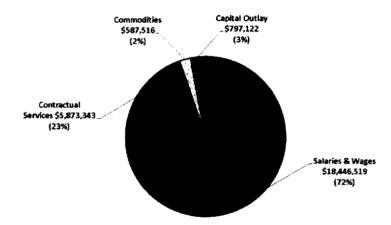

Proposed General Corporate Fund Expenditures by Type Fiscal Year 16/17 Beginning May 1, 2016

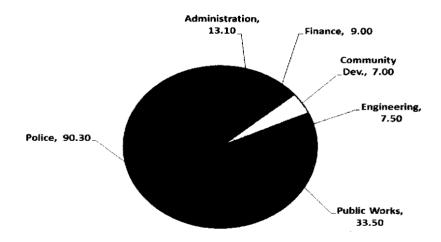

Proposed Regular Employee Staffing By Department Fiscal Year 16/17 Beginning May 1, 2016



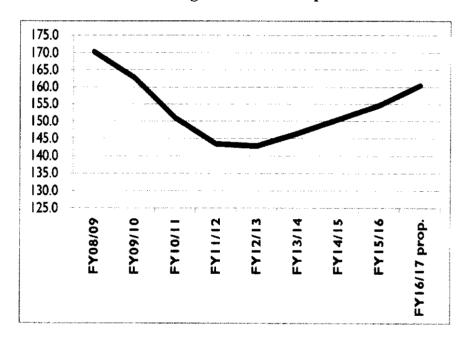

Mr. Farace states Dunkin Donuts is currently a tenant in the Shopping Plaza on the west end and wishes to move to the east end to accommodate the drive thru window lane and by-pass lane, explains the parking reduction and the work to be done on the retaining wall, curb area in the rear of the building to allow for the by-pass lane, states the existing flow of the traffic in the rear of the building currently flows from west to east and will remain the same traffic flow. Mr. Farace states the issues with property maintenance and states the dumpster enclosure gates were left open on several occasions during site visits and staff has noted they should be closed excluding employee usage or trash pick-up. The parking lot has a few pot holes in front of the current business space on the west side of the center and they should be taken care of when the weather improves. There is a parking lot light inoperable on the southeast corner of the plaza as well as on the southeast corner of the building that should be repaired by the property owner. Explains the signage and states the signage will be in compliance with the current sign code. Staff recommends approval of the Special Use and the Amendment to the approved special Use PUD with staff recommendations.

Dunkin' Donuts is currently located in the westernmost tenant space of the plaza, and will relocate to the easternmost tenant space in order to provide a drive-through lane around the south and east sides of the building. A bypass lane is also proposed around the building, which will require the reconfiguration and expansion of the rear drive aisle at the southeast corner of the property. To accommodate the drive-through and bypass lanes, five parallel parking spaces will be eliminated on the south and east sides of the property. Staff believes the remaining 53 on-site parking spaces will accommodate parking demands based on recorded observations at the plaza and parking/drive-through utilization information provided by the applicant.

The staff report presenting the requests, with supporting documentation, was transmitted to the Village Board with the Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals (PC/ZBA) packet on February 19, 2016. At its meeting on February 22, 2016, by a vote of 6-0, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and an Amendment to a Special Use Permit for a PUD. The PC/ZBA recommendations were subject to the conditions in the February 22, 2016, staff report.

Following the PC/ZBA hearing, the operator of the chiropractic office in the plaza contacted staff with concerns about the impact of the drive-through on traffic flow and safety. It is staff's opinion that the design of the drive-through lane and existing configuration of the front parking lot provide adequate space for safe traffic flow and vehicle maneuvering. Staff attempted to address his concerns, but it is unknown if he will attend the Village Board meeting to state his concerns.

If the Village Board concurs with the PC/ZBA recommendation, they should approve the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and an Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a PUD, subject to the conditions contained within the Ordinance, and adopt the necessary Ordinance.

PC/ZBA Case 16013, Village of Carol Stream, Official 2016 Zoning Map

As required by state statute, the Village must publish a current zoning map by March 31 of each year. Staff has prepared the draft Village of Carol Stream Official Zoning Map for 2016, which includes the Village Board's approval of one annexation and one special use for planned unit development/rezoning. The map was also modified to clearly delineate properties near the intersection of Schmale and Geneva Roads that are unincorporated versus in the City of Wheaton, and boundaries of surrounding municipalities now have a darker outline for better demarcation. Additional detail regarding the changes authorized by the Village Board during 2015 for the 2016 Zoning Map is provided below.

- 1. Special Use for a Planned Unit Development for 170-200 W. North Avenue Bluestone Single Tenant Properties, LLC (Pilot Travel Plaza) was approved for a special use for a Planned Unit Development to develop an automobile and commercial vehicle fueling plaza and future retail outlot (PINs will be assigned when the Subdivision Plat is finalized and recorded).
- 2. Annexation and Zoning for 27W031 North Avenue The Wayne Township governmental office property was annexed to the Village of Carol Stream, and upon annexation, was rezoned to R-1 One-Family Residence District. In addition, the North Avenue Corridor boundary was extended west to include the subject property (PIN 01-36-403-008 and 02-31-301-001).

The staff report and draft zoning map were transmitted to the Village Board with the Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals (PC/ZBA) packet on February 19, 2016. At their February 22, 2016, meeting, the PC/ZBA recommended approval of the Official 2016 Zoning Map by a vote of 6-0.

If the Village Board concurs with the PC/ZBA recommendation, they should approve the Official 2016 Zoning Map and adopt the necessary Resolution.

Waiver of Bidding & Award of Contract - Farmhouse Exterior Renovation

This project to replace existing siding, soffit, fascia, windows and pediments was previously formally bid with one qualified bidder responding to the published Notice to Bid. The Village Board rejected all bids and directed staff to negotiate a contract for the exterior renovation of the farmhouse at its Board meeting on February 16, 2016.

The renovation project includes the following work:

- Siding & Insulation Replace existing wood siding with maintenance free vinyl siding to match as closely as possible the existing wood clapboard siding including insulation.
- Soffit & Fascia Replace existing wood soffit & fascia with maintenance free aluminum.
- Windows Replace existing single pane, wood windows with energy efficient multi-pane vinyl windows.
- Window Pediments & Trim Replace existing, exterior wood pediments and trim
 with polyurethane pediments over windows to match existing wood as closely as
 possible.

Staff met with DuPree Construction Co., the only previous qualified bidder from the bid opening on February 16, to negotiate a contract for the work specified above and to further refine products to be used to maintain the historic look of the house. References for DuPree Construction Co. stated the work that they performed was very good with no change orders except those requested by the owner. References included home and barn renovation work (windows, siding, trim) for Fermi Labs, the Forest Preserve of Cook County - Camp Sullivan Barn among others. Based on references and before and after pictures of projects done by DuPree their work appears to be of high quality.

Staff recommends waiving the formal bidding process and awarding the contract for exterior renovation of the farmhouse located at 301 W. Lies Road to DuPree Construction Co. in the amount of \$58,637.80. There are sufficient funds in the Municipal Buildings budget to pay for this expense.

1. **DESCRIPTION OF WORK**

The contractor shall furnish all materials and perform all of the work on the property located at 301 W. Lies Rd. Carol Stream Illinois for the contract and terms noted below. The Contractor will install new P-14 fan fold insulation, Tyvek house wrap, vinyl siding, soffit and crown molding, bead board ceiling on front porch along with replacement windows with window pediments and replacement of all rotted wood and clapboard where needed.

2. SPECIFICATIONS OF WORK

A. WOOD REPLACEMENT:

Removal of all deteriorated and bad wood and replaced with new wood as needed.

B. HOUSE WRAP:

Install Tyvek© or Typar© or equivalent. Wrap to be installed over clapboard. Apply 2" Tyvek tape to all seams, windows, doors and penetrations.

C. INSULATION:

Install P-14 fan fold foam insulation to be placed over wrap.

D. SIDING:

Install siding to be of .044-gauge off white vinyl. Includes all necessary color coordinated aluminum flashing, standard vinyl accessories, 4" vinyl outside corner posts, and a standard color.

E. VINYL SOFFIT:

Install aluminum soffit, same gauge as siding to cover all eaves and overhangs, to be vented every 5 feet (5').

G. BEAD BOARD CEILING:

and #MDL612-12 side trim to windows what previously had them. Apply a color coordinated sealant as needed for weather tight seal. All windows shall have a lifetime frame and glass warranty. All Fypon products to be painted. 31 windows shall be double-hung with upgraded exterior window color and 7 basement hopper windows.

I. WRAPPING:

Manufacture and install aluminum wrapping to 3 entry doors, front bumpout window and frieze trim. Aluminum wrapping to be installed to the lower section of the front bumpout window shall best replicate its current appearance.

3. SPECIFICATIONS GENERAL

3.0 Owner occupancy

- A. The owner will occupy the site periodically for the purposes of conducting meetings. No work shall be scheduled for Saturday April 16 or Sunday April 17, 2016.
- B. The Contractor shall cooperate with owner to minimize conflict and to facilitate owner's operations.
- C. The Contractor shall schedule the work to accommodate any owner occupancy.

3.1 Care and protection of property

1. Contract Security

The Contractor shall furnish a Performance and Payment bond in an amount at least equal to 100 percent of the aggregate amount of the Contract as security for the faithful performance of the Contract and for the payment of all persons performing labor and furnishing materials in connection with this Contract.

2. Contractor's Insurance

Contractor shall procure and maintain, for the duration of the Contract, insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property, which may arise from or in connection with the performance of the work hereunder by the Contractor, his agents, representatives, employees or subcontractors.

