Zoning Text Amendment - Unified Development Ordinance (UDO)-Miscellaneous Modifications

Chairman Parisi swore in Mr. Farace and Mr. Berisha.

Mr. Berisha stated Staff is requesting approval for the following text amendments as listed in the Staff Report:

- Definitions and District Specific Standards pertaining to Electric Vehicle (EV) charging stations in Articles 2, 3 and 4.

Mr. Farace stated Staff is requesting approval for the following text amendments as listed in the Staff Report:

- New regulations pertaining to Community Gardening/Urban Farming
- Additional standards regarding Residential Rainwater Collection Systems

Chairman Parisi asked for questions or comments from the Commission.

Commissioner Petella had no questions.

Commissioner Christopher asked if the text amendment is for the EV chargers for pedestal and/or wall mount.

Mr. Farace replied the charging stations themselves are geared more to the free standing one.

Commissioner Christopher stated that means that it will be a wall mount like those installed in car dealerships and places.

Mr. Farace stated we would review those more from a building code perspective than from an aesthetics or location perspective.

Commissioner Christopher stated the lower the voltage you feed these EV chargers the longer it takes to charge the battery. You could be there 4 hours if you use a 120V. A lot of places are coming across the demand for electric for the fast chargers so your done in 20 minutes instead of waiting 3-4 hours so they can go 300 miles.

Commissioner Christopher then asked if a permit is required for a rainwater collection system.

Mr. Farace stated it would depend on the extent of what someone is going to install. If they are installing a rain barrel at the corner of their house, then no, you probably do not need a permit.

Chairman Parisi asked if a permit is needed for an irrigation system.

Mr. Farace replied yes.

Commissioner Morris asked if the free standing charging stations are strictly in commercial properties or could they be in a church parking lot or where else can they be.

Mr. Farace replied anywhere someone wanted to install them.

Commissioner Morris asked if you can put one in your driveway.

Mr. Farace replied typically the residential chargers are located inside the garage. Maybe an apartment complex might have them if there are no garages.

Mr. Morris asked if the fee is charged by the owner of the charging station or the owner of the property.

Mr. Farace replied it could depend on whatever deal they have that was put in place. The Village does not get involved in that. If a shopping center wants to install ten EV charging stations, that would be between the charging company and the shopping center owner.

Chairman Parisi asked what is the difference between a charging station accessory and a primary.

Mr. Berisha replied the primary stations are more like a fuel sales station or a station with multiple charging stations. The accessory would be only one.

Chairman Parisi stated and that is why the charging station is a Special Use for the B-1 and B-3 Districts.

Chairman Parisi asked if there would be advertising. I'm assuming if I'm at a charge point, I'm going to want to advertise what I'm selling.

Mr. Farace stated if they have signage on the piece of equipment that gives their contact information and name of the company, we don't look at that as advertising necessarily.

Chairman Parisi asked how did you guys come up with the heights of trees regarding the Residential Gardening. Or, is just the structures associated with growing.

Mr. Farace stated we are talking more about the structures that are used in conjunction with gardening.

Commissioner Parisi stated he thinks this will be difficult to enforce. He then asked what if there is a cornfield in the back and a farm house in the front.

Mr. Farace stated these are more geared toward single family.

Commissioner Petella moved and Commissioner Morris seconded the motion with no further discussion.

The subject property has a distinct topographic hardship because Klein Creek runs through the rear lot line, making the installation of the fence along the rear lot line impractical. Therefore, a variation was requested to allow the fence to be installed approximately 20 feet away from the rear lot line instead of along the lot line as otherwise required.

The staff report presenting the request, with supporting documentation, was transmitted to the Village Board with the PC/ZBA packet on June 23, 2023. At its meeting on June 26, 2023, by a vote of 4-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of the Fence Variation.

If the Village Board concurs with the PC/ZBA recommendation regarding the Fence Variation, they should approve the Fence Variation and adopt the necessary Ordinance.

The Village of Carol Stream, on behalf of the property owner at 349 Shawnee Drive, requests approval of a variation to install a six-foot fence in the rear yard and for fencing to be located approximately 20 feet away from the rear lot line. According to 16-5-8(D)(2)(a) of the UDO, a residential property with a rear lot line adjacent to another residential property can only erect a fence five feet in height. However, Section 16-5-8(D)(l) of the UDO allows a six-foot tall fence along a rear or side yard lot line when it abuts a lot line of a property that is not used for dwelling purposes, and is specifically dedicated for park uses or stormwater detention/retention use, or a combination thereof. The subject property has a distinct topographic hardship because although it is adjacent to another residential property, Klein Creek runs through the rear lot line, making the installation of a six foot tall fence appropriate. Furthermore, the fence must be erected approximately 20 feet away from the rear lot line due to the Creek. Therefore, a variation was requested to allow the fence to be six feet in height and to be installed approximately 20 feet away from the rear lot line instead of along the lot line as otherwise required.

The staff report presenting the request, with supporting documentation, was transmitted to the Village Board with the PC/ZBA packet on June 23, 2023. At its meeting on June 26, 2023, by a vote of 4-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of the Fence Variation.

If the Village Board concurs with the PC/ZBA recommendation regarding the Fence Variation, they should approve the Fence Variation and adopt the necessary Ordinance.

Fee Waiver

PURPOSE

The purpose of this memorandum is to coordinate with the Village Board a request from the Carol Stream Animal Hospital, located at 140 Elk Trail, for approval of a temporary waiver from the requirements of the UDO to allow for the temporary placement of five off-site banners to promote the upcoming Carol Stream Animal Hospital / VetBros Charity Dog Show event at the Ross Ferraro Town Center, in addition to a request to waive permit fees associated with said banners and a large tent at the event. This will be the 4th year that the Animal Hospital is organizing the event in-person, and this event took the place of the Carol Stream Park District's CS Barks event from previous years.

