The Board awarded a contract for the Gundersen/West Street Reconstruction Project to A Lamp Construction at the bid unit prices submitted, \$1,082,636.78.

Award of Contract: Phase III Construction Admin. – West/Gundersen:

The Board awarded professional engineering contract to Engineering Resource Associates, Inc. (ERA) in the amount of \$16,803. Billing will be per the specified amounts and rates in the contract at the hours performed plus Direct Expenses.

Award of Contract/bid waiver – Repairs to Well # 2:

The Board waived formal bidding and awarded the maintenance contract to Layne Western at a "not to exceed" limit of \$50,000.00 for repairs to Well # 2.

Award of Contract – State Bid – Road Salt Award:

The Board approved joining the State purchase and awarding the contract for Road Salt to Cargill, Inc. Salt Division at a unit cost of \$65.28 per ton. The Board also approved a budget transfer from the MFT funds to bring the budget amount up to the Road Salt total of \$26,620.00 which matches the State Bid.

REPORT OF OFFICERS:

Trustee Weiss thanked Peter O'Rahilly for his amusing recollections of the Village newspaper "The Citizen" as editor and as one of the earliest residents in the Village.

Trustee Weiss reminded everyone of the Town Meeting, Shape of Carol Stream to be held in the Board Room on September 30, 2009 from 7:00 PM to 9:00 PM. The meeting will be live on Channel 6 and call in questions will be taken.

Trustee McCarthy said that the Youth Council had a food drive on Birchbark last weekend. He reminded everyone that August 4th is the National Night Out at Community Park; the 5th annual JP Run is on September 6th and sign ups for Carol Stream Youth Football starts on August 15th.

Trustee Manzzullo thanked Mr. O'Rahilly for his recollection. He reminded all to attend the National Night Out tomorrow evening at Community Park. Trustee Manzzullo said that the Thursday night concert will feature our own Bob Glees with the Reunion Jazz Orchestra. He also reminded everyone to watch out kids on bicycles, especially at intersections and finally, he reminded everybody to Shop Carol Stream.

Village Manager Breinig reiterated Shop Carol Stream, invited all to the Community Park for the National Night Out which is from 6:00 PM to dusk. He noted the Thursday Night Concert and also the Relay for Life, which will be at the Town Center on Saturday night through to Sunday morning at 6 AM. Mr. Breinig said that there will be a Battle of the

Badges blood drive, Police vs. Fire on Tuesday, August 11th from 3PM to 7PM here at the Municipal Center. Mr. Breinig introduced Police Chief Orr. Chief Orr said that in regard to all of the recent publicity about Red Light Cameras, a recent event occurred at the corner of North Avenue and Kuhn Road that was caught by the cameras and he would like to show the Board and all those that watch these Board meetings, just what happens as shown on the cameras. He proceeded to show the video of a car, traveling at 38mph, drive through the intersection and T-bone a vehicle, 10 seconds after the light turned red. Thankfully neither the passengers nor the drivers were seriously hurt and this video will be of tremendous help in reconstructing the accident and help proving the liability if this matter goes to court.

Mayor Pro-Tem Gieser stated that for anyone interested, the 4th of July parade will be shown every Thursday and Sunday at 5PM on local channel 6. He also said that he sent a couple of T-shirts with the 50th anniversary logo to Miss Carol Stream (the real one) and she wrote a note saying that the horse and the weather vane brought back memories of the beginnings of the subdivision and she was happy to receive them.

HISTORY

Tyndale House Publishers was founded in 1962 by Kenneth N. Taylor. Concerned that his ten children were having a hard time understanding the family's devotional reading of the old English in the King James Version of the Bible, Taylor paraphrased the The Living Bible so they could hear and understand the scriptures in everyday English.

In 1954, as he rode the commuter train to his job in Chicago, Taylor started paraphrasing the New Testament into modern English. After seven years of writing and rewriting, he submitted the manuscript to several publishing houses, but it was rejected by all of them. Convinced that there was value in the work for more than just their children, Taylor and his wife Margaret, decided to use their limited savings to publish Living Letters.

