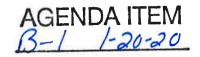

Management – Mowing of Rights-of-Way and Village Properties

In March 2017 the Village awarded a publicly bid contract to Beary Landscape Management for mowing of rights-of-way and Village Properties for fiscal year 2017-18. The original contract amount totaled \$72,097.00¹ and, in accordance with the contract documents the Village exercised its option to extend the contract for a 0% increase for fiscal year 2018-19 and 2% in 2019-20.

The original contract documents provide for a third extension with a two-percent (2%) increase for the 2020-21 mowing season. In addition, the 2019-20 contract document provided for the addition of mowing the Village Hall property once the renovation was completed. Therefore, the 2% increase for the coming season would be calculated based on the total cost including Village Hall, bringing a new total of \$75,860.77. During the recent mowing season staff was satisfied with the performance and responsiveness of Beary Landscape and supports bringing them back for another season.

Therefore, staff recommends awarding an extension of the contract with Beary Landscape Management for Mowing of Rights-of-Way and Village Properties in the amount of \$75,860.77 for the period May 1, 2020 through April 30, 2021, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-8-3(B) and subsection 5-8-14(N) of the Village Code of Ordinances.

Management - Plant Bed Maintenance

In March 2020 the Village awarded a publicly bid contract to Beary Landscape Management for maintenance of planting beds on North Avenue and various Village properties (Town Center, Village Hall and Day Lilly Park). The original contract amount totaled \$58,275 and, in accordance with the contract documents the Village may exercise an option to extend the contract for a 0% increase for fiscal year 2020-21¹.

During the first year of the contract there were some early challenges with achieving compliance with contract expectations. These were in part related to a complete failure by a different contractor in the year prior and the lack of mulch in the planting beds. However, staff worked diligently to insist on compliance by the contractor who eventually improved their performance to a level acceptable to staff.

Therefore, staff recommends awarding an extension of the contract with Beary Landscape Management for Plant Bed Maintenance in the amount of \$58,275.00 for the period May 1, 2020 through April 30, 2021, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-8-3(B) and subsection 5-8-14(N) of the Village Code of Ordinances.

Systems - Street Sweeping Services

In February 2018, the Village awarded a publicly bid contract to Lakeshore Recycling Systems for street sweeping services. The original contract amount totaled \$72,200¹, and included an option for three, one-year extensions at the Village's discretion. In 2019 the Village awarded a one-year extension with an increase of 2.5%.

LRS has met contract performance requirements in a satisfactory manner and works well with staff with regards to communication, flexibility in scheduling and timely invoicing. The original awarded contract provides for a 2.5% increase for the period May 1, 2020 thru April 30, 2021.

Therefore, staff recommends awarding an extension of the contract with Lakeshore Recycling Systems for Street Sweeping Services in the amount of \$75,855.13 for the period May 1, 2020 through April 30, 2021, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-8-3(B) and subsection 5-8-14(N) of the Village Code of Ordinances.

Personnel Policy Revision - Drug-Free Workplace

With the recent legalization of recreational cannabis in the state of Illinois, the Human Resources Department has received multiple questions related to the Village's Drug-Free Workplace policy. In order to continue to ensure transparency, safety, and legal compliance within the organization, it is recommended to provide a detailed policy to all employees and applicants alike.

Currently, the Personnel Manual provides that information will be provided as a "statement", as well as an employment letter stating that a condition of employment is to abide by the terms of the drug-free workplace policy "statement". With the inevitable confusion that is created when a controlled substance that is federally illegal becomes legal under state law with various exemptions, it is strongly recommended to begin to provide the full and detailed policy. As such, it is recommended to amend the Personnel Manual to read that employees and applicants will be provided the Drug-Free Workplace Policy in full.

The recommended Personnel Manual amendment, as well as the Drug-Free Workplace policy itself is attached for your review. This policy has been reviewed by counsel.

As always, please let me know if you have any questions or concerns.

1Q. DRUG-FREE WORKPLACE

Purpose: The Village of Carol Stream prohibits the unlawful manufacture, distribution, possession, or use of a controlled substance in the workplace and worksites.

It is the goal of The Village of Carol Stream to provide a safe work environment and a healthy, productive workforce as well as to maintain compliance with the Federal Drug Free Workplace Act. On-going compliance with the drug free workplace policy is required by all affected employees.

Policy: In establishing a drug-free workplace, it is the Village policy that there will be ongoing drug education about the dangers of drug use and drug use in the workplace. The Village of Carol Stream will assist an employee in utilizing the Employee Assistance Program, if an employee seeks such assistance prior to any misconduct in conjunction with drug abuse. The EAP personnel are qualified professionals who will make confidential assessment and referral for services and treatment for substance abuse and personal problems. The EAP personnel will see employees who are self-referrals for substance abuse and personal problems affecting them, their dependents, and their work performance.

Each employee or job applicant engaged in the direct or indirect performance of a federal eontract shall as a condition of employment, be given a copy of the Village's Drug-Free Workplace policy, this statement and an employment letter stating that the employee agrees to abide by the terms of this drug-free workplace policy statement by signing a copy of the policy letter and returning it to the Human Resources Director within ten (10) days of receipt. Failure to comply with the policy provision will result in termination, or in the case of a job applicant, consideration for employment withdrawn.

An employee convicted of any drug statute violation occurring in the workplace shall notify the Village within five (5) days after the conviction. The Village will notify the contracting agency within ten (10) days of receiving such notice from the employee or other actual notice of conviction.

Any employee who violates this prohibition may be subject to disciplinary action, including termination.

Additional information regarding the Village of Carol Stream's Drug and Alcohol policy may be obtained through the Human Resources Department.

Drug-Free Workplace Policy



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I. STATEMENT OF POLICY

A. Purpose and Goals

The Village of Carol Stream has a vital interest in maintaining a safe and efficient environment for its employees, residents and customers. Employees who are under the influence of drugs or alcohol on the job pose serious safety risks not only for the user, but also to co-workers and others. The potential effects of such use are substantial in terms of lives lost, personal injuries, property damage, business losses (lost productivity, absenteeism, increased health care costs, etc.) and environmental damage. Accordingly, it is the right, obligation and intent of the Village of Carol Stream to maintain a safe and efficient environment for all employees and guests and to protect Village property, equipment and operations.

The Village has adopted a drug-free workplace policy to ensure that our organization is functioning safely, efficiently and cost effectively. In doing so, the Village will comply with all federal and state drug-free workplace requirements.

The Village will require all employees and job applicants to participate in, consent to, and comply with this policy as a condition of employment and continued employment. For those who refuse to seek help on their own or who fail to cooperate fully with the terms and conditions of this policy, the Village will take appropriate measures to address the situation promptly and directly. Substance issues in the workplace or by employees that affect the workplace will not be tolerated.

II. SCOPE

This policy applies to all employee of the Village of Carol Stream when they are on-call, performing Village business, or on Village premises, including but not limited to all properties, facilities, land, platforms, buildings, structures, fixtures, installations, automobiles, trucks and other vehicles whether owned, leased or used by the Village or for Village purposes. This policy also covers the use of drugs or alcohol while off Village premises if the employee is "under the influence," as defined in this policy, when representing the Village. This policy further prohibits the consumption, possession, sale, purchase or delivery of cannabis or cannabis-infused substances by law enforcement officers, even when off duty. Safety-sensitive transportation employees covered by the Department of Transportation's regulated drug testing program are required to comply with all applicable regulations. The Department of Transportation's Drug and Alcohol Testing Regulation – 49 CFR Part 40 – does not authorize the use of Schedule I drugs, including marijuana, for any reason. Additionally, regardless of the event or situation employees are always responsible for their actions and behavior at Village-related events or activities.