REQUEST

Attached is a letter from Dr. Mondrian Contreras with the Carol Stream Animal Hospital, requesting approval to install temporary banners at five locations between July 18, 2023 and August 6, 2023, to promote the event that will be held at Town Center on Sunday, August 6 from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm. As in years past, the event will include a variety of dog competitions, vendor displays, and food vendors. The submitted aerial photograph illustrates the proposed setup for the event, which will be similar to previous years. In addition, the applicant has also obtained approval from CSC/Wesco at 200 E. Lies Road (near the southeast corner of Gary & Lies) for volunteer and visitor off-site parking.

Sign regulations in the UDO allows entities to install temporary signs advertising special events. These signs, usually banners, may remain in place for up to 30 days, and may not exceed 60 square feet in area. The intent is that these signs are to be installed on the property at which the special event will be held. As indicated in Dr. Contreras' letter, the Carol Stream Animal Hospital wishes to install the five banners off-site at the following Park District properties:

- Barbara O'Rahilly Volunteer Park at 302 N. Kuhn Road
- Veteran's Park at 200 W. Lies Road
- Hampe Park at 297 W. Lies Road
- Red Hawk Park at 651 W. St. Charles Road
- Bark Park at 280 Kuhn Road

To allow for the installation of the five off-site special event banners, a variation from §16-6-6 (A)(2) (Temporary Signs Requiring a Permit) of the UDO is necessary. Although the PC/ZBA would normally review and make a recommendation regarding sign variation requests, the Village Board may grant a temporary waiver to the UDO, in accordance with the provisions of §1-1-17 of the Code of Ordinances, to allow for the installation of the five off-site banners. The banners will be installed for a limited period, and so a permanent variation is not necessary. In addition, the request is similar to requests for previous special events held at Town Center such as Relay for Life, Just Play, CS Barks, and Bud's Run.

The Carol Stream Animal Hospital also requests a waiver of permit fees for the banners and a 20 foot x 40 foot tent that will be installed at Town Center, specifically at the check-in area for the event (see submitted aerial photograph). It should be noted that other small tents (10 feet x 10 feet in size) will be installed in the west field for vendors; however, permits are not required for small "popup" tents.

In making the request for a waiver of the temporary sign and tent permit fees, Dr. Contreras has explained that there is a limited budget to allocate toward costs associated with administering the Charity Dog Show event. Staff estimates that the permit fees would be \$380 (\$130 for the temporary banners and \$250 for the tent). In addition, there is a \$120 fee to request a temporary waiver to the Code of Ordinances. It is not uncommon for the Village Board to waive certain fees, such as raffle license and amplification permit fees, for community organizations or other governmental agencies. However, the waiving of building permit and zoning fees, which are greater in cost and cover the Village's cost of providing services, is only allowed by ordinance for governmental agencies. Exceptions to this practice have been the waiving of building permit fees for events like Relay for Life and Bud's Run, which were also held at Town Center.

Two other points are worth noting. As mentioned, the charity event has taken the place of the annual CS Barks event that the Park District previously held at Town Center. In addition, the event is sponsored by the VetBros Pet Education Charitable Fund, which is a 501c3 organization whose mission is to educate children and young adults about how to best care for pets and to assist with opportunities for becoming veterinarians, animal advocates, and animal healthcare professionals. The Charitable Fund also provides financial assistance towards healthcare for pets in families experiencing various financial hardships, or have been affected by natural disasters (flooding, fire, etc.)

STAFF ANALYSIS

The Village Board has historically approved similar requests for the promotion of other events, such as Just Play, CS Barks, Relay for Life, and previous Charity Dog Show events. In view of the temporary nature of the banners and the need to inform the public about the event, staff supports the temporary waiver to the UDO to allow the off-site banners. In addition, staff can support the request to waive building permit fees for the banners and large tent and the Code of Ordinances waiver fee.

RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends approval of the Carol Stream Animal Hospital's request for a temporary waiver to the UDO to allow for the installation of temporary banners for the Charity Dog Show, and a waiver of fees associated with the banner, large tent, and Code of Ordinances waiver request. If the Village Board concurs with staff's recommendation, they should approve, by motion, a temporary variation from the UDO to allow the five off-site special event banners, and a waiver of fees for the Carol Stream Animal Hospital Charity Dog Show, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the Carol Stream Animal Hospital must obtain a temporary sign permit for the banners and a tent permit prior to the installation of the banners and large tent, and that an inspection of the tent shall occur prior to the event;
- That the five banners will be installed between July 18, 2023 and August 6, 2023 at the Barbara O'Rahilly Volunteer Park, Veteran's Park, Redhawk Park, Hampe Park, and the Bark Park, and removed by August 8, 2023;
- 3. That the banners must be maintained in good condition for the duration of their installation;
- 4. That the banners must be installed and maintained in a manner that does not present visibility obstructions for motorists, and must not be installed within the sight-visibility triangle; and
- 5. That all signage and the tent must comply with all applicable state, county and village codes and requirements.



Carol Stream Police Department Memorandum

RE: Purchase of Impound Lot Storage Containers

As part of the Village of Carol Stream Public Works Yard Improvement Project, the current Police Department impound lot is being relocated from 124 Gerzevske Ln., to the Water Reclamation Center at 245 Kuhn Rd. The new impound area will house seized vehicles and serve as overflow storage for evidence that does not fit or cannot be safely stored in the evidence storage area located within the Municipal Center.