In 1962, Taylor exhibited his self-published Living Letters at the Christian Booksellers Association convention. The following spring Billy Graham saw a copy of Living Letters and asked if he could print a special edition and offer it on the telecasts of his crusades. Half a million copies were given away through the Graham crusades. Ken Taylor's dream had become a reality and more – a publishing entity had been born. Tyndale House Publishers grew from a modest home into a major publishing entity that reaches every continent in the world.

"I had always been fascinated by the story of the 16th-century Englishmen William Tyndale. His lifetime goal was to translate the Bible into English, even though there was a death penalty for anyone who dared to do this. William Tyndale's dream was accomplished, but in 1536 King Henry VII arranged for Tyndale to be burnt at the stake for giving the English Bible to England. I too had a dream of giving America a Bible that was easy to understand."

The first industrial park lands were offered for development in July, 1959 by the Cole-Stream Industrial Park. A small 250-acre tract, it lay on both sides of North Avenue from Schmale Road west to Gary Avenue. Arthur Cole was a partner in this venture.

As soon as the first sections of housing units were well underway in Carol Stream, Stream turned his attentions to attracting top line companies to the industrial park. He kept a close tab on the tax structure of the village knowing this would be a great sales point for the industrial area.

The north side of the industrial park lay in the Carol Stream Utility Company's jurisdiction while the south half lay in the Wheaton Sanitary District. Plans were underway for the new water well in the industrial park. It opened in 1963, the year that Container Corporation, the first major corporation to locate in the village, opened the first of four facilities on its North Avenue/

Schmale Road property.

Stream's original plans called for the northeast intersection of North and Gary Avenues to be a major shopping area. This did not materialize. E-G Home Center opened in 1961 on the southeast corner. A gasoline service station was located on the northeast and northwest corners while the southwest corner was the site of the old Paddock Club, a restaurant/bar which for several years lay in unincorporated territory. Today, the Paddock no longer exists; the gasoline station on the northeast corner is now a candy shop; and the other gasoline station has been converted into a fast-food restaurant. In this same area, the Carol Stream Auto Parts was originally a sandwich shop.

In discussing his early-day planning for major intersection corners. Stream said he felt it was good business to sell them to gasoline companies. There would be a steady source of tax income to the village during formative years and they could always be re-purchased for a new sale.

Linked with this philosophy, the developer said, "One should remember buildings do not stand forever. They can be used, demolished and replaced with structures that will be more in demand

to meet the changing times."

In a simultaneous development project, Kenneth Gundersen began to develop the area along Main Place and the street which bears his name, Gundersen Drive. It was in this area that the numerous religious groups seeking to expand their offices chose to make their new business homes.

Stream knew that these groups were tax-exempt but there were other advantages to having such prestigious organizations in his office park. Many of them were staffed by his friends or former classmates. More important, many of them were professional people looking for a nice home close to Wheaton. He felt that these

people would help in the development of his residential community and lend their expertise in management.

The first occupant in the industrial park in 1962 was Easterling Silver Company, located on North Avenue, west of Schmale Road. The first two occupants of the office park that same year were Youth For Christ and the National Association of Evangelicals. While Easterling left the village after a few years, Youth For Christ and the National Association of Evangelicals still have offices here. They are among 16 religious organizations in the office park.

Development of the village industrial park continued as the Gaylord Division of Crown-Zellerbach, Streator Clay Tile (now No-Bel), Morton Quality Products, Crane Company and the IGA grocery/variety store opened facilities along Gary Avenue.

In 1965, the industrial park had expanded and Nardi and Podolsky (later Nardi and Company), industrial realtors and developers, began marketing an enlarged industrial park. The firm also constructed buildings for sale or lease in the park.