- A. Minimum Scope of Insurance: Coverage shall be at least as broad as:

- 2. Business Automobile Liability: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per accident for bodily injury and property damage.
- 3. Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability: Workers' Compensation coverage with statutory limits and Employers' Liability limits of \$500,000 per accident.
- 4. Environmental Impairment/Pollution Liability: \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, property damage and remediation costs

C. Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions

Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the Village. At the option of the Village, either: the insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductibles or self-insured retentions as it respects the Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers; or the Contractor shall procure a bond guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigation, claim administration and defense expenses.

D. Other Insurance Provisions

The policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

1. General Liability and Automobile Liability Coverages:

The Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers are to be covered as insureds as respects: liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Contractor; products and completed operations of the Contractor; premises owned, leased or used by the Contractor; or automobiles owned, leased, hired or borrowed by the Contractor. The coverage shall contain no special limitations on the scope of protection afforded to the Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers.

- 2. The Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary as respects the Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers shall be excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 3. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Village, its officials, agents, employees and volunteers.
- 4. The Contractor's insurance shall contain a Severability of Interests/Cross Liability clause or language stating that Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 5. If any commercial general liability insurance is being provided under an excess or umbrella liability policy that does not "follow form," then the Contractor shall be required to name the Village, its officials, employees, agents and volunteers as additional insureds
- 6. All general liability coverages shall be provided on an occurrence policy form. Claims-made general liability policies will not be accepted.
- 7. The contractor and all subcontractors hereby agree to waive any limitation as to the amount of contribution recoverable against them by the Village. This specifically includes any limitation imposed by any state statute, regulation, or case law including any Workers' Compensation Act provision that applies a limitation to the amount recoverable in contribution such as *Kotecki v. Cyclops Welding*

E. All Coverages:

Each insurance policy required by this paragraph shall be endorsed to state that coverage shall not be suspended, voided, cancelled, reduced in coverage or in limits except after thirty (30) days prior written notice by certified mail, return receipt requested, has been given to the Village.

F. Acceptability of Insurers

Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a Best's rating of no less than A-, VII and licensed to do business in the State of Illinois.

G. Verification of Coverage

Contractor shall furnish the Village with certificates of insurance naming the Village, its officials, agents, employees, and volunteers as additional insured's and with original endorsements, affecting coverage required herein. The certificates and endorsements for each insurance policy are to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf. The certificates and endorsements are to be received and approved by the Village before any work commences. The Village reserves the right to request full certified copies of the insurance policies and endorsements.

H. Subcontractors

Contractor shall include all subcontractors as insured's under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All coverage's for subcontractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

3. Assumption of Liability

The contractor assumes liability for all injury to or death of any person or persons including employees of the contractor, any subcontractor, any supplier or any other person and assumes liability for all damage to property sustained by any person or persons occasioned by or in any way arising out of any work performed pursuant to the Contract.

4. Indemnity/Hold Harmless Provision

- A. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor hereby agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Village, its officials, agents and employees against all injuries, deaths, loss, damages, claims, patent claims, suits, liabilities, judgments, cost and expenses, which may in anywise accrue against the Village, its officials, agents and employees arising in whole or in part or in consequence of the performance of this work by the Contractor, its employees, or subcontractors, or which may in anywise result therefore, except that arising out of the sole legal cause of the Village, its agents or employees, the Contractor shall, at its own expense, appear, defend and pay all charges of attorneys and all costs and other expenses arising therefore or incurred in connections therewith, and, if any judgment shall be rendered against the Village, its officials, agents and employees in any such action, the Contractor shall, at its own expense, satisfy and discharge the same. Contractor expressly understands and agrees that any performance bond or insurance policies required by this contract, or otherwise provided by the Contractor, shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, keep and save harmless and defend the Village, its officials, agents and employees as herein provided.
- B. Kotecki Waiver. In addition to the requirements set forth above, the Contractor (and any subcontractor into whose subcontract this clause is incorporated) agrees to assume the

entire liability for all personal injury claims suffered by its own employees and waives any limitation of liability defense based upon the Worker's Compensation Act and cases decided there under. Contractor agrees to indemnify and defend the Village from and against all such loss, expense, damage or injury, including reasonable attorneys' fees, which the Village may sustain as a result of personal injury claims by Contractor's employees, except to the extent those claims arise as a result of the Village's own negligence.

5. Retention of Payments:

The Contractor further agrees that to the extent that money is due the Contractor by virtue of this contract as shall be considered necessary in the judgment of the Village, may be retained by the Village to protect itself against said loss until such claims, suits, or judgments shall have been settled or discharged and/or evidence to that effect shall have been furnished to the satisfaction of the Village.

6. Patent Fees and Royalties:

Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Village and anyone directly or indirectly employed by either of them from and against all claims, damages, losses, and expenses (including attorneys' fees and court and arbitration costs) arising out of any infringement of patent rights or copyrights incident to the use in the performance of the work or resulting from the incorporation in the work of any invention, design, process, product, or device not specified in the Contract Documents, and shall defend all such claims in connection with any alleged infringement of such rights.

7. Request for Payment:

Contractor shall submit sworn Contractor's affidavit along with executed lien waivers with request for payment. Request for payment shall be made on AIA Document forms G702 and G703 or on an equivalent Village approved form. Payment shall be made pursuit to the Illinois Local Government Prompt Payment Act (50 ILCS 505/1 et seq.)

8. Certificate of Authority and Surety Certificate

The Contractor shall furnish the Village with a current Certificate of Authority or Surety Certificate issued by the Illinois Department of Insurance (IDOI) for the bonding company that they are using.

The Contractor shall also furnish the Village with a current Certificate of Authority issued by the Illinois Department of Insurance (IDOI) for the insurance company that they are using.

9. Contract Documents

The Contract Documents and any work shown therein shall be executed the same as if specifically mentioned herein and should any discrepancy between Contract Documents appear, the ruling of the Assistant Village Manager on the interpretation thereof shall be final and binding.

It is the intention of the Contract Documents to provide for this improvement in a complete, thorough and workman-like manner. The Contractor to whom the work is awarded shall furnish all materials, labor, tools, appliances, appurtenances, and all things necessary to complete the work in

accordance with these Contract Documents, and anything omitted that may be interpreted as reasonably necessary to such completion is to be merged into the Contract price.

10. Changes

If the Village deems it proper or necessary in the execution of the work to make any alteration which will increase or diminish the quantity of labor or material or the expense of the work, even to the elimination of one or more items, such alteration shall not annul or vitiate the Contract hereby entered into; provided, however, that the value of any work added or diminished shall be determined by mutual Contract between the Village and Contractor, before such work shall be commenced.

11. Extra Work

No claim whatsoever will be allowed the Contractor for changes, extra work or material not completed or necessary for the completion of the work described, or for a greater amount of money than is hereby stipulated to be paid, unless the change in or addition to the work requiring additional outlay by the Contractor is first ordered in writing by the Village, and the price therefore agreed to in writing.

Minor changes or small modifications in the specifications which may be made to suit some special condition or situation shall not be construed as a precedent for like changes at other times, nor shall such modifications be construed by the Contractor as removing the work from the specifications of the work, and placing it under the category of "Extra Work".

12. Notice of Starting Work

The Contractor shall notify the Village forty-eight (48) hours before beginning any work on this Contract, or of its intention so to do; in case of a temporary suspension of the work he shall give a similar notice before resuming same.

13. Sequence

The Village shall have the power to direct the order and sequence of the work. On any major portion of the work, all accessories shall be set coincident with the main construction. Payment for major portion of the work may be withheld until proper completion of accessories.

14. Supervision

The Village shall have override power to superintend and direct the work, and the Contractor shall perform all of the work herein specified, to its entire satisfaction, approval and acceptance.

15. Contractor's Representative

The Contractor shall have at all times a competent foreman or superintendent at the work site, who shall have full authority to act for the Contractor and to receive and execute orders from the Village and any instructions given to such superintendent or person, executing work for the Contractor, shall be binding on the Contractor as though it was personally given to the Contractor.

16. Workers

The Contractor shall employ competent staff and shall discharge, at the request of the Village, any incompetent, unfaithful, abusive or disorderly workers in its employ. None but staff expert in their respective branches of work shall be employed where special skill is required.

The Contractor shall provide and maintain such sanitary accommodations for the use of its employees as may be necessary to comply with the State and local Board of Health requirements. Public nuisances will not be permitted.

17. Termination of Contract

If, at any time, the Village shall be of the opinion that the work under this Contract is unnecessarily delayed and will not be finished in the prescribed time, or that the work is not being performed in a satisfactory manner, he will so notify the Contractor in writing. If the Contractor has not within ten (10) calendar days thereafter taken such measures, as will in the judgment of the Village, insure the satisfactory completion of the work under this Contract, the Village may notify the Contractor to discontinue all work under the Contract and proceed to terminate the Contract.

18. Construction Schedule

The Contractor is to commence work at the site after receiving a written notice to proceed and within fifteen (15) calendar days after the effective date of the award of the Contract. The Contractor is to fully complete all work covered by this contract to the point of final acceptance by the Village on or before Friday, April 29, 2015.