Due to the nature of some of the items which will be stored at the impound lot, secured, weather-tight storage is required to retain the integrity of the property while it awaits its final disposition. During the Yard Improvement Project's planning process, several indoor storage options were discussed. The cost of a free-standing structure was found to be cost-prohibitive, and alternative solutions were sought. Upon review of potential solutions, it was determined that the use of two (2) of customized 8' x 40' storage containers would sufficiently address the storage needs at the new impound lot. These containers would be equipped with 36" x 80" entry doors and 7' x 7' lockable roll-up doors with seals on one end of each container.

Contact was made with a sales representative at Container Sales Group, which is based in Chicago, and has provided other Illinois police departments with storage containers for similar use. Additionally, Container Sales Group was the only local provider of these types of storage containers. Contact also was made with members of some of the referred agencies, and product quality and functionality were confirmed.

On July 11th, 2023, a quote was obtained from Container Sales Group for two customized storage containers as described above, in the amount of \$18,688.00, which includes customization and delivery of the units.

This purchase will be expended to the asset forfeiture fund, therefore creating no budgetary impact.

Customization and delivery is projected to be between six (6) and eight (8) weeks. According to the contractor's schedule for the Yard Improvement Project, completion of the pavement portion of the project will be mid to late August. This would be the ideal time to have the containers delivered and positioned.

Motion to Purchase Large Water Meters and Supplies

The Water and Sewer Division will undertake our annual program of testing large water meters in the coming months to help limit water loss as a result of inaccurate metering. When meters test outside of the American Water Works Association (AWWA) accuracy standards they are scheduled for replacement by staff. Large meters are tested on a schedule of either every two or four years based upon their size (in accordance with AWWA recommendations). In addition, purchase of other large meters may occur when any meters outside of the testing program are found to be faulty and are replaced at Village expense or when a meter is required to accommodate a new business or development (for which there is an offsetting revenue).

Several years ago staff identified the various large meter options and identified the Sensus Omni meter as the most attractive option due to its excellent performance ratings, maintenance history and our own experience. This meter style is compatible with the Village's meter reading equipment and is available for purchase through an authorized sole-source supplier (Core & Main) located in West Chicago. An equipment price sheet form Core & Main is attached which contains current pricing. Also attached is a letter from the manufacturer dated January 3, 2023, identifying Core & Main as the current sole source provider in this area. Purchases of meters will be made throughout the year as needed, and the total amount expended will not exceed the budgeted amount of \$40,000.

It is recommended that the Village Board authorize the purchase of large water meters and supplies from Core & Main in an amount not-to-exceed \$40,000 pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-8-3(B) and subsection 5-8-14(C) of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances.

Recommendation for Purchase of Automated Salt Brine Controls

The FY24 budget includes \$42,000 for the purchase of automated salt brine controls for our existing salt brine maker to provide additional efficiencies to the Village's snow and ice control.

After researching the various manufacturers and having discussions with several vendors, Street Supervisor Pauling identified the Brine Masters SC-100-R best suits our needs. Brine Masters SC-100-R is offered through the Minnesota Department of Administration Cooperative Purchasing Agreement, a joint-purchasing cooperative.

Making brine at the correct concentration is critical to the Village's snow and ice response. The proposed unit will reduce the number of staff needed to make the brine from two employees to one, provide up to the second inventory of how much salt brine remains in the tanks, and allows staff the ability to make brine at precise concentration levels throughout the duration of a snow event through a web application.

It is recommended that the Village Board approve a Motion to purchase the Brine Master SC-100-R (Automated Unit) from Brine Masters under Minnesota Purchasing Agreement Contract No. 222340 in the amount of not to exceed \$32,835.00, pursuant to the provisions of Section 5-8-3(B) and Subsection 5-8-14(L) of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances.

COOPERATIVE PURCHASING AGREEMENT

Under the Authority of Minnesota Statutes § 16C.03, Subdivision 10 and Minnesota Statutes § 471.59, Subdivision 1

This Joint Powers Agreement is between the State of Minnesota, through its commissioner of Administration, Office of State Procurement ("Division") and

VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM ("Authorized Entity").

Pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 16C.03, subd. 10, the Division acquires various supplies, commodities, equipment, and services for state agencies and governmental units (as defined in Minn. Stat. § 471.59, subd. 1) through competitive bidding or requests for proposals. The Division, through Minn. Stat. § 16C.11, and the Authorized Entity wish to combine their purchasing functions, as specifically provided below, so that the Authorized Entity may avail itself of the prices which have been agreed upon by the Division and its vendors.

The parties agree as follows:

- 1. Term. This joint powers agreement will be effective on the date State obtains all required signatures under Minn. Stat. § 16C.05, subd. 2, and remains in effect until canceled by either party upon 30 days' written notice to the other party.
- **2. Services.** The Division will make its contracts for commodities and services, as listed on the State of Minnesota's Contract Index, available to the Authorized Entity.
- 3. Use of Division Contracts. To purchase commodities or services from the Division's contracts, the Authorized Entity must issue a purchase order in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Division's contracts and any requirements applicable to the Authorized Entity's governing body. The Authorized Entity must send purchase orders directly to the applicable vendor and will make payments directly to the vendor in accordance with its established procedures and terms of the Division's contract. The Authorized Entity will not use the goods available under the Division's contracts for the purposes of resale. The Authorized Entity must be the end user of the goods purchased.
- **4.** Liability. The Authorized Entity agrees that neither the Division nor its employees personally assume responsibility or liability for any amounts due or claimed to be due pursuant to any purchase order entered issued by the Authorized Entity. The Authorized Entity will indemnify, save and hold harmless the Division and its employees from any loss, damage or expense, including payment of attorney fees allowable by law, which arise or may arise from the Authorized Entity's use of this joint powers agreement and from any dispute or claim



arising from any transaction between the Authorized Entity and the Division's vendors, whether or not the loss, damage, dispute or claim arises during or after the period of this cooperative agreement. The Division's liability will be governed by the provisions of Minn. Stat. § 3.736.