Village officials and residents found that the residents of their industrial park were as concerned over spiraling costs of their government as Stream had been. They were vitally interested in the wise and conservative management of the village and kept an eye on the tax levies.

Industry and commerce were as interested in the impressions of their new location on the outside world as Stream had been in 1960-61. They looked for the quality programs in religion, education, cultural, recreational and civic fields. As the new corporations moved into the village, they brought key personnel and workers who moved along with the company.

They encouraged their workers and employees to participate in community life. Thus, the Fortune 500 industries as well as the smaller commercial houses have reached out through their employees to work for a better community for all residents. Ideas came from the four corners of the world to this small community now located in three townships. They have tended to give the village a "cosmopolitan air" as we move toward the year 2000.

By 1970, the major companies had located along North Avenue, Illinois Route 64, between Schmale Road and Gary Avenue. Motorola replaced the Easterling Silver Company. Allis-Chalmers (now Fiat-Allis); Eaton Dole Valve (now Eaton Controls); Meyercord; McDade and Company; Container Corporation and E-G Home Center lined the State highway.

By the time the industrial park was nine years old, Carol Stream village officials had replaced the original weather vane logo with the present Tree of Life.





Expansions - 769 and 775 Alison Lane

<u>PURPOSE</u>

The purpose of this memorandum is to coordinate a request for Village Board approval of temporary variations to allow for driveway expansions at 769 and 775 Alsion Lane.

DISCUSSION

The Community Development Department recently received applications for variations from the Village's driveway regulations to allow for driveway expansions on neighboring properties at 769 and 775 Alison Lane. Each property is improved with a home having a two-car garage and a standard two-car wide driveway, approximately 17 feet in width. The proposal for each property is to widen the driveway to a maximum width of 24 feet, to effectively create a three-car wide driveway. From a functionality standpoint, this would allow vehicles to access the garage while allowing a vehicle to be parked off to the side of the existing two-car wide portion of the driveway.

Upon review of the formal zoning variation applications, staff noted that the driveway configuration that the homeowners at 769 and 775 Alison Lane wished to construct is common in the Village. A survey of aerial photography confirmed that this driveway configuration is not unusual in Carol Stream. After further review, it was discovered that when the Zoning Code's driveway standards were last updated in 2007, the ability to have a driveway wider than the garage was inadvertently omitted. Because omitting this provision was unintentional, and because the referenced driveway configuration is not detrimental to the character of residential neighborhoods, staff intends to advance a text amendment in the near future to restore the ability to have a driveway wider than the garage.

In the interim, however, staff does not wish to delay construction of the driveway expansions at 769 and 775 Alsion Lane, nor do we wish to require these homeowners to pursue formal zoning relief for a driveway configuration that is intended to be allowable. Under the provisions of §1-1-17 of the Village Code, the Village Board has the authority to grant a temporary variation to these homeowners that would allow the driveways to be constructed as shown on the attached surveys. An aerial photo of the two properties is also attached.

If the Village Board would be inclined to support a text amendment to restore a property owner's ability to have a driveway wider than the garage, they could provide temporary relief to the two property owners on Alison Lane for a period not to exceed 120 days, and the driveway expansions could be constructed. During this 120-day period, staff would prepare a text amendment that would restore this provision. Alternatively, the homeowners would need to pursue variations through the formal Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals process. It should be pointed out that if the suggested zoning code text amendment is ultimately not approved, a multitude of properties in the Village would be considered non-conforming as a result of having a driveway wider than the garage.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that, if the Village Board wishes to grant temporary relief to the homeowners at 769 and 775 Alison Lane, they should pass the following motion:

Motion to approve the driveway expansions as shown on the attached surveys for 769 and 775 Alison Lane for a period not to exceed 120 days.

As a point of information, the Community Development Department has been contacted by a property owner on Edington Lane who wishes to widen their driveway similar to the proposed configuration for the driveways at 769 and 775 Alsion Lane. It is likely that this property owner will submit a building permit application for the driveway expansion in the near future, and it is conceivable that other permit applications for similar driveway expansions will be submitted before the suggested Zoning Code text amendment is processed. If the Village Board would also wish to grant relief to other similar cases that might arise while staff is processing the text amendment, the Board should provide such direction.

