The following is a brief description of those items on the Consent Agenda.

Final Plat of Subdivision: Tall Grass Square-NEC Gary & Lies – R. 2350:

At their meeting on June 23, 2008, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of the Final Plat of Subdivision for Tall Grass Square, North East Corner of Gary Avenue and Lies Road in accordance with staff conditions. The Board concurred with the recommendation, but deleted recommendation #3, that the Final Plat can be recorded when presented, but that no building permits will be issued until the Plat of Easement Vacation has been recorded. The Board adopted Resolution 2350, A RESOLUTION APPROVING A FINAL PLAT OF SUBDIVISION – (TALL GRASS TOWN SQUARE – NORTHEAST CORNER OF GARY AVENUE & LIES ROAD.

Rear yard setback variance: 652 Chestnut Drive - Ord. 2008-07-31:

At their meeting on June 23, 2008, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of a rear yard setback in accordance with staff recommendations. The Board concurred with the recommendation and adopted Ordinance 2008-07-31, AN ORDINANCE GRATNING A REAR YARD SETBACK VARIATION – 652 CHESTNUT DRIVE.

Expansion of a non-conforming use variance: 370 S. Main Place -Ord. 2008-07-32:

At their meeting on June 23, 2008, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of a request for a variation for an addition to a nonconforming building in accordance with staff recommendations. The Board concurred with the recommendation, adding that the approved site plan be attached to the Ordinance, and adopted Ordinance 2008-07-32, AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A VARIATION ALLOWING AN EXPANSION OF A NON-CONFORMING STRUCTURE – (370 MAIN PLACE).

Zoning upon annexation: Spec. uses, variations- Chicago Motors Corp.- 27W 110 North Ave. :

At their meeting on June 23, 2008, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of a request for a variation for an addition to a nonconforming building in accordance with staff recommendations. The Board directed staff to proceed in negotiating a pre-annexation agreement with Chicago Motors Corporation.

Spec. Uses: auto laundry, auto service station; Variances: outdoor activities, vehicle stacking: Mehran Farahmandpour – 120 S. Gary- Ord. 2008-07-33:

At their meeting on June 23, 2008, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommended approval of the stated special use permits, auto laundry, and auto service station and variations for outdoor activities and vehicle stacking spaces, all in accordance with staff recommendations. The Board concurred with the recommendations adding that the hours of operation shall be no earlier than 6 a.m. and no later than 10 p.m. and adopted Ordinance 2008-07-33, AN ORDINANCE APROVING A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR A CAR WASH AND AUTO SERVICE STATION, AND VARIATIONS FOR STACKING SPACES AND OUTDOOR BUSINESS OPERATIONS – (120 S. GARY AVENUE).

Contractual Service: Performance Management & Incentive System:

The Board approved of Performance Management and Incentive System consulting services to The Mercer Group in the amount of \$26,525.

Budget Transfer:

The Board approved a budget transfer in the amount of \$26,525 from the Contingency Account to the Consultant Account for the Implementation of consulting services for Village-wide Pay for Performance System.

Ordinance 2008-07-30: Prevailing Wage:

The Board adopted Ordinance 2008-07-30, AN ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DU PAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS ASCERTAINING THE PREVAILING RATE OF WAGES FOR LABORERS, WORKERS AND MECHANICS EMPLOYED ON PUBLIC WORKS PROJECTS OF SAID VILLAGE.

Resolution 2351: Declare surplus property – seized vehicles:

The Board adopted Resolution 2351, A RESOLUTION DECLARING SURPLUS PROPERTY OWNED BY THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM. – (SEIZED VEHICLES)

Amplification permit – fee waiver – Outreach Community Center:

The Board approved an amplification permit and waiver of fee for the Outreach Community Center's Community Barbecue on August 5, 2008.

Regular Bills, Addendum Warrant of Bills:

The Board approved the payment of the Regular Bills in the amount of \$348,538.56. The Board approved the payment of the Addendum Warrant of bills in the amount of \$703,172.14.

REGULAR MEETING:

Ordinance Approving a Special Use Permit for a Car Wash and Auto Service Station, and Variations for Stacking Spaces and Outdoor Business Operations – (120 S. Gary Avenue).

Trustee McCarthy asked if the car wash will be open 24/7 and was told it would be. Trustee McCarthy said that he is concerned about the noise from the dryers disturbing the guests at the adjacent hotel and the petitioner said that the dryers are hand dry only

and everything else is contained inside of the tunnel. The petitioner went on to say that he is not sure of the exact hours of operation, but he thinks that the car wash would close at 9 p.m. everyday except Sunday which would be 7 p.m. It will not be an overnight operation.

Mr. Diamond noted that if necessary the Board can restrict the hours of operation in the future. He said that the hours of operation can be added to the Special Use Ordinance. It was determined that the hours of operation from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. will be added as a condition to the ordinance.

Trustee Gieser said that there is an existing median in the road leading into the property and asked if it will be removed and was told that it will be. In response to the question of automobiles using that road for stacking, the petitioner said that they have provided 21 stacking spaces instead of the original 11 and they believe that there will be no need to have the road used for staging. It was also stated that the road is wide enough for cars to pass each other narrowly and there is no entrance from North Avenue.

Trustee McCarthy moved and Trustee Weiss made the second to approve Ordinance 2008-07-33, AN ORDINANCE APPROVING A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR A CAR WASH AND AUTO SERVICE STATION, AND VARIATIONS FOR STACKING SPACES AND OUTDOOR BUSINESS OPERATIONS – (120 S. GARY AVENUE) with the additional condition that operating hours will be from 6:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. The results of the roll call vote were:

Presentation by Value Place for a New Hotel and Shopping Plaza at 200 W. North Avenue:

Robert Parsons and Tom Matthews gave a full presentation of the proposed project of a new hotel and shopping plaza at 200 W. North Avenue. Mr. Parsons said that they estimate that the sales tax portion would be about \$50,000 a year so they are prepared to escrow \$150,000 and if they do not break ground for the retail development by the Spring of next year then the sales tax that you would lose because we didn't do that, the Village could draw that amount down on a monthly basis until they did build the center. He said that would be sufficient for three full years of them not building the retail.

Tom Matthews gave a presentation about the hotel, its functions and procedures. He also spoke about the security features and the financial benefits to the Village.

Trustee Schwarze asked what research has been done to determine who the clientele will be for the hotel and Mr. Matthews said that they have done informal market research, where an employee actually called human resource departments in companies within a five mile radius of a proposed hotel and asked if they refer consultants and other employees to long term stay hotels (42% in this area) and he noted that there were double the number of qualified employers that are looked for in five mile radius.

Trustee Schwarze asked if there is a defined maintenance plan for the public areas and exterior of the hotel and it was stated that there is a deferred maintenance plan that is used for general maintenance. There are also two employees that are property attendants at each hotel and some of their essential job functions are shampooing carpets, light electrical work, light plumbing, studio preventative maintenance programs that include preventative pesticide treatments, janitorial work, parking lot upkeep and other duties as assigned.

Trustee Schwarze asked if this is the only location that they have looked at in Carol Stream and he was told that generally they would be looking for a larger site, but as a

business model, this works financially because of where it is at, the visibility, the car counts, the employer counts, rooftops, and median incomes all are factors.

Trustee Schwarze asked how Value Place could improve the quality of life for the residents of the Village and Mr. Porter said that they as a group, bring quality to whatever it is that they do, so it will look nice, it will be kept up, it will not be an eyesore, ever, and they bring financial strength to the community, the number of dollars that the hotel will bring within the circle of food, clothing and restaurants and gasoline. Mr. Porter said that this will be their first hotel and it is their most important hotel and they are anxious to be able to use this as the ideal for the next community.

Trustee Weiss asked if they will be using a changeable copy sign and Mr. Porter said that they will meet the sign code regulations and if allowable they could use changeable copy signs on the monument sign, not generally on the building.

Trustee Weiss asked if there is a cross easement to either Windsor Park on the west or Brunswick to the east? There is an easement to the bowling alley side. Mr. Glees said that this is something that was discussed in the course of the project and the staff comment is that the parking in the area of the commercial building should be designed so as to be connectable with a future development to the west, whatever that might be. That is what the applicant has done. Staff has discussed the development with Windsor Park and they do not have any plans for that vacant site, immediately west of the proposed Value Place site at this time. What they are thinking of is probably to try to get approval of an expansion of their residential development. However, it may be commercial. If it were a residential development, they have indicated that they would not be in favor of a cross connection. However, it were commercial, they would not have an objection.

Trustee Weiss asked the Village Attorney if, in the future, Value Place is taken over or sells to another entity, would the Village have any control over what name, tenant, brand name ultimately takes over this property, that it would be at a level that is consistent, or higher than what we are debating right now, through a stipulation or condition. Mr. Diamond said that, fortunately, this property is unincorporated, so the Village has the device of an annexation agreement to use to have some control over the use. If the Board would choose to have this be a hotel that people check into for a week at a time, then it could be incorporated into the annexation agreement, if the owners agree to it. The Village could attach to the agreement, many of terms under which the facility would operate. It could include that this must be operated by a national franchisee, not owned as a single unit and a lot of it would incorporate what terms the Board wants.

Mayor Saverino said that he also would like to have the agreement protect our hotel tax collection with this and any future owners.

Trustee Gieser asked if they are developing this property or any property to retain ownership, or to sell to other people. Mr. Matthews said that their goal, right now, today is that they keep Value Place. They are hoping to build 40 or 50 of them, which would be a great victory for them.

Attorney Diamond noted that an annexation agreement is binding for twenty years, so even if the hotel is sold, the agreement runs with the land.

Trustee McCarthy asked if a hotel guest can have an overnight guest stay in the room and was told no. He said that in investigating other similar hotels, he has not seen a lot of occupancy, judging by cars in the parking lot, and asked about filling the occupancy requirements needed to succeed. Mr. Matthews said that current Value Place hotels that are open have over 80% occupancy.