- 2.14 There must be an option for shed heaters listed on the price page. The heater should be able to heat inside of shed to tempters above 32 degrees when shed is closed.

3.0 Mixing System Requirements

- 3.1 The mixing system must be able to mix up to three separate de-icing chemicals and load into a plow truck.
- 3.2 The mixing system must be able to change ratios of chemicals as the storm progresses. The system must be able to mix two chemicals and a three-chemical blend, being automatically control by the mixing valves.
- 3.3 The system must use stainless steel centrifugal pumps driven by a electric motor correctly sized for the primary pump. The pump must be able to pump enough water for the system when operating at full capacity.

- 4.5 Tank must have a closed, non-removable top with a manway.
- 4.6 Contract Vendor must provide up to (3) three fittings, sized up to 3" N.P.T. in the tank, with the locations designated by the ordering entity.
- 4.7 Tank must have a means of reading both liquid and containment tank levels.
- 4.8 Tank must provide a method for moving from one location to another.
- 4.9 Tank must have a top vent with screen.
- 4.10 Holding pond equipment is not acceptable.
- 4.11 The vendor can offer single wall tanks but must list them in section 4.5.0 and state they are single wall tanks.

5.0 ADDITIONAL ELECTRICAL SERVICE REQUIREMENTS for ABOVE EQUIPMENT

- 5.1 All electrical service must be protected from hazardous shock by a 115-volt, GFI receptacle with trip and reset and be enclosed in a waterproof outdoor service enclosure.
- 5.2 Electrical connection is made by connecting the power service cord/wiring on the equipment to the customer supplied electrical service.
- 5.3 All units must be flow tested to specification with a purchaser's representative present before the purchase will be considered complete.
- 5.4 System installation and setup charge if applicable, must include all hoses, fittings, couplers, adaptors, electrical connectors and installation of all equipment or components at each installation sight.

Charging Level, DC. The charging station bypasses a vehicle's on-board charger to directly deliver electricity to the vehicle's high voltage battery. Voltage is equal to, or greater than four hundred eighty (480) volts.

Charging Station, Primary. An electric fueling station with equipment that supplies electric power for charging plug-in electric vehicles.

§ 16-4-15 ACCESSORY BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES, GENERAL.

- (F) Residential Rainwater Collection Systems.
 - (1) No more than four residential rainwater collection system storage devices shall be allowed on a single-unit residential lot.
 - (2) Rainwater collection systems that are four feet in height or less, or have a capacity of up to 55 gallons, may be located in all yards. Rainwater collection systems taller than four feet in height, or with a capacity of more than 55 gallons, must be located in the rear yard. Any structures and materials used for mounting and connecting the rainwater collection system shall be as unobtrusive as possible.
 - (3) Rainwater collection systems must be maintained in good working order, and must be removed if they are no longer in use.
- (G) Accessory Buildings and Structures in Business and Industrial Districts. Site Plan Review shall be required prior to the installation of an accessory building or structure in the Business and Industrial zoning districts, and shall be subject to all applicable codes and ordinances and the following provisions:
- (1) Quality materials. Exterior building materials shall complement the architecture of the primary structure, and be traditional, time- and weather-tested materials and techniques such as but not limited to masonry, stone veneer systems, stucco, precast panels with inlaid or stamped brick texture, or comparable material.
- (2) Accessory buildings and structures shall include landscape located at the building foundation as required by § 16-5-6 of the UDO.
- (3) Accessory buildings and structures shall not be located in required parking or storage spaces.

§ 16-4-18 OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES AND OPERATIONS, PERMANENT, AND OUTDOOR VEHICLE STORAGE IN THE INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT.

- (B) Screening of outdoor activities and operations in the B-1, B-2, B-3, and O-S Districts.
 - (1) Outdoor activities and operations shall not be visible from:
 - (a) Any public right-of-way; or
 - (b) Any residential property.
- (2) The following minimum screening requirements shall apply to outdoor activities and adjacent to or visible from areas identified in $\S 16-4-18(B)(1)$:
- (a) A solid wall or fence not less than six feet and not more than eight feet in height along all property frontages identified in § 16-4-18(B)(1).

(b) A landscape strip not less than five feet wide located in front of the wall or fence. The required landscape materials shall conform to all requirements for transition area landscape found in § 16-5-56.

(3) The following minimum screening requirements shall apply to outdoor activities

and operations not adjacent to or visible from areas identified in § 16-4-18(B)(1).

(a) A fence, which conforms to all fence material requirements detail in § 16-5-98 and is not less than six and not more than eight feet in height.

(b) A landscape strip not less than five feet wide located in front of the masonry wall. The required landscape materials shall conform to all requirements for transition area landscape found in § 16-5-6.

§ 16-4-29 ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations shall meet the following provisions:

(A) Parking Regulations.

1. Parking spaces devoted to the charging of electric vehicles shall count toward the minimum number of required off-street parking spaces.

2. Electric vehicle charging station spaces may only be used for parking and

charging electric or hybrid vehicles.

3. Electric vehicle charging station spaces shall be identified with signage indicating the intended use of the parking space.

(B) Signage and Advertising.

1. Advertising shall not be allowed on an electric vehicle charging station.

(C) Other Provisions.

1. Protection: Barrier curbing, steel bollards, or other adequate protection shall be used to protect charging station equipment.

2. Accessibility: Charging station equipment shall be located so as not to interfere with accessibility requirements of the Illinois accessibility code and

other applicable accessibility standards.

3. Maintenance: Charging station equipment, bollards, and parking stalls shall be maintained by the property owner. Charging stations no longer in use shall be immediately removed.

4. Location: Charging equipment is encouraged near landscaped areas.

5. Usage fees: Owners of charging equipment shall not be prohibited from collecting a fee for the use of a charging station. Fees shall be displayed on the charging station.