A. Covered Employees

The Village of Carol Stream's drug-free workplace policy covers all:

- Full-time employees
- Part-time employees
- Temporary employees
- Applicants

B. Applicants

All Applicants are covered by this policy insomuch as a pre-employment drug test is required.

Applicants are not entitled to employee assistance benefits, Village-paid retests or any other services made available to employees in this policy unless stipulated by applicable state or federal law.

III. EDUCATION & TRAINING

The Village of Carol Stream will provide employee drug awareness information and supervisor training as needed. At a minimum, the Village will provide information regarding:

- The dangers of drug abuse
- The Village's drug-free workplace policy
- The penalties for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace
- The availability of any drug counseling, rehabilitation, and/or employee assistance plans offered through the Village.

IV. EMPLOYEE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Village of Carol Stream encourages employees and their families to work with the Village's Employee Assistance Program (EAP) to resolve substance abuse problems. The program provides confidential assistance to employees in problem identification, evaluation, counseling and referral services for emotional, behavioral, medical, personal and chemical-dependency problems that employees and their families may experience.

Note: For employees seeking voluntary assistance for substance abuse issues on their own, please refer to the Village of Carol Stream Personnel Manual Chapter 1H (Medically Restricted Employees) and Chapter 6G (Employee Assistance Program) for more information.

V. PROHIBITED CONDUCT

The Village of Carol Stream employees are prohibited from:

- Being impaired by or under the influence or effects of drugs as defined in this policy (including as evidenced by a confirmed positive drug test) while at work;
- Being impaired by or under the influence or effects of alcohol including as evidenced by a BAC of .04 or higher as demonstrated by an alcohol test and/or demonstrating the signs and symptoms of being under the influence of alcohol while at work;
- Failing to notify a supervisor or manager if the employee believes that he or she is impaired by or under the influence of drugs or alcohol:
- Bringing drugs, controlled substances or drug paraphernalia to work and/or storing such items on Village property;
- Possessing, using, manufacturing, distributing, or attempting to distribute, selling or dispensing drugs or controlled substances off Village property that may adversely affect the Village, the worker's job performance, or place at risk the safety or wellbeing of the worker or others.
- Failing to notify the Village in writing immediately of a criminal drug or alcohol conviction or pleading guilty to a criminal drug or alcohol offense; (please see departmental rules re: arrests);
- Abusing prescription drugs, which includes exceeding the recommended prescribed dosage or using others' prescribed medications;
- Switching, tampering with or adulterating any specimen or sample collected under the Village's policy for the purpose of testing for drugs or alcohol;
- Disclosing information related to a drug or alcohol test result, and/or substance abuse treatment referrals, except as required by this policy;
- Refusing to cooperate with the terms and conditions of this policy. Failure to

cooperate includes, but is no limited to:

- a) Refusal to be tested
- b) Failure to provide an adequate sample without a valid medical excuse
- c) Refusal to sign required paperwork (including, but not limited to, consent forms, acknowledgment forms, chain of custody forms)
- d) Failure to show up at an assigned collection site to provide a specimen, and
- e) Failure to be reasonably available to be tested once the employee has been notified.

VI. CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

As used in this policy, controlled substances includes the drugs listed below and any drug that is illegal under federal or state law, or that is legally obtainable but has not been legally obtained. The term includes prescribed drugs which are not being used for the prescribed purpose or in the prescribed manner. Examples include, but are not limited to:

Marijuana (Cannabis)

Opiates

Amphetamines

Cocaine

Crack, phencyclidine (PCP)

Narcotics, barbiturates

Stimulants, depressants

VII. ALCOHOL USE

The following exceptions, while permitting alcohol consumption, do not authorize an employee to be "under the influence" of alcohol or operate a Village vehicle after consuming alcohol:

Alcohol Use Circumstance	Village Policy
Will on-duty alcohol use be permitted?	No*
Will drinking at off-hour Village sponsored events be permitted?	Yes - at employee's own expense
Will drinking at off-hour professional functions/meetings be permitted?	Yes - at employee's own expense
Will the Village pay for transportation expenses for an employee who is unable to drive?	No
Are employees permitted to consume alcohol and operate a municipal vehicle?	No

^{*}On-duty consumption of alcohol when necessitated by an official investigation within the Police Department will be subject to the rules and regulations established for such circumstances.

VIII. MEDICATION NOTIFICATION GUIDELINES

Employees are expected to manage potential impairment during working hours due to the legitimate use of medications. There are numerous over-the-counter and prescription drugs that may negatively impact safe work performance. Therefore, employees are expected to consult with their personal physician or other health care professional to determine if use of such medication will have any potential negative impact on safe job performance. Use of medication that may pose a threat to workplace safety must be discussed with the employee's supervisor.

IX. NOTIFICATION OF CONVICTIONS

Pursuant to state and federal Drug-Free Workplace Acts as well as Village policy, employees must report any conviction under the alcohol or drug statute that occurs on Village premises, on Village time or while conducting Village business off premises within five days after conviction. Conviction includes a plea of guilty or no contest.

X. DRUG AND ALCOHOL TESTING

To ensure the accuracy and fairness of our testing program, all testing will be conducted according to Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) guidelines. Testing will be conducted for the following reasons:

A. Types of Testing

- Pre-Employment: Pre-employment testing will take place after a conditional job offer has been extended. Post offer applicants who test positive for drugs or alcohol will be rejected for employment.
- Post-Accident: Any employee involved in an on-the-job accident involving the loss
 of human life, bodily injury to a person who, as a result of the injury, immediately
 receives medical treatment away from the scene of the accident; or one or more
 motor vehicles incurring disabling damage as a result of the accident, requiring the
 vehicle to be transported away from the scene by a tow truck or other vehicle.
- Reasonable Suspicion: Employees may be subject to testing based on a belief by Village management that an employee is in violation of this policy. Any such suspicion will be based upon specific, contemporaneous, articulable observations concerning the appearance, behavior, speech or body odors of the employee, which may include indications of the chronic and withdrawal effects of controlled substances (see appendix A). These observations will only be made by a supervisor or Village of Carol Stream official who has received appropriate training and will be documented in writing by that individual within twenty-four (24) hours after his/her observations.

B. Cost of Testing

The Village will pay the costs of drug and alcohol tests required by the Village of all job applicants and employees. Applicants and employees may be required to pay the cost of any additional drug or alcohol testing not required by the Village such as retests and follow up testing.

C. Drug Testing Service Providers

The Village of Carol Stream employs the services of Amita Health Medical Group to administer all drug and alcohol testing.

D. Medical Review Officer

If a test is positive, a Medical Review Officer (MRO) will attempt to speak with the employee/applicant in order to verify the result and report a final result to the Village. After 10 days, if no communication with the employee/applicant has taken place, the MRO will verify the result and report it to the Village.