Trustee Drager said that he shares Trustee McCarthy's concern about the occupancy of the hotel. He also noted that the retail center in Frankfort, IL looks a lot nicer than what

is being proposed and Mr. Porter said that they will build the retail to look the same as Homer Glen/Frankfort, or work with whatever the Board wants.

Trustee Gieser asked what is "breaking ground" in relation to the tax escrow and it was stated that breaking ground means pouring foundations. Their expectation is that in the spring of 2009 they will have all of the leasing, and the financing in place, so they can pour foundations and start laying brick. If they do not do that, then they are penalizing the Village of Carol Stream by not doing what they said they would do. The \$150,000 should replace the sales tax, by using some formula that is worked out. Trustee Gieser said that his concern is that the Village could be left with a concrete pad and utilities if the economy does not warrant further development. All the utilities would be in, but it would site graded, not concrete.

Mayor Saverino said that the Village has had a lot of promises from developers about retail development that has never happened and he is comfortable that something will happen here, either development or receipt of retail sales tax.

Mr. Diamond said that the Board should move to authorize staff to negotiate an annexation agreement and come back to the Board at a public hearing for approval. He suggested that better renderings and elevations should be produced by the petitioner so that the Board can see how this will match up with the hotel.

Mr. Breinig asked Mr. Diamond if there should be a motion to reconsider since at the last meeting the Board moved to direct staff not to move forward with the annexation agreement. Mr. Diamond concurred and the motion would be made by someone who voted against going forward to reconsider the previous decision.

Trustee Fenner moved and Trustee Schwarze made the second to reconsider the previous motion to direct staff not to proceed with negotiating an annexation agreement. The results of the roll call vote were:

Trustee Weiss moved and Trustee Schwarze made the second to direct staff to work on a draft of an annexation agreement and to present it back to the Village Board for a public hearing. The results of the roll call vote were:

Mr. Diamond noted that it takes five (5) votes to approve an annexation agreement.

REPORT OF OFFICERS:

Trustee Weiss congratulated the Carol Stream Park District White Sox, 3rd 4th Grade Softball Champions. He also thanked the 4th of July Parade Committee, the businesses that supported and everyone that turned out to watch the parade.

Trustee Schwarze echoed Trustee Weiss' comments for staff . He said to Shop Carol Stream.

Trustee Gieser said that this was a great parade, it was the biggest ever and he thanked the Committee that works for 12 months a year to make the event come together.

Trustee Drager said the parade was awesome, and thanked the McCarthy's and the Gieser's for all of their work. He said that in regard to the Community Pride awards will be soon and said that there should be awards for those that don't care for their property and they are called tickets. Keep the Village clean. Pray for our troops!

Trustee McCarthy said that Kim Gieser drives the boat for the parade and thanked Public Works and the Police Department for their contributions.

Trustee Fenner echoed all of the thanks for the Parade.

Village Clerk Melody thanked everyone for their good wishes for her daughter's recovery and said that Melissa is doing well.

Village Manager Breinig reminded everyone of the Thursday concert.

Mayor Saverino commented on an unsigned letter that he received and stated that if residents have something to say they are welcome to come to the Listening Post to talk to the Trustees. He thanked Bob Mellor and the staff for working with insurance carriers to get the best rates for the Village. Mayor Saverino noted that the last vehicle in the 4th of July Parade was the street sweeper and within minutes, except for the signs, no one would know that had been a parade. He thanked the staff and all of the "red shirts", volunteers for making this a success.

David Schonback, 625 Fabyan Parkway, Geneva, IL was sworn in as a witness in this matter. He stated that everything in regard to his request is in the staff report and that he is in agreement with the conditions in the report.

There were no comments or questions from those in attendance at the call for public hearing.

Chairman Michaelsen noted that the record is to show that the staff report is hereby entered and made a part of the record.

This report serves as an addendum to the report presented at the May 27 and June 23, 2008, Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals meetings. At the May 27 meeting, David Schonback presented his proposal and received questions and comments from the Plan Commission. At the conclusion of the public hearing, by a 4-0 vote, the Plan Commission continued the case to allow the applicant time to make certain revisions to his site plan, to obtain a sign-of from Engineering Services that the DuPage County stormwater management

permit is in order, and to add to his requests a variation for rear yard setback. At the June 23 meeting, the case was again continued because the applicant had been unable to resolve certain outstanding issues, and to allow the applicant time to add to his requests a variation for parking lot greenspace. The issues and current status are as follows:

- County approval of the stormwater permit. The Engineering Services Department
 has signed off on this issue, and confirmed that the stormwater management permit
 approved by DuPage County now corresponds with the plans attached hereto as
 Exhibit A. Issue resolved.
- Submittal of a request for variation for rear yard setback, legal notice of the request for variation. The applicant has submitted the request and staff has placed the required legal notice. Staff's evaluation of the request is provided herein. Issue Resolved.
- Revisions to the site plan to provide adequate curb returns at the entrance drives to
 the satisfaction of the Village Engineer, and trash enclosures constructed with
 masonry materials to match the masonry on the buildings. We have received
 revised plans and we find them satisfactory. Issue resolved.
- Submittal of a request for variation for parking lot greenspace. The applicant has submitted the request and staff has placed the required legal notice. Staff's evaluation of the request is provided herein. Issue resolved.

The applicant is requesting approval of an amendment to the existing preannexation agreement for the property at 27W371 North Avenue to reflect zoning upon annexation in accordance with §16-15-7 of the Carol Stream Zoning Code, a plat of subdivision in accordance with §7-2-3 of the Carol Stream Subdivision Code, approval of a variation for rear yard setback in accordance with §16-10-2(G) and §16-15-6 of the Carol Stream Zoning Code, and approval of a variation for parking lot greenspace in accordance with §16-13-2(E)(3) and §16-15-6 of the Carol Stream Zoning Code. Attached for review are the public notice for the most recent variation request, Forms B-1 submitted by the applicant for his two variation requests, and reduced copies of the Site Geometric Plan (Exhibit A), Building Elevation (Exhibit B), and Plat of Subdivision (Exhibit C).

Variations:

As noted in the initial staff report, the Zoning Code requires a front yard of not less than 75 feet, interior side yard of 10 feet, corner side yard of 40 feet and rear yard of 75 feet. With the St. Charles Road frontage being identified as the front of the property, the proposed building and parking locations would meet Carol Stream's setback requirements with the exception of the rear yard building setback, which is proposed to be 26.75 feet rather than the required 40 feet. Staff notes that the building setbacks meet the requirements of DuPage County, the permitting authority; however the applicant has obtained approval from the County for variations for parking and drive aisle setbacks. Staff would observe that the applicant has presented no reason to justify his request for variation from Carol Stream's rear yard setback requirement. However, we also must note that the project has been approved by DuPage County as meeting its requirements, and is not out of keeping with other industrial properties in the St. Charles Road corridor. Therefore, staff has no objection to the requested variation for rear yard setback.

Also as noted in the initial staff report, Section 16-13-2(E)(3) of the Zoning Code requires that 5% of the parking lot paved area be landscaped to provide visual relief. Staff has evaluated the applicant's proposed site plan, and we find that the two parking lots have a combined area of approximately 21,800 square feet, and so 1,090 square feet of landscaped area are required; however, the proposed parking lot islands have a combined area of approximately 490 square feet, and so the requirement is not met. In reviewing the applicant's request for variation from

the parking lot greenspace requirement, we note that parking is proposed to be provided in the amount of 55 spaces, including three handicapped spaces. Staff has expressed to the applicant a concern with respect to the parking ratio, in that only 1.9 spaces per 1,000 square feet of floor area would be provided. The applicant has not identified any proposed uses for the building, and so parking must be evaluated using expected uses. If the overall building were to include warehouse uses, with a relatively minor level of office use, such as 10%, the parking requirement would be 33 spaces and the site plan would be adequate. However, if more intense uses were to occupy the building, such as auto service or a greater degree of office use. the parking demand could exceed the 55 spaces. Staff believes the proposed parking will likely be sufficient, but we invite comments from the Plan Commission on this matter. In order to provide increased greenspace in accordance with the Zoning Code, four parking spaces would need to be removed. We would again note that the project has been approved by DuPage County as meeting its requirements, and is not out of keeping with other industrial properties in the St. Charles Road corridor. We would also note that, in view of the possibility that some future uses may require a greater amount of parking than anticipated, it may be prudent to provide as many spaces as possible. Therefore, staff has no objection to the requested variation for parking lot greenspace.

With regard to any variation, the Zoning Board of Appeals shall not recommend a variation unless it shall make findings based upon the evidence presented to it in the following case, as per Section 16-15-6(D) of the Zoning Code:

1. That the property in question, other than a single-family residential lot, cannot yield a reasonable return if permitted to be used only under the conditions allowed by the regulations governing the district in which it is located.

In order to meet the parking lot greenspace requirements, the amount of parking spaces or the size of the proposed building would need to be reduced. The applicant desires to maximize the building size and parking provided.

2. The plight of the owner is due to unique circumstances.

There are no unique circumstances associated with the property.

The variations, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the locality.

The surrounding area is primarily unincorporated commercial and industrial properties, and the existing uses have been developed under DuPage County requirements, and do not meet many of Carol Stream's requirements. The variations, if granted, will not alter the essential character of the locality

4. The particular physical surroundings, shape, or topographical conditions of the specific property involved bring a particular hardship upon the owner as distinguished from a mere inconvenience.

There are no physical conditions that bring about a hardship.

5. The conditions upon which the petition for the variations is based would not be applicable generally to other property within the same district.

The conditions associated with this site are no different than any other site in the vicinity. Therefore, the conditions upon which the petition for the variations is based would apply generally to other properties.

6. The granting of the variations will not be detrimental to the public welfare or injurious to the other property or improvements in the neighborhood in which the property is located.