SECTION 4: That Chapter 16, Article 5, Sections 6 and 10 of the Carol Stream Unified Development Ordinance are hereby amended as follows:

§ 16-5-6 LANDSCAPE.

(F) Installation and maintenance of landscape areas.

(1) Immediately upon planting, all landscape shall conform to the American Standard for Nurserymen, published by the American Association of Nurserymen, Inc., as revised from time to time.

(2) A guaranty, in the form of a letter of credit or performance bond, approved by the Village Attorney and the Community Development Director, or a cash deposit made with the Village Treasurer for 20% of the total cost estimate of landscaping for the

construction in January 1 dollars for the current year, shall be provided by the applicant for all required landscape improvements. Such guaranty shall be executed before building permits are issued. The 20% landscaping deposit will be held in escrow for a period of 18 months past the time of planting and will be refunded on approval of the village, unless extended by the village per § 16-8-4(N)(O)(10)(c).

- (3) Dead plant materials shall be replaced within 60 days upon notification from the village, taking into consideration the season of the year, and shall be of the same quantity and quality as initially approved. If the particular project is constructed in more than one phase, the 60-day timeframe shall apply to each individual phase.
- (4) All landscape areas shall be maintained in a healthy and weed-free condition. The ground surface of landscape areas shall be covered with regularly maintained turf or other types of pervious groundcover or mulch.
- (5) Any required landscaped area, greater than 150 square feet in area, shall be provided with an underground irrigation system or be provided with a portable water supply within 50 feet of said landscaped areas, unless otherwise approved by the Engineering Services Director to accommodate native grasses. No part of an irrigation system may be installed in village right-of-way.

- (1) No more than four residential rainwater collection system storage devices shall be allowed on a single-unit residential lot.
- (2) Rainwater collection systems that are four feet in height or less, or have a capacity of up to 55 gallons, may be located in all yards. Rainwater collection systems taller than four feet in height, or with a capacity of more than 55 gallons, must be located in the rear yard. Any structures and materials used for mounting and connecting the rainwater collection system shall be as unobtrusive as possible.
- (3) Rainwater collection systems must be maintained in good working order, and must be removed if they are no longer in use.
- (G) Accessory Buildings and Structures in Business and Industrial Districts. Site Plan Review shall be required prior to the installation of an accessory building or structure in the Business and Industrial zoning districts, and shall be subject to all applicable codes and ordinances and the following provisions:
- (1) Quality materials. Exterior building materials shall complement the architecture of the primary structure, and be traditional, time- and weather-tested materials and techniques such as but not limited to masonry, stone veneer systems, stucco, precast panels with inlaid or stamped brick texture, or comparable material.
- (2) Accessory buildings and structures shall include landscape located at the building foundation as required by § 16-5-6 of the UDO.
- (3) Accessory buildings and structures shall not be located in required parking or storage spaces.

§ 16-4-18 OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES AND OPERATIONS, PERMANENT, AND OUTDOOR VEHICLE STORAGE IN THE INDUSTRIAL DISTRICT.

- (B) Screening of outdoor activities and operations in the B-1, B-2, B-3, and O-S Districts.
 - (1) Outdoor activities and operations shall not be visible from:
 - (a) Any public right-of-way; or
 - (b) Any residential property.
- (2) The following minimum screening requirements shall apply to outdoor activities and adjacent to or visible from areas identified in § 16-4-18(B)(1):
- (a) A solid wall or fence not less than six feet and not more than eight feet in height along all property frontages identified in § 16-4-18(B)(1).

- (b) A landscape strip not less than five feet wide located in front of the wall or fence. The required landscape materials shall conform to all requirements for transition area landscape found in § 16-5-56.
- (3) The following minimum screening requirements shall apply to outdoor activities and operations not adjacent to or visible from areas identified in § 16-4-18(B)(1).
- (a) A fence, which conforms to all fence material requirements detail in § 16-5-98 and is not less than six and not more than eight feet in height.
- (b) A landscape strip not less than five feet wide located in front of the masonry wall. The required landscape materials shall conform to all requirements for transition area landscape found in § 16-5-6.

§ 16-4-29 ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

Electric Vehicle Charging Stations shall meet the following provisions:

- (A) Parking Regulations.
 - 1. Parking spaces devoted to the charging of electric vehicles shall count toward the minimum number of required off-street parking spaces.
 - 2. Electric vehicle charging station spaces may only be used for parking and charging electric or hybrid vehicles.
 - 3. Electric vehicle charging station spaces shall be identified with signage indicating the intended use of the parking space.
- (B) Signage and Advertising.
 - 1. Advertising shall not be allowed on an electric vehicle charging station.
- (C) Other Provisions.
 - 1. Protection: Barrier curbing, steel bollards, or other adequate protection shall be used to protect charging station equipment.
 - 2. Accessibility: Charging station equipment shall be located so as not to interfere with accessibility requirements of the Illinois accessibility code and other applicable accessibility standards.
 - 3. Maintenance: Charging station equipment, bollards, and parking stalls shall be maintained by the property owner. Charging stations no longer in use shall be immediately removed.
 - 4. Location: Charging equipment is encouraged near landscaped areas.
 - 5. Usage fees: Owners of charging equipment shall not be prohibited from collecting a fee for the use of a charging station. Fees shall be displayed on the charging station.

SECTION 4: That Chapter 16, Article 5, Sections 6 and 10 of the Carol Stream Unified Development Ordinance are hereby amended as follows:

§ 16-5-6 LANDSCAPE.