19. Freedom of Information Act

Within five (5) business days after the Village's Notice to the Contractor of the Village's receipt of a request made pursuant to the Illinois Freedom of Information Act [ILCS 140/1 et seq. - herein "FOIA"], the Contractor shall furnish all requested records in the Contractor's possession which are in any manner related to this Contract, including but not limited to any documentation related to the Village and associated therewith. The Contractor shall not apply any costs or charge any fees to the Village or any other person, firm or corporation for its procurement and retrieval of such records in the Contractor's possession which are sought to be copied or reviewed in accordance with such FOIA request or requests. The Contractor shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Village including its several departments and including its officers and employees and shall pay all of the Costs associated with such FOIA request for requests including Costs arising from the Contractor's failure or alleged failure to timely furnish such documentation and/or arising from the Contractor's failure or alleged failure otherwise to comply with the FOIA, whether or not associated with the Contractor's and/or the Village's defense of any litigation associated therewith. In addition, if the Contractor requests the Village to deny the FOIA request or any portion thereof by utilizing one or more of the lawful exemptions provided for in the FOIA, the Contractor shall pay all Costs in connection therewith. As used herein, "in the Contractor's possession" includes documents in the possession of any of the Contractor's officers, agents, employees and/or independent contractors; and "Costs" includes but is not limited to attorney fees, witness fees, filing fees and any and all other expenses — whether incurred by the Village or the Contractor.

20. Contractor Certifications

- A. Contractor certifies it is not barred from bidding on or entering into public contracts due to having been convicted of bid-rigging or bid rotating under paragraph 5/33E-3 or 5/33E-4 of the Illinois Criminal Code. The undersigned also certifies that no officers or employees of the bidder or contractor have been so convicted and that the bidder or contractor is not the successor company or new company created by the officers or owners of one so convicted. It is further certified that any such conviction occurring after the date of this certification will be reported to the above named public body, in writing, within seven (7) days of such conviction, if it occurs during any bidding process, contract term or otherwise prior to entering into any contract herewith.
- B. Contractor certifies that it has a written Sexual Harassment Policy in full compliance with 775 ILCS 5/2-105(A)(4).
- C. Contractor certifies that it shall comply with the provisions of the Equal Employment Opportunity Clause, the Illinois Human Rights Act or Applicable Rules and Regulations of the Illinois Department of Human Rights. Contractor acknowledges that in the event of the Contractor's non-compliance with the provisions of the Equal Employment Opportunity Clause, the Illinois Human Rights Act or Applicable Rules and Regulations of the Illinois Department of Human Rights, the contractor may be declared ineligible for future contracts or subcontracts with the State of Illinois or any of its political subdivisions or municipal corporations, and the contract may be cancelled or voided in whole or part, and such other sanctions or penalties may be imposed or remedies invoked as provided by statue or regulations.
- D. Contractor agrees to fully comply with the provisions of 820 ILCS 265/1. et seq., which include prior to commencement of work on a municipal project, having in place a written substance abuse program for the prevention of substance abuse among its employees which meets or exceeds the program requirements identified in this Act. The substance abuse policy shall be submitted in writing to the municipality and shall be made available to the general public.
- E. Contractor agrees to comply with the requirements of the Toxic Substance Disclosure to Employees Act, for any materials, supplies, and covered by said Act.
- F. All products supplied shall meet all applicable federal, state and local standards for product safety. Products and containers shall be properly labeled to meet all applicable standards and regulations regarding safety, toxicity and other standards. Material Safety Data Sheets (MSDS) shall be supplied as required for all affected products at all sites and the Contractor is responsible to keep all MSDS sheets current.

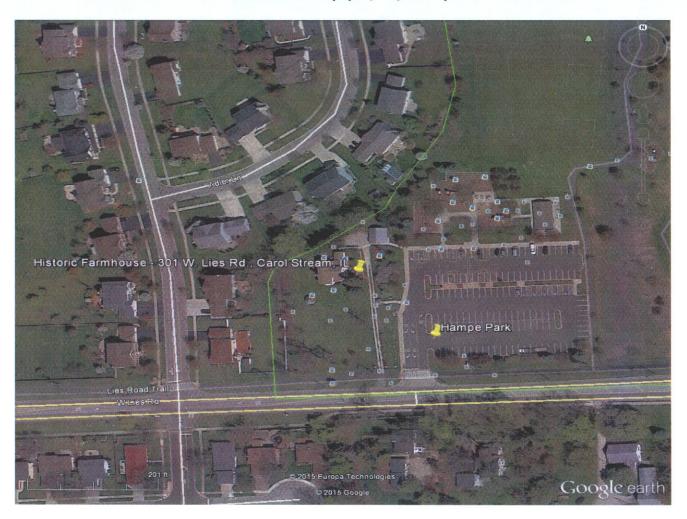

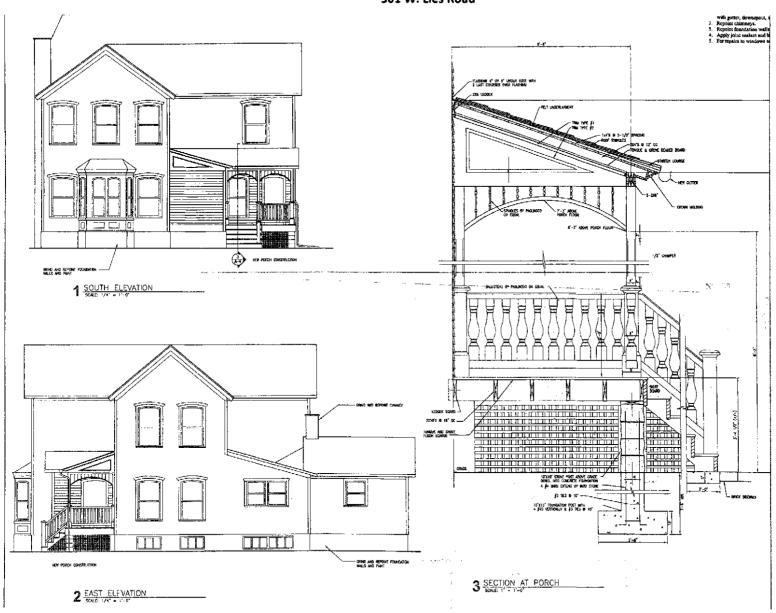

SUBJECT: Motion to Approve Extension of Trees Removal Contract – 1-800 Tree Guy

In April of 2015, the Village awarded a contract to 1-800 Tree Guy for tree removal services following a public bidding process that attracted a total of thirteen (13) bids. The contract included the option to extend the contract for two, one-year terms. The only difference in pricing is a reduction in the cost of the 15.1" to 20" DBH, which decreases by \$30 to \$225 for FY 17 and FY 18.

Recommendation for Purchase of Dump Truck

The FY17 budget includes funding for the replacement of truck #65, a large dump truck which serves primarily as an anti-icing unit and also supports street division activities in the summer months. The recommended purchase is for a cab and chassis along with the outfitting of the truck (dump body, plow, spreader, wet system and anti-icing unit).

The current vehicle was purchased in 1998 and is beyond the point where rehabilitation would be cost-effective. The dump body and frame are significantly corroded and it is not outfitted with updated snow and ice-fighting technology.

Last year at this time staff reviewed various vehicle offerings that meet our needs and subsequently purchased a Peterbilt model #348. We are again recommending this make and model and have found this truck available through a joint purchase contract awarded by Lake County (IL) Department of Transportation (joint purchasing agreement #15015). The contract document provides for other governmental agencies to purchase vehicles under the same terms of this contract, in accordance with the Governmental Joint Purchasing Act (30 ILCS 525/), similar to contracts available under the State's CMS program or the Suburban Purchasing Cooperative. The contract between Lake County and JX Peterbilt includes purchase of the cab and chassis directly from JX Peterbilt, who will then contract with another firm for outfitting of the truck. A copy of the proposal from JX Peterbilt is attached, along with the specifications associated with the contract between Peterbilt and Lindco Equipment Sales for the outfitting services.

When complete, this new truck will be outfitted with a stainless steel dump body and spreader, a wetting system, a corrosion-resistant aluminum cab, backup camera system and a large (11-foot) front plow. This truck will also come with a removable anti-icing unit, so that the truck can be used for anti-icing duties pre-storm and then be quickly switched over to plowing duties during a snow event.

The budget provides \$188,000 for this purchase. The total purchase price of the new truck would be \$180,917.96. Once received, we estimate up to \$1,000 additional will be spent on installation of a two-way radio and decals/striping.

As reported at a recent budget workshop, portions of this truck will be painted with a custom pink color in recognition of breast cancer awareness. With the distinctive coloring the truck can be featured at community events (Relay for Life, July 4th Parade, WRC Open House, etc.) and be used to attract donations for appropriate fundraising interests.

RE: Motion to Enter Into an Engineering Services Agreement for WRC NPDES

Permit Assistance with Baxter & Woodman, Inc.

The new operating permit for the Water Reclamation Center (WRC), issued in October 2015, came with a significant set of new special conditions that the Village is required to meet over the next several years. Due to the Village's ongoing work with the DuPage River Salt Creek Work Group (DRSCW) we have been aware that these new special conditions would likely show up in the operating permit issued by the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (IEPA) and that there would be expenses associated with compliance.

The list of special conditions and associated tasks is considerable, but the major projects which will require attention starting immediately, and continuing for two to three years, includes:

- Review and update of the sewer use ordinance including the enforcement response plan, the pre-treatment program and an evaluation of local limits;
- Monitoring of copper, zinc and ammonia levels
- Completion of a Capacity, Management, Operations and Maintenance (CMOM) study to assure adequate sanitary sewer capacity at all times:
- A phosphorous optimization plan and feasibility study to determine how, and at what cost, the plant will reduce phosphorous effluent when the IEPA lowers the limit in future permits. (Note: the Village has recently entered into an agreement with CH2M for services related to this project).

I have met with Baxter & Woodman to review the list of remaining projects required over the next several years as well as the schedule needed to complete the tasks within the deadlines established by IEPA. Some of these tasks require an initial progress report as early as April 1, 2016. Funds to support engineering services are provided in the current fiscal year budget as well as in the proposed FY17 budget, and also projected into FY18.