The granting of the variations should not be detrimental to the public welfare or other properties in the vicinity.

Based upon the evaluation criteria, staff finds little to support the applicant's requests for variations. However, in view of the nature of the development as an unincorporated property in DuPage County, and that the project meets County standards, staff has no objection to approval of the applicant's request for variations as part of a preannexation agreement for access to Village utilities.

Summary

Based upon our review, staff finds that the applicant's requests for rezoning upon annexation, variations for rear yard setback and parking lot greenspace, and plat of subdivision are reasonable and will have minimal impacts on adjacent properties and rights-of-way. Staff finds the applicant's proposed site plan to be acceptable.

Staff recommends approval of the request for zoning upon annexation, plat of subdivision, a variation for rear yard setback, and a variation for parking lot greenspace, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That a plat of easement be prepared for water and sewer extensions and stormwater management facilities, submitted for review as part of the final engineering plans, and recorded prior to issuance of a building permit for utility service connections;
- 2. That the amendment to the preannexation agreement include commitments for cost-sharing for required infrastructure improvements;
- 3. That the use of plain concrete block as an exterior finish shall be prohibited. Concrete block may be used in exterior walls provided the exterior surface is covered or coated with a suitable material for exterior surfaces, such as, but not limited to: brick, stone, stucco, wood, metal, or other material approved by the DuPage County building official;
- 4. That unfinished pre-cast concrete or unfinished poured-in-place concrete shall not be used on any façade;
- 5. That fabricated metal shall cover no more than fifty percent of any façade;
- 6. That the landscaping along Morton Road and St. Charles Road must be a hardy, salt tolerant variety to avoid winter die-off;
- 7. That all landscape materials shall be maintained in a neat and healthy manner, with dead or dying materials replaced with similar size and type species on an annual basis;
- 8. That a separate permit is required for water main and sanitary sewer construction, and connection thereto;
- 9. That the access drives to Morton Road shall require approval from the Wayne Township Highway Department;
- 10. That the access drive to St. Charles Road shall require approval from the DuPage County Division of Transportation;

11. That the development of the site and buildings will comply with all State, County and Village Codes and requirements.

Mr. Glees reported the following highlights: In your packet is the final addendum to the staff report presented at the May 27 and June 23, 2008, Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals meetings. At the June 23 meeting, the case was continued to allow the applicant to resolve certain outstanding issues, and to allow the applicant time to add to his requests a variation for parking lot greenspace. The applicant has now resolved all outstanding issues.

The applicant has made two additional requests since first presenting the project to the Plan Commission – a variation for rear yard setback and a variation for parking lot greenspace.

With respect to the rear yard setback variation, staff notes that the applicant has presented no reason to justify his request for variation. However, we also must note that the project has been approved by DuPage County as meeting its requirements, and is not out of keeping with other industrial properties in the St. Charles Road corridor. Therefore, staff has no objection to the requested variation.

With respect to the parking lot greenspace variation, we would again note that the project has been approved by DuPage County as meeting its requirements, and is not out of keeping with other industrial properties in the St. Charles Road corridor. We would also note that, in view of the possibility that some future business uses may require a greater amount of parking than anticipated, it may be prudent to provide as many spaces as possible. Therefore, staff has no objection to the requested variation.

Based upon our review, staff finds that the applicant's requests for rezoning upon annexation, variations for rear yard setback and parking lot greenspace, and plat of subdivision are reasonable and will have minimal impacts on adjacent properties and rights-of-way. Staff finds the applicant's proposed site plan to be acceptable.

Staff recommends approval of the request for zoning upon annexation, plat of subdivision, a variation for rear yard setback, and a variation for parking lot greenspace, subject to the conditions contained in the staff report.

Commissioner Manzzullo said that he agrees with all of the conditions noted in the staff report, but he noted that the parking spaces were all at 9 feet instead of 9.5 feet and asked if this is due to it being developed in the county. Mr. Glees said that this is one reason, also, per the Zoning Code, in the Industrial Zone, the business owner may request approval from the Community Development Director for spaces to be 9 feet wide. This property would be zoned Industrial upon annexation and thus they would be in keeping with the Village Code.

Chairman Michaelsen commented that he finds everything in order.

Commissioner Manzzullo moved and Commissioner Christopher made the second to recommend approval of the petitioners requests in accordance with staff recommendations. The results of the roll call vote were:

Final Plat of Subdivision (Consolidation)

Mario Spina, 3813 St. Charles Road, Carol Stream, IL was sworn in as a witness in this matter. He said that the request is for a final plat of subdivision, consolidation and that there have been no changes.

There were no comments or questions from those in attendance at the call for pubic hearing.

Chairman Michaelsen noted that the record is to show that the staff report is hereby entered and made a part of the record.

The following is the staff report:

This report serves as an addendum to the report presented at the April 14, 2008, Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals meeting. At that meeting, by a 5-0 vote, the Plan Commission recommended approval of the petitioner's requests for: Special Uses for Planned Unit Development, Shopping Plaza, Drive-up Service Window, Bank with Drive-up Service Window, and Auto Laundry; Preliminary/Final PUD Plan; and Rezoning upon Annexation to B-3 Service District. The Plan Commission also continued the request for Sign Code variations until such time as the petitioner could modify his requests to reflect comments heard at the public hearing.

In the initial staff report, it was noted that the petitioner intended to prepare a plat of consolidation for the property at such time as he completed arrangements for easements with adjacent properties, including cross-access easements with the Village Tavern and a stormwater management easement with the Westhaven Apartments. Those arrangements have been completed, and the plat has been reviewed by staff and found acceptable with the condition that certain language must be added to the plat as provided by the Engineering Services Department.

Staff recommends approval of the Final Plat of Subdivision for Carols Court, subject to the following condition:

1. That the access easement provisions provided by the Engineering Services Department be added to the plat prior to it being brought to the Village Board for approval.

Special Use – Outdoor Activities and Operations

Gary Avenue Corridor Review

CONTINUED FROM 06-09-08 MEETING

Stephen Moeller, 745 N. Gary Avenue, Carol Stream was sworn in as a witness in this matter. He explained that they are proposing the installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank which is the special use for outdoor activities and operations. He noted that they have added a row of concrete bollards to the west of the tanks for added safety. Mr. Moeller also said that they are requesting a Gary Avenue Corridor Review for the building expansion on the east side of the current building.

There were no comments or questions from those in attendance at the call for public hearing.

This is the staff report for this matter:

Applicant:

Stephen A. Moeller of Krusinski Construction on behalf of Prince Industries.

Size and Location:

The 5.09-acre property is located on the east side of Gary Avenue, about 300 feet south of Elk Trail. (See attached location map.)

Existing Zoning and Land Use:

The subject property is zoned I Industrial District, and is improved with an approximate 64,000 square foot industrial building.

Adjacent Zoning and Land Uses:

The properties to the north, south and east are zoned I Industrial District, and are improved with industrial buildings. The properties to the west are zoned R-4 General Residence District with a Special Use for Planned Unit Development, and are improved with residential condominium dwellings.

Attachments:

Attached for review are a location map, aerial photo, public notice, cover letter dated April 16, 2008, from Steve Moeller, Project Manager for Krusinski Construction Company, the General Application, the Special Use Application, Gary and North Avenue Corridor Review Application, and reduced copies of the site plan (Exhibit A), landscape plan (Exhibit B) and building elevations (Exhibit C).

Request:

The applicant is requesting approval of a Special Use Permit for *Outdoor Activities and Operations* in accordance with §16-10-2 (B)(14) of the Carol Stream Zoning Code to allow for the installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank in the I Industrial District. The applicant is also requesting Gary Avenue Corridor Review in accordance with Section 16-5-6 of the Carol Stream Zoning Code.

STAFF ANALYSIS

Steve Moeller of Krusinski Construction Company, on behalf of Prince Industries, Inc., has submitted an application requesting approval of a Special Use Permit for outdoor activities and operations to allow installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank at 745 North Gary Avenue. The site is occupied by a 63,977 square foot, one-story industrial building. The outdoor tanks are proposed along the north side of the building, at a location approximately 406 feet away from the nearest Gary Avenue right-of-way line. The tanks are proposed outside of the 400-foot Gary Avenue Corridor, and so Gary Avenue Corridor

Review of the tank area is not required. However, the applicant is also expanding the building with a 42,011 addition, for which Gary Avenue Corridor Review is required.

Special Use – Outdoor Activities and Operations

With regard to the Special Use Permit, staff has reviewed the operational and the aesthetic factors of the proposed outdoor use. From an operational standpoint, the tanks would be located along the north wall of the proposed expansion of the existing industrial building, adjacent to a proposed truck dock area. This location will allow easy access for delivery trucks that would fill the tanks, and is in close proximity to the laser-cutting equipment which are served by the tanks inside the building. No fencing is proposed to enclose the tank area, as the applicant prefers to have easy access to the tanks and ancillary equipment. Staff has no objection, however, we invite comments from the Plan Commission on this matter. The nitrogen and oxygen storage tanks fall under the authority of the State Fire Marshall's office with respect to code requirements, and staff has worked with that office to ensure proper locational and setback requirements are provided on the site plan. In order to provide protection from accidental impact, the designer has located six pipe bollards along the parking lot east of the tank area. Bollards are not proposed adjacent to the truck dock area to the west of the tanks, in order to keep the area accessible for supply trucks. Staff is concerned with the lack of protection against accidental truck impact, and if the Plan Commission were to recommend approval of the Special Use, staff would advise that the recommendation include the condition that bollards be installed at strategic locations along the west side of the tanks area to protect the tanks from being hit by vehicles, while not inhibiting accessibility by supply trucks. With the condition of installing additional bollards, staff believes the proposed arrangement will function efficiently and safely. Therefore, staff has no objection to the proposed use from an operational standpoint.