E. Rebuttal Opportunity

Employees and applicants who test positive for drugs will be given the opportunity to

offer an explanation for why the result was positive. The Village may or may not accept that explanation and may or may not alter the applicable consequences.

XI. CONSEQUENCES

One of the goals of our drug-free workplace program is to encourage employees to voluntarily seek help with alcohol and/or drug problems. If, however, an individual violates the policy, the consequences are serious.

If an applicant violates the drug-free workplace policy, the offer of employment will be withdrawn. The applicant may reapply after six months.

On any confirmed positive alcohol or controlled substance drug test of an employee, the employee will be removed from duty and subject to Village discipline and termination guidelines.

XII. CONFIDENTIALITY AND RECORDKEEPING

A. Confidentiality

The Village of Carol Stream will maintain all records generated under this policy in a secure manner so that disclosure to unauthorized persons does not occur. The Village of Carol Stream may disclose information required to be maintained under this policy to the employee, the employer or the decision-maker in a lawsuit, grievance, or other proceeding initiated by or on behalf of the individual, and arising from the results of an alcohol and/or drug test administered under this policy, or from the employer's determination that the employee engaged in conduct prohibited by this policy (including, but not limited to, a worker's compensation, unemployment compensation, or other proceeding relating to a benefit sought by the employee.)

B. Designated Employer Representative

The Village's Human Resources Director is the individual authorized by the Village to receive communications and test results relating to testing under this policy, to coordinate immediate action to remove employees from safety-sensitive duties, and to make required decisions in the testing and evaluation processes. Any questions concerning the Village's testing program, this policy, or the Federal regulations should be directed to the Human Resources Director. In the event the Designated Employer Representative is unavailable to fulfill these duties, an alternate individual will be designated by the Village Manager to execute this responsibility.

As you know, the Village of Carol Stream is a member of the Intergovernmental Personnel Benefits Cooperative (IPBC), which consists of over 100 municipalities pooled together to achieve economies of scale in the cost of benefits such as health and dental insurance coverage. With advice from the IPBC's insurance consultants Aurther J. Gallagher, the Village has embraced increased efforts with regard to the health and well-being for our employees.

It is strongly believed that these efforts can and will result in the reduction of future insurance costs. The Village of Carol Stream, along with other municipalities within the IPBC, have continued to receive insurance rates that beat market averages following the inception of wellness efforts. Our average health insurance rate increase over the last 4 years has been 3.175%. In concept, adapting a healthier lifestyle reduces the risk of developing disabling or life threatening diseases and their associated costs. Further, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention state that employers also benefit from workplace wellness programs through enhanced productivity and reduced absenteeism.

As we enter into this new decade of wellness advocacy, our well-being committee has prepared a program recommendation called Commit to be Fit. The Commit to be fit program is a 6-month, self-initiated step program, allowing for all employees to participate regardless of their current activity level. Prizes will be awarded monthly for the top competitor in each of the following categories:

- Beginner (Up to 35,000 Steps per Week)
- Intermediate (35,001 70,000 Steps per Week)
- Advanced (70,001 and Up)

The full details of the Commit to be Fit program are attached for your review, and funding for this program is already within budget. With partial reimbursement for the purchase of a fitness tracker included in the program, the estimated cost should not exceed \$5000.00, and is estimated at substantially less (\$2800.00). The

committee will also be submitting for a grant with the Intergovernmental Risk Management Agency (IRMA) to off-set 50% of these costs.

As a final piece of the recommendation, the Committee believes, and I concur, that time-off in the form of an 8-hour wellness day for the grand prize winners (top competitor for the overall 6-month period) will produce more participation in the program. As such, I am recommending a one-time non-recurring approval of three (3) 8-hour wellness days to be awarded to the grand prize winners of the Commit to be Fit program upon completion of the challenge. Village Board authorization is requested in order to move forward with this incentive.

RE: Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program

As you are aware, over the past several years there have been significant changes to the law in regards to the enforcement of cannabis impaired driving. More recently, the legalization of adult use cannabis has caused concern to many in the law enforcement profession as it relates to traffic safety. Being a leader in impaired driving enforcement and education, we are often on the front lines of new and innovative ways to better identify and apprehend impaired drivers. In order to maintain our reputation and to better serve our community, I would like to recommend that we dedicate resources to participate in the Illinois Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program (ILEPP).

The ILEPP certifies law enforcement agency members to draw blood from an individual in order to collect evidentiary samples on impaired driving arrest cases. There are no licensing requirements and upon the competition of a forensic phlebotomy course, an individual meets the statutory requirement of being a "trained phlebotomist." This course takes approximately two weeks and is hosted at Richland Community College in Decatur, IL. The approximate cost for this class is \$2,000.00, per student. That cost includes tuition, supplies and boarding. There will some additional costs for a phlebotomy chair for blood draws and other small equipment. Overall, I believe these additional costs will be less than \$2,000.00. These costs can be covered by utilizing our current DUI Tech funds, which total approximately \$396,000.00. The DUI Tech Fund is statutorily designated for this type of training and equipment, as it will be used for the enforcement of impaired driving cases.

The benefits of having a trained phlebotomist on staff is beneficial for the department both logistically and financially. Illinois statute requires that a blood or urine sample be collected from an impaired driving arrestee within two hours of initial contact with a law enforcement officer (625 ILCS 11-501 (a)(7)). This statutory requirement does not leave a significant amount of time to collect evidentiary samples and can lead to a loss of evidence needed to properly prosecute an impaired driving case. Having members of our agency that are trained and able to response timely manner to a blood draw request increases the likelihood that the evidence will be collected within the two hours. In addition, it can lead to more accurate and favorable results for the case. Studies have shown that 90% of Delta 9 THC (active compound of cannabis) is out of a subject's blood within 90 minutes. This means that the more rapidly we can collect the evidence from the suspect, the more consistent the result will be with what was in the person's system as they were operating a vehicle.

Our current method of drawing blood requires the use of an outside vendor, Illinois Phlebotomy Services (IPS). The cost for these services are \$425.00, per blood draw. While we do attempt to obtain reimbursement for these services through court proceedings, we are not always successful. In addition, the response time for IPS is between 45 minutes to one hour. During this time, the amount of Delta 9 THC is dissipating from a person's system and potentially weakening the arresting officer's case. In 2019, the Carol Stream Police Department drew blood on 22 individuals who were arrested for impaired driving. With the legalization of cannabis upon us, I would confidently anticipate an increase in the number of cases that will require blood draws in order to properly prosecute our cases. While I do not suggest completely removing IPS's services from our available options for blood collection, I do believe that we could minimize the need to utilize their services through the use of our own trained phlebotomists.

The Carol Stream Police Department would not be the first agency in the State to be using this program. Currently, there are 11 officers that are participating in this program from around Illinois. General reports from agencies participating in the program indicate a very positive response from their courts of venue. The ILEPP is modeled directly from the State of Arizona's Law Enforcement Phlebotomy Program, which has been in effect for nearly 25 years. It has only been challenged by the defense twice in over two decades and in both cases the judges dismissed the lawsuits for no merit.

As it relates to liability, there is statutory immunity against liability under 625 ILCS 5/11-500.1. The statute is provided below:

Sec. 11-500.1. Immunity.