Page Two March 2, 2016

Baxter & Woodman is uniquely qualified to aid us in meeting the special conditions due to their intimate knowledge of plant history, infrastructure and operations. Baxter & Woodman has also been closely monitoring and contributing to the work of the DRSCW over the past several years in preparation for the new permit special conditions. The work ahead of us on these compliance matters will require coordination between staff and consulting engineering and operations resources. Baxter & Woodman has demonstrated their willingness to successfully work with staff and CH2M on projects in the past that have produced both quality outcomes and cost-savings.

Attached is a proposed Engineering Services Agreement from Baxter & Woodman to conduct a variety of detailed projects over the next three years. Because the final scope of some of the work tasks will be determined in part by results of monitoring, testing and survey results, I directed them to prepare this proposal with an amount not-to-exceed for each major task. The total not-to-exceed amount is \$130,400 over the three-year period that the work will take place. Assuming the full not-top-exceed amount, I expect the expenses will be incurred on the following schedule:

FY16: \$15,000FY17: \$90,900FY18: \$24,500

I am recommending a Motion to Enter Into An Engineering Services Agreement with Baxter & Woodman, Inc., for WRC NPDES Permit Assistance in an amount not-to-exceed \$130,400.00 over the next three fiscal years.

ENGINEERING SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this ______ day of ______ 2016, by and between the Village of Carol Stream, Illinois, hereinafter referred to as the Village, and Baxter & Woodman, Inc., Consulting Engineers, hereinafter referred to as the Engineers, for engineering services required by the Village for assisting with compliance with Special Conditions in the Water Reclamation Center NDPES permit, hereinafter referred to as the Project.

WITNESSETH that in consideration of the covenants herein, these parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The Project consists of assisting with compliance with Special Conditions in the Water Reclamation Center NDPES permit, as more completely described in Exhibit A, attached hereto. After written authorization by the Village, the Engineers shall provide professional services for the Project. These services will include serving as the Village's representative in all phases of the Project, providing consultation and advice, and furnishing customary engineering services, as enumerated in Exhibit B, attached hereto.

SECTION 2. The Village shall compensate the Engineers for the professional services enumerated in Exhibit B hereof as follows:

The Engineers' fee for the professional engineering scope of services as listed in Exhibit B shall be computed on the basis of their hourly billing rates for actual work time performed plus reimbursement of out-of-pocket expenses including travel costs which total amount will not exceed \$130,400, Engineers' Project No.150800.90. Compliance with individual NPDES Special Conditions are as follows:

Special Condition 10 (Pretreatment)	\$60,000
Special Condition 15 (CMOM)	\$20,000
Special Condition 16/22/23 (Copper/Zinc)	\$25,600
Special Condition 19 (Excess Flow)	\$5,000
Special Condition 20/21 (Ammonia)	\$14,800
NPDES Project Management	\$5,000

The Village shall reimburse the Engineers for costs associated with employment of laboratory services as set forth in Paragraph 3.9.

SECTION 3. The parties hereto further mutually agree:

3.1 The Engineers may submit requests for periodic progress payments for

services rendered. Payments shall be due and owing by the Village in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Local Government Prompt Payment Act, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Ch. 50, Sec. 505, et. seq.; and the Engineers may, after giving seven (7) days written notice to the Village, suspend services under this Agreement until the Engineers have been paid in full all amounts due for services, expenses, and late payment charges as provided in such Act.

- 3.2 This Agreement may be terminated, in whole or in part, by either party if the other party substantially fails to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement through no fault of the terminating party; or the Village may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, for its convenience. However, no such termination may be effected unless the terminating party gives the other party (1) not less than ten (10) calendar days written notice by certified mail of intent to terminate, and (2) an opportunity for a meeting with the terminating party before termination. If this Agreement is terminated by either party, the Engineers shall be paid for services performed to the effective date of termination, including reimbursable expenses. In the event of contract termination, the Village shall receive reproducible copies of Drawings, Specifications and other documents completed by the Engineers.
- 3.3 The Engineers agree to hold harmless and indemnify the Village and each of its officers, agents and employees from any and all liability claims, losses, or damages including reasonable attorney's fees to the extent that such claims, losses, damages or expenses are caused by the Engineers' negligent errors, acts or omissions, but not including liability, claims, losses or damages due to the negligence of the Village or other consultants, contractors or subcontractors working for the Village, or their officers, agents and employees.

In the event claims, losses, damages or expenses are caused by the joint or concurrent negligence of the Engineers and the Village they shall be borne by each party in proportion to its negligence.

The Village acknowledges that the Engineers is a Business Corporation and not a Professional Service Corporation, and further acknowledges that the corporate entity, as the party to this contract, expressly avoids contracting for individual responsibility of its officers, directors, or employees.

The Village and Engineers agree that any claim made by either party arising out of any act of the other party, or any officer, director, or employee of the other party in the execution or performance of the Agreement, shall be made solely against the other party and not individually or jointly against such officer, director, or employees.

3.4 For the duration of the Project, the Engineers shall procure and maintain insurance for protection from claims under worker's compensation acts, claims for damages because of bodily injury including personal injury, sickness or disease or death of any and all employees or of any person other than such employees, and from claims or damages because of injury to or destruction of property including loss of use resulting therefrom, alleged to arise from the Engineers' negligence in the performance of services under this Agreement. The Village shall be named as an additional insured on the Engineers' general liability insurance policy. The policy which names the Village as an additional insured shall also name "its officers and employees" as covered parties, and that policy and the other

policies specified below shall, with regards to certificates of insurance, provide that the coverage shall not be cancelled, modified or reduced without 10 days' prior written notice to the Village. All policies shall be with insurance companies with a rating of A- or above. The limits of liability for the insurance required by this Subsection are as follows:

3.5 Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, and to the fullest extent permitted by law, the total liability, in the aggregate, of the Engineers and their officers, directors, employees, agents, and any of them, to the Village and anyone claiming by, through or under the Village, for any and all claims, losses, costs or damages whatsoever arising out of, resulting from or in any way related to the Project or the Agreement from any cause or causes, including but not limited to the negligence, professional errors or omissions, strict liability or breach of contract or warranty express or implied of Engineers or their officers, directors, employees, agents or any of them, hereafter referred to as the "Village's Claims", shall not exceed the total insurance proceeds available to pay on behalf of or to the Engineers by their insurers in settlement or satisfaction of Village's Claims under the terms and conditions of Engineers' insurance policies applicable thereto, including all covered payments made by those insurers for fees, costs and expenses of investigation, claims adjustment, defense and appeal. The limitation regarding insurance should only be applicable if the Engineers keep in place the insurance policies set forth in Section 3.4.

The Village and Engineers agree to waive against each other all claims for special, incidental, indirect, or consequential damages arising out of, resulting from, or in any way related to the Project.

- 3.6 The Engineers are responsible for the quality, technical accuracy, timely completion, and coordination of all Designs, Drawings, Specifications, Reports, and other professional services furnished or required under this Agreement. The Engineers shall endeavor to perform such services with the same degree of knowledge, skill and diligence normally employed by professional engineers performing the same or similar services.
- 3.7 The Village may, at any time, by written order, make changes within the general scope of this Agreement in the services to be performed by the Engineers. If such changes cause an increase or decrease in the Engineers' fee or time required for

performance of any services under this Agreement, whether or not changed by any order, an equitable adjustment shall be made and this Agreement shall be modified in writing accordingly. No service for which an additional compensation will be charged by the Engineers shall be furnished without the written authorization of the Village.

- 3.8 All Reports, Drawings, Specifications, other documents, and electronic media prepared or furnished by the Engineers pursuant to this Agreement are instruments of service in respect to the Project, and the Engineers shall retain the right of reuse of said documents and electronic media by and at the discretion of the Engineers whether or not the Project is completed. Reproducible copies of the Engineers' documents and electronic media for information and reference in connection with the use and occupancy of the Project by the Village and others shall be delivered to and become the property of the Village upon request; however, the Engineers' documents and electronic media are not intended or represented to be suitable for reuse by the Village or others on additions or extensions of the Project, or on any other project. Any such reuse without verification or adaptation by the Engineers for the specific purpose intended will be at the Village's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to the Engineers, and the Village shall indemnify and hold harmless the Engineers from all claims, damages, losses and expenses including attorneys' fees arising out of or resulting therefrom. Any furnishing of additional copies and verification or adaptation of the Engineers' documents and electronic media will entitle the Engineers to claim and receive additional compensation from the Village. Electronic media are furnished without guarantee of compatibility with the Village's software or hardware, and the Engineers' sole responsibility for such media is to furnish replacements of defective disks within 30 days after initial delivery.
- 3.9 The compensation for engineering services set forth in Section 2 hereof shall include supervision of any laboratory services required by the Engineers for the Project. The Engineers shall make all necessary arrangements, subject to the prior approval by the Village, and employ qualified subconsultants for all laboratory services. The cost of such subconsultant services shall be a separate expense to the Village and the Village shall reimburse the Engineers for the actual costs of the laboratory services plus five percent (5%) service charge upon submission of proper invoices.
- 3.10 The Engineers are an equal opportunity employer and hereby incorporate the requirements of 44 lll. Adm. Code 750 Appendix A, as applicable.
- 3.11 Any provision or part thereof of this Agreement held to be void or unenforceable under any law shall be deemed stricken and all remaining provisions shall continue to be valid and binding upon the parties. The parties agree that this Agreement shall be reformed to replace such stricken provision or part thereof with a valid and enforceable provision which comes as close as possible to expressing the intention of the stricken provision.
- 3.12 To the extent required by law, the Engineers agree to comply with the provisions of the Employment of Illinois Workers on Public Works Act, and to comply with all other provisions of Illinois law, which affect the persons who perform work and the conditions under which their work takes place. In the event that the terms of this

Agreement, or the actions of the Engineers are found to have not complied with the law, then the Engineers shall indemnify and hold the Village harmless, and pay all amounts determined to be due, including, but not limited to fines, costs, attorneys' fees and penalties.