The Village entered into a five-year agreement with Operations Management International (OMI), to operate the Thomas R. Vinson Water Reclamation Center in 2005. We will be entering into the last year of the contract on September 1, 2009, and it will expire on August 30, 2010. The agreement requires OMI to develop an annual budget for presentation and confirmation by the Village. For the fifth year of operation, the contract limited the cost increase to 3.04%.

OMI has developed the attached amendment for the last year of the contract. The proposed contract cost will be \$1,591,067, which is 3.04% above last year's cost and is consistent with the percentage increase allowed by the contract. Electrical and sludge disposal costs will continue to be rebatable cost, meaning that if the budget amounts are not spent, 50% of the savings are rebated to the Village. The contract lets OMI keep the other 50% as an incentive to operate the WRC as energy efficient as possible. Unused labor costs will continue to be 100% rebated to the Village.

During the past year, OMI completed a design-build conversion of the plant's chlorination system and is now developing a program, recommended by the recent energy audit, to modify the blower operations to save energy.

OMI has done a very good job of operating and maintaining the Village's WRC over the past years and has presented a cost proposal for the fifth year of operation, which is consistent with the previous agreement. It is, therefore, recommended that the agreement be amended to indicate that the 2009/2010 total operating cost shall not exceed \$1,591,067.

The Public Works Department would like to waive competitive bidding for the purchase of a Brush Chipper that was budgeted in the FY 2010 budget.

In researching ways to attain the best possible price, the Village became aware of the National Joint Powers Alliance. The National Joint Powers Alliance is a Service Cooperative created by Minnesota Statute 123A.21. This statute was created in 1978 and revised in 1995 to allow participating governmental and municipal agencies to reduce the cost of purchased goods by leveraging their combined purchasing power. The NJPA is a member owned cooperative, serving all public and non-public educational systems, governmental agencies and non-profits. Illinois Governmental organizations can utilize the pricing through Act 220 Intergovernmental Cooperation of the Illinois Statutes.

NJPA awarded Vermeer a contract in January 2009 as an addendum to an original bid request. Prior to acceptance by the NJPA, they performed a "Due Diligence" review to the request and looked at two points.

- 1) The products and services being added are within the scope of the original bid
- 2) Purposed pricing is commensurate with prior practices for the products and services already under contract

The original price of the Vermeer BC1800XL is \$51,288. By trading in our current brush chipper, we can receive a \$13,500 allowance. The final cost of the new brush chipper is \$37,788.

The Public Works Department would like to have authorization to waive bidding and purchase the new Vermeer Brush Chipper through the NJPA-Coop.

Federal Energy Efficiency Stimulus Grant Funding

As part of the American Recovery & Reinvestment Act, Congress and the Obama Administration earmarked substantial federal funds to stimulate the nation's economy with the goals of saving millions of jobs and addressing the nation's energy and environmental challenges. The Department of Energy is the designated grant agency that administers the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant program that includes an allocation formula using official population data to direct federal investment to the States, counties, territories and cities. The energy and conservation stimulus funding earmarked for the Village was set at \$173,000 (\$4.24/person). In order to secure the federal grant resources, eligible governments were to submit an application and corresponding energy management plan that supports the program objectives of moving our nation toward greater energy independence and taking a leadership role on the problem of climate change. The Village submitted a successful grant application this past June 25th.