- (F) Installation and maintenance of landscape areas.
- (1) Immediately upon planting, all landscape shall conform to the American Standard for Nurserymen, published by the American Association of Nurserymen, Inc., as revised from time to time.
- (2) A guaranty, in the form of a letter of credit or performance bond, approved by the Village Attorney and the Community Development Director, or a cash deposit made with the Village Treasurer for 20% of the total cost estimate of landscaping for the

construction in January 1 dollars for the current year, shall be provided by the applicant for all required landscape improvements. Such guaranty shall be executed before building permits are issued. The 20% landscaping deposit will be held in escrow for a period of 18 months past the time of planting and will be refunded on approval of the village, unless extended by the village per § 16-8-4(N)(O)(10)(c).

- (3) Dead plant materials shall be replaced within 60 days upon notification from the village, taking into consideration the season of the year, and shall be of the same quantity and quality as initially approved. If the particular project is constructed in more than one phase, the 60-day timeframe shall apply to each individual phase.
- (4) All landscape areas shall be maintained in a healthy and weed-free condition. The ground surface of landscape areas shall be covered with regularly maintained turf or other types of pervious groundcover or mulch.
- (5) Any required landscaped area, greater than 150 square feet in area, shall be provided with an underground irrigation system or be provided with a portable water supply within 50 feet of said landscaped areas, unless otherwise approved by the Engineering Services Director to accommodate native grasses. No part of an irrigation system may be installed in village right-of-way.

Proposed Changes to Village Code Chapter 10 - Business

Licensing and Registration

Presently, the annual business registration process is administered through a staff-developed Microsoft Access database that has been in use for 25 years or more. While this has been effective, the process is inefficient considering current technology, relying on printing and mailing of paper applications for each calendar year renewal.

Finance Department and Information Technology staff are currently designing enhancements to this program in an effort to provide a primarily on-line solution, utilizing the same technology that was used by Community Development to offer an on-line building permit product in 2022. Our objective is to have this solution ready for the calendar 2024 registration cycle.

This process encompasses the following registrations and licenses within Chapter 10 (Business Licensing and Regulation) of the Village Code of Ordinances:

Annual Business Registration (Article 1)
Amusements (Article 2)
Vending Machine Licenses (Article 8)
Tobacco Products (Article 9)

As we work to design the new application process, we conducted a review of current Village Code sections and are making several recommended changes that will facilitate a streamlined process and update certain sections that haven't seen changes in many years.

I have attached a red-lined version of suggested Code updates which are summarized below:

Article 1 - Administration

§10-1-3(B) Applications: We are recommending to discontinue collection of residential (home) addresses of applicants. Over the years, we have not found this information necessary or useful in establishing contact with various owners, partners or officers. Given this language pre-dates FOIA laws (as well as email), this is the type of information that would typically be redacted from a FOIA request. If we don't need it, or collect it, we don't need to safeguard it or redact it.

§10-1-3(C)(5) Applications: Delete submittal of application for industrial pre-treatment. Administration of this program is already governed in Chapter 13 (Water and Sewer Regulations) and is separately administered by the Public Works Department. The pre-treatment program does not coincide with the business registration cycle in terms of timing (pre-treatment is fiscal year, while business registration is calendar year).

§10-1-19 Fee Schedule: Although the fee schedule for various license types has not been adjusted in many years, staff is not presently recommending general fee increases. Our focus at present is to make a few consolidations to simplify the design of the application under development.

§ 10-1-19(A)(1) Owner of Game Room. We are proposing to collapse the current 3 class tier for game room owners, and increase the current base fee from \$100 to \$200 per year. You will note later that we are proposing in Section 10-2-1 that the minimum number of amusement devices that meet the definition of a "game room" be increased from 2 to 6, thus the fee increase is more in line with a larger number of licensed amusement devices. Note that these provisions do not include video gaming (gambling) terminals which are covered by Article 14.

§ 10-1-19(B) Bankers and Brokers, Other than Insurance and Real Estate. We are proposing to eliminate the license fee for bankers and brokers. It is unusual to find this unique licensing category listed under "Amusements" section of the fee schedule. Further research indicates that the Village Code in 1965 established license fees for a number of specific business categories, including auto dealers, bankers/brokers, blacksmith shops, drug stores, laundromats, and undertakers to name a few.

Provisions and fees related to these specific classifications have long since been repealed from the code, thus it does not make sense that there is still a bank/broker fee in the fee schedule.

§ 10-1-19 Going Out of Business Sale. Similar to bankers and brokers above, we found text in the 1981 Code of Ordinances regulating going out of business sales. This language has also been repealed decades ago, however the fee schedule appears to have not been updated.

<u>Article 2 – Amusements</u>

§ 10-2-1 Definitions. Staff is recommending amending the code's definition of "Game Room" to increase the minimum number of amusement devices from 2 to 6.

There are significant additional registration and licensing requirements within Article 2 related to game room owners and operators. The current level of 2 devices under current code, would require a minimum annual fee of \$285 (\$175 game room owner + 2@\$55 amusement tax) with a possible additional \$375 investigation fee for a game room operator. With this fee structure, it would be speculative whether there would be any economic benefit to the owner/operator for placement of these devices.

This change would continue to require the added licensing requirements (and fees) to larger businesses that are more heavily invested in amusement devices and where their use are more than incidental to the primary business purpose. Much of this code language was likely designed to handle a large operators similar to Gala Lanes/Galaxy World which closed many years ago. With these changes, the code remains well suited to continue to regulate possible future larger operators.

Article 8 - Vending Machines

§ 10-8-3 Application. Staff is recommending eliminating the product to be sold from each vending machine application. With the vast majority of all vending machines dispensing beverages or snack/food items, there is little if any value in capturing this data and would unnecessarily lengthen the on-line application process.

Article 1: ADMINISTRATION

§ 10-1-1 LICENSE REQUIRED; SUBJECTS OF LICENSING AUTHORITY.