3.13 This Agreement contains and embodies the entire and integrated agreement between parties hereto and supersedes all prior negotiations, representations, or agreements, either written or oral.

EXHIBIT A

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Village of Carol Stream's NPDES permit for the Water Reclamation Center (WRC) was renewed on October 1, 2015. The NPDES permit contained a number of new Special Conditions that the WRC will need to comply with. Each Special Condition has its own compliance and reporting schedule. The scope of this Project is to assist with compliance with the following Special Conditions:

- Special Condition 10: Pretreatment
- Special Condition 15: CMOM
- Special Condition 16/22/23: Copper and Zinc
- Special Condition 19: Excess Flow
- Special Condition 20/21: Ammonia

Special Condition 10 requires the Village to implement and enforce its approved Pretreatment Program. Several updates to the program are required to meet the requirements of the revised NPDES permit including:

- Modifications to the Sewer Use Ordinance to incorporate the revisions of the Pretreatment Streamlining Rule;
- Updates to the Enforcement Response Plan (ERP) to coordinate with the revised ordinance;
- A technical re-evaluation of the Local Limitations consistent with U.S. EPA's Local Limits Development Guidance; and
- Updates to the inventory of Industrial Users (IUs), which is to be completed annually, to
 ensure that all Significant Industrial Users are properly identified, characterized, and
 categorized.

Special Condition 10 requires the Village to collect data from WRC, residential and stream sampling sites to support the local limits evaluation. The goal is to develop defensible local limits that allow the industrial users the most flexibility while meeting the USEPA requirements.

Special Condition 15 requires the Village to develop and implement a Capacity, Management, Operations and Maintenance (CMOM) plan for its sanitary sewer system. The CMOM plan will assist with the goal of eliminating sanitary sewer overflows and basement backups.

Special Condition 16/22/23 allows the Village to collect data to support a site specific metal translator for copper and zinc. The goal is to remove copper and zinc limits from the permit or raise them to a level that the WRC will comply.

Special Condition 19 allows the Village to collect data in the receiving stream and outfall during wet weather events to support the ability for the WRC to continue to utilize Outfall 001 when the plant



capacity is exceeded.

Special Condition 20 allows the Village to collect pH and temperature data in support of a site specific ammonia limit. The goal is to increase ammonia limits to concentrations from the previous permit.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

Project Management

PROIECT MANAGEMENT

- Plan, schedule, and control activities to complete the Project. These activities include, but are
 not limited to, budget, schedule, and scope. Submit a monthly status report via email
 describing tasks completed the previous month and outlining goals for the subsequent
 month.
- Coordinate with the Village and CH2M to ensure that progress reports and milestones required by the NPDES permit are met.

MEETINGS

- Hold a kick-off meeting with staff and the project team to establish clear lines of
 communication, introduce staff to the team members, and establish the Village's detailed
 needs, objectives, and goals for the Project. The meeting will also be used to obtain
 information, plans, atlases, and other data to be supplied by the Owner, and to set schedules
 and guidelines for any future design meetings.
- Hold progress meetings on a quarterly basis, including at milestone reporting dates, to update
 the Village, CH2M and the Project team on the current status of the NDPES Special Conditions.

The scope of services for each special condition are as follows:

Special Condition 10 – Sewer Use Ordinance Modifications to incorporate Streamlining Rule – Use the USEPA's most recent model Pretreatment Ordinance that contains required streamlining changes as the basis for the Village's Pretreatment Ordinance. Modify the model based on recent comments and conversations with both the EPA and the USEPA. Coordinate modifications with existing ordinance legacy sections and building department criteria. The submittal to USEPA is required prior to October 1, 2017.

- 1. Meet with Village/CH2M to discuss pretreatment objectives and needs.
- 2. Provide a presentation that is an overview of the draft Sewer Use/Pretreatment (SU/PT) ordinance, its strengths, and decisions that need to be made by the Village/CH2M,
- Submit SU/PT to the Village/CH2M for review and comment and subsequently modify.
 Modifications are limited to four hours for staff modifications and four hours for attorney
 modifications. Modification time beyond that will be billed at standard rates once approval
 is received from the Village.



- 4. Submit SU/PT ordinance rewrite to USEPA with 12 page legal cross-reference. Changes that USEPA would want that were not included in the model ordinance that have been identified in other program ordinance modifications will be included in the draft to prevent additional comment from USEPA,
- 5. Discuss comments with USEPA and make modifications.
- 6. Submit adoption documentation to USEPA.

Special Condition 10 - Enforcement Response Plan (ERP) Updates to incorporate Streamlining Rule

The Enforcement Response Plan will contain detailed procedures describing how the Village/CH2M investigates and responds to instances of non-compliance for industrial users. Update and modify the current plan to coordinate with the revised sewer use/pretreatment ordinance (SU/PT ordinance). The draft submittal to USEPA is required prior to October 1, 2017.

- 1. Discuss informal regulatory options with Village/CH2M that are not in the SU/PT ordinance so they are clearly contained in the ERP,
- 2. Produce a draft ERP with new streamlining or other options from the revised SU/PT ordinance,
 - o Provide monitoring criteria,
 - Provide 10 samples of common Notice of Violation (NOV)/Reporting NOV formats identified in the ERP,
- 3. Incorporate the Village/CH2M's comments into the final ERP document,
- 4. Check the provision cross references to the codified ordinance,
- 5. Submit to USEPA for review and comment,
- 6. Revise as needed to incorporate comments from USEPA, and

Special Condition 10 - Technical Re-Evaluation of Local Limits

Assist the Village in updating the local limits as required by the Village's NPDES permit Special Condition 10 and make them legally defensible. USEPA requires that the evaluation be consistent with its Local Limits Development Guidance (July 2004). Local limit are required to be submitted to USEPA prior to October 1, 2017.

- 1. Conduct a kick-off meeting with Village/CH2M to define sampling and data needs of Project.
- Obtain and screen influent, effluent, and sludge data from the 2014 and 2015 Annual Pretreatment Report and first half 2016 semi-annual sampling (if completed), for routine local limits evaluation and identify if any other non-organic or organic pollutants need to be evaluated.
- 3. Discuss additional data the Village/CH2M needs to schedule to complete local limits evaluation. The specific samples needed for the re-evaluation are as follows:
 - o Publicly-Owned Treatment Works (POTW): Twelve (12) days of paired analyses of time weighted raw influent and effluent to determine removal efficiencies for the plant,



- Bio-solids: 503 and pretreatment annual report data from the 2014 and 2015 years can be used as the bulk of the bio-solids information. One sample will be collected during the POTW sampling cycle,
- Waterway Segment Sampling: Twelve (12) samples grab samples taken on the day of the raw influent samples will be required upstream of the POTW outfall to define the stream characteristics, and
- o Residential/domestic sources: A total of nine (9) samples should be taken from three (3) residential/domestic source locations that include housing more than five (5) years old, housing less than five (5) years old, a location that includes housing and commercial unregulated users that discharge only domestic waste.

The analyses that are identified by USEPA that will need to be evaluated for the development of local limits include the following metals and non-metals:

^{*}Pollutants that we recommend be evaluated based on emerging USEPA trends, Illinois Water Quality Standards or Village NPDES requirements.

The cost of sampling and analyses, which is estimated to be between \$15,000-\$20,000, is not included in this proposal.

- 4. Provide the Village/CH2M with the required sampling and analytical requirements, criteria for cancelling samples, and define that the laboratory used provides the project data in a spreadsheet format. Review and comment on the Village/CH2M's sampling schedule once completed. The Village/CH2M will review the data for use of the correct method, holding times, preservatives, and quality control.
- 5. Prepare spreadsheets to evaluate and summarize the Village/CH2M's analytical data. Screen non-detect data for appropriate replacement. Evaluate data statistically to identify outliers.
- 6. Calculate hardness based Illinois General Use Water Quality Standards for the local limit evaluation.
- 7. Input Village data plus state and federal criteria in USEPA approved local limit tables and prepare preliminary local limit calculations based on most stringent calculation of the nine criteria. Address calculation aberration such as negative values. Verify the calculated local limits are practical.
- 8. Meet with Village/CH2M to present proposed preliminary local limits and supporting data. Discuss whether additional data is needed in order to improve targeted local limits calculations. Provide Village/CH2M with additional sampling requirements, if required.
- 9. Update local limits if additional sampling data was required and provide Village/CH2M with revised local limits.



- 10. Provide draft report for Village/CH2M review that includes executive narrative summary and appendices. Appendices will include USEPA Region V spreadsheet, POTW information including permit requirements, identify sources of state and federal defaults used in the calculations as well as summarize Village data and requirements. Incorporate Village/CH2M's comments and finalize local limits report.
- 11. Submit final local limits report to Village and USEPA. Address any comments received from USEPA.

The Village/CH2M will coordinate the sampling and analyses for the required data with an outside laboratory, provide a final sampling schedule with appropriate criteria for review and provide data summarized in a format defined by Baxter & Woodman. The Village/CH2M will also prepare and provide Baxter & Woodman with the following:

- 1. Influent, effluent, and sludge data from the 2014 and 2015 Annual Pretreatment Reports in an Excel spreadsheet for each WWTP. 2016 data will be added once it is available.
- 2. Summarize and provide influent flow data (average daily flow by month) in an Excel Spreadsheet for 2014, 2015, and 2016 (added when available).
- 3. Sludge information for each WWTP:
 - o Flow Data in Excel Spreadsheet (flow to digester, thickened WAS flow to digester, sludge flow to disposal & percent solids),
 - o Quarterly & Semi-Annual Sludge Sampling Data,
 - o Semi-Annual Quantity Sludge Management Report Form, and
 - Sludge Land Application Reports
- 4. Summarize and provide the 2014 & 2015 analytical results and flow for all permitted industrial users.
- 5. Summarize collection system problems.
- 6. Summarize pollutants that have caused violations or operational problems at the POTW, including conventional pollutants; fire and explosions; corrosion; flow obstructions; increased temperature in the sewer system; toxic gases, vapors or fumes that caused acute worker health and safety problems; toxicity found through Whole Effluent Toxicity testing; or inhibition to processes.