At the Village Manager's direction, Al Turner worked with Mike Scaramella and I on a detailed a plan to address one of the major energy inefficient processes identified in a recent energy audit of the Thomas Vinson Wastewater Reclamation Center (attachment 1). The application tendered by the Village included two specific projects that met the grant funding requirements and in addition advanced the Village's continued efforts to green our operations. The projects energy and economics summary are detailed as follows:

<u>Project #1</u>: Installation of Dissolved Oxygen Sensors and Variable Frequency Drives on the Aeration Tank Blower Motors

Estimated Annual Energy Consumption Savings - 476,062 kWh

Energy Demand Reduction – 156 kW

Estimated Project Cost (Per Audit) - \$152,000

Estimated Project Cost (WRC Contract Operator) - \$152,200 (+.13%)

Estimated Annual Energy Cost Savings - \$ 29,706

Project #2: Installation of LED Street Lights in Along Spring Valley Drive.

Estimated Energy Consumption Savings – 245,280

Energy Demand Reduction – 245 kW

Estimated Project Cost (Ground Hog Utility- Contractor) - \$71,900

Estimated Annual Energy Cost Savings - \$ 17,170

The U.S. Dept. of Energy has contacted the Village on several occasions in early August requesting that we register with the federal Contractor Certification clearinghouse so federal funds could be transferred into a Village account to commence the grant projects once formal approval is given. The registration was completed and we are waiting for official notification from the Department of Energy to proceed. As part of the grant preparation process, the Village's WRC Contract Operator CH2MHILL was asked to prepare a detailed project proposal for the Dissolved Oxygen Sensor/VFD project and Ground Hog Utility of Roselle, the Village's LED installation vendor was asked to prepare project cost estimates for the Spring Valley Drive Street Light Upgrade project. Both of these cost proposals are attached for your review and in addition, CH2MHILL has also submitted a project timeline since their proposed project requires they submit and obtain approval from the WRC Permit Authority, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (attachments 2, 3 & 4).

The expenditures guidelines established for the Dept. of Energy for the Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant program for projects under \$250,000 require an applicant government to either bid out or secure competitive quotes for materials, equipment and labor associated with the project. Because the Village has established contractor relationships with both CH2MHILL (formerly OMI) and Ground Hog Utility and the competitive quotes submitted have been reviewed and approved by the federal grant administrators, staff seeks permission from the Village Board to establish project contracts and timelines with both of these vendors for the associated projects.


With respect to the Spring Valley Street Light Project, \$43,000 is budgeted in the Capital Improvement budget to find this project. The \$173,000 federal grant award after funding the WRC project would leave a \$20,800 balance to help fund the installation of 10 LED street lights in the Spring Valley subdivision (attachment 5). In addition, the Village's Com-Ed Energy Competition team will be submitting a grant application with the Dept. of Commerce and Economic Opportunity seeking an additional \$50,000 for the LED street light project, which if awarded, would allow the Village to accelerate the proposed 5-year capital improvement project to replace high-pressure sodium street lights along Spring Valley Drive with energy efficient LED lights.

Please include this matter on the August 17th Village Board meeting seeking authority to proceed with preliminary plans to seek IEPA approval to automate the aeration process and subsequently return with proposed contracts for the project work for their approval. 4.5 ECRM 5 - Control blowers operation with DO sensors and VFDs

Objective: Reduce electricity consumption by modulating the blowers speed with variable frequency drives (VFDs) based on the dissolved oxygen (DO) demand.

Issues and Observations: During normal operations, one of the four blowers in each blower building runs continuously rotating weekly with the other blowers and supplying air to one tank in the aeration basin. Two DO measurements per day are taken manually at several locations in the aeration tanks to determine the DO demand. Airflow supply is then varied accordingly by adjusting the blowers' intake dampers. Average DO concentration in 2008 was 6.5 mg/l, which is much higher than the satisfactory 2.0 mg/l. Therefore, it seems that the sludge is over-aerated and, as a result, excessive energy is consumed to deliver unnecessary air to the aeration tanks.

Recommendations: Potential energy reduction can stem from automatically detecting dissolved oxygen (DO) demand in the aeration tank, and by modulating the blowers speed with VFD controls. Manual adjustments can result in excessive oxygen in the treatment process. Blower energy consumption with VFDs is typically 10% to 20% lower than consumption using conventional controls. Installing DO sensors at the aeration tanks to monitor real time DO demand can save unnecessary energy consumption used to over aerate the tanks. VFDs installed on the blower motors and controlled by the DO sensors can ensure that the level of oxygen input into the system follows the demand pattern at all times.

