or more serious fireworks violations can still be charged under Illinois State Statute resulting in larger fines. **The definition of fireworks** whose possession, use and/or sale are punishable under local ordinance and state statute **includes** the following:

- Blank cartridges
- Firecrackers
- Torpedoes
- Sky rockets
- Roman candles
- Toy cannons using explosives
- Balloons requiring fire underneath
- Bombs or highly charged fireworks
- Fireworks containing an explosive compound
- Tablets or other devices containing an explosive or combustible substance(s) that produces visual effects.



The following **SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED FIREWORKS** under the definition detailed in the Village Code/State Statute

- Snake or Glow worm pellets
- Smoke devices
- Sparklers
- Trick noisemakers (aka "party poppers", "bobby traps", "snappers")
- Toy pistols, canes, guns, or other devices in which paper or plastic caps which contain twenty-five hundredths grains or less of explosive compound
- Toy pistol paper or plastic caps containing less than twenty-five hundredths grains of explosive mixture.

If You Weren't Aware – Now You Are


Abiding by the following codes is a demonstration of citizenship and respect for your neighbors. Please comply with the following codes to do your part in fostering community:



Health Regulation: Removal of Pet Waste (Chapter 9, Provision 3, Section 14) It is a code violation for any person who owns or controls a dog or cat which deposits excrement upon any property, public or private, not owned or possessed by such person to

fail to promptly remove such excrement to a proper receptacle located upon property owned or possessed by such person. Any person violating any provision of this section shall be deemed to be guilty of an offense and fined \$20 for the first offense, \$30 for the second offense, \$60 for the third offense and \$120 for the fourth offense and for each offense thereafter.

Business Regulation: Garage Sales Limited (Ch. 10, Provision 7, Section 2) A person may not conduct more than 3 garage sales in a year, nor participate in more than 5 multi-home garage sales a year without being required to secure a second hand dealer's license.



Annexation, Public Ways & Properties: Sidewalk Obstructions (Ch. 12, Provision 3, Sec. 4-3) It is a violation of local code for any person to cause, create or maintain any obstruction upon any street, alley, sidewalk or anywhere within a public right-of-way. Objects (vehicles etc.) which impede the flow of traffic or interfere

in a dangerous manner with the visibility of pedestrians, bicyclists or the drivers of motor vehicles are such obstructions regulated under this code.



Village Receives Award for Excellence in Financial Management

Organic Lawn Care Safer for You & Easier on the Planet



In a recent study, only 21% of homeowners surveyed felt their lawn contributed to water quality problems. 79% of the remaining survey respondents believe their lawns had little to no impact on local water quality. More than 50% of those surveyed also believed that their neighbor's lawn did contribute to local water quality problems. For the record, turf grass absorbs approximately 40% of the water that falls on it while the other 60% of the rain or sprinkler water departs your property carrying with it fertilizers and pesticides – known contaminants of local waterways by way of swales, drainage ditches, overland flow routes, the sidewalk, driveway surface ending up in storm sewers. These pollutions sources contain phosphorous and nitrogen which cause genetic damage to birds, fish, water fowl (ducks, geese, swans, herons, egrets) and causing algae blooms in ponds and lakes which rob the aquatic life of oxygen causing large scale fish kills.

It is important to know that every property drains to a waterway whether or not the property is located near a river, lake or pond. Given this sobering fact, residents are encouraged to consider environmentally friendly ways to maintain their lawns and gardens. The right formulation of natural compounds can actually be more powerful than even the most advanced chemicals. Organic lawn care solutions made with common household items, which will in fact save you money. Recycle Used Motor Oil Locally

By recycling your used motor oil at a local collection program or facility, you can prevent damage to the environment. The Village encourages residents and business owners who perform fluid and lube service on their own cars or vehicle fleet to lawfully dispose of hazardous waste at local repair and vehicle/truck maintenance shops. State law requires all oil change and quick lube facilities to accept free of charge residents used motor oil as well as used transmission fluid and anti-freeze during their business hours. Census 2010 – It's In Your Hands

The goal of the 2010 Census is to count all residents living in our nation on April 1, 2010. The Census Bureau does not ask, nor is interested in the legal status of residents in any of its surveys. To help ensure the nation's increasingly diverse population can answer the questionnaire accurately and completely, about 13 million bilingual Spanish/English forms will be mailed to housing units in neighborhoods identified as requiring high levels of Spanish assistance on or around March 1, 2010. Additionally, questionnaires in Spanish, Chinese (Simplified), Korean, Vietnamese and Russian as well as language guides in 59 languages will also be available on request.