(a) A person authorized under this Article to withdraw blood or collect urine or other bodily substance shall not be civilly liable for damages when the person, in good faith, withdraws blood or collects urine or other bodily substance for evidentiary purposes under this Code, upon the request of a law enforcement officer, unless the act is performed in a willful and wanton manner.

(b) As used in this Section, "willful and wanton manner" means a course of action that shows an actual or deliberate intention to cause harm or which, if not intentional, shows an utter indifference to or conscious disregard for the health or safety of another.

(Source: P.A. 99-697, eff. 7-29-16.)

Two of our department members have applied and been accepted by the ILEPP Program Coordinator after a vigorous application process. Those two individuals are Officer Natalia Wajdowicz and Community Service Technician Christina Kotnaur. Both of these individuals possess the ideal qualities of an individual to be trusted with this responsibility. Further, both will represent our agency in an extremely positive manner as they have throughout their careers.

I understand that there will likely be further questions related to this program. I would be pleased to field any of those questions or concerns whenever they arise. I appreciate your attention to this request and explanation.

Proposed Cannabis Ordinance Amendments

The purpose of this memorandum is to inform the elected officials of Carol Stream of proposed amendments to cannabis-related laws within the Village's Code of Ordinance. In addition, two new regulations have been drafted for your consideration to address those that use cannabis and possess cannabis paraphernalia unlawfully.

On June 25th, 2019, the Illinois General Assembly passed the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, which effectively makes adult cannabis usage legal. The Act, which went into effect on January 1st, 2020, requires revisions to current ordinances that deal with cannabis, and the creation of new laws. Below listed is a summary of the proposed amendments that will aide in regulating behavior that adversely influences the health, safety, and welfare of our community.

Currently, listed within Chapter 14, Article 2, Section 1 of the Village's Code are definitions that coincide with crimes within the "Offenses Against Persons" article. The below-listed terms and their meanings have been added to the amendment. It should be noted that each definition has been taken directly from the Illinois Compiled Statutes, and the specific section is listed at the end of each description.

- Cannabis
- Cannabis Concentrate
- Cannabis Container
- Cannabis Flower
- Cannabis Paraphernalia
- Cannabis-Infused Product
- **Drug Paraphernalia** (this definition has been moved from the "Drug Paraphernalia Offense" (14-2-32) and into the "Definition" list (14-2-1).

The current "Cannabis; Possession of" ordinance (14-2-4) is vague and brief, since before January 1st, 2020, any amount of cannabis was illegal. Now, taking into account the Cannabis Regulation and Tax

Act, Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, and the Cannabis Control Act, the "Cannabis; Possession of" ordinance has been lengthened to incorporate the new law changes. These new amendments allow an individual over 21 years of age (depending on the state they reside in) to possess varying amounts depending on the form of cannabis. The seven divisions of the amended 14-2-4 ordinance are listed below:

- 1) The first division of the amended law makes it unlawful for a person to possess any amount of cannabis if they violate any subsection of 410 ILCS 705/10-35. The previously mentioned section is the "Limitation and Penalties" portion of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act. If an individual, who is legally able to possess cannabis, violates any part of the "Limitation and Penalties" section are no longer protected by the Act and are subject to arrest via the Cannabis Control Act.
- The second division of the ordinance covers Illinois residents that are over 21 years of age. The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act list the maximum amounts of cannabis flower, cannabis-infused product, and cannabis concentrate a person can possess at one-time. These amounts are reflected in the amendment. The maximum cannabis flower a person can possess and still be charged under Village Ordinance is 100 grams. The amount was chosen since it coincides with a class A misdemeanor if charged under the State statute. No maximums were selected for cannabis-infused products, and cannabis concentrates because none were reflected in the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act.
- 3) The third division deals with non-Illinois residents who are 21 years of age or older. The amounts for the three categories of cannabis were taken directly from the Illinois Compiled Statutes (410 ILCS 705/10-10).
- 4) The fourth division covers possession of cannabis by individuals under 21 years of age. The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act is transparent in that those under 21 are not to possess any form of cannabis. The mission of the law is now reflected in the revision.
- The fifth division deals with individuals who possess cannabis that was not purchased lawfully. As stated within the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, the new law was written so "legitimate, taxpaying business people, and not criminal actors, will conduct sales of cannabis (410 ILCS 705/1-5(b)(2))." If a subject is found to be in possession of cannabis purchased by a "criminal actor," and not a lawful dispensary, they can be held accountable.
- 6) The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act set forth guidelines on who can legally possess cannabis plants. Division six of the amended ordinance will state that no persons, who are not registered qualifying patients under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, can be in possession of any amount of cannabis plants.
- Tastly, the seventh and final division of the amended "Cannabis; Possession of" deals with cannabis plants and qualified patients. Similar to the Cannabis Registration Act, the ordinance will allow registered qualifying patients to possess (5) cannabis plants that are more than (5) inches tall. Having more than (5) plants will be a violation.

The majority of the current "Drug Paraphernalia" (14-2-32) ordinance is consistent with the Illinois Compiled Statutes, Drug Paraphernalia Act. The divisions that require changes are the only ones listed on the ordinance amendment. As you can see, all forms of cannabis paraphernalia verbiage have been

removed. Now, only paraphernalia that is used to consume controlled substances or synthetic drugs is applicable to be charged under this section.

Finally, we, as a Department, are no longer faced with the need to regulate only cannabis possession, but also its use. For your consideration, two new ordinances entitled "Cannabis; Unlawful Use of" and "Cannabis Paraphernalia; Possession of," respectively, were drafted. The "Cannabis; Unlawful Use of" ordinance, which has been assigned to Chapter 14, Article 2, Section 38, covers seven different divisions taken from 410 ILCS 705/10-35. These areas are described as unlawful usages of cannabis, regardless if they possess the drug legally.

The Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act have also made it a point to create a new definition for "Cannabis Paraphernalia." Still, as previously mentioned, it is no longer listed within the Illinois Compiled Statute Drug Paraphernalia Control Act. Since cannabis paraphernalia is used to ingest a drug that remains illegal for those under 21, the administration believes it is essential to regulate it amongst this specified population. The new ordinance, "Cannabis Paraphernalia; Possession of (14-2-39)," will make it illegal for those under 21 years of age to possess cannabis paraphernalia. The Village of Bolingbrook has adopted a similar ordinance.

Subject to your review, I have attached to this memorandum two ordinance amendments. The first being an amendment addressing the changes to 14-2-1, 14-2-4, and 14-2-32. The second contains the purposed new ordinances. Please note, further revisions of current ordinances dealing with the sale of age-appropriate items are forthcoming since we are an "Opt-In" community. However, since this is a time-sensitive issue, and these are the most frequently used cannabis related ordinances, the Police Departments Administration sought to ensure these amendments were submitted to the Board in a timely fashion.