Staff has evaluated the request from an aesthetic standpoint. In reviewing §16-10-1(C) of the Zoning Code, which requires that industrial outdoor storage areas be enclosed by a fence, staff would observe that the intent is to provide screening from other properties and adjacent roadways. In other cases, staff has supported and the Plan Commission has approved the use of landscaping and other forms of screening to satisfy the fencing requirement. The proposed tanks are 20 feet tall and six feet wide, shorter than the adjacent 24-foot building wall which would therefore screen view of the tanks from the east. The industrial building to the north is the American Litho building, which is approximately 180 feet away, and whose south face is a blank wall; this building would screen view of the tanks from the north. (See photos below.) To the east are other industrial buildings, railroad spurs, and rear-yard parking and storage areas, and so staff sees no concern with respect to screening from the east. As noted above, the tanks would be located approximately 406 feet east of the nearest Gary Avenue right-of-way line. As shown on the photos below, four existing evergreen trees are located in the grassy area north of the building, just west of the truck docks, and these trees provide excellent landscape screening; as such, the tanks would be minimally visible from Gary Avenue. In addition, the applicant proposes to paint the tanks to match the colors of the proposed building. Because of the distance to Gary Avenue, the screening offered by the nearby buildings, the landscaping and the camouflaging, the tanks would have minimal impact on neighboring properties. Staff believes the proposed screening is adequate, and therefore has no objection to the proposed use from an aesthetic standpoint.

As stated in Section 16-15-8(E) of the Zoning Code, no Special Use shall be recommended by the Plan Commission nor approved by the Village Board unless the Special Use:

- 1. Is deemed necessary for the public convenience at the location.
 - Prince Industries is an existing Carol Stream business. The applicant has indicated that the tanks are necessary for operation of the facility.
- 2. Will not be unreasonably detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare.
 - The proposed outdoor tanks would cause minimal visual impact. With the additional bollards recommended by staff, the tanks should not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare.
- 3. Will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood.

The site is within an existing, developed industrial area, and therefore the proposed outdoor storage tanks should not be injurious to the use or enjoyment of other property in the immediate vicinity, nor substantially diminish or impair property values within the neighborhood.

- 4. Will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding property for uses permitted in the district.
 - The surrounding properties have already been developed.
- 5. Will provide adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other important and necessary community facilities.
 - Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other public improvements are currently in place.
- 6. Will conform to the applicable regulations of the district in which it is located, except as the Village Board may in each instance modify such regulations.

The proposal is expected to conform to all applicable codes and requirements.

Gary Avenue Corridor Review

Per Section 16-5-6(B)(1) of the Carol Stream Zoning Code, the Gary Avenue Corridor (GAC) includes those properties abutting Gary Avenue, and within a depth not exceeding 400 feet from the nearest Gary Avenue right-of-way line. The east side of the existing building is approximately 350 feet from the Gary Avenue right-of-way, and so the first 50 feet of the proposed building expansion fall within the Corridor. In addition, the applicant proposes to add parking areas within the GAC in order to accommodate the expansion. The Plan Commission has the authority to make the final determination of conformance with the GAC regulations, and Village Board consideration is not required.

Architectural Design:

Staff has reviewed the building elevations and has determined that they appear to meet the design criteria set forth in the GAC regulations. The building elevations shown on Exhibit C indicate acceptable use of materials, colors, shapes, textures and details so as to avoid monotony and present a high quality appearance. The building expansion will be constructed of precast concrete panels, with decorative painted reveal patterns and prefinished metal coping. Staff recommends that as a condition of approval, no rooftop mechanical equipment shall be visible from Gary Avenue.

Section 16-5-6(K)(10) of the GAC regulations requires screening of loading docks and other places that tend to be unsightly. Screening of loading docks and truck doors in the GAC is usually accomplished by locating the doors toward the rear of the building away from Gary Avenue. In this instance, the applicant has located the new loading dock area adjacent to the existing area, towards the rear of the building. In addition, as noted above, the area is screened by the existing trees in the grassy area just west of the truck docks.

Parking:

Section 16-5-6(E)(4)(g) of the GAC regulations states that any addition to or reconstruction of parking spaces shall conform with the GAC standards regarding parking and landscaping. The proposed Site Plan (Exhibit A) shows a total of 16 new parking spaces to be constructed within the GAC, 11 in front of the building and five at the rear of the site. All of the new spaces meet the GAC requirements with respect to number, size and setbacks. However, no landscaping is proposed for the 16 spaces. The GAC Regulations state that in the event of unusual circumstances, the property owner may request that the Plan Commission adjust the

applicability of the regulations to existing development. Staff notes that the existing parking lot was constructed in conformance with the zoning standards that existed at the time. We also note that the 16 new spaces within the Corridor are located in two separate areas, and that application of the parking lot landscaping requirements to either area would be inconsistent with the vast majority of the overall parking lot. In addition, as noted in the photos below, the existing lot in front of the building is well screened from Gary Avenue. For these reasons, staff is comfortable recommending that the GAC parking lot landscaping requirements should not apply to the 20 new spaces within the Corridor.

Summary

Staff believes that the two outdoor liquid nitrogen and oxygen tanks would cause no operational concerns, with the condition that bollards be installed along the truck dock to protect the tanks from being hit by vehicles. Staff believes that the tanks would have minimal impact on neighboring properties and believes that the screening from Gary Avenue is adequate. Therefore, staff has no objection to the proposed use from an aesthetic standpoint. Based upon the information discussed above, staff has determined that the Special Use Permit to allow outdoor storage tanks in the I Industrial District is reasonable. With respect to Gary Avenue Corridor Review of the proposed building expansion, staff notes that the proposed architecture meets requirements, and that the proposed loading dock expansion is adequately screened. We believe that the parking lot landscaping requirements should not apply to the small separate expansions of the existing lot within the Corridor. As such, we can support approval of the Gary Avenue Corridor Review.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends approval of the Special Use Permit for *Outdoor Activities and Operations* in accordance with §16-10-2 (B)(14) of the Carol Stream Zoning Code to allow installation of two outdoor nitrogen and oxygen storage tanks in the I Industrial District, subject to the following conditions:

- That bollards be installed at strategic locations along the west side of the storage tank area to protect the tanks from being hit by vehicles, while not inhibiting accessibility to the tanks by supply trucks;
- 3. That no rooftop mechanical equipment shall be visible from Gary Avenue;
- 4. That all proposed landscape materials shown on the Landscaping Plan shall be installed at the specified height and caliper;

- 5. That all trees and shrubs shall be maintained in a neat and healthy manner, with dead or dying species to be replaced with similar size and type species on an annual basis;
- 6. That looped parking stall striping, in accordance with the Village standard, be used in the striping of the parking spaces; and,
- 7. That the operation of the facility and maintenance of the site will comply with all state, county and village codes and requirements.

Mr. Glees gave the following highlights:

Prince Industries is planning to construct a 42,000 square foot building addition to their 64,000 building at 745 N. Gary Avenue. As part of that project, they wish to locate an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank at the north side of the building. The tanks are proposed outside of the 400-foot Gary Avenue Corridor, and so Gary Avenue Corridor Review of the tank area is not required. However, Gary Avenue Corridor Review is required for the small portion of the building addition that is located within the 400-foot Gary Avenue Corridor.

A Special Use permit is being requested for the two storage tanks, which would be located along the north wall of the proposed building expansion in close proximity to the truck docks and the laser-cutting equipment which are served by the tanks inside the building. No fencing is proposed to enclose the tank area, as the applicant prefers to have easy access to the tanks and ancillary equipment, and so pipe bollards are proposed as a means of protecting the tanks against accidental vehicle impact. With respect to the Zoning Code requirement that industrial outdoor storage areas be enclosed by a fence, staff would observe that the intent of the Code is to provide screening from other properties and adjacent roadways. In this case, the screening would be provided by the surrounding buildings, the existing landscaping, and the painting of the tanks to match the building. A seven-foot fence would do little to screen the 20-foot tanks. Staff has determined that the Special Use Permit to allow outdoor storage tanks in the I Industrial District is reasonable.

The east side of the existing building is approximately 350 feet from the Gary Avenue right-ofway, and so the first 50 feet of the proposed building expansion fall within the Corridor. In addition, the applicant proposes to add 16 new parking areas within the GAC in order to accommodate the expansion. Staff has reviewed the building elevations and has determined that they appear to meet the design criteria set forth in the GAC regulations. The applicant has located the new loading dock area adjacent to the existing area, towards the rear of the building. and this area is screened by the existing trees. The 16 new parking spaces would be located in two separate areas, and application of the parking lot landscaping requirements to either area would be inconsistent with the vast majority of the overall parking lot. In addition, the existing lot in front of the building is well screened from Gary Avenue. For these reasons, staff is comfortable recommending that the GAC parking lot landscaping requirements should not apply to the 20 new spaces within the Corridor. Staff notes that the proposed architecture meets requirements, and that the proposed loading dock expansion is adequately screened. We believe that the parking lot landscaping requirements should not apply to the small separate expansions of the existing lot within the Corridor. As such, we can support approval of the Gary Avenue Corridor Review.

Staff recommends approval of the Special Use Permit for *Outdoor Activities and Operations* in accordance with §16-10-2 (B)(14) of the Carol Stream Zoning Code to allow installation of two outdoor nitrogen and oxygen storage tanks in the I Industrial District, and Gary Avenue Corridor review for the proposed building expansion, subject to conditions contained in the staff report.

Commissioner Manzzullo said that he agrees with the staff recommendations and is pleased that the bollards have been added for safety.

Commissioner Hundhausen asked if there were tanks in place now and was told that there aren't any tanks presently because this will be a new operation.

Chairman Michaelsen asked if oxygen and nitrogen tanks can be side by side and Mr. Moeller said that the tanks will be installed as approved by the Fire Protection District. Chairman Michaelsen said that he is glad that a Carol Stream company can expand and take on new operations.