Costs and Benefits: Since supplying air to the aeration tanks constitute the largest energy consuming activity at a waste water treatment facility, investing in a control system should be considered as a priority, also given the very favorable payback time.

The blower energy management improvements are intended to reduce the energy consumed by the aeration tanks' blowers. This is accomplished by separately controlling the dissolved oxygen (DO) concentration in the front and rear of each of the three trains in the West Plant only by throttling a new automatic inlet valve to the blowers.

The front three western aeration trains (old) are supplied with a common air header from the four Hoffman, 125 HP blowers. The rear three western aeration trains (new) are supplied with a common air header from the Spencer, 250 HP blowers. Each system will need to be balanced manually across the three aeration trains, front and back sections independently. Also, each drop leg will need to be manually balanced longitudinally along the train. Additional aeration control can be afforded with additional drop leg valves, actuators and DO sensor systems (not included in this improvement effort).

To reduce energy consumption a blower inlet may be throttled to reduce the air flow. A butterfly valve and electrically operated motor actuator will be installed on two Spencer blowers and two Hoffman blowers. One of each blower groups (Spencer or Hoffman) will be used as primary and the second as a back up for periods of maintenance. If more than one blower is needed, one of the associated fixed speed un-throttled blowers should be placed in service in addition to the throttled blower used for DO trim.

One dissolved oxygen probe will be installed in the front and the rear of each train, total of six. These HACH LDO probes will need to be cleaned weekly to remove any biological slime or growth on the probe tip. The six probes will be connected to three HACH SC100 which have the capacity to receive input from two probes. The input from the three forward trains will be averaged to provide a 4-20 milliamp signal to the Hoffman blower valve actuator. The input from the three rear trains will be averaged to provide a 4-20 milliamp signal to the Spencer blower valve actuator.

The project will need an engineering drawing by an Illinois registered engineer. A permit modification will be needed as this is a change to the plant. Time will be needed to manage this project as well as some contingency costs to account for the budgetary nature of this cost estimate.

Estimate for Carol Stream WRF Blower Energy Recovery Program

Install four (4) motorized valve operators on the suction side of two each of the existing Spenser & Hoffman aeration blowers.

Install six (6) HACH LDO dissolved oxygen (DO) meters with controllers in each of three (3) aeration tanks (front and rear) (west/new side only). Install three (3) HACH SC100 Controllers with sunshades and extension cables to collect the DO Probe input.

Install and program a program logic controller (PLC) to receive the DO input and provide a 4-20 milliamp output to the blower valves.

Both of these cost proposals are attached for your review and in addition, CH2MHILL has also submitted a project timeline since their proposed project requires they submit and obtain approval from the WRC Permit Authority, the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (attachments 2, 3 & 4).

The expenditures guidelines established for the Dept. of Energy for the Energy Efficiency Conservation Block Grant program for projects under \$250,000 require applicant government to either bid out or secure competitive quotes for materials, equipment and labor associated with the project. Because the Village has established contractor relationships with both CH2MHILL (formerly OMI) and Ground Hog Utility and the competitive quotes submitted have been reviewed and approved by the federal grant administrators, staff seeks permission from the Village Board to establish project contracts and timelines with both of these vendors for the associated projects.

With respect to the Spring Valley Street Light Project, \$43,000 is budgeted in the Capital Improvement budget to find this project. The \$173,000 federal grant award after funding the WRC project would leave a \$20,800 balance to help fund the installation of 10 LED street lights in the Spring Valley subdivision. In addition, the Village's Com-Ed Energy Competition team will be submitting a grant application with the Dept. of Commerce and Economic Opportunity seeking an additional \$50,000 for the LED street light project, which if awarded, would allow the Village to accelerate the proposed 5-year capital improvement project to replace high-pressure sodium street lights along Spring Valley Drive with energy efficient LED lights.