The men and women of the Carol Stream Police Department thank you for your time and attention to this matter.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 14 (GENERAL OFFENSES), ARTICLE 2 (OFFENSES AGAINST PERSONS), SECTION 14-2-1 (DEFINITIONS), SECTION 14-2-4 (CANNABIS; POSSESSION OF), AND SECTION 14-2-32 (DRUG PARAPHERNALIA) OF THE CAROL STREAM MUNICIPAL CODE OF ORDINANCES

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream, Illinois, as a home rule unit of local government as provided by Article VII, Section 6, Subsection (a) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs and protect the public health, safety and welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly has passed the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., (hereinafter referred to as the "Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act"), approved on June 25th, 2019, and effective on January 1st, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act legalizes the possession and use of adult use cannabis with certain restrictions; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream desires to enact an ordinance to update its Municipal Code to be consistent with the Cannabis Regulation and Control Act, including its restrictions; and

WHEREAS, in exercise of its home-rule authority, the Village of Carol Stream, through its Mayor and Village Board, has found and determined that amending the Carol Stream Municipal Code of Ordinances to make all regulations regarding adult use cannabis use and possession and the prohibition of use under certain circumstances and for the prohibition of possession of cannabis for those under twenty-one years of age within the Village is in the best interest of Carol Stream residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

SECTION 1: The above referenced recitals are hereby incorporated into this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION 2: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, "General Offenses," Article 2, "Offenses Against Persons", Section 14-2-1, "Definitions," is hereby amended to revise and add the following definitions, which shall read as follows:

SECTION 14-2-1: DEFINITIONS

§14-2-1 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this article, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

CANNABIS. Marijuana, hashish, and other substances that are identified as including any parts of the plant Cannabis sativa and including derivatives or subspecies, such as indica, of all strains of cannabis, whether growing or not; the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant; and any compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or resin, including tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and all other naturally produced cannabinol derivatives, whether

produced directly or indirectly by extraction; however, "cannabis" does not include the mature stalks of the plant, fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, any other compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the mature stalks (except the resin extracted from it), fiber, oil or cake, or the sterilized seed of the plant that is incapable of germination. "Cannabis" does not include industrial hemp as defined and authorized under the Illinois Industrial Hemp Act. "Cannabis" also means cannabis flower, concentrate, and cannabis-infused products. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CANNABIS CONCENTRATE. A product derived from cannabis that is produced by extracting cannabinoids from the plant through the use of propylene glycol, glycerin, butter, olive oil or other typical cooking fats; water, ice, or dry ice; or butane, propane, CO2, ethanol, or isopropanol. The use of any other solvent is expressly prohibited unless and until it is approved by the Illinois Department of Agriculture. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CANNABIS CONTAINER. A sealed, traceable, container, or package used for the purpose of containment of cannabis or cannabis-infused product during transportation. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CANNABIS FLOWER. Marijuana, hashish, and other substances that are identified as including any parts of the plant Cannabis sativa and including derivatives or subspecies, such as indicia, of all strains of cannabis; including raw kief, leaves, and buds, but not resin that has been extracted from any part of such plant; nor any compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of such plant, its seed, or resin. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CANNABIS PARAPHERNALIA. Equipment, products, or materials intended to be used for planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, ingesting, or otherwise introducing cannabis into the human body. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CANNABIS-INFUSED PRODUCT. A beverage, food, oil, ointment, tincture, topical formulation, or another product containing cannabis that is not intended to be smoked. (410 ILCS 705/1-10).

CONTROLLED SUBSTANCE. The meaning ascribed to it in § 102 of the Illinois Controlled Substances Act, 720 ILCS 570/102, as if that definition were incorporated herein.

DELIVER or **DELIVERY**. The actual, constructive or attempted transfer of possession, with or without consideration, whether or not there is an agency relationship.

DRUG PARAPHERNALIA. All equipment, products and materials of any kind, other than methamphetamine manufacturing materials as defined in Section 10 of the Illinois Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act and cannabis paraphernalia as defined in Section 1-10 of the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act, which are intended to be used unlawfully in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance in violation of the Illinois Controlled Substance Act or the Methamphetamine Control and Community Protection Act or a synthetic drug product or misbranded drug in violation of the Illinois Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act. The term Drug Paraphernalia includes, but is not limited to:

1. Kits intended to be used unlawfully in manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing or preparing a controlled substance;

- 2. Isomerization devices intended to be used unlawfully in increasing the potency of any species of plant which is a controlled substance;
- 3. Testing equipment intended to be used unlawfully in a private home for identifying or in analyzing the strength, effectiveness or purity of controlled substances;
- 4. Diluents and adulterants intended to be used unlawfully for cutting a controlled substance by private persons;
- 5. Objects intended to be used unlawfully in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing cocaine or a synthetic drug product or misbranded drug in violation of the Illinois Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act into the human body including, where applicable, the following items:
 - a. Water pipes;
 - b. Carburetion tubes and devices;
 - c. Smoking and carburetion masks;
 - d. Miniature cocaine spoons and cocaine vials;
 - e. Carburetor pipes;
 - f. Electric pipes;
 - g. Chillums
 - h. Bongs
 - i. Ice pipes or chillers;
 - j. Any item whose purpose, as announced or described by the seller, is for the use in violation of the Illinois Drug Paraphernalia Control Act (720 ILCS 600).

SECTION 3: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, "General Offenses," Article 2, "Offenses Against Persons", Section 14-2-4, "Cannabis; Possession of," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§14-2-4 CANNABIS; POSSESSION OF.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly possess any quantity of any substance containing cannabis while:
 - 1. in a school bus, unless permitted for a qualifying patient or caregiver pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act;
 - 2. on the grounds of any preschool or primary or secondary school, unless permitted for a qualifying patient or caregiver pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act;
 - 3. in a vehicle not open to the public unless the cannabis is in a reasonably secured, sealed container and reasonably inaccessible while the vehicle is moving; or
 - 4. in a private residence that is used at any time to provide licensed child care or other similar social service care on the premises;
- B. It shall be unlawful for a person who is 21 years of age or older and a resident of the State of Illinois, except as exempted by the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (410 ILCS 130), to be in possession of:
 - 1. More than 30 grams, but less than 100 grams of cannabis flower
 - 2. More than 500 milligrams of THC contained in cannabis-infused product

- 3. More than 5 grams of cannabis concentrate
- C. It shall be unlawful for a person who is 21 years of age or older and who is not a resident of the State of Illinois to be in possession of:
 - 1. More than 15 grams, but less than 100 grams of cannabis flower
 - 2. More than 250 milligrams of THC contained in cannabis-infused product
 - 3. More than 2.5 grams of cannabis concentrate
- D. It shall be unlawful or any person under the age of 21 to knowingly possess any quantity of any substance containing cannabis; except as exempted by the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (410 ILCS 130) and 720 ILCS 550/11.
- E. It shall be unlawful for any person to knowingly possess any quantity of any substance containing cannabis if said substance was not lawfully purchased in accordance with the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act (410 ILCS 705/1-5).
- F. It shall be unlawful for a person, who is not a registered qualifying patient under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act, to be in possession of any amount of cannabis plants.
- G. It shall be unlawful for a person who is a registered qualifying patient under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act to be in possession of more than (5) cannabis plants that are more than (5) inches tall.

SECTION 4: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, "General Offenses," Article 2, "Offenses Against Persons", Section 14-2-32, "Drug Paraphernalia," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§14-2-32 DRUG PARAPHERNALIA

- A. No person shall keep for sale, offer for sale, sell or deliver for any commercial consideration any item of drug paraphernalia.
- B. Any store, place or premises from which or in which any item of drug paraphernalia is kept for sale, offered for sale, sold or delivered for any commercial consideration is declared to be a public nuisance.
- C. In addition to any other penalties already provided for by law and this section, a person or store owner convicted of selling drug paraphernalia shall be subject to having his or her license to sell tobacco revoked, as provided by § 10-1-13 of the Village of Carol Stream Code of Ordinances.
- D. No person shall knowingly possesses an item of drug paraphernalia with the intent to use it in ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing a controlled substance into the human body, or in preparing a controlled substance for that use. This section does not apply to a person who is legally authorized to possess hypodermic syringes or needles under the Hypodermic Syringes and Needles Act (720 ILCS 635/0.01).