Special Condition 10 - Industrial User Survey Database Hosting and Special Condition 17 - Phosphorous Source Reduction Database Hosting

Assist the Village in updating the list of Significant Industrial Users to meet the requirements of Special Condition 10 of the NPDES Permit. In addition, assist the Village in locating sources of Phosphorous through a Food Service Establishment (FSE) Survey.

SURVEY

The Village/CH2M will identify all possible businesses and Food Service Establishments
through a windshield survey, using resources from the Village and/or by obtaining a copy of
the current Illinois Manufacturing Directory and Services Directory lists provided by Baxter
& Woodman to create the survey recipient lists.



Two Excel spreadsheets will need to be provided to Baxter & Woodman, one list of industry names and addresses for the industrial survey and a second list containing Food Service Establishment names and addresses. These lists will be used by Baxter & Woodman to load information into the online GIS database system.

- 2. Prepare surveys that will include a web address and login for survey respondents to complete the survey online. Provide technical support to the Village during the survey collection process. Baxter & Woodman, Inc. will prepare:
 - o Two surveys: one for each type of user (Industrial and FSE).
 - o Instructions for completing the survey.
- The Village/CH2M will prepare standard cover letters to accompany the surveys, print
 individual letters, stuff envelopes, apply postage, and mail all letters. The Village will collect
 phone numbers and contact names for industries that are to receive a survey.
- 4. Baxter & Woodman will provide the online survey, software, on-going annual hosting (12 month access), server connection, and technology support so that businesses can load operation details directly into the database.
 - Our fee does not include ARCGIS licensing fees, which we understand the Village already has.
- 5. The Village/CH2M will manually enter into the database the information contained in any hardcopies of surveys that are received by mail.

SURVEY FOLLOW-UP

- 6. Baxter & Woodman will provide 2 hours of training to instruct the Village/CH2M on how to obtain information from the database system for follow up and how to utilize the system for tracking of each step.
- 7. The Village/CH2M will complete all survey follow up (Industrial and FSE) to collect surveys by placing phone calls and visiting users.
- 8. The Village/CH2M will screen all industrial surveys in the database to determine which firms are of concern or have not provided sufficient information to determine an evaluation and will place follow-up phone calls to industries to obtain more information about their businesses.
- 9. The Village/CH2M will use the online survey database to track the status during the process and provide phone log details in the database system. These are valuable tools for IEPA/USEPA and should be included as part of the report to fulfill the requirements of the Pretreatment Program.

SITE INSPECTIONS AND CLASSIFICATIONS

10. The Village/CH2M will complete site inspections of industries, and review information to properly classify and identify significant or categorical industrial users or potential phosphorus dischargers. If the Village wishes for Baxter & Woodman staff to review surveys, assist in the classification or permitting of industries these services can be included and would be billed at standard rates once approval is received from the Village.



- 11. The Village/CH2M will provide a summary for each industrial user site inspection completed. This summary should also include justification why industries are or are not classified as a CIU or SIU for documentation in Special Condition 17.
- 12. Baxter & Woodman will provide the Village/CH2M with all data from the surveys in a Geodatabase in XML format for use by the Village in their GIS system. The initial setup of this system for the industrial user and food service establishment surveys will allow the database system to be used for future surveys at a lower cost.
- 13. Baxter & Woodman will provide summaries of the data from the Survey Database system in electronic format to be included with the Village/CH2M documents for submittal to IEPA.
- 14. The Village/CH2M will create a report and letter response to IEPA including information from the Geodatabase file to meet the requirements of Special Condition 10.

SPECIAL CONDITION 15: CAPACITY, MANAGEMENT, OPERATION, AND MAINTENANCE (CMOM) PLAN

Assure adequate sanitary sewer Capacity at all times through proper Management, Operation, and Maintenance.

1. PROJECT WORKSHOP MEETING

o A Project Workshop meeting with Village staff and the Project team will be held for the CMOM Plan. The purposes of the meeting are to establish clear lines of communication, introduce the Village staff to the team members, and establish the Village's detailed needs, objectives, and goals for the Project. The meeting will also be utilized to obtain information, plans, atlases, and other data to be supplied by the Village, and set schedules and guidelines for future design meetings.

2. GATHER AND REVIEW DATA

- Request to Village: We ask the Village to gather the following documents, if available:
 - Sewer GIS shapefiles
 - Sanitary Sewer Atlas Map(s):
 - Large Overall
 - Reduced, Atlas book
 - Sewer System Description
 - Organization Chart
 - Sewer Use and Pretreatment Ordinances
 - Sewer Operating Budget
 - Sewer Capital Improvement Plan (CIP)
 - Sewer Master Plans or Evaluations
 - Sewer Design Standards
 - Emergency Response Plans (sanitary related: sewer backup, overflow, etc)
 - Sewer equipment O&M schedule or documentation
 - List (or map) of Overflows and Basement Backups
 - Record Drawings (pump stations)



- O&M Manuals (pump stations)
- Attend two (2) meetings with the City staff to review the requirements. Assist the City in collecting and organizing the existing information into a file binder for record keeping.
 An electronic version of the file binder will also be made.

3. MEETINGS WITH VILLAGE STAFF

- o Conduct meetings with staff at times during the Project to clarify staff wishes and available information.
- o Because of the complexity of this Program, two (2) additional meetings have been scheduled with the staff.
- The total contract includes five (5) meetings and one (1) presentation.

4. PREPARE CMOM PLAN

 The plan shall include the following information, as outlined in Special Condition 15 of the NPDES Permit:

A. Measures and Activities:

- 1. A complete map and system inventory for the collection system owned and operated by the Permittee;
- Organizational structure; budgeting; training of personnel; legal authorities; schedules for maintenance, sewer system cleaning, and preventative rehabilitation; checklists, and mechanisms to ensure that preventative maintenance is performed on equipment owned and operated by the Permittee;
- 3. Documentation of unplanned maintenance;
- 4. An assessment of the capacity of the collection and treatment system owned and operated by the Permittee at critical junctions and immediately upstream of locations where overflows and backups occur or are likely to occur; use flow monitoring as necessary;
- 5. Identification and prioritization of structural deficiencies in the system owned and operated by the Permittee;
- 6. Operational control, including documented system control procedures, scheduled inspections and testing;
- 7. The Permittee shall develop and implement an Asset Management strategy to ensure the long-term sustainability of the collection system. Asset Management shall be used to assist the Permittee in making decisions on when it is most appropriate to repair, replace or rehabilitate particular assets and develop long-term funding strategies; and
- 8. Asset Management shall include but is not limited to the following elements:
 - Asset Inventory and State of the Asset;



- b. Level of Service;
- c. Critical Asset Identification:
- d. Life Cycle Cost; and
- e. Long-Term Funding Strategy.

B. Design and Performance Provisions:

- 1. Monitor the effectiveness of CMOM;
- 2. Upgrade the elements of the CMOM plan as necessary; and
- 3. Maintain summary of CMOM activities.

C. Overflow Response Plan:

- 1. Know where overflows within the facilities owned and operated by the Permittee occur:
- 2. Respond to each overflow to determine additional actions such as clean up; and
- Locations where basement back-ups and/or sanitary sewer overflows occur shall be evaluated as soon as practicable for excessive inflow /infiltration, obstructions or other causes of overflows or back-ups as set forth in the System Evaluation Plan.

D. System Evaluation Plan:

- 1. Summary of existing SSO and Excessive I/I areas in the system and sources of contribution:
- 2. Evaluate plans to reduce 1/1 and eliminate SSOs;
- 3. Special provisions for Pump Stations and force mains and other unique system components; and
- 4. Construction plans and schedules for correction.

E. Reporting and Monitoring Requirements:

- 1. Program for SSO detection and reporting; and
- 2. Program for tracking and reporting basement back-ups, including general public complaints.

F. Third Party Notice Plan:

- Describes how, under various overflow scenarios, the public, as well as other entities, would be notified of overflows within the Permittee's system that may endanger public health, safety or welfare;
- Identifies overflows within the Permittee's system that would be reported, giving consideration to various types of events including events with potential widespread impacts;
- 3. Identifies who shall receive the notification;



- 4. Identifies the specific information that would be reported including actions that will be taken to respond to the overflow;
- 5. Includes a description of the lines of communication; and
- 6. Includes the identities and contact information of the responsible POTW officials and local, county, and/or state level officials.

Special Condition 16/22/23:

Copper Translator / Interim Report Assistance

A metals translator plan, utilizing site-specific hardness and metals translator information, will be utilized for revising the copper limit. Specifically, the scope proposed for copper compliance issues is as follows:

- Submit a copper translator study plan to the IEPA. The plan will describe the sampling
 activities and sampling location. The Village will collect the samples and arrange for the
 laboratory analyses. The study will require a minimum of 12 samples of total and dissolved
 copper from both the effluent and receiving stream.
- Provide interim progress reports as required.
- Monitor the sampling results and coordinate with the laboratory in case of suspect results.
 Any needed coordination with the laboratory and/or the IEPA is assumed to be via phone or email. No meetings with the IEPA in Springfield are included.
- Submit a letter report to the IEPA containing the full results of the study and requesting that
 the IEPA modify the NPDES permit accordingly in conjunction with the hardness study. The
 goal of the study would be to prevent a copper limit from appearing in the draft permit.