Commissioner Manzzullo moved and Commissioner Hundhausen made the second to recommend approval of a Special Use Permit for outdoor operations and activities in accordance with staff recommendations. The results of the roll call vote were:



David Schonback has submitted an application seeking rezoning upon annexation to the Village for the southern portion of the *Brian's Charhouse* property, located generally at the northeast corner of St. Charles Road and Morton Road. The applicant intends to subdivide the property so that the existing restaurant would be located on the northerly 1.31-acre parcel, a 0.07-acre strip along the south property line would be dedicated as St. Charles Road right-of-way, and the remaining 2.27-acre parcel would be used for the proposed development, which is an approximate 29,780 square foot office/warehouse condominium building. Although the property is not currently contiguous to the Village of Carol Stream, it is subject to an existing preannexation agreement and has been reviewed through the Southwest Planning Area preannexation process. The developer is proposing to rezone the southerly parcel as I Industrial District, rather than B-2 as currently stipulated in the preannexation agreement for the entire property. In addition, the developer is requesting approval of subdivision and variations for rear yard setback and parking lot greenspace.

The staff report and addenda presenting the requests, with supporting documentation, were transmitted to the Village Board with the Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals (PC/ZBA) packets on May 23, June 20 and July 11, 2008. The public hearing was opened on May 27, 2008, and continued by the PC/ZBA to June 23 and July 14, 2008. At their July 14 meeting, by a vote of 6-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of subdivision and rezoning to I Industrial District upon annexation. Also by a vote of 6-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval with conditions of a variation for rear yard setback of 26 feet rather than the required 40 feet, and a variation for parking lot greenspace of 2.2% rather than the required 5%.

At this time, per the Village's standard procedure for annexation of properties for development, the petitioner's requests and the PC/ZBA's recommendations are being presented to the Village Board for information and discussion. No Village Board action is being requested at this time other than direction from the Village Board with respect to moving forward with the completion

of a proposed amendment to the annexation agreement and the scheduling of a future public hearing. Staff also invites comments from the Village Board that they may like to see addressed in the annexation agreement.

At the direction of the Village Board, staff will work with the petitioner and the Village Attorney to prepare an amendment to the annexation agreement, which would be brought to the Village Board at a future public hearing to be held on the evening of a regular Village Board meeting.

Mario Spina of Angel Associates, LP has submitted an application for approval of a Final Plat of Subdivision to consolidate three parcels located generally within the southeast quadrant of the intersection of Schmale Road and E. St. Charles Road. This is part of an application for several zoning approvals to allow a multi-building commercial development at that location.

The project was presented to the Village Board, with the recommendations of the Plan Commission, at their regular meetings on April 21 and June 2, 2008. At the June 2nd meeting, the Village Board directed staff to prepare an annexation agreement and schedule a public hearing for annexation. Gary Avenue Corridor Review

Prince Industries, Inc., has submitted an application requesting approval of a Special Use Permit for Outdoor Activities and Operations to allow installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank at 745 North Gary Avenue, as part of a 42,000 square foot building expansion project. The site is occupied by a 63,977 square foot, one-story industrial building. The outdoor tanks are proposed along the north side of the proposed building expansion, at a location approximately 406 feet away from the nearest Gary Avenue right-of-way line. The tanks are proposed outside of the 400-foot Gary Avenue Corridor, and so Gary Avenue Corridor Review of the tank area is not required. However, Gary Avenue Corridor Review is required for the building expansion.


The staff report presenting the requests, with supporting documentation, was transmitted to the Village Board with the Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals (PC/ZBA) packet on July 11, 2008. At their July 14, 2008, meeting, by a vote of 6-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of the special use permit to allow the outdoor storage tanks, subject to the conditions contained within the staff report. The PC/ZBA also voted 6-0 to approve the Gary Avenue Corridor Review, subject to the conditions contained within the staff report. Please note that the PC/ZBA vote regarding the Gary Avenue Corridor Review serves as the final decision on this matter.

If the Village Board concurs with the Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals recommendation, they should approve the requested Special Use Permit for Outdoor Activities and Operations for the outdoor storage tanks, subject to the conditions contained within the Ordinance, and adopt the necessary Ordinance.

Consultant Services for Building Permit Review

PURPOSE

The purpose of this memorandum is to present to the Village Board proposals for consultant services for the referenced project, and to recommend an award of contract.

DISCUSSION

The Chief Code Enforcement Officer has given notice of his retirement effective July 25, 2008. There are now two senior positions open in the Community Development Department. We are taking steps to fill the vacant positions in accordance with the recommendations of the recently completed management study and the direction of the Village Board. However, in the interim, we will need to use consultant services to outsource the Chief Code Enforcement Officer's building permit review duties on a temporary basis. We have contacted the two building code consultants, B&F Technical Code Services and TPI Building Code Consultants, and requested proposals to provide consultant services to process commercial and industrial building permit applications. A comparison of the details of their proposals is attached.

Staff believes that both consultants are highly qualified and capable of performing the work. However, in view if the challenges we will be facing as we go through a transition period to change our development services processes, it will be critically important that the consultant provide excellent customer service. It is for this reason that we are recommending B&F Technical Code Services for the work. We offer the following information:

B&F Technical Code Services employs two Client Specialists, whose sole
job function is to monitor and troubleshoot the service provided to their
clients. If a problem should arise, one of the Client Specialists would

- work with the client to identify and solve the problem, and take measures to prevent recurrence.
- B&F keeps a database of customer information, in order to assist them in developing their client relationships.
- B&F sends a survey to each of their clients every quarter, in order to keep up on changes and new information. This is a proactive means of ensuring that they have the latest community codes and standards.
- Company President Richard Piccolo is active in several professional organizations, and served on the Illinois Council of Code Administrators for 10 years. This active service enables B&F to keep up with the latest legislative happenings, and advise their clients when new codes or legislation affects their community.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Village Board, by motion, authorize the Village Manager to execute an agreement for consultant services with B&F Technical Code Services, Inc., to provide temporary building permit review services.

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



amount not to exceed \$50,000.

On July 8th, the Public Works Department opened bids for contract parkway tree removal from six vendors. The vendors were asked to bid on removal of parkway trees over 10 inches in diameter, removal of stump, and to bring the area back to grade.

In previous years the Village has removed most trees in-house and has used several different companies to remove larger trees that needed to use a large amount of resources. Due to Emerald Ash Borer being present within the Village and our need to remove sick, disease, and dying trees throughout our urban forest, a request to bid was sent out. The vendors were asked to give a price for 5 different size groups of trees. Three vendors gave a unit price, while the other 3 vendors gave a per inch price. The vendors were also given an estimated quantity for each range, as a way for us to determine the low bidder and for them to understand the scope of work

We analyzed the prices by utilizing a series of three different assumptions. We 1st calculated the companies that did a per inch cost at the lowest size per range. The next calculation was at the median of the range, and then at the high end of the range. The price for the three companies that provided unit cost remained constant. The following chart shows the cost per company using the lowest size per range.

In all three calculations, Ciosek Tree Service was the low bidder. After checking their references, we would recommend that Ciosek Tree Service of Lombard, IL be awarded the contact from Parkway Tree Removal in an amount not to exceed \$50,000. The budgeted amount for Parkway Tree Removal in FY09 is \$105,000. The Public Works Department would request the additional money due to the quantities being estimated and that additional work may be needed during this Fiscal Year.

Staff Recommends an Ordinance Authorizing the Cross-Connection Control Program in Order to Protect the Carol Stream Potable Water System from Contamination and to Comply with IEPA Regulations

Cross-connection control devices, which prevent the backflow of possible contaminated water into the drinking water supply, are required by the state plumbing code, which the Village has adopted. During the building permit process, cross-connection control devices are required to be installed, and the Public Works Department monitors the annual testing of these devices. The annual testing and surveying of facilities to ensure that the cross-connection control devices are properly maintained is required by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

The Public Works Department has been conducting this program for years in accordance with the IEPA regulations; however, the IEPA recently pointed out, during a system evaluation that the Village did not have a cross-connection control ordinance, which specifically detailed the program. Such an ordinance is, therefore, being proposed.

Attached for review and consideration by the Carol Stream Village Board is an ordinance authorizing cross-connection control program, along with Attachment A, which details the various rules and regulations, which will be applicable to the program. This ordinance is modeled after an ordinance provided by the IEPA and has been reviewed by the Village's attorney for accuracy. In order to protect the Carol Stream potable water system from possible contamination due to the backflow of contaminants and to comply with Illinois Environmental Protection Agency regulations, it is hereby recommended that the attached ordinance be approved.

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AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING A CROSS-CONNECTION CONTROL PROGRAM

WHEREAS, it is necessary to provide an effective means for protecting the public water supply system from contamination due to backflow of contaminants through the customer water service connection into the public water system; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Plumbing Code, 77 Ill. Adm. Code 890.Subpart I, requires protection of the potable water system from contamination due to backflow or backsiphonage of contaminants through the water service connection; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois Pollution Control Board Regulations, 35 Ill. Adm. Code 607.104, et seq. requires an active program of cross-connection control which will prevent the contamination of all potable water supply systems; and

WHEREAS, in order to accomplish these goals it is necessary to introduce restrictions that describe in detail specific procedures and requirements for cross-connection control;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DUPAGE COUNTY ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

SECTION 1. That all plumbing installed within the Village of Carol Stream, shall be installed in accordance with the Illinois Plumbing Code, 77 Ill. Adm. Code 890. That, if in accordance with the Illinois Plumbing Code or in the judgment of the Director of Public Works, an approved backflow prevention device is necessary for the safety of the public water supply system, the Director of Public Works will give notice to the water customer to install such an approved device immediately. The water customer shall, at his own expense, install such an approved device at a location and in a manner in accordance with the Illinois Plumbing Code and all applicable local regulations, and shall have inspections and tests made of such approved devices upon installation and as required by the Illinois Plumbing Code and local regulations.