Census results determine a state's official representation in Congress as well as the amount of state and federal funding communities receive over the course of the coming decade. 2010 Census data will directly affect how more than \$3 trillion is allocated to local, state and tribal governments over the next 10 years. In order for this funding allocation to be accomplished fairly and accurately, the goal of the decennial census is to count everybody, count them only once, and count them in the right place. The facts gathered in the census also help shape decisions for the rest of the decade about public health, neighborhood improvements, transportation, education, senior services and much more.

With one of the shortest questionnaires in history, the 2010 Census asks for name, gender, age, race, ethnicity, relationship, and whether you own or rent your home. It takes only about 10 minutes for the average household to complete. **Responses to the 2010 Census questionnaire are required by law.** All responses are used for statistical purposes only, and all are strictly confidential. Road Maintenance Season Upon Us

Crack Filling is the process of injecting a hot rubberized sealant into cracks to prevent water from penetrating the sub-grade and stone base.



Crack filling is the most cost effective maintenance for pavement. During summer and early fall, the Village hires a private contractor to crackfill local streets that have been identified through pavement inspection ratings to require this important treatment. If left exposed, pavement cracking allows water under the pavement causing the base to become unstable during the freeze thaw cycle. An unstable pavement base will lead to increased cracking and when they intersect, potentially form potholes.



Pavement rejuvenator spray emulsion is applied to roadways about 1 year after being resurfaced and helps restore original properties to aged (oxidized) asphalt surfaces.

Rejuvenator spray will retard the loss of surface fines and reduce the formation of surface cracking. Sand is applied to roadways soon after having been sprayed to prevent vehicles tires from dispersing the emulsion.



West Nile Virus Alert



St. Clair County confirmed the 1st positive West Nile virus test this year. The St. Clair County Health Department collected the positive sample on June 3rd while other positive mosquito batches have been verified in Cook County and a crow tested positive in LaSalle County. Residents must be vigilant to ensure they protect themselves and their families from this public health threat. Those with compromised immune systems must take extreme caution.

Mosquito Bites - protecting yourself and family:

- **Sparingly apply insect repellent to exposed skin.** The more DEET a repellent contains the longer it will protect you from mosquito bites.
- Avoid applying repellent to the hands of children.
- Be sure to read and follow the manufacturer's directions for use.
- **Spray clothing with repellents** containing permethrin or DEET. Do not apply repellents containing permethrin directly to exposed skin.
- Whenever possible, **wear long-sleeved shirts and long pants outdoors.**
- **Place mosquito netting over infant carriers** when outdoors.
- **Stay indoors during peak biting times** - dawn, early evening & dusk.
- Install or repair window and door screens.

Breeding Sites - reduce their number around your house:

- **Twice a week, empty water from** flower pots, pet food and water dishes, birdbaths, swimming pool covers, buckets, barrels, and cans.
- **Check gutters for clogged down spouts.**
- **Remove discarded tires and other items that collect water.**
- **Check under bushes, sheds or decks for empty items** that can collect water.
- Cut your grass on the medium setting at least once a week.

1980 – Gregory J. Bielawski, the Village 3rd Professional Administrator was hired to manage the daily operations of the Village.

1980 – The Illinois Dept. of Natural Resources notified the Village it would receive \$200,000 for the purchase of the land that now encompasses Community Park.

February 26, 1980 – The Village and 22 other DuPage County municipalities join the DuPage Water Commission to bring Lake Michigan water to the region as the primary source for potable water for residents and businesses.

June 24, 1980 – Village passed resolution 581 preparing the way for the future construction of private cable TV service to residents.

Fall 1980 – The U.S. Census Bureau certified the population of the Village to total 15,472 residents.

October 1981 – The Village Board approves the future development of a Days Inn Hotel & Restaurant at 150 S. Gary Ave., the community's first hotel.

1981 – The Village moved into a brand new 38,000 square foot Village located at 500 N. Gary Ave. the former site of the Wilbert Landmeier Farmstead.

Village President Gerzevske and the Board began the tradition of hosting a Listening Post, an informal 30-minute period before the regular Village Board meetings where residents could talk one-on-one with the governing board on matters of interest or concern.


April 1981 – The 12th Village election was held during which **Steven Cohen, Erling Pedersen** and **Jack Ambrogio** as were elected new members of the Village Board of Trustees.