- E. This section shall not apply to the following:
 - 1. Items historically and customarily used in connection with the planting, propagating, cultivating, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, or inhaling of cannabis, tobacco, or any other lawful substance, and including but not limited to, garden hoes, rakes, sickles, baggies, tobacco pipes, and cigarette-rolling papers.
 - 2. A person who is legally authorized to possess hypodermic syringes or needles under the Hypodermic Syringes and Needles Act.
- F. In determining whether or not a particular item is exempt under this section, the tier of fact should consider, in addition to all other logically relevant factors, the following:
 - 1. the general, usual, customary, and historical use to which the item involved has been put;
 - 2. expert evidence concerning the ordinary or customary use of the item and the effect of any peculiarity in the design or engineering of the device upon its functioning;
 - 3. any written instructions accompanying the delivery of the item concerning the purposes or uses to which the item can or may be put;
 - 4. any oral instructions provided by the seller of the item at the time and place of sale or commercial delivery;
 - 5. any national or local advertising concerning the design, purpose or use of the item involved, and the entire context in which such advertising occurs;
 - 6. the manner, place and circumstances in which the item was displayed for sale, as well as any item or items displayed for sale or otherwise exhibited upon the premises where the sale was made;
 - 7. whether the owner or anyone in control of the object is a legitimate supplier of like or related items to the community, such as a licensed distributor or dealer of cannabis or tobacco products;
 - 8. the existence and scope of legitimate uses for the object in the community.
- G. Any person violating the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than \$750.00.

SECTION 5: Those sections, paragraphs and provisions of Chapter 14 of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances which are not expressly amended or repealed by this Ordinance are hereby reenacted, and it is expressly declared to be the intention of this Ordinance not to repeal or amend any portion of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances other than those expressly amended or repealed in Section 1 of this Ordinance.

SECTION 6: The invalidity of any section or provision of this Ordinance hereby passed and approved shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CAROL STREAM CODE OF ORDINANCES TO REGULATE THE UNLAWFUL USE OF CANNABIS AND POSSESSION OF CANNABIS PARAPHERNALIA

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream, Illinois, a home rule unit of local government as provided by Article VII, Section 6, Subsection (a) of the Illinois Constitution of 1970, has the authority to adopt ordinances and to promulgate rules and regulations that pertain to its government and affairs and protect the public health, safety and welfare of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Illinois General Assembly has passed the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act 410 ILCS 705/1 et seq., (hereinafter referred to as the "Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act"), approved on June 25th, 2019, and effective on January 1st, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the Cannabis Regulation and Tax Act legalizes the possession and use of adult use cannabis with certain restrictions; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream desires to ensure that those that partake in adult use cannabis does so in accordance with the Cannabis Regulation and Control Act; and

WHEREAS, in exercise of its home-rule authority, the Village of Carol Stream, through its Mayor and Village Board, has found and determined that amending the Carol Stream Municipal Code of Ordinances to regulate the use of cannabis is in the best interest of its citizens.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

SECTION 1: The above referenced recitals are hereby incorporated into this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION 2: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, "General Offenses", Article 2, "Offenses Against Persons" is hereby amended by adding Section 14-2-38, "Cannabis; Unlawful Use of;", which shall read as follows:

SECTION 14-2-38: CANNABIS; UNLAWFUL USE OF.

§14-2-38 CANNABIS; UNLAWFUL USE OF.

A. As used in this section, unless the context otherwise requires.

PUBLIC PLACE. Any place where a person could reasonably be expected to be observed by others. "Public Place" includes all parts of buildings owned in whole or in part, or leased, by the State or a unit of local government. "Public Place" does not include a private residence unless the private residence is used to provide licensed child care, foster care, or other similar social service care on the premises.

- B. It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke, consume or use any substance containing cannabis:
 - 1. In a school bus, unless permitted for a qualifying patient or caregiver pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (410 ILCS 130);
 - 2. On the grounds of any preschool or primary or secondary school, unless permitted for a qualifying patient or caregiver pursuant to the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (410 ILCS 130);
 - 3. In any motor vehicle;
 - 4. In a private residence that is used at any time to provide licensed child care or other similar social service care on the premises;
 - 5. In any public place;
 - 6. Knowingly in close physical proximity to anyone under 21 years of age who is not a registered medical cannabis patient under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Program Act (410 ILCS 130);
 - 7. In any place where smoking is prohibited under the Smoke Free Illinois Act.

SECTION 3: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 14, "General Offenses", Article 2, "Offenses Against Persons" is hereby amended by adding Section 14-2-39, "Cannabis Paraphernalia; Possession of", which shall read as follows:

SECTION 14-2-39: CANNABIS PARAPHERNALIA; POSSESSION OF.

§14-2-39 CANNABIS PARAPHERNALIA; POSSESSION OF.

It shall be unlawful for a person who is under 21 years of age to possess cannabis paraphernalia, unless he or she is a qualified patient under the Compassionate Use of Medical Cannabis Act (410 ILCS 130).

SECTION 4: Those sections, paragraphs and provisions of Chapter 14 of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances which are not expressly amended or repealed by this Ordinance are hereby reenacted, and it is expressly declared to be the intention of this Ordinance not to repeal or amend any portion of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances other than those expressly amended or repealed in Section 1 of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5: The invalidity of any section or provision of these Ordinances hereby passed and approved shall not invalidate other sections or provisions thereof.

SECTION 6: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by law.

Resolution for Maintenance Under the Illinois Highway Code – 2020 Flexible

Pavement Project (Section 20-00000-02-GM)

Attached is the MFT Resolution for the 2020 Flexible Pavement Project in the amount of \$3,254,077.75 in the format required by IDOT. Also included as part of this year's Flexible Pavement project is the resurfacing of the President Street and Town Center parking lots, which will be funded by the Capital Improvements Project Fund (CIP) and a portion of the Town Center parking lot resurfacing work will be reimbursed by the Park District. Below is a breakdown of estimated costs along with funding sources:

Flexible Pavement Project Right-of-Way Improvements (MFT) \$3,254,077.75

President Street Parking Lot (CIP) \$33,190.00

Town Center Parking Lot (CIP) \$152,711.50

Town Center Parking Lot Reimbursement (Park District) (\$70,115.00)

This appropriation is \$212,077.75 or 7% higher than the \$3,042,000.00 proposed for FY21 in the FY20 budget. All of these values will be reflected in the FY21 Budget.

This project will once again be funded through the State Motor Fuel Tax account, which will be more common since the MFT gas tax was increased. As such, Illinois Department of Transportation procedures and documentation must be followed. It is therefore recommended that the IDOT Resolution for Maintenance Under the Illinois Highway Code be approved in the amount of \$3,254,077.75.

Once four copies of the attached Resolution are executed, the Engineering Services Department will forward all required documents to the Illinois Department of Transportation Bureau of Local Roads and Streets for approval.