SECTION 2. That no person, firm or corporation shall establish or permit to be established or maintain or permit to be maintained any connection whereby a private, auxiliary or emergency water supply other than the regular public water supply of the Village of Carol Stream may enter the supply or distribution system of said municipality, unless such private, auxiliary or emergency water supply and the method of connection and use of such supply shall have been approved by the Director of Public Works and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

SECTION 3. That it shall be the duty of the Director of Public Works to cause surveys and investigations to be made of industrial, institutional, commercial, and other properties served by the public water supply to determine whether actual or potential hazards to the public water supply may exist. Such surveys and investigations shall be made a matter of public record and shall be repeated at least every two years, or as often as the Director of Public Works shall deem necessary. Records of such surveys shall be maintained and available for review for a period of at least five years.

SECTION 4. That the approved cross-connection control device inspector shall have the right to enter at any reasonable time any property served by a connection to the public water supply or distribution system of the Village of Carol Stream for the purpose of verifying the presence or absence of cross-connections or testing backflow devices or assemblies, and that the Director of Public Works or his authorized agent shall have the right to enter at any reasonable time any property served by a connection to the public water supply or distribution system of the Village of Carol Stream for the purpose of verifying information submitted by the customer regarding the required cross-connection control inspection. Such requirement shall be a term and condition related to the privilege of receiving water from the Village public water supply, in addition all users of the system shall be required to follow all other established rules and regulations. In addition, to such other rules and regulations as may, from time to time, be in force, the corporate authorities adopt the rules and regulations appended to and made a part of this Ordinance as Exhibit "A'. In the event that the person in ownership or control of the property should refuse or prevent entry and inspection, the Village may seek the issuance of an administrative search warrant. On demand the owner, lessees or occupants of any property so served shall furnish to the Director of Public Works any information that he may request regarding the piping system or systems or water use on such property. The refusal of such information, when demanded, shall, within the discretion of the Director of Public Works, be deemed evidence of the presence of improper connections as provided in this ordinance and shall require that backflow protection be installed on the service line to the premises.

SECTION 5. That the Director of Public Works of the Village of Carol Stream is hereby authorized and directed to discontinue, after reasonable notice to the occupant thereof, the water service to any property wherein any connection in violation of the provisions of this ordinance is known to exist, and to take such other precautionary measures as he may deem necessary to eliminate any danger of contamination of the public water supply distribution mains. Water service to such property shall not be restored until such conditions have been eliminated or corrected in compliance with the provisions of this ordinance, and until a reconnection fee of \$500 is paid to the Village of Carol Stream. Immediate disconnection with verbal notice can be effected when the Director of Public Works reasonably believes that imminent danger of harmful contamination of the public water supply system exists. Such action shall be followed by written notification of the cause of disconnection. Immediate disconnection without notice to any party can be effected to prevent actual or anticipated contamination or pollution of the public water supply, provided that, in the reasonable opinion of the Director of Public Works or the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency, such action is required to prevent actual or potential contamination or pollution of the public water supply. Neither the Public Water Supply, the Director of Public Works, or its agents or assigns shall be liable to any customer for any injury, damages or lost revenues which may result from termination of said customer's water supply in accordance with the terms of this ordinance, whether or not said termination was with or without notice.

SECTION 6. Any person who has knowledge of a backflow into any potable water system or the public water system must report that backflow to the water department immediately upon becoming aware of the backflow. Any person responsible for any substance that enters the potable water system through backpressure or backsiphonage, or contamination through backflow, if contamination of the potable water supply system occurs through an illegal cross-connection or an improperly installed, maintained or

repaired device, or a device that has been bypassed, must bear the cost of clean-up of the potable water supply system.

SECTION 7. If any provision this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of the ordinance which can be given effect without the invalid application or provision, and to this end the provisions of each ordinance enacted after the effective date of this ordinance are severable, unless otherwise provided by the ordinance.

SECTION 8. Any person or entity which violates any provisions of this ordinance or rules and regulations of the Village pertaining to water and usage regarding cross connection shall, upon being found guilty of such a violation, be fined not less than \$250 nor more than \$750 and any day upon which a violation occurs shall be considered a separate offense.

SECTION 9. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication in pamphlet form as provided by law.

CAROL STREAM PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT WATER DIVISION REGULATIONS ON CROSS-CONNECTION CONTROL PROGRAM

Section 1. Cross-Connection Control -- General Policy

A. Purpose. The purpose of these Rules and Regulations is:

- To protect the public water supply system from contamination or pollution by isolating within the customer's water system contaminants or pollutants which could backflow through the service connection into the public water supply system.
- To promote the elimination or control of existing cross-connections, actual or potential, between the
 public or consumer's potable water system and non-potable water systems, plumbing fixtures and
 sources or systems containing substances of unknown or questionable safety.
- 3. To provide for the maintenance of a continuing program of cross-connection control which will prevent the contamination or pollution of the public and consumer's potable water systems.
- B. <u>Application</u>. These Rules and Regulations shall apply to all premises served by the public potable water supply system of the Village of Carol Stream.
- C. Policy. The owner or official custodian shall be responsible for protection of the public water supply system from contamination due to backflow or back-siphonage of contaminants through the customer's water service connection. If, in the judgment of the Director of Public Works or his authorized representative, an approved backflow prevention device is necessary for the safety of the public water supply system, the Director of Public Works shall give notice to the consumer to install such approved backflow prevention device at each service connection to the premises. The consumer shall immediately install such approved device or devices at his own expense; failure, refusal or inability on the part of the consumer to install such device or devices immediately shall constitute grounds for discontinuing water service to the premises until such device or devices have been installed. The consumer shall retain records of installation, maintenance, testing and repair as required in Section 5D(4) below for a period of at least five years. The Director of Public Works may require the consumer to submit a cross-connection inspection report to the Director of Public Works to assist in determining whether or not service line protection will be required. All cross-connection inspections shall be conducted by a Cross-Connection Control Device Inspector certified by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.

Section 2. Definitions

- A. The following definitions shall apply in the interpretation and enforcement of these regulations:
 - 1. "Fixed proper air gap" means the unobstructed vertical distance through the free atmosphere between the water discharge point and the flood level rim of the receptacle.
 - "Agency" means Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.
 - 3. "Approved" means backflow prevention devices or methods approved by the Research Foundation for Cross-Connection Control of the University of Southern California, Association of State Sanitary Engineers, American Water Works Association, American National Standards Institute or certified by the National Sanitation Foundation, or listed in the Illinois Plumbing Code, 77 Ill. Adm. Code 890.
 - "Auxiliary water system" means any water source or system on or available to the premises other than the public water supply system and includes the water supplied by the system. These auxiliary waters may include water from another purveyor's public water supply system; or water from a source such

as wells, lakes, or streams, or process fluids; or used water. These waters may be polluted or contaminated or objectionable or constitute a water source or system over which the water purveyor does not have control.

- "Backflow" means the flow of water or other liquids, mixtures, or substances into the distribution pipes of a potable water system from any source other than the intended source of the potable water supply.
- "Backflow prevention device" means any device, method, or type of construction intended to prevent backflow into a potable water system. All devices used for backflow prevention in Illinois must meet the standards of the Illinois Plumbing Code and the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.
- "Consumer" or "Customer" means the owner, official custodian or person in control of any premises supplied by or in any manner connected to a public water system.
- 8. "Consumer's water system" means any water system located on the customer's premises. A building plumbing system is considered to be a customer's water system.
- "Contamination" means an impairment of the quality of the water by entrance of any substance to a degree that could create a health hazard.
- "Cross-connection" means any physical connection or arrangement between two otherwise separate piping systems, one of which contains potable water and the other a substance of unknown or questionable safety or quality, whereby there may be a flow from one system into the other.

Direct cross-connection means a cross-connection formed when a water system is physically joined to a source of unknown or unsafe substance.

Indirect cross-connection means a cross-connection through which an unknown substance can be forced, drawn by vacuum or otherwise introduced into a safe potable water system.

- "Double check valve assembly" means an assembly composed of two single, independently acting check valves approved under ASSE Standard 1015. A double check valve assembly must include tight shutoff valves located at each end of the assembly and suitable connections for testing the water-tightness of each check valve.
- "Health hazard" means any condition, device or practice in a water system or its operation resulting from a real or potential danger to the health and well-being of consumers. The word "severe" as used to qualify "health hazard" means a hazard to the health of the user that could be expected to result in death or significant reduction in the quality of life.
- "Inspection" means a plumbing inspection to examine carefully and critically all materials, fixtures, piping and appurtenances, appliances and installations of a plumbing system for compliance with requirements of the Illinois Plumbing Code, 77 Ill. Adm. Code 890.
- "Non-potable water" means water not safe for drinking, personal, or culinary use as determined by the requirements of 35 Ill. Adm. Code 601et seq.
- 15. "Plumbing" means the actual installation, repair, maintenance, alteration or extension of a plumbing system by any person. Plumbing includes all piping, fixtures, appurtenances and appliances for a supply of water for all purposes, including without limitation lawn sprinkler systems, from the source of a private water supply on the premises or from the main in the street, alley or at the curb to, within and about any building or buildings where a person or persons live, work or assemble. Plumbing includes all piping, from discharge of pumping units to and including pressure tanks in water supply systems. Plumbing includes all piping, fixtures, appurtenances, and appliances for a building drain and a sanitary drainage and related ventilation system of any building or buildings where a person or persons live, work or assemble from the point of connection of such building drain to the building

sewer or private sewage disposal system five feet beyond the foundation walls.