Please include this matter on the August 17th Village Board meeting seeking approval from the Village Board to begin working on preliminary plans to seek IEPA approval to automate the aeration process and to secure firm contract pricing and work project timelines with both vendors in anticipation of the award. Should you have any questions or concerns regarding this agenda item, don't hesitate to contact me.

Description & Scope: This project involves the removal and replacement of nine deteriorated concrete streetlight poles with our standard aluminum poles and screw-in bases. The control box and 3,700 feet of faulty wiring will also be replaced.

Purpose & Need: It's estimated the Village has up to 800 concrete streetlight poles. Those poles have experienced deterioration near their bases making them susceptible to collapse. They pose a liability for potentially causing further damage as well as being a safety concern. In addition other elements are in need of repair such as faulty wiring or cable, inadequate controls, bad photoelectric cells, ballasts or luminaries and substandard anchors. This replacement program is designed to address those issues and to maintain the Village's streetlight system in a safe and reliable operating condition.

Impact on Future Operating Budget: Replacing the deteriorated concrete poles will reduce the Village's liability exposure. Other repairs will restore the streetlight system to a safe and reliable operating state.

Furnish and install one (1) Village of Carol Stream specification lighting controller on a helix base. This controller will have circuit breakers and load capacity to accommodate an additional future lighting circuit.

Furnish and install 1 1/4" HDPE uniduct as needed to provide a complete lighting installation. Lighting circuits installed in the uniduct will be #6 XLP-USE consisting of one red, one black, one white, and one green conductor. Uniduct will be installed via the directional bore method in order to reduce landscape restoration.

Consideration of Carnival Amusement Services – 2009 Oktoberfest

Alpine Amusement has provided carnival services for the 4-day Summer-in-the-Center event for the past 5 years and has expressed interest in providing similar services for the Oktoberfest event in September. Terms of the agreement are similar to the Summer-in-the-Center agreement and include the following provisions:

- Sharing of 25%-30% of the amusement revenues with the Village
- Special \$15 unlimited ride periods (versus \$20 for the Summer-in-the-Center event)
- Full compliance with the Village Code relating to carnival amusements

The Oktoberfest event is scheduled for Saturday, September 26. The schedule for the proposed carnival would be as follows:

- Friday, September 25 from 6:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m.
- Saturday, September 26 from 1:00 p.m. 10:00 p.m.
- Sunday, September 27 from 1:00 p.m. 9:00 p.m.

The Village received a 25% share of ride revenues on rides grossing between \$0 - \$50,000 and a 30% share of ride revenues on rides grossing over \$50,000 for the Summer-in-the-Center event. This threshold has been lowered to \$30,000 which should result in a greater share of ride revenues to the Village.

Staff feels the carnival will add a new, festive element to the Oktoberfest event and increase attendance. The Village share of carnival ride revenues should more than offset our cost to staff the event. In light of the successful relationship we have had with Alpine Amusements over the past 5 years staff recommends entering into the attached agreement with Alpine Amusement Company to provide carnival services for the Oktoberfest event per the terms of the attached agreement.

This agreement made this 17th day of August, 2009 by and between Alpine Amusement Co., Inc., Party of the First Part and The Village of Carol Stream, Party of the Second Part. Second Part agrees to furnish a location for the erection and operation of a combination of rides, shows and concessions known as Alpine Amusement Co., Inc. Party of the Second Part also agrees to furnish and pay for any Village tax, permits or licenses that my be required for operation, and for all water, lot and street privileges necessary for operating, conducting, and placing of all attractions and concessions (the location must be mutually agreeable and acceptable to both parties).