PURPOSE

This purpose of this memorandum is to transmit to the Village Board, for Board action, a Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement with the Village of Winfield.

DISCUSSION

Boundary agreements can minimize conflicts between adjacent municipalities and reduce the occurrence of adverse land use decisions by establishing the municipality that would ultimately exercise land use control and provide utility service to unincorporated properties between municipalities. With the goal of determining future municipal land use control for the unincorporated area between Carol Stream and Winfield, in March of 2000, the Village Board adopted Resolution 1811, A Resolution Authorizing Execution of an Intergovernmental Boundary Agreement between the Village of Carol Stream and Village of Winfield.

With the boundary agreement approved in 2000 due to expire this March, staff contacted Winfield last fall to determine their interest in entering into a new boundary agreement. Winfield expressed interest in a new agreement, and Carol Stream staff prepared the attached updated Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement. Also attached is the public notice, which in accordance with state statutes, was published in The Examiner not less than 30 days nor more than 120 days prior to consideration by the Village Board.

The proposed Agreement has been updated to include new exhibits and reflect current references. For example, NIPC (Northeastern Illinois Planning Commission) has been superseded by CMAP (Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning). The boundary line delineating the municipality to which properties would annex in the proposed Agreement is essentially identical to the boundary line in the current agreement, and is shown on the exhibit in the proposed agreement. Described generally, beginning at Fair Oaks Road, the line would run east down North Avenue to Morton Road, turn south down Morton Road to St. Charles Road, run east along St. Charles Road to Taylor Drive, then south to the north property line of the Wheaton Christian Grammar School, then east to the west property line of the Fed Ex Motor Freight Terminal, then south to the south property line of the American Legion property, then east to Gary Avenue, and finally south to Geneva Road.

As required under the current agreement, the proposed updated agreement would require each municipality to notify the other of development proposals received for any property on its side and within 1,000 feet of the boundary line. The agreement also requires the municipalities to share plans of any such development proposals with each other, and to allow each municipality to comment on any proposal prior to any Plan Commission, Zoning Board or Village Board meeting.

The Winfield Village Board approved the new boundary agreement at their meeting on Thursday, January 16, 2020.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement with the Village of Winfield. Should the Village Board concur, they should adopt the necessary Resolution approving the Agreement.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING EXECUTION OF A JURISDICTIONAL BOUNDARY AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM AND THE VILLAGE OF WINFIELD

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream ("Carol Stream") and the Village of Winfield ("Winfield"), DuPage County, Illinois, (jointly referred to herein as "the municipalities") are Illinois Home Rule municipalities pursuant to provisions of Article VII, Section 6, of the Illinois Constitution, 1970, and as such, may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, Carol Stream and Winfield are authorized by the 1970 Illinois Constitution to contract with each other; and

WHEREAS, Carol Stream and Winfield have determined it is in the best interests of the residents of Carol Stream and Winfield that future municipal land use control and utility service shall be governed by a Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement between the municipalities; and

WHEREAS, a Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement has been developed establishing the jurisdictional boundary line between the municipalities and setting forth the necessary terms, conditions and procedures related to administration of the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Winfield Village Board approved the Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement at its meeting on January 16, 2020.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DU PAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the Mayor is authorized to execute and the Village Clerk to attest a Jurisdictional Boundary Agreement between the Village of Carol Stream and the Village of Winfield with regard to the logical municipal boundaries and municipal authority between these respective municipalities.

SECTION 2: This Resolution shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.

JURISDICTIONAL BOUNDARY LINE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, ILLINOIS AND THE VILLAGE OF WINFIELD, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, a portion of unincorporated territory in DuPage County lying between the VILLAGE OF WINFIELD, DuPage County, Illinois (hereinafter referred to as "Winfield"), and the VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DuPage County, Illinois (hereinafter referred to as "Carol Stream"), is a rapidly growing area in Illinois and development is in various stages of planning; and

WHEREAS, such development will be accompanied by future demands for municipal services; and

WHEREAS, Winfield and Carol Stream recognize the need and desirability of providing for logical municipal boundaries and areas of municipal authority between their respective municipalities in order to plan effectively and efficiently for the growth and potential development between their communities and for the orderly provision of municipal services; and

WHEREAS, Winfield and Carol Stream are "units of local government as defined by article VII, Section I, of the Constitution of the State of Illinois"; and

WHEREAS, units of local government are enabled by Article VII, Section 10 of the Constitution of Illinois to enter into agreements among themselves to obtain or share services and to exercise, combine or transfer any power or function, in any manner not prohibited by law or ordinance; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 65 ILCS 5/11-12-9, if unincorporated territory is within one and one-half miles of the boundaries of two or more corporate authorities that have adopted official plans, the corporate authorities involved may agree upon a line which shall mark the boundaries of the jurisdiction of each of the corporate authorities who have adopted such agreement, and such agreement may provide that one or more of the municipalities shall not annex territory which lies within the jurisdiction of the other municipality, as established by such line; and

WHEREAS, both Winfield and Carol Stream are municipalities which meet the requirements of 65 ILCS 5/11-12-9 and mutually desire to enter into a binding jurisdictional boundary agreement whereby each municipality shall not annex territory which lies in the agreed upon jurisdiction of the other municipality, as established herein; and

WHEREAS, Winfield and Carol Stream have authorized the execution of this agreement as an exercise of their respective authority and as an exercise of their statutory powers and their powers of intergovernmental cooperation authority under the Constitution of Illinois.

NOW, THEREFORE, upon consideration of the mutual promises contained herein and upon the further consideration of the recitals hereinabove set forth, it is hereby agreed between Winfield and Carol Stream as follows:

- 1. The recitals set forth hereinabove shall be and are hereby incorporated in this Paragraph 1 as if said recitals were fully set forth herein.
- 2. Winfield and Carol Stream are sometimes referred to individually as a Municipality or Party and collectively as the Municipalities or Parties.
- 3. Winfield and Carol Stream agree that, in the unincorporated territory lying between the two municipalities, the boundary line for municipal government planning, subdivision control, annexations, official map, ordinances and other municipal purposes shall be as attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit A.
- 4. Carol Stream agrees that with respect to the territory lying south and west of the aforesaid boundary line it shall not annex any unincorporated territory, nor shall it exercise or attempt to exercise or enforce any zoning, subdivision control, official map, or other municipal authority or ordinances, except as may be hereinafter provided in this Agreement.
- 5. Winfield agrees that with respect to the territory lying north and east of the aforesaid boundary line, it shall not annex any unincorporated territory, nor shall it exercise or attempt to exercise or enforce any zoning, subdivision control, official map, or other municipal authority or ordinances, except as may be hereinafter provided in this Agreement.
- 6. Each municipality shall actively oppose any attempt to effectuate an annexation to its respective municipality which annexation would have the effect of changing the boundaries established under this Agreement unless agreed to by the other municipality.
- 7. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary within this Agreement, this Agreement shall not be construed so as to limit or adversely affect the right of either municipality to file a statutory objection to proposed rezoning of any territory located within one and one-half (1 ½) miles of its corporate limits.