- "Pollution" means the presence of any foreign substance (organic, inorganic, radiological, or biological) 16. in water that tends to degrade its quality so as to constitute a hazard or impair the usefulness of the water.
- "Potable water" means water which meets the requirements of 35 Ill. Adm. Code 601 et seq. for 17. drinking, culinary, and domestic purposes.
- "Potential Cross-Connection" means a fixture or appurtenance with threaded hose connection, tapered 18. spout, or other connection which would facilitate extension of the water supply line beyond its legal termination point.
- "Process fluid(s)" means any fluid or solution which may be chemically, biologically or otherwise 19. contaminated or polluted in a form or concentration such as would constitute a health, pollution, or system hazard if introduced into the public or a consumer's potable water system. This includes but is not limited to:
 - polluted or contaminated waters; a.
 - process waters; b.
 - used waters originating from the public water supply system which may have C. deteriorated in sanitary quality;
 - cooling waters; d.
 - questionable or contaminated natural waters taken from wells, lakes, streams, or e. irrigation systems;
 - chemicals in solution or suspension; f.
 - oils, gases, acids, alkalis and other liquid and gaseous fluids used in industrial or g. other processes, or for fire fighting purposes.
- "Public water supply" means all mains, pipes and structures through which water is obtained and 20. distributed to the public, including wells and well structures, intakes and cribs, pumping stations, treatment plants, reservoirs, storage tanks and appurtenances, collectively or severally, actually used or intended for use for the purpose of furnishing water for drinking or general domestic use and which serve at least 15 service connections or which regularly serve at least 25 persons at least 60 days per year. A public water supply is either a "community water supply" or a "non-community water supply".
- "Reduced pressure principle backflow prevention device" means a device containing a minimum of two 21. independently acting check valves together with an automatically operated pressure differential relief valve located between the two check valves and approved under ASSE Standard 1013. During normal flow and at the cessation of normal flow, the pressure between these two checks shall be less than the supply pressure. In case of leakage of either check valve, the differential relief valve, by discharging to the atmosphere, shall operate to maintain the pressure between the check valves at less than the supply pressure. The unit must include tightly closing shutoff valves located at each end of the device, and each device shall be fitted with properly located test cocks.
- "Service connection" means the opening, including all fittings and appurtenances, at the water main 22. through which water is supplied to the user.
- "Survey" means the collection of information pertaining to a customer's piping system regarding the 23. location of all connections to the public water supply system and must include the location, type and most recent inspection and testing date of all cross-connection control devices and methods located within that customer's piping system. The survey must be in written form, and should not be an actual plumbing inspection.
- "System hazard" means a condition through which an aesthetically objectionable or degrading material 24. not dangerous to health may enter the public water supply system or a consumer's potable water system.

- "Used water" means any water supplied by a public water supply system to a consumer's water system after it has passed through the service connection and is no longer under the control of the water supply official custodian.
- 26. "Water purveyor" means the owner or official custodian of a public water system.

Section 3. Water System

- A. The water system shall be considered as made up of two parts: the public water supply system and the consumer's water system.
- B. The public water supply system shall consist of the source facilities and the distribution system, and shall include all those facilities of the potable water system under the control of the Director of Public Works up to the point where the consumer's water system begins.
- C. The source shall include all components of the facilities utilized in the production, treatment, storage, and delivery of water to the public water supply distribution system.
- D. The public water supply distribution system shall include the network of conduits used to deliver water from the source to the consumer's water system.
- E. The consumer's water system shall include all parts of the facilities beyond the service connection used to convey water from the public water supply distribution system to points of use.

Section 4. Cross-Connection Prohibited

- A. Connections between potable water systems and other systems or equipment containing water or other substances of unknown or questionable quality are prohibited except when and where approved cross-connection control devices or methods are installed, tested and maintained to insure proper operation on a continuing basis.
- No physical connection shall be permitted between the potable portion of a supply and any other water supply not of equal or better bacteriological and chemical quality as determined by inspection and analysis by the Agency.
 - 2. There shall be no arrangement or connection by which an unsafe substance may enter a supply.

Section 5. Survey and Investigations

- A. The consumer's premises shall be open at all reasonable times to the approved cross-connection control device inspector for the inspection of the presence or absence of cross-connections within the consumer's premises, and testing, repair and maintenance of cross-connection control devices and assemblies within the consumer's premises.
- B. On request by the Director of Public Works, or his authorized representative, the consumer shall furnish information regarding the piping system or systems or water use within the customer's premises. The consumer's premises shall be open at all reasonable times to the Director of Public Works for the verification of information submitted by the consumer to the public water supply custodian regarding cross-connection survey or inspection results.
- C. It shall be the responsibility of the water consumer to arrange periodic surveys of water use practices on his premises to determine whether there are actual or potential cross-connections to his water system through which contaminants or pollutants could backflow into his or the public potable water system. All cross-connection control or other plumbing inspections must be conducted in accordance with the Illinois Plumbing License Law, 225 ILCS 320/3(1).
- D. It is the responsibility of the water consumer to prevent backflow into the public water system by ensuring that:
 - All cross-connections are removed; or approved cross-connection control devices are installed for control of backflow and back-siphonage.

- 2. Cross-connection control devices shall be installed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- Cross-connection control devices shall be inspected at the time of installation and at least annually by a
 person approved by the Agency as a cross-connection control device inspector (CCCDI). The inspection of
 mechanical devices shall include physical testing in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions.
- 4. Testing and Records
 - a. Each device shall be tested at the time of installation and at least annually or more frequently if recommended by the manufacturer.
 - b. Records submitted to the community public water supply shall be available for inspection by Agency personnel in accordance with 415 ILCS 5/19.
 - c. Each device shall have a tag attached listing the date of most recent test, name of CCCDI, and type and date of repairs.
 - d. A maintenance log shall be maintained and include:
 - 1. date of each test;
 - 2. name and approval number of person performing the test;
 - 3. test results;
 - 4. repairs or servicing required;
 - 5. repairs and date completed; and
 - 6. service performed and date completed.

Section 6. Where Protection is Required

- A. An approved backflow device shall be installed on all connections to the public water supply as described in the Plumbing Code, 77 III. Adm. Code 890 and the Agency's regulations 35 III. Adm. Code 653. In addition, an approved backflow prevention assembly shall be installed on each service line to a consumer's water system serving premises, where in the judgment of the Director of Public Works, actual or potential hazards to the public water supply system exist.
- B. An approved backflow prevention device shall be installed on each service line to a consumer's water system serving premises where the following conditions exist:
 - Premises having an auxiliary water supply, unless such auxiliary supply is accepted as an additional source by the Director of Public Works and the source is approved by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency.
 - Premises on which any substance is handled which can create an actual or potential hazard to the
 public water supply system. This shall include premises having sources or systems containing process
 fluids or waters originating from the public water supply system, which are no longer under the
 sanitary control of the Director of Public Works.
 - Premises having internal cross-connections that, in the judgment of the Director of Public Works and the Cross-Connection Control Device Inspector, are not correctable or intricate plumbing arrangements which make it impractical to determine whether or not cross-connections exist.
 - Premises where, because of security requirements or other prohibitions or restrictions, it is impossible or impractical to make a complete cross-connection survey.

- Premises having a repeated history of cross-connections being established or re-established.
- C. An approved backflow device shall be installed on all connections to the public water supply as described in the Plumbing Code, 77 III. Adm. Code 890 and the Agency's regulations 35 III. Adm. Code 653. In addition, an approved backflow prevention device shall be installed on each service line to a consumer's water system serving, but not necessarily limited to, the following types of facilities unless the Director of Public Works determines that no actual or potential hazard to the public water supply system exist:
 - Hospitals, mortuaries, clinics, nursing homes.
 - Laboratories.
 - Piers, docks, waterfront facilities.
 - Sewage treatment plants, sewage pumping stations or storm water pumping stations.
 - Food or beverage processing plants.
 - Chemical plants.
 - Metal plating industries.
 - 8. Petroleum processing or storage plants.
 - Radioactive material processing plants or nuclear reactors.
 - 10. Car washes.
 - Pesticide, or herbicide or extermination plants and trucks.
 - 12. Farm service and fertilizer plants and trucks.

Section 7. Type of Protection Required

- A. The type of protection required under Sections 6(A), 6(B), and 6(C) of these regulations shall depend on the degree of hazard, which exists as follows:
 - An approved fixed proper air gap separation shall be installed where the public water supply system
 may be contaminated with substances that could cause a severe (high) health hazard.
 - An approved fixed proper air gap separation or an approved reduced pressure principle backflow
 prevention device shall be installed where the public water supply system may be contaminated with a
 substance that could cause a system or (high) health hazard.
 - An approved fixed proper air gap separation or an approved reduced pressure principle backflow
 prevention assembly, or a double check valve assembly, shall be installed where the public water
 supply system may be polluted with substances that could cause a pollution hazard not dangerous to
 health (low health hazard).
- B. Where a public water supply or an auxiliary water supply is used for a fire protection system, reduced pressure principle backflow preventers shall be installed on fire safety systems connected to the public water supply when:
 - the fire safety system contains antifreeze, fire retardant or other chemicals;
 - water is pumped into the system from another source; or

- 3. water flows by gravity from a non-potable source; or water can be pumped into the fire safety system from any other source;
- 4. there is a connection whereby another source can be connected to the sprinkler system.
- C. All other fire safety systems connected to the potable water supply shall be protected by a double check valve assembly on metered service lines and a double detector check valve assembly on unmetered service.

Section 8. Backflow Prevention Devices

- A. All backflow prevention devices or methods required by these rules and regulations shall be approved by the Research Foundation for Cross-Connection Control of the University of Southern California, American Water Works Association, American Society of Sanitary Engineering, or American National Standards Institute or certified by the National Sanitation Foundation to be in compliance with applicable industry specification, and listed in the Illinois Plumbing Code, 77 Ill. Adm. 890.
- B. Installation of approved devices shall be made in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and 35 III. Adm. Code 653.802, and only as specified by the Research Foundation for Cross-Connection Control of the University of Southern California or applicable industry specifications. Maintenance as recommended by the manufacturer of the device shall be performed. Manufacturer's maintenance manual shall be available on-site.