Zinc Translator / Interim Report Assistance

A metals translator plan, utilizing site-specific hardness and metals translator information, will be utilized for revising the zinc limit. Specifically, the scope proposed for zinc compliance issues is as follows:

Submit a zinc translator study plan to the IEPA. The plan will describe the sampling activities
and sampling location. The Village will collect the samples and arrange for the laboratory
analyses. The study will require a minimum of 12 samples of total and dissolved zinc from
both the effluent and receiving stream.



- Provide interim progress reports as required.
- Monitor the sampling results and coordinate with the laboratory in case of suspect results.
 Any needed coordination with the laboratory and/or the IEPA is assumed to be via phone or email. No meetings with the IEPA in Springfield are included.
- Submit a letter report to the IEPA containing the full results of the study and requesting that the IEPA modify the NPDES permit accordingly in conjunction with the hardness study. The goal of the study would be to prevent a zinc limit from appearing in the draft permit.

Hardness Study

A Hardness Study will allow the Village to use site specific hardness from the receiving stream to assist in supporting the case of the above translator studies. The implementation of a site specific harness evaluation will take 12-24 months. This time frame depends on the suggested schedule from IEPA and their approval for the sampling. At several points during the sampling period we will evaluate the results, should the results indicate that there is no benefit from the results, we will recommend that the Village abandon this Evaluation.

- Prepare a letter to the IEPA requesting that the Village be allowed to perform a Receiving Stream Hardness Evaluation. The letter will describe the sampling activities and sampling locations.
- The Village/CH2M will collect the samples and arrange for the laboratory analyses.
- Monitor the sampling and analytical results on a weekly basis and then prepare a letter report
 to the IEPA detailing the results of the study.
- Following establishment of the Stream Hardness Value by the IEPA Standards Unit, we will
 request that the IEPA Permit section modify the NPDES permit issued to the Village.

The cost of sampling and analyses, for the copper translator, zinc translator and hardness study is not included in this proposal.

Special Condition 19: Excess Flow

Baxter and Woodman prepared an excess flow monitoring plan dated November 20, 2015 to describe data collection during certain wet weather events. The data collection consists of measuring the stream flow, and sampling/testing the receiving stream water quality upstream and downstream of the WRC outfall. The plan was approved by IEPA on November 30, 2015. The scope includes:

- Prepare a gauging table of stream depth vs discharge for the receiving stream to allow plant staff to record flows during wet weather events.
- Analyze data collected by plant staff for the receiving stream water quality and compare the WRC effluent. Advise the Village of the findings.
- Submit data in a tabular format to IEPA.



Special Condition 20/21: Ammonia-Nitrogen Compliance Assistance Translator / Interim Report Assistance

A site-specific monitoring study will be prepared to demonstrate that the existing limits adequately protect the receiving stream and that new, lower limits for ammonia-nitrogen are not necessary. The study includes obtaining 12-months of data and recalculating the site-specific ammonia-nitrogen limit after the stream monitoring data has been collected.

- Submit an ammonia-nitrogen monitoring plan to the IEPA. The plan will describe the sampling activities and sampling location. The Village will collect and analyze the samples. The study will require twice a week samples of pH and temperature of the receiving stream.
- Monitor the sampling results and coordinate with the Village in case of suspect results. Any
 needed coordination with the IEPA is assumed to be via phone or email. No meetings with
 the IEPA in Springfield are included.
- Provide interim progress reports as required.
- Submit to the IEPA a letter report containing the summary and discussion of the pH and temperature monitoring.
- Submit to the IEPA the full results of the monitoring effort with the updated estimate of the site-specific ammonia-nitrogen limits. The submittal will request that the IEPA recalculate the ammonia-nitrogen limits and modify the NPDES permit accordingly.

WHEREAS, Hitesh Patel, on behalf of Dunkin' Donuts, hereinafter referred to as the Petitioner, has petitioned the Village of Carol Stream for a Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and an Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development, as provided in Sections 16-9-2(C)(1) and 16-9-4(C)(1) of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, on the property legally described in Section 2 herein and commonly known as 222 W. Army Trail Road, Carol Stream, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 16-15-8 of the Carol Stream Code of Ordinances, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals held a public hearing on the above petition on February 22, 2016, following proper legal notice of said public hearing, after which the Commission recommended to the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village that the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window be approved; and

WHEREAS, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals further recommended to the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village that the Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development be approved; and

WHEREAS, the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals has filed its Findings and Recommendations regarding the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and the Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development with the Mayor and Board of Trustees, and the Mayor and Board of Trustees have duly considered said Findings and Recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Board of Trustees find it to be in the best interest of the Village to grant approval of the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development, as set forth in this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CAROL STREAM, DU PAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, IN THE EXERCISE OF ITS HOME RULE POWERS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1:

The Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Carol Stream, after examining the Petition for a Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and an Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development, and the Findings and Recommendations of the Combined Plan Commission / Zoning Board of Appeals, have determined and find that the requested Special Use Permit and Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit:

- 1. Is deemed necessary for the public convenience at the location. Drive-up service windows are popular at food service establishments, and have been found to be appropriate for the public convenience at many existing Carol Stream restaurants.
- 2. Will not be unreasonably detrimental to or endanger the public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare. The drive-up service window represents an improvement to the property aimed at improving the efficiency of operations, which should not be detrimental to or endanger public health, safety, morals, comfort or general welfare.
- 3. Will not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other properties in the immediate vicinity for the purposes already permitted, nor substantially diminish and impair property values within the neighborhood. The improvements to the property represent a re-investment in the property and should not be injurious to the use and enjoyment of other properties in the immediate vicinity, nor substantially diminish or impair property values within the neighborhood.
- 4. Will not impede the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding properties for uses permitted in the district. The drive-up service window should be of no impact on the normal and orderly development and improvement of surrounding properties.
- 5. Will provide adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other important and necessary community facilities. Adequate utilities, access roads, drainage and other public improvements are already in place.
- 6. Will conform to the applicable regulations of the district in which it is located, except as the Village Board may in each instance modify such regulations. The drive-up service window is expected to operate and conform to all applicable regulations and any conditions of approval as determined by the Combined Plan Commission/Zoning Board of Appeals and Village Board.

SECTION 2:

The Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development are hereby approved and granted, subject to the conditions set forth in Section 3, upon the real estate commonly known as 222 W. Army Trail Road, Carol Stream, Illinois, and legally described as follows:

LOT 1 AS DESIGNATED UPON THE PLAT OF BURKE VENTURE SUBDIVISION, BEING A SUBDIVISION OF PART OF THE SOUTHWEST QUARTER OF THE NORTHWEST QUARTER OF SECTION 20 AND PART OF THE SOUTHEAST QUARTER OF THE NORTHEAST QUARTER OF SECTION 19, ALL IN TOWNSHIP 40 NORTH, RANGE 10 EAST OF THE THIRD PRINCIPAL MERIDIAN, IN DUPAGE COUNTY, ILLINOIS

hereinafter referred to as the Subject Property.

SECTION 3:

The approval of the Special Use Permit for a Drive-Up Service Window and Amendment to an Approved Special Use Permit for a Planned Unit Development granted in Section 2 herein is subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the inoperable light pole in the southeast corner of the property and the existing wall mounted light fixture at the southeast corner of the building must be repaired and maintained in working order by the property owner by June 1, 2016;
- 2. That the pavement deficiencies in the northwest quadrant of the plaza parking lot shall be repaired by the property owner by June 1, 2016, and that a building permit must be obtained prior to said parking lot work;
- 3. That the yellow striping for the drive-through lane be installed for the entire length of the lane for better delineation between the drive-through lane and the bypass lane;
- 4. That all trash, refuse and recycling containers must be kept within the trash enclosure at the southwest corner of the property, and that the gates to the enclosure must be kept closed at all times except when employees are accessing the enclosure or when the waste hauler is servicing the property;
- 5. That the applicant must obtain sign permits for all signs, with such permits being separate from the main building permit, and that all new signage must comply with Village Sign Code regulations;
- 6. That stormwater certification shall be required prior to the issuance of a building permit; and
- 7. That the site must be maintained and the business must be operated in accordance with all State, County and Village codes and regulations.

Such execution and delivery to the Village shall take place within sixty (60) days after the passage and approval of this Ordinance or within such extension of time as may be granted in the discretion of the corporate authorities, by motion.