- (A) No person, firm or corporation shall conduct, engage in, maintain, operate, carry on or manage any business, occupation, activity or establishment, either by himself, herself or itself, or through an agent, employee or partner, for which a license is required by this code or by any village ordinance, without first having obtained a license for such business, occupation, activity or establishment.
- (B) Whenever a license or permit is required for the maintenance, operation or conduct of any business or establishment, or for doing business or engaging in any activity or occupation, any person, firm or corporation shall have violated the requirements of this code, if, by himself, herself or itself, or through an agent, employee or partner, he, she or it is held forth as being engaged in the business, activity or occupation, or if he, she or it solicits patronage therefor, actively or passively, or if he, she or it performs or attempts to perform any part of such business, activity or occupation in the village.

§ 10-1-2 REGISTRATION OF BUSINESSES REQUIRED.

- (A) All businesses operating within the village, for which a business license is not specifically required by this code, shall register with the Village Clerk, upon forms provided for that purpose. For the protection of the health, welfare and safety of the community, registration of businesses is hereby required in order to assist the village in determining the name of the owner and/or operator of such business, the address of the person in charge of conducting such business, the type of business being conducted and whether the business is in compliance with the Zoning Code and other ordinances of the village and state statutes.
- (B) Such information is required by the village for a number of reasons, including the ability to give notice in the case of emergencies, planning Fire Department strategies and planning periodic inspections.
- (C) For the clerical cost of maintaining a list of businesses within the village, a nominal fee, as required in the fee schedule at § 10-1-19, shall be charged to the applicant at the time of registration.

§ 10-1-3 APPLICATIONS.

- (A) Applications for all licenses, permits and registrations shall be made to the Village Clerk in writing on a form provided for that purpose, except as otherwise provided.
- (B) If the applicant is an individual (sole proprietorship), the application shall contain his or her name, residence address and residential telephone number. If the applicant is a partnership or other non-corporate business entity, the application shall contain the name.

AUTOMATIC AMUSEMENT MACHINE. Any mechanical amusement machine or device, the operation of which is governed or controlled by the deposit of a coin or token, including, without being limited to, any such coin controlled instrument or device capable of producing any vocal or instrumental sounds, including jukeboxes, and any coin-operated mechanical or electronic machine or similar types of machines which are intended for and generally used by children and referred to as a "children's ride".

GAME ROOM. Any business establishment having two six or more amusement devices, whether or not operated as a principal use.

OPERATOR. Any person or entity which leases or operates a business establishment which is or has contained within it a game room, or any other amusement.

OWNER. Any person or entity who owns a building or a portion of a building which is utilized for a game room, or which houses an amusement.

YOUTH LOCK IN. Any event hosted by a game room operator after 11:00 p.m. for the sole benefit of youths under 21 years of age.

§ 10-8-2 LICENSE REQUIRED.

No person, firm or corporation who owns, leases or has a possessive interest in any premises within the village shall install, keep, maintain, use or permit the maintenance or use upon such premises of any vending machine, as defined above, unless the same shall have been first licensed under the provisions of this article; and no owner of any vending machine, as described above, shall install same on any premises located within the village without first obtaining a license therefor pursuant to the provisions of this article.

§ 10-8-3 APPLICATION.

Application for such license shall be made in conformity with the general requirements of this chapter relating to applications and licenses. Such application shall include the following information: the name and address of owner of the premises upon which the machine is to be located for use, the owner or lessee of the machine, the product to be sold or distributed by the machine and a correct description of the premises upon which the machine will be used.

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AN ORDINANCE AMENDING VARIOUS SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 10 OF THE CAROL STREAM CODE OF ORDINANCES PERTAINING TO BUSINESS LICENSING AND REGULATION

WHEREAS, Chapter 10 of the Village of Carol Stream Code of Ordinances provides regulations with respect to local business registration and various permits and licenses; and

WHEREAS, Village staff have undertaken a review of current business registration and licensing regulations in an effort to design and implement program enhancements that streamline and enhance the compliance process for our local businesses; and

WHEREAS, the Village of Carol Stream is a home rule unit under subsection (a) of Section 6 of Article VII of the Illinois Constitution of 1970; and

WHEREAS, as provided in said Section, a home rule unit may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs for the protection of the public health, safety, morals and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Trustees find that the amendment of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances is in the best interests of the Village in approving business regulations which protect the health, welfare and safety of its residents while also promoting a vibrant local business community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, as follows:

SECTION 1: The above referenced recitals are hereby incorporated into this Ordinance by reference.

SECTION 2: The Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, Chapter 10, "Business Licensing and Regulation", Article 1, "Administration", Sections 10-1-3 and 10-1-19, Article 2, "Amusements", Section 10-2-1, and Article 8, "Vending Machines", Section 10-8-3 are hereby amended to read as follows:

§10-1-3 APPLICATIONS.

- (A) Applications for all licenses, permits and registrations shall be made to the Village Clerk in writing on a form provided for that purpose, except as otherwise provided.
- (B) If the applicant is an individual (sole proprietorship), the application shall contain his or her name, address and telephone number. If the applicant is a partnership or other non-corporate business entity, the application shall contain the name, address and telephone number of the principal partner or member thereof. If the applicant is a corporation, the application shall contain the name, address and telephone number of the principal officer and the registered agent thereof.
 - (C) Each application shall also contain:
 - (1) A designation of the type or kind of license or permit desired;
 - (2) The location or proposed location of the place of business, occupation or activity;

- (3) The applicable fee to be paid as provided in § 10-1-19;
- (4) The number of the certificate of registration required under the Retailer's Occupation Tax Act, being 35 ILCS 120/1 et seq., Service Occupation Tax Act, being 35 ILCS 15/1 et seq. and/or Use Tax Act, being 35 ILCS 105/1 et seq., if applicable;
- (5) Such additional information as may be needed for the proper guidance of village officials in the evaluation of such application, including proof of any insurance policy or bond required by this code.