May 1, 1982 – U.S. Air Force Reservist and Carol Stream resident Steve Olczyk, a 27-year old father of 3 was honored at a Memorial Park ceremony. Steve along with 27 other reservist were killed in the crash of a C-135 which crashed in McHenry county en route to a scheduled deployment.

1982 – William Reichert, the former Police Chief for the City of Oak Park was hired as the Village's 6th Police Chief who served in that capacity until 1993.

June 1982 – District 93 Superintendent Dr. Elsie Johnson retired after more than 20 years serving as an educator and school administrator. In November of 1982, the District opened a middle school in Hanover Park named in honor of Dr. Johnson.

1983 – The Village began preparation for celebrating its 25th anniversary by forming an anniversary committee.

April 1983 – The 13th Village election was held which included the reelection of Village President Jan Gerzevske, **Trustees Don Phillips and Dave Kaina** and the election of newcomers **Village Clerk Clela, Anne Montgomery and Trustee Jay Gould.**

1984 – The Village celebrated its 25th anniversary all year adopting the theme 'Our Roots are Down and We're Branching Out'.

1984 – The Carol Stream Association of Business and Industry was formed to assist the business community with issues pertaining to commerce, marketing and business networking.

March 1984 – The DuPage Water Commission signed a 40-year agreement to buy water from the City of Chicago for redistribution in DuPage County. The Water Commission Act of 1985 gave the Commission the authority to finance, design, construct and operate a Lake Michigan-to-DuPage County water supply system.

1984 – The Village dismantled Water Tower #1 which included the lighted Carol Stream sign.

1985 – Village made an application to the State of Illinois to become an Illinois Certified City, a program administered by the Dept. of Commerce and Community Affairs whose aim it was to certify cities as full service communities.

April 1985 – The 14th Village election was held which included the election of **Susan McNees, Linda Pugh and Tom Vinson** as newly elected Village Trustees.

July 4, 1985 – The Village hosted its inaugural Independence Day parade which traveled east along Lies Rd. turning south at Kuhn Rd. ending at Munson Dr.

1986 – Wheaton Youth Outreach, a Wheaton-based Christian social service organization established the Outreach Community Center, a satellite agency in Carol Stream to serve the multi-family neighborhood in the southeast section of the Village.

1986 – The Diocese of Joliet official granted St. Luke Catholic Church jurisdiction over the care of the pioneer era St. Stephen Cemetery.

1986 – The DuPage Water Commission entered into a "wholesale" Water Purchase Agreements with 23 DuPage County municipalities including Carol Stream and began the construction of the second largest water supply system in the State of Illinois.



1987 – Carol Stream Fire Protection Dist. Station 1 was remodeled, expanded and formally dedicated in honor of Board President, Richard P. Kammes.

1987 – The Carol Stream Historical Society accepted the dedication of a caboos from the Elgin, Joliet & Eastern Railway that was located at the entranceway of Armstrong Park to compliment Gretna Station.

April 1987 – The 15th Village election was held which included the election of Mayor Ross Ferraro, the reelection of **Trustee Don Phillips and the election of Don Sutenbach as Village Clerk and Harlon Barron** and former Village President Jan Gerzevske as new Trustees.

August 1987 – The Village once again experienced a major flood event with 9 ½ inches of rainfall in less than 24 hours.

Fall 1988 – With the opening of Stratford Junior H.S. in Bloomingdale, Community Consolidated School District 93 converted Jay Stream elementary school on Hiawatha Tr. into a middle school.


1989 – Carol Stream celebrated its 30th anniversary with a list of activities hosted throughout the year to showcase a vibrant, growing community.

April 1989 – The 16th Village election was held which included the reelection of **Village Trustees Tom Vinson, Susan McNeas and Linda Pugh.**

September 1989 – The Village entered into an intergovernmental agreement with the United States Postal Office for the construction of a regional mail sorting facility located at the corner of Schmale Rd. and Fullerton Ave.

1980-1989 – During this period, approximately 33% of the Village housing stock was constructed which included 5,057 housing units (single & multi-family units combined). Major residential developments approved for construction during this decade included Rolling Oaks, Slepicka Farm, Burke Farm, Heritage Glen, Spinnaker Cove, Cambridge Point, Kingsport Ridge, Lakehaven Apartments, President Street Condos and Windsor Park Manor.

With the significant growth in the residential sector, the Village's network of roadway expanded to accommodate the increased traffic. Lies and Kuhn Rd. once country roads were widened and improved to safely handle the growth in traffic throughout the community.