SECTION 6:

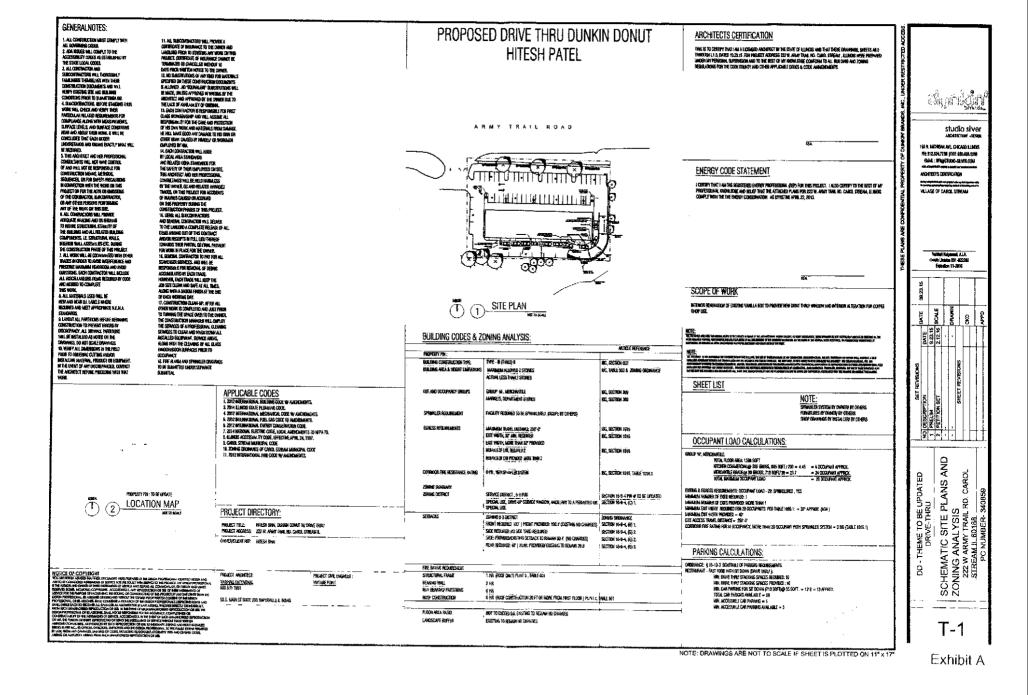

This February we sent letters to all businesses and property owners advising them that the project was in jeopardy if the remaining easements were not granted. THIS GRANT OF WATER MAIN EASEMENT ("Grant of Easement") is made this

The Temporary Easement shall terminate on the date which is twenty-four (24) months from the date this Grant of Easement is recorded. - 4. Subject to the terms of Paragraph 7, Grantor hereby agrees to and with the Grantee that the officers, agents, employees, successors, grantees, lessees and assigns of the Grantee may, at any and all times designated herein, when necessary and convenient to do so, go in, on, upon, over and across the Grantor Property and the Easement Premises, and do and perform any and all acts necessary or convenient to the carrying into effect the purposes for which this Grant of Easement and the Easement created hereby are made, and that the Grantor shall not disturb, molest, injure or in any manner interfere with the aforesaid water main, and all facilities and activities incidental thereto.
- 5. The Easement shall be used and enjoyed solely by Grantee and its duly authorized officers, agents, contractors or employees to conduct the Easement Activities in accordance with this Grant of Easement. Grantee shall not assign its rights under this Grant of Easement in whole or in part or grant permission to traverse, enter upon or otherwise use the Easement Premises to any other person or entity without the prior written consent of Grantor.
- 6. The Grantor reserves the right to use of the Easement Premises, for any lawful purpose, except that any structure or use shall not unreasonably interfere with the Easement or the Easement Activities granted hereunder.

The Grantee, its officers, agents, employees, successors, grantees, lessees, contractors and assigns shall promptly, and as soon as practicable after engaging in any Easement Activities, restore to its former condition any portion of the Grantor Property which is disturbed or altered in any manner by such Easement

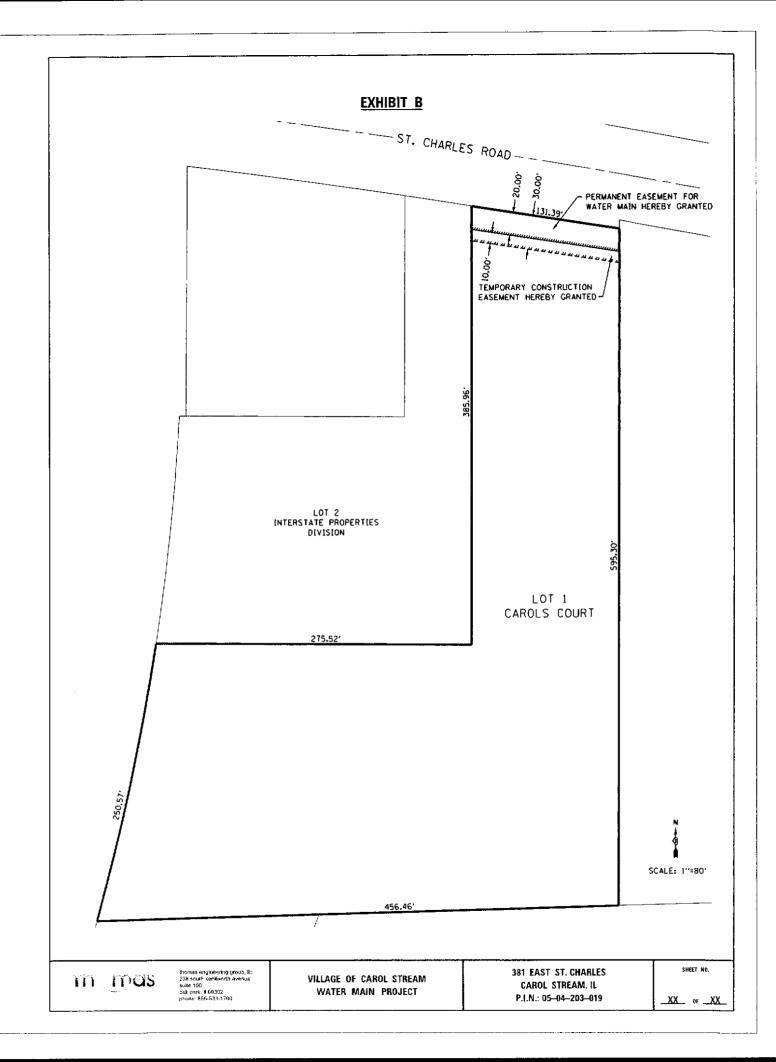

Resolution Supporting Application for ComEd Green Region Grant Funds for the WRC

Native Prairie Restoration Project

ComEd, in partnership with Openlands, is offering funding through their annual Green Region Grant funding program which is intended to assist local communities' efforts to plan for, protect, and improve open land by providing funding for some expenses towards these goals. The grants, which can go up to \$10,000 (and no more than 50% of project costs), support existing open space projects that focus on conservation, preservation and improvements to local parks and recreation resources. Grant recipients can use ComEd Green Region grants in combination with other funding sources to cover a portion of the expenses associated with developing and/or supporting their open space programs.

The proposed FY17 budget includes a project to restore a portion of the landscape on the east side of the WRC which has been de-commissioned. The project as originally conceived included simply replacing the turf grass in the east side with a pollinator meadow mix to both reduce maintenance costs and increase habitat for pollinators. The availability of the grant program presents an opportunity for a larger project. A map depicting the proposed project area, which is just less than one acre, is attached.

If grant funds are awarded the project would be expanded to include:

- removal of 950 feet of existing fencing and installation of 235 feet of new fencing to allow pedestrian access to the restored area
- installation of mulch walking paths through the restored area
- installation of one or more benches along the path
- installation of educational signage at multiple locations in the restored area
- removal of two small concrete structures from the decommissioned plant

I have met with a Glenbard North High School representative who teaches ecology courses and also works with the Green Panthers Club who has expressed interest in this opportunity to include students in the planning, design and monitoring of the project over several years. I have also spoken with CH2M and they have committed \$5,000 and expressed a desire to work closely with the Village and the high school in the planning and design efforts. While a project budget is still under development I would recommend that the Village commit \$5,000, and request a grant in the amount of \$10,000.

Grant applications are due by March 15 and must be accompanied by a resolution authorizing participation in the ComEd Green Region Program. Staff recommends Board adoption of the attached.

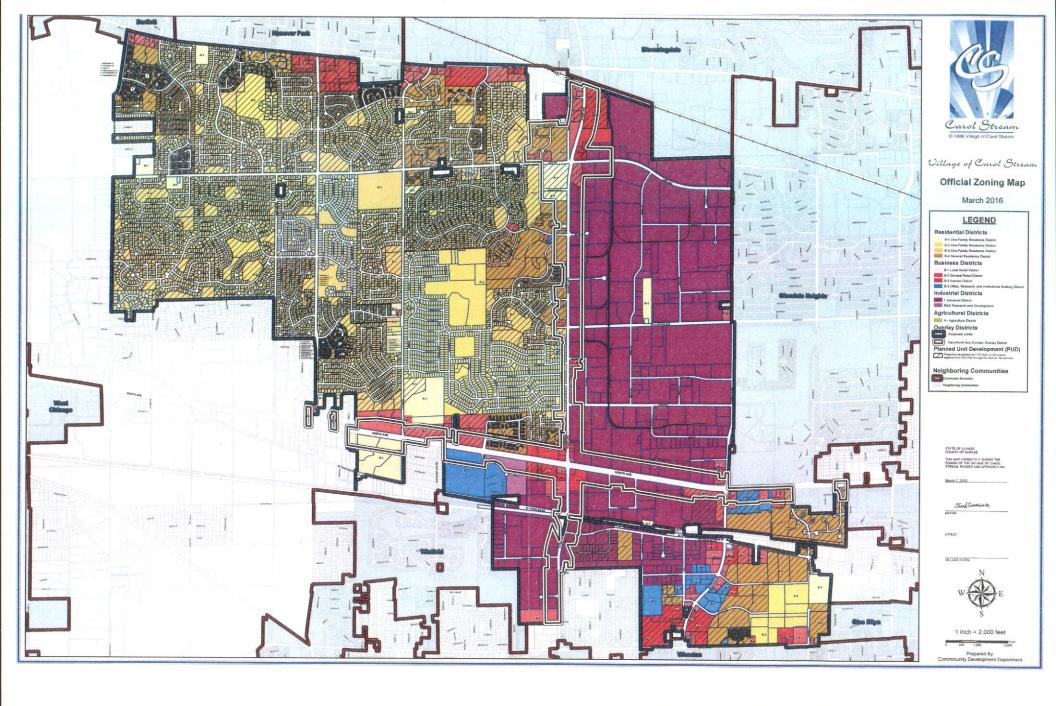

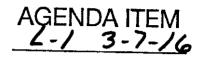