Proposed Amendment to § 13-2-37 of the Village Code - Sewer Line

Maintenance/Replacement

Staff had been asked to develop a Code amendment to address sanitary sewer service line repairs that occur under the roadway in the Village public right of way. This was made somewhat difficult inasmuch as municipalities are prohibited from using public funds for principally private purposes. Subsequent to many staff meetings to discuss this issue, review of other municipal codes and discussions with the petitioner who had requested Village Board review of this Code provision, attached is the draft amendment to the Village Code, Section § 13-2-37 SEWER LINE MAINTENANCE/REPLACEMENT for your review and comment.

This amendment was drafted to provide some relief to property owners who experience breaks in their private sanitary sewer service lines that occur under the Village roadway in consideration of some public benefit that otherwise would not occur if the repair were not made.

The grant, should the Village Board choose to provide this relief, would reimburse residents 50% of repair or replacement costs of their service lines falling under the Village roadway up to \$10,000 under conditions specified in the proposed Code amendment (attached) and later in a grant application.

Several points to consider:

- The program would only be available prospectively (not for prior service line repairs) and subject to a determination that the roadway surface could be compromised if the repair was not made. This does not appear to be the case for the service line at 463 Thunderbird Trail as the offset does not appear to be obstructing the flow nor is it undermining the roadway surface.
- The property owner would be responsible for televising and recording the exact location of the service line issue to enable Village staff to determine whether the flow blockage is a maintenance or a repair issue and whether it is under the Village roadway or on private property.
- The Code, as amended would provide relief to all property owners experiencing service line breaks under the roadway (the current Code language also applies to all property owners). The Village Board would need to determine if this provision should apply to all property owners, including businesses or just residential property owners.

• The maximum proposed grant amount is \$10,000 subject to the Village Board's review. For comparison, the City of Wheaton provides a maximum reimbursement of 65% up to a maximum of \$13,000 to homeowners; the Village of Glen Ellyn provides cost sharing of 50% to property owners; the City of Elmhurst provides for a one-time reimbursement to homeowners of 50% of their costs for private sanitary sewer line repairs within the City right-of-way (not to exceed \$2,000). Note that Wheaton & Glen Ellyn justify reimbursement based on the occurrence of Infiltration and Inflow (I&I) issues in those older communities rather than on the rare occurrence of roadway damage from broken sanitary sewer service lines.

Staff does not recommend that the Village perform work on the property owner's private service line. Residents who need to repair their service lines under the Village roadway would need to obtain a permit and secure quotes from a licensed plumber or sewer contractor before performing any work. The Village could assemble a list of qualified, licensed contractors for property owner consideration but not endorsement by the Village. If the Village or its contractor were to perform the work, we would be required to invoice the property owner for any amount over the relief amount and pursue possible collection should the property owner not pay the Village invoice.

It is recommended that the property owner be responsible for securing the permit and contracting the work, who would then submit a copy of the paid contractor invoice to the Village for reimbursement of 50% of the cost up to the maximum reimbursement of \$10,000, eliminating the need to invoice the applicant, go to collection for unpaid balances and avoiding us having to perform work on private service lines. The proposed amendment (addition of section (F)) is attached to this memo.

Subject to any comments from the Village Board, an ordinance amending the Village Code could be placed on the August 7, 2023 Village Board agenda.

§ 13-2-37 SEWER LINE MAINTENANCE/ REPLACEMENT.

- (A) The property owner is responsible for the maintenance and repair of the private sewer line from their structure to the main sewer or public sewer including the connection into the main/public sewer.
- (B) In the event the property owner finds it necessary to excavate the private sewer line for maintenance or replacement, such excavation shall be the property owner's responsibility.
- (C) In those instances when property owners have had to excavate and as a result the sidewalk, curb and street have been dug out or damaged, the property owner will be responsible for the restoration of the street (surface and sub-surface) curb and sidewalk.
- (D) In those instances where division (C) of this section is involved, it is recommended tunneling under the curb and sidewalk whenever practical. Sidewalk and curb must be cut when removal is required.
- (E) All work, as it is related to the replacement and/or repair of the private sewer line, shall be in conformance with the village standard construction specifications and will be inspected by a duly authorized agent of the village during the repair and replacement.
- (F) The Village will participate in the repair or replacement of a private sanitary sewer service line located under the paved roadway within the Village's right-of-way subject to the following:
 - 1. The sanitary sewer service line has been televised by the property owner and based on the evidence provided to the Village, to include video and evidence of location of the potential issue, the Village Engineer and Public Works Director have determined the sewer service line under the paved roadway presents the potential to damage the Village's paved roadway or the Village's sewer main if uncorrected; and
 - 2. The only method of repair or replacement of the sanitary sewer service line requires excavation of the Village's paved roadway.
 - 3. The Village will reimburse the property owner fifty-percent (50%) of the costs toward the repair or replacement of the private sanitary sewer line under the Village paved roadway and pavement repair in an amount not to exceed \$10,000. The applicant will be responsible for all additional costs associated with the sanitary sewer service line repair or replacement in excess of these amounts.
 - 4. The applicant will indemnify, hold and release the Village from any and all liability arising from the repair of the sanitary sewer service line by the Village.
 - 5. Repair or replacement of any private sanitary sewer line outside of a Village paved roadway will be not be eligible for reimbursement and shall remain the responsibility of the homeowner pursuant to subsections (A) through (E) of this section.
 - 6. In all cases, maintenance of the entire private sanitary sewer service line shall remain the responsibility of the property owner, including but is not limited to flushing to clear blockages and root cutting in the property owner's service line.