Section 9. Inspection and Maintenance


- A. It shall be the duty of the consumer at any premises on which backflow prevention devices required by these regulations are installed to have inspection, tests, maintenance and repair made in accordance with the following schedule or more often where inspections indicate a need or are specified in manufacturer's instructions.
 - 1. Fixed proper air gap separations shall be inspected to document that a proper vertical distance is maintained between the discharge point of the service line and the flood level rim of the receptacle at the time of installation and at least annually thereafter. Corrections to improper or bypassed air gaps shall be made within 24 hours.
 - Double check valve assemblies shall be inspected and tested at time of installation and at least annually thereafter, and required service performed within fifteen (15) days.
 - Reduced pressure principle backflow prevention devices shall be tested at the time of installation and at least annually or more frequently if recommended by the manufacturer, and required service performed within five (5) days.
- B. Testing shall be performed by a person who has been approved by the Agency as competent to service the device. Proof of approval shall be in writing.
- C. Each device shall have a tag attached listing the date of most recent test or visual inspection, name of tester, and type and date of repairs.
- D. A maintenance log shall be maintained and include:
 - date of each test or visual inspection;
 - name and approval number of person performing the test or visual inspection;
 - test results;
 - repairs or servicing required;
 - 5. repairs and date completed; and

- servicing performed and date completed.
- E. Whenever backflow prevention devices required by these regulations are found to be defective, they shall be repaired or replaced at the expense of the consumer without delay as required by Section 9A.
- F. Backflow prevention devices shall not be bypassed, made inoperative, removed or otherwise made ineffective without specific authorization by the Director of Public Works.

Section 10. Booster Pumps

- A. Where a booster pump has been installed on the service line to or within any premises, such pump shall be equipped with a low pressure cut-off device designed to shut-off the booster pump when the pressure in the service line on the suction side of the pump drops to 20 psi or less.
- B. It shall be the duty of the water consumer to maintain the low pressure cut-off device in proper working order and to certify to the Director of Public Works, at least once a year, that the device is operable.

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING A SPECIAL USE PERMIT FOR OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES AND OPERATIONS (745 N. GARY AVENUE)

WHEREAS, Steve Moeller of Krusinski Construction, on behalf of Prince Industries, has requested a Special Use Permit in Accordance with Section 16-10-2(B)(14) of the Carol Stream Zoning Code to allow the installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank in the I Industrial District; and

WHEREAS, the Combined Plan Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals, pursuant to proper legal notice, held a public hearing on July 14, 2008 concerning this request and has recommended that the Special Use be granted; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities find that granting of this Special Use would not be inconsistent with surrounding uses, nor would it be contrary to the intent of the Zoning Code of the Village of Carol Stream provided certain conditions are met.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

SECTION 1: That the property legally described in Section 1 of this Ordinance, commonly known as 745 N. Gary Avenue be granted a Special Use to allow the installation of an outdoor liquid oxygen tank and an outdoor liquid nitrogen tank in the I Industrial District in accordance with the attached Site Plan (Exhibit A), Landscape Development Plan (Exhibit B) and Building Elevations (Exhibit C), provided the following conditions are met:

1. That no rooftop mechanical equipment shall be visible from Gary Avenue.

- 2. That all proposed landscape materials shown on the Landscaping Plan shall be installed at the specified height and caliper.
- 3. That all trees and shrubs shall be maintained in a neat and healthy manner, with dead or dying species to be replaced with similar size and type species on an annual basis.
- 4. That looped parking stall striping, in accordance with the Village standard, be used in the striping of the parking spaces.
- 5. That the operation of the facility and maintenance of the site will comply with all state, county and Village codes and requirements.

LEGAL DESCRIPTION:

As you know, the Village of Carol Stream contracted with Virchow Krause to evaluate the present effectiveness of our community development services. As a result, recommendations were made with regard to changes in the current organizational structure of this department.

As an off-shoot of these recommendations, the elimination of the Village Planner position, while incorporating an Assistant Community Development Director was suggested. With this structure (mirroring the Finance Department structure) the Community Development Director would be available to work on special projects and improvements, while the Assistant Director focuses on the day to day operations. In addition, having as Assistant Director is an asset with regard to succession planning.

The difference in salary is described below:

Village Planner: \$60,062 - \$85,497. Assistant CD Director: \$70,510 - \$100,370

Although an increase in cost, other suggested organizational changes will offset this dollar amount. For all of these reasons, the elimination of the Village Planner classification as well as the introduction of an Assistant Community Development Director would be appropriate at this time.

2008-09 PAY PLAN

Pay ranges have been established for the various position classifications in the Village of Carol Stream and adjusted through an annual evaluation. The pay ranges are established in conformance with previously stated Village policy to establish pay ranges at the top one-third level of pay ranges for comparable positions in other suburban metropolitan municipalities.

Each pay range has a minimum and maximum. In general, the minimum is the initial hiring level. Original appointment to any position will be made at this entrance level unless it is determined by the Department Head and Village Manager that the candidate's abilities, training and/or prior work experience justify a higher entrance rate.

Advancement through the range is made on the basis of performance. Performance is determined through annual employee performance appraisals. Non-organized, non-executive employees are considered for performance increases on their employment anniversary date. Executive employees are considered for performance increases on May 1st. Performance increases for those employees, with performance review dates from May 1, 2007 April 30, 2008, shall be in the manner and amounts described in Chapter Four of the Personnel Code.

In no case will an employee receive a performance adjustment which will put him or her above the maximum of the pay range of the classification. RESOLUTION NO.

Electric Supply Auction

On January 22, 2008 you approved Resolution No. 2319 authorizing the Mayor to execute an agreement for the purchase of electric utility service based on the low bid received by the Northern Illinois Municipal Electric Cooperative (NIMEC). The agreement was awarded to Exelon for a 1-year period beginning on June 8, 2008.

Attached is a memo from our consultant David Hoover from NIMEC, describing a new opportunity to bid our electric utility service, which would lock our rates for a 3 year period beginning June 2009 to 2012. Locking into a favorable 3 year rate after our current agreement expires with Exelon would allow staff to budget electricity expenses with more certainty and potentially avoid future market rate increases. We would also not have to bid electricity for 36 months or make the transition to a new carrier every year. The downside is that if rates decline in the next 3 years we would not be able to avail ourselves of the lower rate. If we believe that commodity prices for oil, natural gas or coal will decline over the next 3-years then we should not participate in the upcoming 3-year rate auction.

The optional rate auction for 3 of the areas largest electricity providers will occur within the next 3 weeks. If we feel that the new 3 year auction rate is not significantly low enough to justify a 3 year commitment then we are under no obligation to lock into the new rate and would continue to participate in the annual auction.

We will know the proposed NIMEC coop rate in early August. Similar to the other electricity supply auctions in which we have participated, when NIMEC presents bids to coop members in early August, we will only have until the end of the day to accept the bid (by signing the agreement from the lowest bidder). Because this process requires the Village to make a quick decision we would not be able to act quickly enough to secure a favorable electrical supply rate if we wait until the next regularly scheduled Board meeting. Staff recommends that the Village Board approve the attached resolution authorizing the Mayor to enter into a 36 month agreement with the lowest cost electric utility supplier subject to final contract review and approval by the Village Manager and Attorney. I am available should you have any questions regarding this process.

Dear Members,

I am writing to make you aware of a new opportunity. Currently, your account(s) are placed with Exelon through May of 2009. Due to favorable pricing, we will be holding another bid in early August for the 36 month period of June 2009 – May 2012 period. We are projecting a one time increase in your current Exelon pricing of 10%, then your pricing would remain flat for the following 3 years.

Please note: **this is optional**; if you would prefer to stay on the 12 month bid cycle, we will continue to hold a 12 month bid each Spring.

When we first bid out your account(s) for the January 2007 to May 2008 period, the increase from the previous ComEd rates was 15 – 20%. ComEd's rates had been frozen for 10 years, and the market pricing for power had increased significantly since the rates had been frozen.

Our second bid, 3 months ago, also saw a prices rise appreciably. Due to a precipitous jump in commodity (oil, natural gas, coal) prices since our initial bid 18 months before, our latest bid saw prices increase 12 – 14% on average. We appreciate the difficulty in budgeting when your electric pricing is increasing sharply.

Why hold another bid now? We just bid out our electricity.

When we look out several years, we see electric prices flattening out. This is due to the fact that electric generators are willing to lock in a certain portion of their future load at today's prices. We tested the market by bidding out 4 NIMEC accounts, and found a one time, price increase (from the current Exelon pricing) of 10%. (Please note: this is an average, and your individual prices will vary.) This would be a one time price increase in June 2009, and then your prices would remain flat for the next 3 years. This would equate to a 4.5% annual increase.

Are there other benefits?

Should you take advantage of this opportunity, you would have no further bids until the spring of 2012. Also the next transition to a different supplier (June of 2009) would be the last one for 3 years. Finally, you would have budget certainty. Your budgeting process should be more accurate, knowing the prices during the 3 year period.

What if prices go down?

You would not be able to benefit from any price drops, should they occur. You would be fixing your price for the 3 year period.

What if I don't want to commit for 3 more years?

You do not have to participate in this optional bid. Instead, we will continue to hold our annual bid in the Spring of 2009.

What do I need to do between now and the bid date in August?

First, let me know if you are interested in participating in the bid. You would then need to obtain the appropriate authorization to enter into a 3 year purchase agreement. To accept the bid, you would need to sign a purchase agreement from the winning supplier. You will only have 1 day to accept the bid.

If I participate in this bid, does that mean that I have to accept the new pricing in early August?

No. You will not be required to accept the bid. You will only accept the bid if you find the pricing attractive to you on that day.

Should I participate in this bid if I think commodity (oil, natural gas, coal) prices are gong to drop over the next few years?

No. You would want to continue purchasing your power on the annual contract, which would allow you to enjoy a drop in prices, should that occur.

What is the next step?