- 8. This Agreement shall be binding upon, and shall apply only to relations between Winfield and Carol Stream. Nothing herein shall be used or construed to affect, support, bind or invalidate the boundary claims of either Winfield or Carol Stream insofar as such shall affect any municipality, which is not a party to this Agreement.
- 9. With respect to any territory within a distance of 1,000 feet north and east of the aforesaid boundary line, Carol Stream agrees that it will provide a copy of any proposed development, engineering plans, any applications for rezoning, special uses, planned development or proposed annexation agreements ("Development Proposals") for said territory to Winfield for information and comment at least 10 days prior to action thereon by any municipal agencies, including but not limited to Plan Commission, Zoning Board of Appeals, or Board of Trustees.
- 10. With respect to any territory within a distance of 1,000 feet south and west of the aforesaid boundary line, Winfield agrees that it will provide a copy of any Development Proposals for said territory to the Carol Stream for information and comment at least 10 days prior to action thereon by any municipal agencies, including but not limited to Plan and Zoning Commission and Board of Trustees.
- 11. Although each of the Municipalities shall exercise their best efforts to provide such notice, however, permits granted or other action taken in the absence of such notice shall not be invalid. Provided, however, that if the Municipality which was to receive such notice shall learn of the proposed action prior to its being taken, the Corporate Authorities of the municipality planning to take that action shall, upon the written request of the Village Manager of the other community, table any projected action from the meeting at which action was expected to be taken to the next regular or special meeting of the Municipality.
- 12. Carol Stream's comprehensive plan for territory within a distance of 1,000 feet north and east of the boundary line and outside its corporate limits as attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit B, shall not be changed without 30 days written notice to Winfield. Winfield shall have the right to submit written comments to the Mayor and Board of Trustees of Carol Stream regarding that change in use.
- 13. Winfield's comprehensive plan for territory within a distance of 1,000 feet south and west of the boundary line and outside its corporate limits as attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit C shall not be changed without 30 days written notice to Carol Stream. Carol Stream shall have the right to submit written comments to the President and Board of Trustees regarding that change in use.

- 14. Neither Carol Stream nor Winfield shall directly or indirectly seek any modification to this Agreement through court action, and this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect until amended or changed by the mutual agreement of both respective corporate authorities.
- 15. If any provision of this Agreement shall be declared invalid for any reason, such invalidation shall not affect other provisions of this Agreement, which can be given effect without the invalid provision and, to this end, the provisions of this Agreement are to be severable.
- 16. This Agreement shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty years from the date hereof and for such further and additional time as the parties hereto may hereafter agree by amendment to this Agreement.
- 17. This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois and shall be published by the respective municipalities and recorded or filed with appropriate County Recorders, County Clerks, and others as their interest may appear.

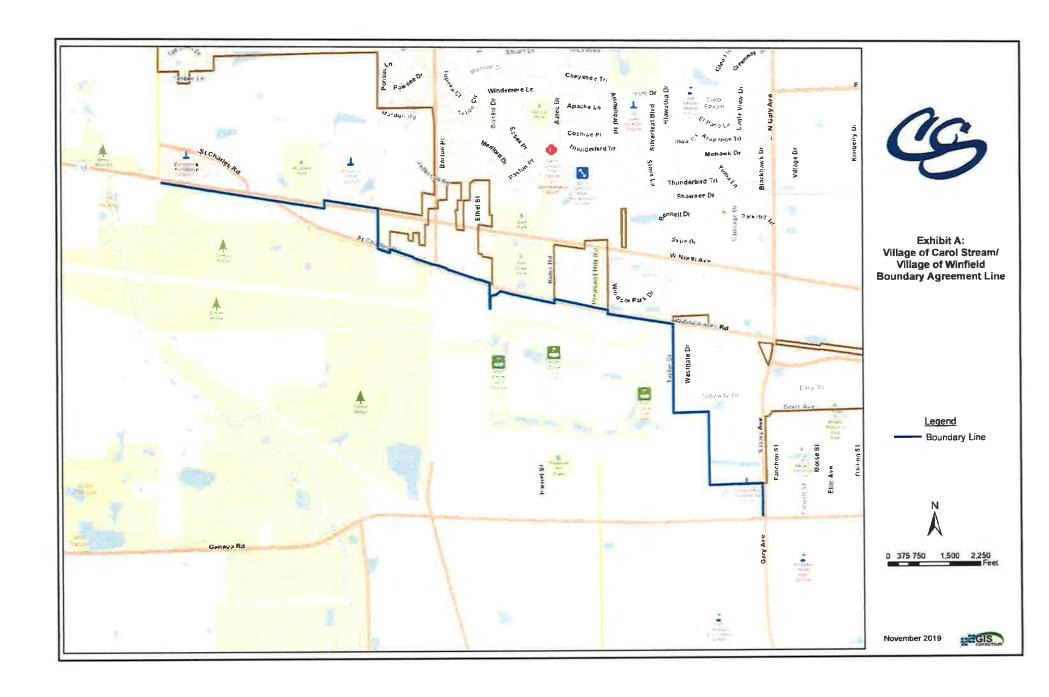

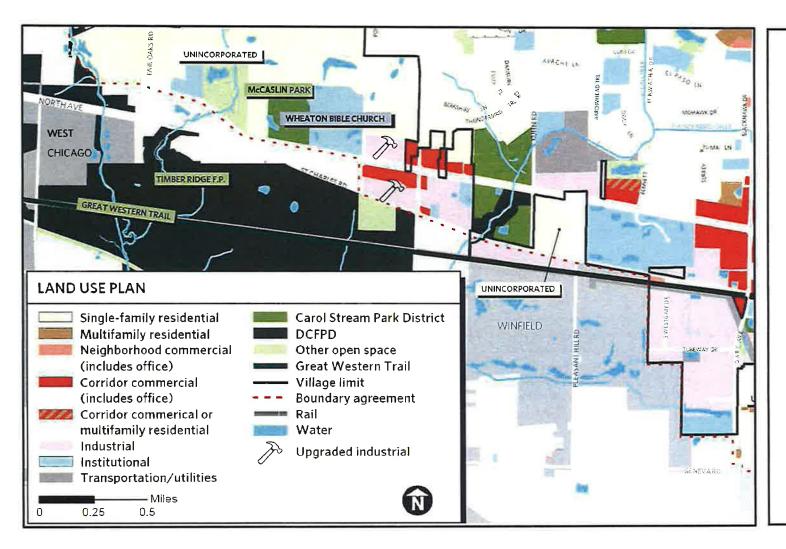




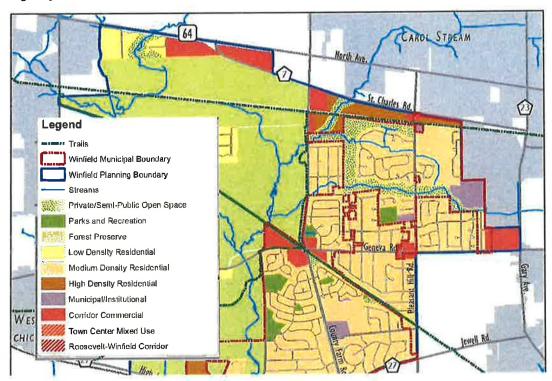
Exhibit B: Village of Carol Stream Comprehensive Plan

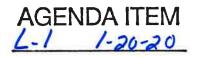


EXHIBIT C – VILLAGE OF WINFIELD COMPREHENSIVE PLAN