Party of the First Part further agrees to furnish all electrical connections, sufficient electrical generators and electric current with distribution necessary for the power and illumination of all rides, shows and concessions. Said current to be for operating hours and to be supplied until all attractions are dismantled at the close of the engagement. Party of the First Part also agrees to furnish Uniformed Ride Attendants, Foreman on Festival grounds at all times, All ticket boxes and coupons for ride admittance and \$1,000,000 public liability and property damage certificate of insurance for each incident. (Alpine Amusement Co. is not liable for your employees and volunteers), unless caused by our own negligence. Said Certificate of Insurance shall be sent to the Village at least one (1) week prior to the engagement. The Village of Carol Stream, it's Officers, and Employees shall be named as an insured on said policy. Said policy shall be on an ISO approved form and shall not include any limitations of liability for failure to notify the Village of the cancellation of said policy.

Party of the Second Part also agrees to have location, portable toilet facilities available Monday before event. If streets are used for location of said attractions, Party of the Second Part agrees to have them closed to traffic and parking no later than 12:01 A.M. Monday before event.

IN CONSIDERATION OF THE ABOVE, Party of the First Part agrees to furnish, present and operate rides, concessions, and attractions at The Ross Ferraro Town Center for a period of 3 days, starting August 25, 2009 and ending August 27, 2009 for an event to be known as 2009 Oktoberfest. Any concession or booth closed or unable to operate shall pay pro-rata for actual days operated. To pay the Party of the Second Part (25% from S0-\$30,000 and 30% from \$30,001 and over) the gross receipts from monies derived from the sale of admission tickets at any attractions and rides after usual Government Taxes, Midway Insurance and State and City sales tax, amusement tax and unlimited ride wristband discount coupons, if applicable, are deducted.

The settlement of the percentage on the attractions and rides shall be made on the closing of the engagement. This agreement is fully assignable by Alpine Amusement Co., Inc. only upon concurrence by the Village of Carol Stream.

Village of Carol Stream is responsible for the following services:

- *The handling for all festival advertising and promotion exclusive of any other items that may otherwise be contained in this agreement.
- *Sufficient police protection and security
- *Trash receptacles for midway clean-up operation
- *Parking area for semi-trailers, trucks and trailers at an approved Village parking lot, (no trailers or trucks will be allowed to park on site unless they are an integral part of the carnival ride).
- *24-hour access to portable toilets, starting Monday morning, September 28, 2009.

The Village of Carol Stream & Alpine Amusement agree to equally share the cost of 4 portable restroom facilities (50% each).

REMARKS:

Alpine Amusement Co. will furnish 25 advertising posters free of charge for distribution by the Village. No employee travel trailers will be on site at festival nor will employees be housed on site.

UNLIMITED RIDE SPECIAL \$15.00/PERSON, SATURDAY AND SUNDAY 1-5 PM.

Hours of event will be: Friday 6PM-10:00PM, Saturday 1:00PM-10:00PM and Sunday 1:00PM-9:00PM.

IT IS FURTHER UNDERSTOOD AND AGREED:

Party of the First Part assumes no liability for any accident that might be caused by streets or other locations being left open to local traffic or parking during erection, dismantling, or operation of equipment or to trespassers while equipment is not in operation. Party of the Second Part agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Party of the First Part for any defects relating to the condition of the grounds not caused by Party of the First Part. Party of the First Part agrees to indemnify and hold harmless, Party of the Second Part against any and all injuries or claims for damages as a result of said carnival, amusement and /or concessions operated by Alpine Amusements or its subcontractors or agents.

It is understood and agreed that there shall be no other riding devices, shows, attractions, or concessions (including confections to be known as popcorn, cotton candy, funuel cakes, corn dogs, sno cones, nachos, coke and other soft drinks at this event other than those furnished by Alpine Amusement Co., Inc. except those furnished by the Party of the Second Part or food vendors operating under agreement by the Village (and those agreed upon, prior to the event). Both parties shall mutually agree upon the introduction of additional attractions such as rock climbing wall, laser tag, simulated NASCAR racing, bungee jumping, etc.


